

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

I have been attending, and participating in, Carnival events this week (mid September). It is refreshing to see so much participation, and it is a social event that we should try and keep. Wincanton have lost theirs this year, may-be for a long time. Mere Parish Council always call the Carnival AGMs, therefore if a committee was not found one year, hopefully it would the following year. At present Mere has an active and successful committee.

I hope possible charges for Mere Car Parks can be averted, although it may entail taking them under local control. The Environment & Select Committee meeting is to be held on Tuesday 2nd November 2010 where: 'The Review of Local Transport Parking Plan' is an agenda item. This is the last meeting before it goes to cabinet.

Any of you thinking of installing renewable energy schemes should note: schemes installed before 2012-13 will get the best subsidies. I attended a presentation at Wiltshire Council where it was claimed one of the biggest wins for Wiltshire Council would be to try and reduce the number of cars on the school run. It was noted, and pressure put on at the meeting, to try and get children close to the school picked up free on the spare capacity of some school buses. This needs to be closer than the present three miles radius from the school.

It has been brought to my attention that the excellent first response medical service provided by Mere Fire Brigade and other brigades may be cut, I am much against this and I believe it should be resisted.

NHS Wiltshire (PCT) should have issued a written response to my questioning of the partial loss of our National Heath Dentist in Mere at our local Area Board. Upon chasing I find my statement was not put in the Area Board minutes, and the representative from

NHS Wiltshire forgot to write the statement. This makes me very sceptical, but I have been told a public written statement will be produced.

I have been told recently (if I am wrong I apologise, as with all information in this communication), that with the impending cuts, an estimated 2,000 public workers across Wiltshire may lose their jobs. This is not just Wiltshire Council, it includes many public bodies.

Local government is changing, especially the Wiltshire Councils involvement with schools. In three years time we may not be providing as many school services and buildings. It is acknowledged that many Secondary Schools will become Academy's. The Revenue Support Grant (central government provided) is being reduced by 5% to 40%, an average being about 25%. Highways are ring-fenced and no project is being withdrawn this year, but it is hoped the standard of maintenance can be maintained. We have had some roads repaired in the Mere area (this includes the outlying villages). I intend pursuing roads, as we know there are many locally in need of attention. The grant for free swimming for the over 60s and under 16 s has been removed, which will impact across Wiltshire.

The Area Board has been offered some more grit bins for our highways, these are few compared to the number requested. I will pursue those for West Knoyle, Stourton, Gasper and others.



MERE POLICE TEAM NEWS

We would like to start this month's bulletin by informing you of a piece of good work by your local neighbourhood policing team. A local man recently called into our office to report that his car had just been damaged by an unknown local youth, albeit he had a description of the offender. Details were recorded by us and an area search for the

offender was commenced. A youth fitting the description was subsequently located in Mere and apprehended within 30 minutes! He is now helping us with our enquiries, and this case shows how prompt reporting and quick actions can help us to help you.

We are pleased to report that the Mere carnival was a great success on Saturday 18th September. The weather held out and the event was very well supported. I would like to thank the team of officers who assisted Jake and I with the various road closures, particularly as some of those volunteered to assist us on their day off!

LIPREADING AND COMMUNICATION SKILLS

Thanks to the Mere Lecture Hall Trust

The Lipreading and Communication Skills class for people with a hearing loss takes place in Mere every Friday morning from 17th September until 3rd December with a two week break in the last two weeks of October. This is a very friendly group of people with all levels of hearing loss from mild to profound, but everyone enjoys learning more about the skill of lipreading and strategies for communication to help in those moments when diminishing hearing lets us down.

The great news this term is that we have been fortunate enough to secure a generous donation from the Mere Lecture Hall Trust to ensure that group members need only be charged the absolute minimum. We meet in a lovely classroom in the Footprints building at Mere School in Springfield Lane from 10.15am - 12.15pm every Friday. The room is easily accessible and there is plenty of parking. We use a hearing loop for those who need it.

