I would like apologise for the inconvenience caused to users of the Multi Use Games Area (MUGA) over recent weeks. We have been experiencing problems with the floodlights and we are trying to attend to this but the job has taken longer than expected for a number of reasons. This has resulted in the MUGA being closed and unavailable for use.

### GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

Highways have been top priority before and over the Christmas break for me. Cars were sliding into each other in the night near my house at the bottom of Hazzards Hill. One night during the very icy weather, my son Michael and I and decided to salt some of the road at about 1.30 am. With the help of Councillor Tony Dean I managed to get the standard raised from 40 car parks treated in Wiltshire to 42, thereby including the 2 car parks in Mere. Before treating was agreed one morning the school bus had to pick the children up from the square, which caused some confusion. I put pressure on for the grit bins around the town and villages to be refilled, and to be fair Wiltshire Council did refill them. Luckily on at least one occasion Wiltshire Council was using local people who knew how to prioritise. I must thank our two Mere Parish Council workers Mr Suter and Mr Hansford for keeping going in the extremes of weather and gritting and clearing what they could, doctors' surgery area etc. In some areas of Mere my own firm helped clear public areas. I lived through the winters of 1963 and 1977 both of which were much worse than this time, however I had not experienced such weather as we had for decades. Note - monitor your local grit bins and if they need filling, contact Clarence on 0800 232323.

The Harmonization of Car Parking Charges could impose charges for Mere car parks. This was discussed in Trowbridge on 12th January, 2010, at the Environment Select Committee. Mere Chamber of Trade undertook a survey, distributing 650 copies of a questionnaire. The survey had a return of over 25%, which shows there is much interest in this subject. This was not a petition: respondents had to voluntarily fill out a form in their own time and return it. Mere sent a delegation of 6 including myself, Michael Hall, (Parish Council vice chairman) Barbara Hewitt (Chamber of Trade chairperson), Sam Squires and Roy Sims. Mere must have been mentioned over 20 times, therefore we have raised our profile. On Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> January, the survey will be presented to cabinet. I must thank the nearly 200 people who have filled out the survey. Wiltshire Council are proposing to put all the council controlled car parks of Wiltshire into 4 categories. Mere almost certainly would be in band 4. I wanted the committee to agree that band 4 charges could start at a zero platform, but the officer has said in public that we need to put a case forward for this. Money raised above a prescriptive minimum is used for a sustainable transport system. I personally cannot see the money if charged being used to improve our local public transport to any significant degree. We were promised devolvement of power with the new Wiltshire Council, and it was proposed to let the local area board decide the charges. Now we are elected the committee feels this would be too parochial, which I cannot say I agree with 100%. If charges as part of harmonisation are implemented, the time scale will be over 12 months, to allow for the process to take its course. We all should have a chance for further input; however should you feel your consultation is not being addressed or you wish to go "straight to the top" for your information, the elected Portfolio holder is ClIr Dick Tonge, who can be mailed at County Hall, Bythesea Road, Trowbridge or e-mail <u>richard.tonge@wiltshire.gov.uk</u>. I know many of you have filled in a survey; however if the pressure is not kept on, I am sure we will be forgotten. ClIr Tony Dean is our South West Area Board representative for highways who has been very helpful, therefore any representations you decide to make, please copy him in: <u>tony.dean@wiltshire.gov.uk</u> or mail to County Hall as above.

A and B class roads in Wiltshire are subject to a speed limit review at present. The B3092 and B3095 in our area may have 50 mph limits put on much of their lengths. This may be considered good or bad; however the consultation period ends at the end of January, and I have made this information available to the local Parish Councils in time. C and unclassified roads will not be surveyed until 2013.

I have attended a pre-hearing meeting at Salisbury on the 14<sup>th</sup> January regarding the Local Development Framework (housing, employment land etc.)The full hearing is starting on 2<sup>nd</sup> March, which will examine the soundness of the document put forward by Wiltshire Council. I understand from the pre-hearing anyone can attend and listen.

Lastly do not forget Community Area Grants. I have publicised them at all my local Parish Councils for them to get the message to local and community groups, that funds are available.

### FARM WATCH

### A bulletin from the Rural Crime Team of Wiltshire Police

Operation Ecstatic targeted Hare Coursers. We utilised the intelligence from the

previous 12 months to give us the best time frames to undertake the operation. Information was fed directly to the officers on the ground from the farming communities. Since the start of this operation, 26 persons have been arrested or reported for poaching-related offences and three vehicles seized. We are also working with our neighbouring police forces who are conducting similar operations.



