# MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you!

You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on **Monday, 2nd September 2013**.

### The Chairman writes:

As you may know, as a general rule, the Parish Council does not meet in August. However, there is always work to be done and issues to attend to.

Last month I was pleased to attend the Remembrance Service for the 43rd Wessex Regiment and to lay a wreath, on behalf of the Parish Council, at the memorial. The service was well attended despite the extremely hot weather.

Our grounds staff are very busy during the summer months, cutting grass and maintaining the open spaces, play areas, cemetery etc. You may have noticed also that the play equipment in the Castle Hill Play Area has been refurbished although, sadly, it has been necessary to remove the old slide unit which, at 22 years old, had outlived its usefulness and could not withstand any more repairs. We shall aim to replace this as soon as finances allow.

Whilst we have been deliberating the issue of our faded yellow lines in The Square, it transpires that we have strong feelings amongst our councillors for both sides of the argument: repainting the yellow lines or asking for them to be removed. This issue will be debated in full at our September meeting (Monday, 2nd September).

At the time of writing this report, we have had a wonderful summer enabling sport to flourish in Mere. I was pleased to be asked to award certificates at the youth football summer school event.

# GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

At a recent full council meeting Maggie Rae was appointed Head of paid services. We have to have an officer for this function by statute. We have no Chief Executive who would normally fulfil the role; therefore it is going to be rotated between our three corporate directors.

Of the £11m Wiltshire Council invested in Icelandic Banks, Wiltshire Council will get, and has received back most of £10m plus some dividend.

The Audit commission will be completely abolished by 2015. During some Audit training it was said Councils placed too much emphasis on policies and not outcomes. I quite agree with this view. Planning policies driven by policy with little regard to neighbours or parish council views being an example in my opinion.

Dog fouling complaints continue. The villages around Mere also are now beginning to voice concern. I understand our new PCSO can issue fines to those who do not pick up after their dog fouls in a public area.

On one of our nice summer evenings, I painted part of the flag pole on Castle Hill in Mere and removed some metal, which fouled the ropes. This was ready for the annual remembrance service in July of each year for those men of the 43rd (Wessex) Division who gave their lives in Europe in 1944/45, especially at Hill 112, Caen in July 1944, which was the Division's first major battle.

We are a very neighbourly area, and people openly offered their help. Andrew Holder stayed for more than an hour helping; he had only gone out to shop at the local Co-op! Those of you with Facebook may already have seen reference to the painting of the flag pole on Castle Hill. Some of my fellow electrical dealers told me about it, when I met with them in London. Media is certainly affecting all our lives.

The Co-op has just awarded a large grant to the Mere Rainbows, Brownies and Guides plus Mere Scouts, Cubs and Beavers.

Council Housing is seeing much change and a Housing Board is being set up that will probably meet every 6 months. We already have Tenants Panels and Focus groups with tenant's scrutiny of which Sandra Catley is chairman who lives in Mere, which I think is helpful for Mere residents.

I have had complaints about kitchen and bathroom fits in Wiltshire Council property, especially in Zeals. Should you know someone who is or was not happy with their install, please tell me.

Broadband latest. The Government has made an additional £250m available to bring 95% coverage by 2017. This additional funding is to increase our coverage further, above that which Wiltshire hopes to achieve by 2015.

It is difficult to achieve one SID (Speed Indicator Device) in a town the size of Mere. We actually have two at present. For one, we have to thank Mr Benfield in White Road by his agreement to the installation of a pole in his garden (except that the council put the device on the wrong pole last time!)

An APP for you to use on your smart phone to report road defects should be available by the beginning of September.

Help to live at home was passed recently by The Wiltshire Council cabinet. Should you require information on this latest move to enable people to live at home, please contact me.

Leslie and Tony Traves walking with me across Southbrook Allotments found a bracelet. If you have lost such an item when walking through the allotments, please give me a description and I will let you know if it is yours.

# WILTSHIRE COMMUNITY TRANSPORT DEVELOPMENT FUND

Funded by Wiltshire Council and managed by Community First, the Wiltshire Community Transport Development Fund (WCTDF) has been set up to:

- Enable existing community and voluntary transport groups to provide a wider range of services
- Enable communities to trial new services which assist local people to better access local facilities
- Support the establishment of wholly new community and voluntary transport groups

The fund will give priority to voluntary and community transport projects that provide services for the general public; particularly where public transport is no longer financially sustainable.

