The Chairman writes:

As we spring forward into April I have heard lots of comments praising the beautiful flower tubs around the town, so thank you to all concerned. I have also been asked about the clock in the clock tower which has been stopped for quite some time now. Unfortunately, we have a problem in the tower with rotting posts and water getting in. We have done an initial inspection, which confirmed this, and are planning a closer and more intense appraisal soon. Inevitably, this could involve some disruption to the square with scaffolding etc. The clock tower and memorial is a vital feature in the town and I shall be keeping you in touch with the outcome of the investigations and the way forward.

At the Area Board meeting held in Mere in March, I was very impressed with a group of youngsters who spoke out in praise of their youth club and their leader Jaki Farrell. They put forward a proposal, which would maintain youth services in a practical and feasible way, and the Parish Council were happy to adopt this proposal as its response to the consultation document outlining the changes to the system. It amazes me that the youth services budget can be reduced by £192,000 and at the same time, according to the youth co-ordinator, be improved enormously!

The Mere skatepark has now been completed and is being well used and thoroughly enjoyed. Mere now has the best skatepark for miles around and we are attracting skaters from outlying villages and towns. Once the grass seed has had a chance to grow around the bunds, and the area is a little less muddy, we shall be holding an official opening ceremony. We would like to involve the youth in organising some competitions and skatepark jams in the future, so if you would like to help or become involved in this, please contact the Parish Clerk.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES:

I have been pleased to see the new Mere Skatepark being well used in the Spring sunshine. Yes, sunshine not rain for a change. It has taken 5 years, however, to see the excitement of the children today, but it has been worth it. It is the best in the area they say.

After many months, a sign stating "Woodlands Road Industrial Estate" with a direction arrow has been erected at the east end of Salisbury Street, Mere. This hopefully will discourage HGV's and large vehicular traffic away from Water Street and The Lynch in Mere. I am aware of many highway problems in the Mere area, grass cutting probably will soon be another, and I have requested a meeting with a highways officer, to discuss ways forward. The junction to Stourhead still needs redesigned signage. I hope this will not take as long to achieve as the Mere Skate Park!

Mere Parish Council is submitting a scheme for painting yellow lines on some streets, hopefully this will improve safety with regard to parking in Water Street, Salisbury Street and in The Square of Mere.

I will again mention The World War One commemorations this year, reminding us of the many people locally and nationally who tragically fell in The Great War of 1914-18 that started 100 years ago.

I hope you will remember in your own way, perhaps watch the march on Sunday, 13th July, 2014, which although for a commemoration of an event that happened in the second world war, some youth will be marching and we hope a display of poppies will be present around Mere. I understand also that a special commemorative walk is being organised. Visit Mere Museum or take a few moments to show respect in your own way.

I sat on a Standards Review Sub-Committee in March, which assesses whether a complaint against a Councillor would represent a breach of the Code of Conduct for Members. It was an interesting experience and gives me confidence that a robust mechanism is in place at Wiltshire Council for complaints against councillors.

While sitting on the Licensing Committee, I learned of some relaxation in (liquor) licensing for the World Cup Football games this summer, however this is only for England Matches! We were also told we can attend music festivals with officers, - could be interesting!

I now sit on the Finance Task Group and one of its tasks has been to review the aligning of the Wiltshire Council budget to Wiltshire Council Business Plan. It is somewhat technical, but I am now gaining an insight into the financial workings of the council.

Many have benefited from South West Wiltshire Area Board Grants in our area. In 2009 the annual grant budget was in the region of £120,000, but has been reducing year on year and further reduction this year is certain.

Those of you wanting grants for your club, or to say refurbish a local highways finger post would be advised to apply sooner rather than later this year.

I am, with my fellow councillors on the task group for Positive Leisure Time Activities for Young People, trying to find ways to maintain a good youth service for Wiltshire. The results will impact on Mere, Zeals, West Knoyle and the other villages around Mere.

The St. George's flag is again flying on Castle Hill and spring appears to be here, or I hope it is when you read this.

FREE SUNDAY PARKING AT SALISBURY'S CULVER STREET SHOPPER'S CAR PARK

Visitors to Salisbury can enjoy free Sunday parking at Culver Street shoppers' car park from 6 April 2014 as part of a trial by Wiltshire Council.

The decision to open the car park on Sundays without charge – it is currently open Monday to Saturday with a charge –is to encourage tourists and shoppers to use it, increasing trade to local businesses in the vicinity as visitors walk to the city centre.

Culver Street shoppers' car park is also receiving additional maintenance to improve the visual aspects of the area, further encouraging shoppers to use it during the rest of the week, when charges apply – as well as Sundays.

The trial of the free Sunday parking will be monitored and the findings used in the council's current review of its car parking facilities across Wiltshire. Other initiatives are also being reviewed to identify new and innovative arrangements for the council's car parks.