Landrover Defender 90s would appear to be the vehicle of choice at this moment. There have been seven reported thefts in the past month of these vehicles. The incidents are spread throughout the South and West of the county and there does not appear to be a

pattern to this, although the increase in Landrover thefts is a National trend and not just an issue for Wiltshire. Only one of these Landrovers has been recovered.

PCSO John Bordiss has been working very hard to set up a Countywide Horsewatch scheme. This works like Farmwatch with text alerts and bulletins. If anyone would like to join the Horsewatch scheme please send your details to:

If you are venturing out on foot then please be aware that footpaths and pavements are not routinely salted or gritted. If possible, try to avoid any unnecessary trips. If you are an elderly individual I would urge you to call upon a friend, family or willing neighbour to assist you with your essential shopping.

I would like to update you all in relation to our community 'drop in' point at Mere Library. For some time now we have been staffing the Library on Wednesday mornings between 11.00am & 1.00pm. We have now published a timetable of future dates which will be the first and third Wednesday of each month, same time, same place. The next date will be 20<sup>th</sup> January. ## MERE WEATHER

We had more rain in November than any month I have recorded in Mere, a total of 243.5 mm (9.59 ins.) We had gale force wind on the 14<sup>th</sup>. December started cold with a frost on the 1<sup>st</sup> and several more frosts from the middle of the month, particularly from the 20<sup>th</sup> to the 23<sup>rd</sup>. During the Christmas week the frozen rain made the roads and pavements very hazardous although it was milder on the 25<sup>th</sup>. Total rain for the month was 114 mm (4.49 ins). Last year it was 64 mm (2.57 ins.) The total rain for the year was 1008 mm (42.71 ins.). Last year was 1280 mm (51.5 ins.). Every month was less than last year except for November and December.

Up to the 16<sup>th</sup> January we only had 23 mm of rain (0.91 ins.) which all fell on the 15<sup>th</sup>. On the 5<sup>th</sup> we had a heavy fall of snow, about 3 inches. Up to the 13<sup>th</sup> it was very cold, the snow froze and pavements were icy and treacherous. On the 13<sup>th</sup> we had another fall of snow - about 1 inch. Then it turned milder and after the rain on the 15<sup>th</sup> the snow was washed away.

A Happy New Year to everybody and let us hope for that Barbecue Summer promised for last year!

# REVD. CHRIS MOORSOM, RECTOR OF UPPER STOUR, WRITES

### GOOD IN A CRISIS?

So that was a real winter – snow, ice, lakes frozen over, roads closed .... For some this created real difficulties and dangers, while for others it was an opportunity for a bit of fun, or some extra time off. All this was put in perspective by the terrifying damage and disaster in Haiti, caused by the powerful earthquake which killed thousands, flattened homes and destroyed the infrastructure of a whole country.

Any disaster, whatever the scale, causes human suffering, and shakes (and maybe breaks) the foundations of people's lives. Seeing others in such need naturally calls out of us sympathy and compassion – as I write, an urgent appeal is calling us to give generously to bring help (see details of Christian Aid's appeal below). But this also makes me think, 'How would I cope if something like that happened here? Would I despair or fight for survival at whatever cost? Or would I keep alive the hope and compassion needed to re-build a broken world?'

Such qualities are found in the characters of C S Lewis' Narnia stories, on which this year's Lent course is based (see p. 30). In *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe* he tells how some children, mysteriously entering a parallel but magical world, are given the task of saving it from the clutches of an evil witch. But they are not on their own, and Aslan, the great lion from across the sea comes to their aid. In spite of arguments and mistakes, they discover inward resources of courage and hope which bring them through the crisis to win a great battle. The witch is banished and a new Narnia is begun.

Christians are surely called to be those kind of people, to be good in a crisis. None of us can be sure how we would react to disaster, yet there are things that can help. During Lent, Christians are encouraged to test and train ourselves in the way of Christ, deepening our understanding of Christ's message of compassion and forgiveness, and our courage to stand up for truth and justice.

So by taking on disciplines of prayer, study and action we can strengthen one another to meet life's challenges with the light of hope in Christ burning in us brightly.
