The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you!

You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on **Monday, 2nd March 2015**.

The Chairman writes:

I am pleased to report that the new play equipment in The Castle Hill Play Area has been installed. This replaces previous items which were old and uninspiring or had failed the safety inspection. The log cabin had been there for 30 years or more, so it was sad to see it go. I am sure that the children will enjoy playing in this popular area. The equipment was purchased using Developers' Funds.

At the February meeting of The Parish Council, we discussed whether we should change our name to Mere Town Council. The recent television programme "Hidden Villages" was keen to confirm that Mere is, indeed, a town. There is an argument that changing our name may help to promote tourism, the businesses in the town and the facilities Mere has to offer.

Our Clerk is currently looking into the legal process and the Parish Council will be discussing this issue at future meetings. Of course, we would like to have the parishioners' views on this, so please look out for agenda notices and come to the meetings or you can contact the Clerk.

Last month the Parish Council hosted the Annual Carnival meeting. I would like to thank and congratulate the Carnival Committee members, and their helpers, for all the dedicated hard work which goes into organising our carnival. It seems, as ever, more volunteers would be appreciated.

The Parish Council strives to keep Mere looking as good as possible and we have excellent groundsmen and staff who work particularly hard, especially in the winter. It has come to our attention that there are a lot of out-date-notices remaining on notice boards and telegraphs poles around the town, this tends to detract from any new events. GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

I attended the Grove Building on Sunday, 8th February regarding St. Michaels Church, which is the most prominent building in Mere. I was surprised to learn at least £53,000 a year has to be paid out from church funds to the Salisbury diocese. It is a building that impacts on many. The church organises the annual Fete that many of us enjoy. The church is a member of Churches Together in Mere and District, which has in the past, and will again, organise hustings at the coming general election, enabling the local people to hear the candidates.

With the declining Christian population in Mere, Jane Hurd suggested that a way to start connecting with the Mere Parish Council would be to report to the Annual Parish Meeting, which other organised bodies do now. I thought if Churches Together did so, it would be inclusive and an excellent idea. This is now being explored.

Highways Major Maintenance programme 2015/16 includes work at West Knoyle, Stourton, Kilmington and Mere, some of which has already been completed. No mention is made for instance of Castle Street, Mere or Wolverton Lane, Zeals. I have brought this to Wiltshire Council's attention.

Bishops Close, Mere will be closed on 12th March for highway improvements, therefore access to local properties will be impacted on temporarily.

The Magna Carta will be 800 years old this year. On Monday, 15th June, a festive celebration in the Cathedral and Close involving different community groups and a variety of activities, in partnership with Wiltshire Council, will take place as part of a MAGNA CARTA GALA.

BT Open Reach at present is laying fibre optic cable in Mere, to bring some of us Superfast Broadband. On one Sunday morning they managed to lay cable from Chetcombe Road to The Square, but on another day progress was very slow at Edgebridge as there was silt in the existing duct and someone in years past had put the overflow of a drain into the BT manhole!

Area Board Capital Funding across Wiltshire has very slightly increased, however for our South West Wiltshire Area Board we do not know at this time if we will get equal funding to last year.

A Local Youth Network (LYN) is held regularly at The Andy Young Pavilion where the youth of the area are much needed in attendance to propose youth projects for the area. All youth are welcome.

This forthcoming year's budget of Wiltshire Council will have been decided at County Hall on the 24th February. No increase in Wiltshire Council's share of the Community Charge is likely. However, to maintain the status quo with increasing cost, a charge of £40 per green bin is likely, and other cost saving measures, with a commitment to protect the vulnerable in society. Waste is currently forecasting an overspend of £2.5m based on the 2014 to 2015 budget. This mainly relates to additional costs of waste disposal during the year. Note your total community charge probably will increase, an example being the Police who have requested an increase of £3.06 a year for the average household, and Parish Councils having to bear increasing financial liabilities in recent years, all of which impacts on your community charge.

Any increase in business rates attributed to new business in Wiltshire up to a cap of 2% comes to Wiltshire Council. It came to my attention that the Army pay business rates, therefore with the returning forces and increased facilities for them, it is unlikely in the short term Wiltshire will benefit from business rates produced by new business. It was stated at the meeting I attended, the "Shard" building in London was late opening and one of the reasons was to throw the increase of business in to the next qualifying period.

