# GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES:

The popular road to Salisbury through Teffont has been closed while the road through the village has been resurfaced. I have been attending meetings held in Salisbury by travelling the A303 then the A36. The turning to the A36 at Wylye has been very much enhanced by the autumnal colours of the many trees at this point. This year is passing swiftly for me!

While at one Southern Area Planning meeting at Salisbury, one of the applications was for the Police stationed in Salisbury to be permanently located at Bourne Hill Council Offices. Voting was tight on this application, the Salisbury City Council had objected for the reason that sirens and lights could disturb the high number of residents living nearby. I voted for the Police Station to be at Bourne Hill as I felt this was an issue that impacted on many people and the location would be central to Salisbury, and I had to appreciate the larger picture. I think the final vote was 6 for 5 against, therefore a councillor's vote does count sometimes. The area for policing, which includes the Mere area has 45 PCs, 12 PCSOs (not all posts are filled) and deployment is around 70%.

On the 14th November Age UK have an event between 10.00am and 3.00pm split between Mere Salisbury Street Car Park and The Rosemary Goddard Centre.

As I have stated many times, I sit on the Wiltshire Broadband Project Board, even so I do not always know what is happening as an apparent broadband green cabinet has appeared in the centre of Kilmington. The village has spent much time looking for ways

of privately funding enhanced broadband for themselves, as being told they were not in the intervention area for improvement, they would not receive enhanced broadband. Now it appears they could, I have asked for a report on the issue. Wiltshire have obtained two million pounds from Broadband Delivery UK, plus one million from Wiltshire's Local Enterprise Partnership to help some businesses to obtain something called ultra fast broadband. A map is being prepared at present of those areas of Wiltshire where businesses find themselves in a 'no service' area for speeds above 24 or 30 Mbps. This is known as a white area.

I was pleased to hear from a local resident of West Swainsford, Mere that 9 brown trout and 9 eels were found in a hundred metre long Wessex Water test area, in the river through West Swainsford. This is one indication to me that our water is unpolluted, and is reassuring.

I attended The Mere Literary Festival presentation, when the book "Merely A Festival" was launched, which is the history of the 20 year old festival and was was compiled by Sue Evans and Adrienne Howell. It is well worth reading being a publication connected to the Mere area. The Wiltshire South West Area Board gave a grant towards the publication. At the same event we learnt Amazon wanted to charge 53% for selling another book called Deepest Dorset, for which the proceeds were going to charity.

The operator of The Old Ship Hotel, Mere has enhanced the building, which to me is better than the condition it had deteriorated into a few months ago. I am sure many would like to see it brought up to a very high standard, but unfortunately no one seems to want to invest in such a project. The operator has been approached to allow a community event to use some of The Old Ship facilities, to which it has agreed.

I have several highway roads in my area requiring attention, but it has come to my attention that the public in Devon have be voluntarily recruited to repair potholes. Devon County Council is recruiting volunteers to fill in potholes that it cannot afford to repair itself, offering members of the public two days of training and the necessary equipment and materials. The move comes after a £21m shortfall in funding left councils unable to commit to the repairs. Cllr Stuart Hughes said: "The Road Warden scheme came from requests from councils asking to be allowed to do more." The pilot scheme began in April and has so far seen almost 200 minor potholes repaired.

I found with interest that Salisbury Hospital houses laser treatments for acne, hair control, tattoo removal etc. It is not funded by the NHS, therefore it has to be delivered privately. It is advertised as Salisbury NHS Foundation Trust, which gives me reassurance to its reputation.

I raised at Area Board level my concern last month, that the Mere Fire Brigade and other brigades, when called to a medical emergency (Co-responders as they are known) have been re-categorised with a view to reducing unnecessary call outs. I am

not happy about this. I would guess their call outs have been reduced by some 70%. The displeasure of The Area Board and The Mere Town Council has now been referred to The Fire Authority and others.

The new Nadder Centre at Tisbury has rooms for start up businesses from £50 a week, besides many other function rooms and sports facilities.

A local person has volunteered to fix several small circular signs to posts in The Recreation Ground to display: 'For good practice dogs should be on a lead in the Recreation Ground', in an effort to try and reduce the numbers of those dog owners choosing to commit the offence of not cleaning up after their dogs.

The next area board meeting will be on Wednesday, 7th December at the new Nadder Centre in Tisbury at 6.30pm. Also on the 16th November, at 6.30pm in the Nadder Centre there is a Joint Strategy Assessment meeting open to all by registration, when if you attend you can help prioritise those issues most pressing to this area.

