MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion on Monday, 1st September 2008.

The Chairman writes:

Good News – I am very pleased to report that Mere was awarded First Place in the District Round of the Best Kept Village Competition (Large Village Category) and was subsequently awarded Second Place in the County Round of the Best Kept Village Competition. We are extremely proud and pleased with this result and would like to thank all our residents who help to keep Mere looking neat and tidy. A copy of the judges comments can be made available upon request to the Parish Clerk.

I am pleased to report that the youth are currently carrying out community work in clearing the footpath along the north side of Castle Hill.

Unfortunately, we have suffered a small amount of vandalism in and around our play areas and recreation ground. Broken glass is repeatedly being found in the recreation ground, vandalism has occurred in the tennis courts and the Parish Council recently erected ten 'No Dogs – Children Play Area' signs, only one of which is still in place.

We reported in the last edition of Mere Matters, that the Environment Agency had agreed to include the river along Waterside within their river clearance programme for this year and they would also be de-silting the river. I fear that this may have caused some confusion amongst residents because I have received an e-mail from the Environment Agency in response from a resident in Mere who claims that the Parish Council is saying that river cleaning is the Environment Agency's responsibility. This is not the case. Even though the Environment Agency is prepared to carry out the river clearance this year, it is a one-off clearance. The responsibility for routine maintenance of the river lies with the riparian owners (those who live adjacent to the river) and guidance on this is available from the Parish Clerk.

As a result of widespread concern and criticism over the last round of public consultation documents, Salisbury District Council has produced a new consultation document in magazine format, entitled 'Our Place in the Future'. This document will be sent to every household and business in the district during August.

The consultation period will commence on 1st September and continue for eight weeks until 24th October 2008. The purpose of this consultation is to enable Salisbury District Council and the new Wiltshire Council to set the planning policies for the district over the next 20 years and focuses on the possible location of new homes, employment land and the delivery of the infrastructure to support them.

Salisbury District Council will be holding a series of exhibitions, one of which will be in Mere, at the Grove Buildings on Tuesday 2nd September starting at 12.30 p.m. and finishing at 7.00 p.m.

THE NEXT 20 YEARS OF DEVELOPMENT IN THE MERE AREA

Following on from the previous unsatisfactory public consultation about the future development of South Wiltshire, I would like to inform everyone that all households were notified in the 'South Wiltshire Citizen' publication about the next period of public consultation. In mid-August all households and businesses should have received a 'magazine' from Salisbury District Council (SDC) – 'Our Place in the Future'. Copies are also available for reference in Mere Library and further details are accessible on the SDC website: www.salisbury.gov.uk

'Our Place in the Future' focuses on the main issues that were of most concern to consultees at previous stages, especially the location of new houses and jobs, plus the infrastructure to support them. The majority of issues in the 'black book' were strongly supported and hence it was not considered necessary to debate them again in detail, although people will be invited to review all the issues raised in the 'black book' (the earlier consultation document) and make fresh comments on any of the issues should they choose to do so.

There will be information provided in the **Grove Buildings**, **Mere on 2nd September from 12.30pm – 7.00pm**, and discussion at the Western Area Committee on 18th September. All Parish Councils will be arranging meetings during September and October to discuss the proposals. The consultation period will begin on 1st September and all responses must be returned to SDC by 24th October. I urge **everyone** to make their views known to Salisbury District Council **before 24th October**.

MERE WEATHER

Whilst June could not be described as 'flaming', at least it was comparatively dry with many warm days. We only had 63 mms (2.48 ins) of rain against 161 mms (5.42 ins) last year.

July started very wet. Up to the 11th we had 118.5 mms (4.67ins), with thunder on the 3rd. After the 11th it was drier with warm sunshine and a few hot days in the third week. Total for the month was 158 mms (6.22 in), the highest monthly rain this year so far. Last year we had 157.5 mms (6.2 ins).