Wiltshire Council is responsible for Public Health. Weil's disease is a severe form of a bacterial infection. Weil's disease is spread to humans by contact with soil or water contaminated with the urine of certain wild animals, including rats. I have had it alleged to me that Weil's disease has infected a person in South West Wiltshire. If a doctor decides someone has leptospirosis (Weil's disease) that person should tell their employer, who must then report it online at: www.hse.gov.uk/riddor.

The Speed Indicator Device (SID) programme across Wiltshire has been stopped. However, the South West Area Board (SWWAB) with volunteers and insurance I have sourced may be able to fund a local programmes. Our SWWAB will continue to see if the SID's previously used by Wiltshire Highways could be used in the areas where local parishes will help fund them.

Business Wiltshire are asking local SME (Small and Medium Enterprises) who want to understand more about how the council advertises opportunities to quote for its business, to join them at one of their free workshops and learn about Wiltshire Council's procurement process. The details of each workshop are as follows:-Monday 9th March, 10.00am to 12.00noon, City Hall, Salisbury and Monday 16th March, 10.00am to 12.00noon, Monkton Park, Chippenham.

The Car Parking Review Task Group has reported to The Environment Select Committee. The Mere Area had already taken over the local Wiltshire car parks some

time ago. However, the following extract of its recommendations (Numbers taken from theactual Report) is of interest as many of us visit other Wiltshire Towns.

- 1. That the use of automated pay by phone systems be made more attractive by ensuring the same charges are levied irrespective of the method of payment; for example they should be no surcharge on payments made using the automated phone service.
- 5. That Council officers should continue their efforts to maximise use of Car Parks when they are less well used. This would be by means of cheaper or free periods when revenue has been proven not to be affected. Consultation responses were keen to encourage this sort of experimentation.
- 6. The current Park & Ride scheme in Salisbury should encourage out of town city workers to use this service with a more attractive offering.
- 7. The Council should be prepared to enter into discussions with Shopping Centre owners (in addition to Town and Parish Councils) to take over Council Car Parks.
- 9. That towns and parishes are actively given the opportunity to take on assets or topup funding to enable reduced charges; and that they are properly supported in making any such decision through the provision of real and accurate information.

Residents could save on their energy bills. Householders have, and will have again, the opportunity to save money on their energy bills with an auction for the UK's largest collective energy scheme. The Ready to Switch scheme is the largest and most inclusive of its kind in the UK with Wiltshire Council and 11 other local authorities joining together as part of the collective lead by Peterborough City Council.

Finally Mere Brownies have often been over subscribed in the past, although numbers are currently a little down at 22. Mere Rainbows have leaders and few Rainbows. I hope with Spring around the corner, numbers will again increase.

MERE LIBRARY NEWS

On Saturday, 14th March, between 10.30am and 12.00noon there will be stories and craft activities at the library to celebrate Mother's Day. All children are welcome, but any child aged 8 and under should be accompanied by an adult.

There will also be an Easter activity here on Tuesday, 31st March from 2.30 to 4.00pm.

An exciting new promotion is starting shortly in conjunction with Mere School. Children will receive a "loyalty card" on which they can collect stamps every time they visit the library, join the library, borrow books or attend library events. At the end of June, the

end of the promotion period, the class with most stamps will win a celebration party, and the child with most stamps will receive a small collection of books!

POLICE REPORT

Shed "Break-ins"

We have again, unfortunately, had various thefts and attempted thefts from sheds and out-houses where we think the offenders are looking for power tools and other valuable items stored in these places. If you do store power tools in a shed, then you need to make sure it is secure, and that might include a shed alarm or lights

that come on when someone approaches.

Shed alarms can be cheap to buy and would put the casual offender off or alert you to an offender breaking-in. Help us as well by reporting suspicious activity and being alert. Long term security can be useful, when planting bushes, thorny ones are more difficult to get through and gravel paths that 'crunch' deter would be burglars. Always report unusual activity: sometimes thieves will have a look around a few days before and come back at night. If you can safely get a vehicle index number, even better. Call '101' and ask for Wiltshire Police, or 999 if you suspect they are actually breaking-in.

Scams

Reports of scams via post, e-mail and telephone seem to be coming in. The general advice is never to give out your bank details. If someone calls to say they are from 'windows' and your computer is infected, this will be a scam, hang up on them and call police on '101' or report it to 'Action Fraud' - details online or on our posters in the library.

