DR ANDREW MURRISON, OUR LOCAL MP AND MERE RESIDENT, WRITES

Two big reviews have dominated an eventful term at Westminster.

The Comprehensive Spending Review was disappointing for many because it offered only the barebones of the government's spending plans, so it was quite difficult to calculate accurately how individuals might be affected. Experience tells us that people welcome economies in the abstract, but are less keen when this is extrapolated to their particular case or to areas that interest them specifically. However, there can be little doubt that we need to contain spending, otherwise our children and grandchildren will be paying interest on our debt for decades. I am pleased that health has been protected since the budget has to increase just to allow us to stand still.

The Strategic Defence and Security Review (SDSR) inevitably upset a number of my constituents since our area has a heavy military presence. It upset me, but as the biggest threat to the UK right now is economic, not military, I fully accept the need to find savings especially given the unfunded liabilities the coalition inherited. I am comfortable that the SDSR has been informed by a proper attitude to risk and that as a result of it the UK will remain at the top table. The new treaty with France, our old sparring partner with which in truth we hold many interests in common, can only help to drive down costs, promote collective defence and allow us to protect our individual national interests worldwide. But, be assured that the entente will not extend to sharing an aircraft carrier!

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You can raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next two meetings will be on Monday, 6th December and Monday 10th January at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion.

The Chairman writes:

As I am writing this report, I have just returned from a very wet but well attended Remembrance Sunday service, but what is rain compared to the sacrifices so many people made in those arduous days.

The Parish Council is still awaiting the decision of Wiltshire Council on car parking charges. Sam Squires, George Jeans and myself attended another meeting at Trowbridge, trying to put our case across. We hope that this is not falling on deaf ears!

An officer from Wiltshire Council attended the last Parish Council meeting to talk about the present cut backs and, more specifically, the reduction in service provision for Tourist Information and Customer Services at Mere Library and the basis for making the decision to cut back the service was because, that there was no demand. Wiltshire Council is currently conducting a Library Review and we are advising all parishioners to make use of our wonderful library. Not only do they provide the traditional library services but there are computers available for community use, there are wonderful museum exhibitions, our local neighbourhood police hold regular drop-in meetings and there is a wide range of local information available from the very helpful staff. We encourage you to use your local library.

This year the Parish Council has decided not to purchase a traditional Christmas Tree, but to decorate the living tree in the central island (opposite the Post Office) with low voltage lights. The purpose for this decision is not only to save money, but also to comply with Health & Safety guidelines and we hope that it will be more visible as it can be enjoyed by people travelling both ways through Mere. We will welcome feedback on this in the New Year. The Clock Tower will be lit in the normal manner and we are planning to have all the lights ready for a switching on ceremony on Wednesday, 1st December.

On that note, on behalf of the Parish Council, I would like to wish all parishioners of Mere a very Happy Christmas.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

On Sunday, 14th November, I attended The Remembrance Service in Mere where I laid a wreath on behalf of Wiltshire Council. I would like to thank Michael and Maggie Durkee for providing the sound system, which was needed, as those attending extended all around the square. Michael Durkee had to improvise as he found his usual power source missing in the Town Clock and had to find his power elsewhere somewhat quickly. I would also like to thank the Police and Fire Brigade for stopping the traffic, and all those who made it possible for such an important occasion to take place.

Owing to the financial cuts that are taking place at Wiltshire Council, for some morale is low at present, however be assured that despite all the negative stories in the media, the vulnerable will still take priority.

The full Council have now agreed that councillors, like myself, should normally give a reply to an enquiry within four working days, and normally give a detailed reply in 10 days where possible. However, note the word 'normally'.

I have now visited Bourne Hill, which will be the main Wiltshire Council offices in Salisbury. It has much glass in parts with no air conditioning; temperature control is achieved with exterior shutter doors and special glass. The desk seating is for 320 people when 500 staff may need a desk (Hot desking?). It is hoped that many officers and staff will visit clients, therefore releasing desk space. However, Milford Street is currently the face of Wiltshire Council in Salisbury, and not Bourne Hill. Most other offices in Salisbury will be disposed of eventually.

Early December is when the Wiltshire Cabinet will decide on car park harmonisation. Whatever the outcome, I will do my best to keep Mere free of charges.

Those who have qualified for emergency housing in recent years have not had to use bed and breakfast accommodation. Homelessness is increasing and now it looks like "bed and breakfast" may return as an emergency measure.

County Hall has been the topic of "workplace transformation". I have been asked questions like: "will the new extension have a gymnasium?" Not fully knowing the answers, I have been given the chance to join the "Workplace transformation team" and I have agreed. I will keep you informed.

CHRISTMAS SAFETY ADVICE FROM WILTSHIRE FIRE & RESCUE SERVICE

With winter setting in, thoughts turn to the festive season - Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service has issued the following advice to help you have a safe as well as happy, Christmas.

- Festive decorations made of tissue paper or cardboard burn particularly easily, so keep decorations and greetings cards away from heaters, lights, fireplaces and candles.
- Most fires start in the kitchen so never leave festive cooking unattended.
- Ensure that your smoke detectors are working check them on a weekly basis and don't be tempted to remove the batteries to power any Christmas presents.

- Plan your escape route in the event of a fire and share it with everyone in the house, including guests and make sure everyone knows where the door and window keys are kept.
- Fairy lights and Christmas tree lights don't get used very often, so make sure they are in good working order before hanging them and only buy British Standard products.
- Use a residual current device on outdoor electrical equipment this is a safety device that can save lives by instantly switching off the power if there is a fault.
- Don't let light bulbs touch anything that can burn easily, such as fabric or paper, and don't leave lights on when you leave the house or go to bed.