We are very grateful for the Trust's generosity to help this vital class keep going during the coming year. We are always happy to welcome any new members. If you think you are not hearing as well as you used to do, perhaps now is the time to do something to arm yourself with a valuable skill, get to know other people and have some fun along the way. Learning to lipread, understanding more about hearing loss and meeting others in the same boat can make a problem into a very positive experience. We do hope you will join us!

Flu Clinics

A Flu Vaccination Clinic will be held at the surgery on the following Saturday, please contact the surgery to book your appointment time:-

Saturday 16th October 9.00am – 12.00pm

If you are unable to attend on this day further appointments sessions will be offered within normal surgery opening hours in November and December.

We would encourage all patients who are "at risk" to contact the surgery as soon as possible to book your appointment. Telephone requests for an appointment should be made after 1.00pm.

The Department of Health classifies patients with the following conditions as "at risk":-

- All patients aged 65 and over
 Asthma
 Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease including Chronic Bronchitis and Emphysema
 Diabetes
 Chronic Heart Disease
- Chronic Renal Disease
 Chronic Liver Disease
 Patients who have had a Stroke/TIA
 Patients with Multiple Sclerosis, or other degenerative diseases of the Central Nervous System
 Immunosuppression including patients on long term steroids
 Carer's.

If you do not fall into one of the above risk categories but would still like to be vaccinated please contact the surgery after the 1st November 2010 when an appointment will be offered to you if we still have vaccine available.

Swine Flu Vaccination

If you have a child aged over 6 months and below 5 years with one of the above at risk conditions and they have not yet received a Swine Flu Vaccination, the Department of Health are recommending that they are vaccinated at the same time as the normal flu vaccination. Swine Flu vaccination is also still recommended for anyone who is immunosuppressed. Special clinics will be set up on Friday mornings for any patient who needs a Swine Flu Vaccination. Please ask at reception.

If you have any queries about flu vaccinations please ask at the surgery.

The 23rd August meeting saw quite a lot of people at the Area Board Meeting, both private individuals and business representatives, and the decision that the Area Board would go back to Wilts Council and state they felt it was not in the best interests of the local communities to charge for car parking. But the battle is not over and the war is not yet won.

If we do not defeat this particular piece of legislation, how long before parking at Business Premises is charged for and becomes part of the Business Rates? It is a long slippery slope that we are heading for, so we need everyone's help in making sure our Car Parks are safe from fees.

MARY SHELLEY'S MASTERPIECE PLAYS IN MERE!

In May 1816, Mary and Percy Shelley travelled to Lake Geneva to stay with the infamous Lord Byron. It was there, late at night by candlelight, that Mary discussed her fascination of the medical experiments of the 18th century, specifically the ability of animating dead matter and the horrors of restoring a corpse to life. Prompted by her imagination, Byron formed a challenge – for Mary to create a supernatural story entirely of her own.

THE REV'D ROS HOLLINGSWORTH, METHODIST MINISTER, WRITES:

"Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness'
Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun;
Conspiring with him how to load and bless
With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eves run;"

So begins a poem by John Keats entitled 'To Autumn', which I learned at school long before I had any sense or understanding as to what it was about. I learned it and enjoyed getting my tongue around the words, but it was much later that I began to gain a deeper appreciation of the thirty-three line poem, and I commend it to you.

Now it speaks to me of God's provision and bounty in creation, of all that is around us in nature, if only we stopped to recognise it. As I look at the plump fruit and vegetables and the magnificent flowers and trees turning all shades of greens, oranges and reds, I am reminded of how much God loves that which He has created, and continues to create, year after year and as season follows season.

In Matthew's Gospel chapter 6, Jesus says: "Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them....Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these."

So consider, for a moment, the ordinary apple. At first glance, just an apple, but cut it open and you find the potential for lots more apples. Think then of other fruits such as melons or pumpkins, what tremendous bounty lies within.

When I look at such things I cannot but be amazed at the creator who makes such intricate things. How much more time and trouble does he take over us, his greatest creation. I am overwhelmed, astounded and so grateful.

"All good gifts around us are sent from heaven above, then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord for all His love."