Remember the old saying: 'If it seems too good to be true, it usually is'. It is a good dictum to remember! I have lost count of the time that I had e-mails telling me that I have won the Nigerian Lottery and if I sent £2,000 for taxes, they will release the prize!!!

Drones

After reports of a drone being used in Mere, we have located the owner and informed him of the regulations for the use of a drone (they are on our facebook page if you want them).

Residents were worried about intrusive photography, but footage was seen by officers and nothing of that nature was seen. Words of advice on where drones could be used were given to the owner.

Safer Internet Day

Wiltshire police are involved in delivering presentations this month to primary schools regarding internet safety. If your children have I pads etc whereby they can access the

internet, we advise Parental Controls are put on your router. Smart phones can access the internet, so be aware.

If you are not sure what to do, call your provider who will guide you through it. Sometimes children are more aware of technology and can be very good with it. If you are not sure about internet safety, ask someone. Be Safer Online.....

Community Messaging

We are rolling this out this month in our area. Community Messaging is a great new way of keeping up to date of things that are happening in your area. Just go online and Google it, or fill in a card in the library and drop it in at the post office box and you can get informed of incidents when they happen in your area. Wiltshire Police and the Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, Angus Macpherson, are committed to involving communities in the prevention and reduction of crime and anti-social behaviour.

Working alongside Neighbourhood Watch, Wiltshire and Swindon Community Messaging aims to improve the flow of information between communities and the police. You can now join for free.

NEWLY MODERNISED POST OFFICE WITH EXTENDED OPENING HOURS

Mere Post Office is currently converting to a Main Post Office model. Zeals and Bourton Post Offices are the alternative Post offices for the period of conversion.

A newly modernised Post Office will open in Boar Street on **Thursday, 5th March** with: extended opening hours; an extra Post Office till for convenient bill payment, banking, benefits, travel money, Euro's & US dollars, postage, home shopping returns, Local Collect and more.

There will be a Post Office serving point at the retail counter, offering selected services, which will be available during shop opening hours Monday - Saturday: 8.00am - 5.30pm; Sunday: 8.00am - 1.00pm. This means that the branch will open on Sunday mornings and Saturday afternoons and it will open earlier every day.

As a reminder, until Thursday afternoon of 5th March, alternative branches to use are Zeals Post Office, Chapel Lane, Zeals and Bourton Post Office at Forge Garage.

MERE LECTURE HALL TRUST

It seems a good time to explain about the Trust since there are a number of rumours going round. Many people are new to the town and may know little about it. In 1860, a prominent citizen, a Quaker, built the Lecture Hall in his garden as a facility for the town, to provide a venue for adult education classes and lectures (many adults in that generation were illiterate), to further his non-conformist Christian beliefs, and fight against alcoholism. He and his family, the Rutters, managed the Hall. A generation later, in 1924, the Lecture Hall was made over to a newly formed Trust created for the promotion of the spiritual, moral, educational and social welfare of the people of Mere and environs.

Originally the Trust aimed to have 40 members to give wide representation to the town, to the various non-conformist churches and several members of the Rutter family. In recent years we have found 25 to be an optimum number. Currently there are 17 trustees of whom 11 live in Mere. Of the other 6, one is the URC Minister for Mere, two are Quaker representatives from the nearest Quaker Meeting, and 3 are remnant members of the Rutter family. All Trustees have the objects of the Trust and the good of Mere at heart. Recently representatives of the Anglican and Catholic churches in the town have been included, as well as the non-conformists. Six trustees are elected to form a Management Committee.

So that the new Trust would have spiritual and moral freedom, the benefactors ensured financial independence by giving various other properties to the Trust to provide income for the Trust to run and maintain the Lecture Hall and pursue the objects laid down. Over the last 90 years various properties have been bought and sold as appropriate and need arose.

For a long time now, the committee has been very largely taken up with property management, which has consumed most of the rental income and a great deal of the time and energy of a few people to maintain and upgrade our stock of old properties. We have striven to be good, just and caring landlords but a pre-occupation with property management is not the primary purpose for which we are Trustees, which should be creatively pursuing the objects of the Trust and running and maintaining the Lecture Hall. One of the creative ways has been the awarding of annual grants to local organisations.