Candles and night-lights are often used at this time of year. It only takes one candle to put your home at risk, so always take care when using them:

- Make sure you don't put candles in, or by, a Christmas tree, plants, flowers or other foliage.
- Be careful that ribbons, greetings cards and other decorations aren't placed near any candle flames.
- Check that candles are placed out of draughts and away from curtains, other fabrics or furniture, all of which could catch fire.
- Never leave candles unattended.
- Make sure you put out candles before you leave a room and before you go to bed.

Group Manager Perry Payne, from the community safety department, said: "This is the time of year where family and friends get together to celebrate. We don't want to dampen spirits, but we do want to raise awareness of the danger and destruction an overloaded socket or an unattended candle can cause. By following these simple tips, hopefully we can all enjoy a peaceful festive holiday that is safe from fire."

Message in a Bottle

The 'Message In a Bottle' scheme is a simple idea designed to encourage people to keep their personal and medical details on a standard form and in a common location - the fridge. It was originally the idea of a policeman 12 years ago and it has been adopted by the Lions Association. They

distribute a small distinctive plastic container, which is recognised by the three emergency services. The form in the container needs filling in to include your medical details, allergies, details of your next of kin and any pets you have. A sticker is placed both on the outside of the fridge and inside the front door by the lock, indicating to paramedics that "a message in a bottle" can be found in the fridge.

It is clearly useful for paramedics to know your medical details if a situation should arise where you became very unwell at home. It also highlights a pet needing attention if you should then be taken to hospital. It is aimed mostly at patients who live alone.

Free bottles, donated from the Lions association, can be collected from the Mere Doctors Surgery or Mere Pharmacy.

MERE RESIDENTS CALLED UPON TO HELP SAVE LIVES

St John Ambulance and the Great Western Ambulance Service (GWAS) are launching a campaign to set up a new Community First Responder (CFR) group in Mere.

Community First Responders are members of the public living within a designated area who are trained in crucial life-saving first aid by St John Ambulance. Equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen and a first aid kit, the groups respond to high priority calls in their local area. They are dispatched at the same time as the emergency services, but are often able to reach casualties more quickly as they are already in the vicinity.

"The first few minutes can often be crucial," said Steve Smith, CFR Support Officer for St John Ambulance in Wiltshire. "If someone's heart stops, they are 60% more likely to survive if their heart is defibrillated within three minutes of collapse". Julia Doel, GWAS Operational Support Manager for Community First Responders in Wiltshire, said: "CFR schemes are all about saving lives. By ensuring patients suffering immediately life-threatening emergencies receive essential first aid in the first vital minutes while an ambulance is en route".

There are over 100 existing CFRs in Wiltshire who respond to around two hundred 999 emergencies every month. GWAS has long enjoyed an excellent working relationship with St John Ambulance and the proposed new schemes will mean patients in these

areas rapidly get the help they need in a medical emergency. The partnership is based on a similar working model in Gloucestershire, where St John Ambulance runs all CFR schemes on GWAS's behalf.

REV'D PAUL BARNES, VICAR OF ST MICHAEL'S PARISH CHURCH, WRITES:

When a non-religious friend of mine told me he had attended the most amazing Christmas service which, in his words, moved him deeply and made sense of the Christian faith in a way nothing else ever had, I was very keen to know more.

The service he had attended began in someone's kitchen where the smell of newly baked bread hung in the air, moved on to her partner's workshop (their garage!) where the scent was a mixture of engine oil and wood shavings. A short walk to the village pub (and a swift pint) came next, and the service concluded in the very cold and pungent surroundings of the neighbouring farm's cattle shed.

You have probably guessed why the service took place in those particular venues.

In the kitchen they heard about the Angel Gabriel's visit to Mary and her 'yes' to God's plan that she would be the mother of a special child who would change the course of human history. In the workshop, they met Joseph angrily sawing a piece of wood as he

tried to come to terms with the shocking news that his betrothed was 'with child'. In the crowded public bar they saw Joseph and his now heavily pregnant wife being ejected into the cold night because there was no room for them. And finally in the cattle shed they heard of a birth and amidst the noise of the cattle a real baby was laid in a manger.

When we retell the Christmas story in a centrally heated and candle-lit church we lose a great deal of the reality of that event, it almost becomes like a child's bedtime story, designed to make us feel warm and comfortable and safe. But when the Christmas story is told out of doors it enters the real world that we live in and helps us start to make sense of what it meant for God to become one of us, to experience the laughter and tears, the joys and pains of life here on earth.

On Saturday, 18th December, we are taking the Christmas story onto the streets of Mere in the hope that we might hear that story afresh and it might become more 'real' for us. Our 'Living Nativity' will begin at 5.30pm at Fives Court in Angel Lane, from where we will take a short journey around the centre of the village, including a visit to a pub, before returning to Fives Court. To add to the authenticity of the event we are going to be joined by a donkey and a camel both of whom have important roles to play. But we would also like <u>you</u> to enter into the spirit of the event by dressing as a resident of first century Bethlehem, or as a shepherd, a wise man or even if you dare, an angel! (Wouldn't it be superb if we could fill Angel Lane with angels!!) It would also be great if it were not only the children who 'dressed-up' but also the adults.

There will, of course, be many other opportunities for you to hear the Christmas story and sing wonderful carols during this festive season, and all the local churches have listed their services and events here on the centre pages (20 & 21). However you celebrate this special time, I pray that God's beloved Son will bless you and your families with peace and joy this Christmastide and all through the coming New Year.
