The next two meetings will be held at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion on Monday, 1st December 2008 and on Monday 12th January 2009.

On Remembrance Sunday I laid a wreath at the war memorial, on behalf of the Parish Council, not only to remember those who fell in the Great Wars but also those who have given their lives in the service of this country in conflicts that continue even now. We will remember them.

I regret to report some mindless vandalism that occurred in the Recreation Ground last week when someone drove a car across the field in very wet conditions making an unnecessary mess and causing damage. On a brighter note, however, I am pleased to report that the Parish Council hopes to install some new play equipment in the Recreation Ground for the younger children in the near future, and we will be consulting with the playgroups and schools.

Following complaints that the Christmas Tree blocked the bus stop and overhung the highway last year, and after consulting with the Highways Authority, we have repositioned the Christmas Tree site. Finally, I would like to wish you all a happy and peaceful Christmas.

STEPS TOWARDS THE NEW UNITARY COUNCIL

The impending closure of the Salisbury District Council is drawing closer, and as one of your local councillors I will try to keep you informed. As Councillors, communicating to the public about what we do is one of the most important roles we have.

The new Unitary Authority, Wiltshire Council, will be formed following elections to be held on Thursday the 4th June 2009, which will be the same day as the European Elections. District Councils will be disbanded as from the 1st April 2009, but Wiltshire County Councillors will stay in place until the elections in June 2009. Those involved in

planning and licensing applications etc., will wish to know that for the interim period, a transitional arrangements bill currently before Parliament is intended to pave the way for Councils to appoint temporary co-opted members to discharge licensing or planning functions from 1st April 2009 up to the fourth day after the June elections.

To give you an idea of how the new Council will be structured locally after the elections of June 2009, it will be a statutory requirement for the new Wiltshire Council to establish area boards. These boards will be made up of elected unitary councillors, usually a low number, in my opinion of say five elected councillors. When a vote is required, a quorum of three will be required, thus on some occasions a vote of elected councillors may not be possible.

Outside bodies such as local Parish and Town Councils, ambulance, PCT (Health Service) and the Police will be invited to appropriate meetings. These outside bodies will be able to take part in discussions during the area board meeting unlike when attending a formal council meeting, but they will not be able to vote as a representative of Wiltshire Council. The new area board here will have an area about the size of the existing Western Area Committee of the Salisbury District Council. For Mere and West Knoyle, our area board will comprise of the existing Wiltshire Community Areas of Mere, Tisbury and possibly Wilton.

The existing community areas have Community Area Plans, (e.g. The Mere Community Area Plan 2004-9), which will still be developed by a separate community body called the Community Area Partnership. These plans will help shape our area, and will be fed into the statutory area board. I was one councillor chosen from The Western Area Committee of The Salisbury District Council to sit on the South West Wiltshire Area Board Steering Group. This is one of 5 "pilot" area boards out of a total of 20 area boards required for Wiltshire. I was told by one officer that elected Unitary Councillors appointed to these area boards will be Councillors needing to liaise with many outside bodies and work within the community. I spend most days now doing just that in addition to my normal work. As well as being a Mere Parish Councillor, I attend the above "pilot board" every other Wednesday and I attend Salisbury District Council meetings regularly.

Currently, there are four area committees in Salisbury District Council area exercising development control (Planning permission) functions. Each Salisbury District Councillor has a place on one of the above committees. Only one committee for development control will replace all four of the above committees in South Wiltshire after the election, with only about half of the elected Unitary Councillors sitting on development control committees. Housing and planning permission take up a sizeable amount of my time at

present. The public are able, in many cases, to attend very local Western Area Committee meetings to express their views.

Under the Unitary Council it is claimed: "the service will continue to be delivered locally by officers based in Salisbury, Chippenham, Trowbridge and Devizes. As a result, communities and parish and town councils will retain their existing ability to speak with and meet officers with an excellent local knowledge, but who also have the ability to draw down added expertise, should the need arise."

Trowbridge will be the hub of "the operation". I will try to keep you informed as we get ever closer to the new Wiltshire Council.

On a related note, Gillingham Town Council was informed well before I and my local Councillor colleagues, that the A303 would be closed shortly for three months, between Mere and the Willoughby Hedge service station*. I trust that when the area boards are formed after next year's elections that the Highways Agency will be good enough to perform better and inform the new area board of highway matters in that board's area..

WILTSHIRE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE WINTER SAFETY

With the darker colder nights approaching fast, the time for turning up the heating has arrived. Many of us in Wiltshire have open fires and/or woodburners as a source of heating.

Prevent Chimney fires. Keep your chimneys swept clean to prevent fires and structural damage to your property. Clean chimneys also help the environment by assisting the complete combustion of the fuel and reducing emissions in the atmosphere. Regular cleaning of your chimneys or flues eliminates the build-up of soot and clears obstructions such as bird and animal nests, leaves and debris.

Using a vacuum cleaner alone is not sufficient to clean the chimney properly. Ensure your chimney flue is inspected at regular intervals to prevent fire breaking out of the chimney. Fireguards can prevent serious injury or death and Spark guards can prevent a serious fire in your property.

Chimneys using smokeless fuels, bituminous coal, oil or gas should be swept at least once a year, but those using wood should be swept every 3 months when in use. Make sure that your smoke alarms are working and also that you are not at risk from carbon monoxide poisoning by having appliances installed and serviced by competent engineers. Fit a carbon monoxide detector and never block air-bricks, vents or flues.

A HEART-WARMING STORY

Rising fuel prices will make this coming winter a very worrying time for many, but help is at hand thanks to Salisbury District Council and Wiltshire Wildlife Trust. The two organisations have joined forces to run

a six-month campaign called 'Affordable Warmth.'

From now and until March 2009, a special 'affordable warmth action booklet' will be available to people who are having difficulty paying for their fuel or are facing high fuel bills. We have already sent the action booklets to over 6,000 households across the Salisbury district that may face difficulties following the recent fuel price rises. We are also giving the action booklet to organisations which are likely to be in contact with people who could benefit.

The packs will provide people with information on the grants that are available to make homes more energy efficient. Energy efficiency will not only make your home warmer, but it will also cut down your bills. Also included will be details of social tariffs from fuel suppliers to help people pay less, guidance on how to monitor and reduce your energy use, and tips on how to save money through switching fuel suppliers.

It will also have plenty of general advice on the practical things people can do to keep their homes, and themselves, warm – without costing the earth. 

THE REV'D PAUL BARNES, VICAR OF OUR PARISH CHURCH, ST MICHAEL THE ARCHANGEL, WRITES

A mother and father went Christmas shopping one Saturday afternoon with their seven year old daughter. The little girl was so excited about Christmas, so happy, so enthusiastic. But her parents were just the opposite, grumpy, grouchy, uptight, and their bad temper certainly wasn't improved by the traffic jams and the long queues in every shop.

When the family eventually arrived home late that evening, the little girl was still singing Christmas carols while her parents had reached the end of their tethers. Finally, the father snapped and in an angry outburst told the little girl to stop that wretched singing and go to bed.

The little girl headed upstairs to her room, but when she reached the landing she stopped, opened the window and looked out. "Why have you opened the window and let in the cold air?" her father shouted. "Because I thought I heard the angels singing", she answered.