### There are three scales of grant:

### Small Grants (up to £1,000)

For projects over £250, applicants will need to provide a minimum of 25% matched funding of the total cost of the project.

### Medium Grants (from £1,000 to £7,500)

All projects will need to provide a minimum of 15% 'matched' funding towards the total cost of their project.

### Grant and Loan Scheme (from £5,000 to £20,000)

This scheme is on offer to CT groups who are in a good position to take on new services and are already operating in an enterprising way but need some support financially to develop capacity.

Groups can apply for up to £20,000 in total. There is no set percentage between the amount of Grant and Loan available. Community First will be available to provide guidance on this aspect of the application. Applications will need to demonstrate that projects meet community needs and that the group is in a good position to manage repayment of a Loan.

### **Keeping Safe At Home**

10 Golden rules to help you beat scammers (courtesy of the West Midlands Police):



1. There are no guaranteed get-rich-quick schemes.

2. Do not agree to offers or deals straight away. If you think you have spotted a great opportunity, insist on time to obtain independent/legal advice before making a decision.

3. Do not hand over money or sign anything until you have checked the credentials of the company that you are dealing with.

4. Never send money or give bank or personal details to anyone you do not know or trust. This includes sending money abroad and using methods of payment that you are not comfortable with.

5. Log directly on to a website that you are interested in, rather than clicking on links provided in an e-mail.

6. Do not rely on glowing testimonials: find solid independent evidence of a company's success.

7. Always get independent/legal advice if an offer involves money, time or commitment.

8. If you spot a scam or have been scammed, report it and get help. Contact ActionFraud 🕿 0300 123 2040, online at: www actionfraud.police.uk or the local Police 🕿 101.

9. Always remember: scammers are cunning and clever. They know how to manipulate you to produce the response they want.

10. Be suspicious. If you are unsure about anything, seek independent/legal advice.

### "Never go back" by Lee Child

Another thrilling Jack Reacher novel, which sees Child's loner ex-military hero embroiled in adventure and danger as he travels back to north eastern Virginia to meet the new Commanding Officer of his old unit. On arrival he finds himself accused of a 16 year homicide and receives another equally shocking piece of news.

### "The White Princess by Phillipa Gregory

This latest novel from Phillipa Gregory tells the haunting story of Elizabeth of York, wife of Henry VII and daughter of Edward IV and Elizabeth Woodville – the White Queen. As she grows to love the husband, she was forced to marry, she increasingly finds herself torn between her loyalty to her husband and her attachment to her rebellious mother. Her conflict is compounded when she meets *the Pretender* who claims to be her lost brother and denies completely the claims of the House of York.

### "Strange Shores" by Arnaldur Indridason

# Priorities

Our two priorities are rolled over from last month, Dog Fouling and Parking/Obstruction in the town centre continue to be targeted by the Neighbourhood Police Team. We have been engaging with dog walkers and drivers to deter people not picking up their dogs mess

and drivers are being instructed where they can and cannot park safely with due consideration to other road users. Your local police team is also now sending out warning letters to drivers who are caught exceeding the speed limit of 40mph at Kilmington Common. A big thank you to the team at Community Speed Watch for assisting us with this.

### Out and about with PCSO Pete

"I have been out on foot in the surrounding villages this month, talking to people in Zeals, East Knoyle and Semley. People are glad to see me about and I leave contact details so that they can contact me if they have any issues. In rural areas we are sometimes targeted by home and garage thieves. I would ask everyone to be vigilant, make note of suspicious vehicles, and call the Police if they suspect that people are up to no good. You are our eyes and ears; people looking for scrap metal; looking in gardens and driveways are of interest to us. If you can get a vehicle index and description, all the better, let us know and you could help to deter or catch criminals".

### Scam Warning!

This scam was actually sent to the Mere NPT e mail inbox. If you get an e mail from HMRC telling you that you have got a refund on your taxes and they ask you to fill out a

form and return it with your bank card details and security number, so that they can send you the money, DO NOT GIVE THEM THESE DETAILS, THIS IS A SCAM! Report it to Wiltshire Police on the 101 number. NO BANK OR GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENT WOULD EVER ASK FOR YOUR BANK DETAILS. **Remember.** If it looks to good to be true, it usually is!