August has started wet, like early July, but not as much rain. Up to the 10th we had 52 mms (2.05 ins) of rain. Generally, it has been mild with a few warm days. The rest of the month should be better.

MERE SURGERY

YOUR SURGERY NEEDS YOUR SUPPORT

The Department of Health has recently published a Pharmacy White Paper suggesting that 90% of rural dispensing practices, including ourselves, should cease to dispense directly from the surgery. Although this may not appear to affect those patients currently served by the town's pharmacy, we feel we must draw to your attention the inevitable consequences of this policy if it is allowed to go ahead.

Following the imposition of the 1990 GP Contract, 5,500 GPs took early retirement. This, combined with under-investment in health care for much of the next decade, led to problems with both recruitment and retention in general practice.

By 2000, the Government recognised the need for a new Contract and, after three years intensive negotiation, a deal was struck that breathed new life into general practice. For the first time, practices were paid to do much preventative help, particularly in the field of the management of long term diseases with a system known as the 'Quality Outcome Framework' in which practices can be paid for achieving up to a thousand quality points each year.

As a result of the new Contract we have been able to enlarge our staffing, improving both the service to our patients and our own professional satisfaction. We understand that we are the only practice in Wiltshire to have scored 100% in the Quality Outcome Framework for the year 2007/2008, and our Patient Satisfaction results were outstandingly high.

As a result of better staffing we have managed to keep more of our chronic elderly sick patients at home, saving the Health Service many tens and possibly hundreds of thousands of pounds in hospital fees.

Contrary to much press speculation about GP income, our own income is now significantly lower than before the new Contract. If we are forced to close our dispensary, our income would drop by at least another 25%. It will then be only a matter of time before medical staffing is reduced accordingly.

We have an excellent relationship with John Williams, our local Pharmacist, but must point out that he is a salaried pharmacist employed by a much larger chain based in the Midlands. In the event of this proposed change, John's workload would increase by

approximately 50%. Although we believe he would cope with this workload single handedly, he will have less time to advise patients than he presently has.

The local health service will see a reduction in the quality of care both, by ourselves and the pharmacist, and a return to higher hospital admissions thus adding to the PCT's costs.

Lord Darzi recently made five pledges:-

- 1. Changes will always be to the benefit of patients.
- 2. Changes will be clinically driven.
- 3. All changes will be locally led.
- 4. You will be involved (patients, carers, the public and other key partners).
- 5. You will see the difference (existing services will not be withdrawn until new and better services are available to patients so that they can see the difference).

We cannot see that the proposed changes fit any of his stated pledges and urge you to lobby in writing both your MP at the House of Commons, LONDON, SW1A 0AA and the appropriate Government Ministers:

The Centre was named in memory of Rosemary Goddard, a beloved District Nurse and has grown from strength to strength over the years due to a devoted number of Trustees, volunteers and organisers.

On 12th July 2008, we celebrated those 20 years with a party, organised by the present Chair of the Trustees, Lenka Stokes. A rather belated report on our Annual Meeting, which was held at the end of June, just too late for the previous edition of Mere Matters!

Approximately one third were to Salisbury District Hospital. Two thirds of the requests came from people in Mere and the remaining third from the surrounding parishes served by the Linkscheme. There are 30 drivers of whom 23 are from Mere, 4 from Zeals and one each from Bourton, Kilmington and Maiden Bradley.

Donations received from users of the Linkscheme made a substantial contribution towards running costs, but the contribution received from the Mere Literary Festival was essential in meeting the shortfall.

FR BEDE ROWE, THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH MINISTER, WRITES

An Ordination to the Sacrèd Priesthood

You may remember that Mere is in the parish of St George in Warminster, and one of the most wonderful things that happened in the recent past, on the feast of Saint Benedict, was the Ordination to the Sacrèd Priesthood of Fr Malcolm Ferrier.