The few people prepared to give so much time and energy cannot be expected to go on indefinitely, and it has become increasingly difficult to find suitable trustees to accept the

responsibility. New trustees are needed who accept the Christian ethos of the Trust and who can give a wide, balanced representation for Mere and practical expertise in the day-to-day work of the Trust.

During last year, the Trustees took the decision in principle to sell all our endowment properties to prevent the constant drain on resources. And if the Trust were not swamped by property management it would become a much less time and energy consuming responsibility, and so more attractive to future Trustees. We have been accused of "selling the family silver" but that would be completely contrary to our responsibility as Trustees. The properties are old and high in maintenance and we do not believe they will hold or increase their value without further development.

The alternative of financial investment even at low interest rates we believe to be a responsible choice, or re-investment in modern property. This became all the more acceptable when we were advised that the property would sell better, not worse, with sitting tenants.

After further consideration it was decided not to sell all, and a decision was taken to sell three lots. At our last meeting this was reduced further. We are not going to sell The Gables building complex for the time being, but only the two properties on the north side of Salisbury Street. This only partially achieves our objective, but seems more acceptable to the majority, and the various tenants will hopefully have security of tenure for the time being.

I hope this helps to clarify the issues.



PROJECT SUNRISE - MERE

It hardly seems possible that the final six-monthly report to the South West Wiltshire Area Board is about to be submitted. All of the subsidiary projects have progressed well during the two years of the project and the effects will continue into the future. The purpose of the grant can be summarized as:-

Supporting local business, encouraging tourism.

The funding was broken down into five major areas. The stage has now been reached where encouraging results are apparent in all of the sub-projects.



Local Signage

The Duchy Manor sign on the road in from Stourhead has been updated and replaced. It should encourage visitors looking for facilities on their way to the A303 to divert into the town. The new Town Map is in the final stages of agreement before printing and installation in the Square. The other two maps in the car parks will

then be printed and installed. The design method enables their reproduction to any size and is easily modified. Consequently we expect to allow local business to use it for a variety of advertising purposes, from websites to napkins. With the basic design established, the signs at Willoughby Hedge will be brought into line before the summer trek to the West Country.

Stimulating Tourism

Tourism in Wiltshire is publicised through the organisation "Visit Wiltshire". The Chamber has joined this. Local information will now be available to tour organisers and coach companies throughout the country in printed form. Their website will carry updated information and links provided by the Chamber. Mere used to have an ancient charter market but this was discontinued many years ago. Plans are at an early stage to revive this as a Sunday Street Market, once a month. We will keep residents updated through Mere Matters as the project develops.

Improved Business Visibility

The Chamber website has been renewed and now has a distinctive look. Content is gradually being introduced, and links included to businesses and local helpful information. A Facebook page also has been generated but needs more content and followers.

Support Local Trade

Several courses have been held for members covering First Aid, Health and Safety, and the use of social media. Membership of the Chamber has inceased by 35% over the figure before the project started. We are still looking to encourage Single Person Enterprises. If you are one, or know of one, please get in touch.

Premises for Start-ups

We expect one new business to commence trading in the next month or so. Premises are difficult to identify and inhibit growth in the town and surrounding area. A survey of available premises suitable for start-ups was not encouraging. If you know of anyone with a workshop or similar facilities willing to rent to a new business, please let us know. Guidance on apprenticeships and how businesses can arrange them is available locally.

FRIENDS OF ST. MICHAEL THE ARCHANGEL King James II Coat of Arms – Part 1

You may have noticed that the painted Coat of Arms of James II, dated 1684, which has been hanging over the north porch of St Michael's, has gone! It is now in Bristol awaiting the start of what will be a quite long conservation process. But why was it in the church in the firstplace?

At the Reformation, when Henry VIII broke away from the Pope and Rome and declared himself the head of the Church of England (1534), some churches installed the Royal Arms on the rood screen or over the chancel arch, replacing the usual images of the cross and attendant figures. It was a gesture intended to signify in no uncertain terms that the King was now the supreme ruler of the church. This practice was not universal, however, and was the cause of much dispute.

During the reign of Mary (1553 - 58, a Catholic), the cross and figures were put back. The Royal Arms were not banned though, simply placed elsewhere. After the execution of Charles I (1649) and the establishment of Oliver Cromwell's Commonwealth, Royal Arms were removed from churches, or were turned to face the wall. It was only at the Restoration of Charles II in 1660 that the display of the Royal Arms in churches became compulsory. *To be continued!*