# Flu Clinics

Mere surgery flu vaccination clinics will be held on the mornings of Saturday, 19th October and Saturday, 2nd November.

Anyone can get flu, but it can be more serious for certain people, so the flu vaccination is offered to:

- People aged 65 or over
- pregnant women

or if you have any of the following (whatever age you are)

- a serious heart complaint
- a stroke, multiple sclerosis
- asthma or bronchitis
- serious kidney disease or serious liver disease
- diabetes
- lowered immunity for instance because of steroids or cancer treatment
- if you have a problem with your spleen or you have had your spleen removed

The Saturday morning clinics are reserved for adults only, we will be offering children flu clinics at other times.

This year, the NHS is starting to vaccinate people aged between 70 and 79 (as of Sunday, 1st September 2013) against shingles. Shingles, also known as herpes zoster, is a painful skin rash caused by the chickenpox virus. Shingles can be very painful and uncomfortable, some people are left with long-lasting pain for years and very occasionally, shingles can be fatal.

We will be offering the shingles vaccination at the same time as your Flu jab if you are aged between 70 and 79. More information on both the shingles and flu vaccinations can be found at: **www.nhs.uk/Conditions/vaccinations**

We have a very friendly Lipreading Group where we meet others, who have a varying degree of hearing loss. We talk about how hearing loss affects our lives, learn about equipment and agencies who can help us come to terms with the loss of our hearing. We are fortunate to have an excellent lipreading tutor who helps us to learn and practise our lipreading skills. There is much laughter, and we do a good cup of coffee and biscuits!

We meet each Tuesday morning during term time in the small hall in the Grove Buildings. This is one of the few Lipreading Groups in Wiltshire, why not pop in and meet us? Our next meeting is on Tuesday, 24th September from 10.15am until12.15pm.

Action on Hearing Loss (formerly RNID- Royal National Institute of the Deaf) run 'Hear to Help' (a hearing aid clinic) at Mere Surgery on the first Thursday each month. It is run by volunteers. They can retube aids and give advice; however there are a few things which only audiology at Salisbury can deal with.

# WEATHER REPORT

In June we had a total of 25.5mms (1.0ins) of rain. Last year, we had 148mms (5.83ins). The weather was sunny and warm but not particularly hot.

On the 25th it rained and on the 27th we had 21mms (0.83ins). On the 29th we had 10mms (0.39ins) and a thunderstorm. The heat wave to beat many heat waves was over!

August started wet with 11.5mms (0.45ins) up to the 10th, and warmer than June.

# REV'D CHRIS MOORSOM, RECTOR OF UPPER STOUR, WRITES

### **Dressed for action**

As parents get their children ready for the new school term, they will have fitted them out with school uniforms, PE kit and school bags, ready to join their new school, or year group. This ritual enables children to feel they belong and to give everyone in the school a sense of identity. Along with this will go the learning of how a school works and how they are expected to learn and behave.

In the two Voluntary Aided church schools of Upper Stour Parish (St. George's school, Bourton and Whitesheet school), the whole school gets together near the beginning of the school year in church to welcome everybody back, especially any new faces amongst the staff and pupils. Whitesheet school in particular will be giving a very special welcome to their new Headteacher, Karen Brooker. At these services the school community is reminded that Christian beliefs form the foundation for the way the school functions. This is then worked out in practice, as children are introduced to the Golden Rules, which guide their behaviour in a positive way. Of course, it takes children a while to settle into this ethos, but over the year the values are re-enforced and quickly picked up.

Similarly, when parents bring children for Baptism, we refer to the idea of 'putting on Christ', and leaving behind the old self, sometimes represented by a special christening robe. As a new member joins Christ's community, the Church, they are putting off the worldly ways and putting on the Christ-like ways, handed down through the bible and the Church's teachings. So a new child of God is both welcomed into the 'school of Christ' and encouraged to learn by regular teaching and example how Christians are expected to live and behave in God's world.

In both school and Church communities, we are being formed by worship and shared activities into those who are ready to live life well, becoming life-long learners in the school of Christ. So it's important that we come together to encourage one another in faith and love, and in developing our talents and character: then we'll be 'dressed for action' and more ready to be the 'salt of the earth', just as Jesus intended.