John Thomson, Wiltshire Council's cabinet member for highways, said: "This valuable initiative will attract additional visitors to the city on Sundays, and benefit local businesses. It will also provide us with useful information for the review currently being carried out into all our car parks. The review will allow us to identify a range of options and proposals which we will then put out for public consultation later this year."

Culver Street is a long-stay multi-storey car park with 528 spaces, located at the edge of the city centre. It has easy access from the inner ring road, particularly from the A30 (London) or the A36 (Southampton). It is one of seven pay-and-display car parks run by Wiltshire Council in Salisbury – offering a total of 2,596 off-street parking spaces, with a further 2,336 spaces in the city's five park-and-ride sites. 'Break ins' to Sheds and Barns

We have once again had various thefts from out-houses and sheds in our area. These occur mostly at night with the targets being power tools like chain saws, strimmers and quad bikes. We do patrols at night and are targeting the offenders and disrupt their actions. We would ask everyone who lives in rural areas to be alert and phone us if you suspect that there may be a theft

about to occur. Make, model, colour of vehicle, how many persons seen and, if safe to do so, a vehicle registration number would be great. Call this in on '101' unless they are actually there and you suspect they are about to commit offences then call 999. You can help yourself with a few ways to make your shed safer.

- Lock gates and doors with a sturdy lock, keep power tools near to your house.
- Shed alarms are not too expensive and check security lights are working.
- One thing to ask is: How much would it cost to replace what I have in my garage/shed?
- If you have high value items in your shed, park your car in front of the door, thieves will not risk setting a car alarm off to get into your premises.
- Install security lights and cameras up high so thieves cannot reach them.
- Don't leave garage doors open in the daytime, if passers by can see it, so can a potential thief.
- Keep receipts and if the item is stolen you will have the model and make and serial number.
- Remember Lock it or lose it.

Scam to Watch Out For

The Telephone Preference Service (TPS) is a valuable resource, but recent instances have occurred where members of the public have registered on the TPS website and have later received a telephone call from a person who stated they are responding to the TPS registration and asking for a fee of £39 to complete the registration. This is a scam and you should not pass your bank or credit card details. If you have been contacted by a person stating they are from the Telephone Preference Service and have paid money for this free service it is strongly advised that you report the incident to ACTION FRAUD 🖀 0300 123 2040 as well as contacting your bank as soon as practical.

CREDIT UNION NOW AVAILABLE WEEKLY IN MERE

GOOD NEWS ON MERE RIVERS

Wessex Water has a licence to abstract 9 million litres of water a day from Mere. Approximately 4 million litres of this is for local use i.e. Mere, Gillingham and the Stours. The remainder is exported.

Mere Rivers Group and many residents were concerned that this abstraction was having a detrimental effect on our streams. Following meetings with Wessex Water and the Environment Agency it was agreed tests should be carried out.

During 2013 Wessex Water installed testing equipment on the Ashfield at Burton and the Shreen at Landers Bridge. The black and white measuring scale seen on the rivers are known as gauge boards and these measurements are 'rated' so that the depth equates to a given flow. The metal box recorded depth and flow every fifteen minutes, which was then analysed by Wessex Water.

The results from this indicated that when the volume of extraction was reduced the river levels increased by a small amount.

A meeting on was held on 14th March 2014 attended by representatives of Wessex Water, Mere Rivers Group, Wiltshire Wildlife Trust and the Consumer Council for Water. It was agreed that a flow trigger point will be set, and should our streams fall below this level, then only water for local use will be taken.

This trigger level will be used during 2014 when the trials are resumed. The level will be marked on the gauge boards. This is still an on-going trial, but using the information collected should enable a good flow of water in our streams all year.

Dylan Thomas's poem *Under Milk Wood* cannot, in my opinion, be staged or filmed easily. It is an unpleasant jab at Thomas's entire neighbourhood. He didn't travel around with a hidden video camera exposing domestic life, but he might as well have done. All his characters are either curdled, soured, or whipped about!

It takes the brilliance of Chris Wood/Jane Smith as Directors to produce a stage play that left me in awe. The small cast pulled off extraordinary verse speaking, mime shows, quick change acts, Welsh accents. Sixty three roles from thirteen actors. The atmosphere of suffocating village life, the worries, memories, and belief systems, which beset their days and nights were conveyed with alacrity and black humour.

For a morning visit, three members joined a conducted tour of the Bore Hill Farm Biogas Plant at Warminster. Commercial food waste is used to produce energy for local use and farm fertiliser. It employs 6 local people to operate the process, and there is hardly any smell to cause annoyance. In fact after two years of operation a local reporter telephoned to ask when the plant would start up, since there had been no evidence of the process plant being operated. It just goes to show that if you choose your site wisely, everyone can benefit.

Our next meeting on Thursday, 1st May in the Grove Building at 7.30pm will be a member's organised meeting. The first part of the meeting will be a discussion of the National Federation of Womens Institutes' Resolution for the AGM, which this year will be "Increasing Organ Donation."