Our ordinations, under the present Bishop, seldom take place outside of the Cathedral, but, for reasons known only to his episcopal self, Bishop Declan suggested that St George's host it. We, of course, jumped at the chance. This was only the second priestly ordination to happen in our parish.

Fr Malcolm will serve here, in Mere and Warminster, and so it is of particular joy to us as we have not only another priest, but one who we will keep. Our priests are moved simply at the will of the Bishop - our vows of obedience bind us to our Bishop, for he is our Father in God - but we know that Fr Malcolm will be with us for the foreseeable future.

For us, priests are an indispensible part of the action of God. We cannot exist without them. Indeed Pope John Paul II, of happy memory, said that a parish that did not have a priest would die. We need the sacramental life of the Church, of regular Holy Mass and confession, baptism, marriage, ordination, confirmation and anointing. Without these we are bereft of the touch of God. And these, to a large part (though with some exceptions) are trusted to the Holy Priesthood.

The priest is the one who acts in the person of Christ the Head. Thus his priesthood is different for the priesthood of all believers, given in baptism, for he can act in the very person of Christ in the unique rôle of offering the sacrifice of God to God.

For us, then, this is a moment of unsurpassed joy. Another priest to offer the sacrifice! Another priest to minister to the people of God! Another priest to be burnt up on the altar of God!

We hope and pray that Fr Malcolm will be a good priest, one who says his prayers and one who loves God. For there is nothing better in the world. Please pray for him.

EAST WINDOW at St Michael the Archangel Parish Church

Many people in Mere responded magnificently to our appeal for funds to renovate the dilapidated East Window in the Parish Church. We are most appreciative of your generous response and are deeply grateful to Karyn Sheppard and Judy Bickerstaff for their enthusiasm and energy in co-ordinating the appeal by arranging a whole range of innovative and entertaining fund-raising events throughout last year and the early months of 2008, which raised £13,000.

Before undertaking any work on an Anglican church building the Parochial Church Council has to acquire a legal document, the Faculty. For some months now, as Karyn and Judy's efforts were achieving our financial goal, we have been going through the lengthy process of consulting with the appropriate national bodies and providing Salisbury Diocese with all the necessary information in order to gain the required Faculty. Our submission to the Diocese Advisory Committee (DAC) included our wish to enhance the main design by replacing the light restricting and fussy background panes, known as "quarries", with clear glass that would enable more light to penetrate into the Chancel.

We are now keen to bring you up to date and share with you the exciting news that we have been presented by the Diocese with a once in a lifetime opportunity. Two of the national bodies with which we had to consult made it clear that they were not keen for us to remove the "quarries". However, in its own response to our submission, the DAC suggested: "that while the current design of the East Window is representative of its time, its design is of no great merit and sits unhappily within the early 20th Century reordering (of the inside of the church)." The DAC was of the view that: "...the Parochial Church Council should consider a complete change, perhaps of a bold design."

The DAC also acknowledged that the clergy and senior members of St Michael's had been unhappy with the 1850s design as long ago as the early 1900s. They had commissioned a prominent stained glass artist to design a replacement, but unfortunately no action was taken and the design was subsequently lost.

We are now presented with this golden opportunity to install a brand new window and we hope that you, the community, will be supportive of us researching this bold initiative with a view to transferring the funds, which you have kindly donated to us for restoration, if we are in a position to proceed. We have an excellent opportunity to design a window that would not only provide the additional light in the chancel that we have been seeking, but more to the point it would be a tangible and vibrant legacy of Mere at the beginning of 21st Century that we could leave to our children and our grand-children.

A new design is likely to cost a lot more than the £13,000 so far raised to renovate the window, but by having already shown our resolve by raising this substantial sum, it should be easier for us to gain access to grants, particularly "match funded" grants. We are investigating the costs and other implications and through the pages of "Mere Matters" we will keep you updated with our progress. We hope to display design options, if our research suggests that a brand new window is a practical proposition.