#### SAFE PLACES

I expect we all know someone who easily becomes confused and worried, especially in new or unfamiliar situations. We know how to deal with them and reassure them.



Suppose now <u>you</u> are that person and you are out and about. Something disturbs you; how would you cope, where would you turn for assistance? You would like to know that there was somewhere you could pause a while, calm down, or seek assistance in contacting a relative or friend.

**SAFE PLACES** is a National Scheme encouraging businesses and services to provide initial support to anyone who becomes upset, confused, or vulnerable when out and about in the community. A **SAFE PLACE** is indicated by the Safe Place sticker, displayed prominently in the window of each business or service that has agreed to take on the role

Mere is one of the last places in Wiltshire to adopt this scheme, which was started with funding from the Wiltshire Police and Crime Commissioner. Mere and District Chamber of Trade is cooperating with Barbara Hewitt, the local Dementia Champion, to introduce this scheme to Mere.

The Chamber will be contacting businesses in the area to seek their participation. An appointment will then be made for Barbara to visit and explain the scheme. As well as an introduction to the scheme, Barbara will provide some brief guidance on how to handle situations that might arise. Local care homes are also involved and they or carers, who feel they know someone who may need to use the service at some time, may issue an ICE card (In Case of Emergency) with contact details and the way in which the disability affects the vulnerable person.

So if you see the 'Safe Place' logo shown on the preceding page appearing in shops and offices in the town and surrounding area, you will know that this is a Safe Place and that the employees of the establishment are competent to help you.

#### MERE FILM SHOWS

Our film this month, 'The Man Who Knew Infinity' on Friday, 4th November, is a true story but a quite extraordinary one.

In the 1910s, Srinivasa Ramanujan is a man of boundless intelligence that even the abject poverty of his home in Madras, India, cannot crush. Eventually, his stellar intelligence in mathematics and his boundless confidence in both attract the attention of

the noted British mathematics professor, G.H. Hardy, who invites him to further develop his computations at Trinity College at Cambridge.

Forced to leave his young wife, Janaki, behind, Ramanujan finds himself in a land where both his largely intuitive mathematical theories and his cultural values run headlong into both the stringent academic requirements of his school and mentor and the prejudiced realities of a Britain heading into World War One.

Facing this and with his own declining health, Ramanujan joins with Hardy in a mutual struggle that would define Ramanujan as one of India's greatest modern scholars.

Before Albert Einstein there was Srinivasa Ramanujan - A little known fact outside the academic community, and precisely why this story had to be told. This film serves as a biopic behind the life and times of Ramanujan, who some say could decipher the very fabric of existence.

It is a poignant film in as much as an emotional roller coaster, but an extraordinary story told almost a century after Ramanujan's early and tragic death in 1920. Full details on page 25.

#### **Moving Forward In Hope**

By the time you read this letter we will have attended the last service in Mere Methodist church. Like many of you, I feel a sense of sadness that we will be saying goodbye to their Christian witness. Through Churches Together we are trying to plan a lasting legacy in Mere, particularly through our links with local schools; we'll let you know how this develops. Together with our Methodist friends, I would like to say a special thank you to the Rev'd Paul Arnold for his compassionate and hopeful ministry here among us. We shall miss him. (He will, however, be staying on as Chair of Churches Together until the end of this year).

This year, for different reasons, Mere has lost both its non-conformist church leaders. Paul, because of the church closure, and Rev'd Elizabeth Kemp who has moved to pastures new. The URC church is still a presence among us and

is indeed working to improve its building at the moment. But I am very pleased to say that we welcome a new Deacon to ministry in Mere for the Roman Catholics, the Rev'd Michael Hughes and look forward to getting to know him better. He will be one of the contributors to these regular letters in Mere Matters along with senior lay people and ministers from the other churches. With all these changes and comings and goings, it is important to keep up our life of prayer, and to seek guidance and strength from God in uncertain times. In fact the greatest challenge to our Christian values is when Christians STOP BEING CHRISTIANS.

Living as a Christian is demanding on us personally, as a community and as a nation. It isn't just about being a "nice" person or giving our children and grandchildren a set of rules so that they behave nicely. Nor is it something for other people to do too. Christianity is a religion which encourages forgiveness, living with a loving heart and a sincere hope in others and in all situations.

These are good things to teach children, but first and foremost they are things to believe in ourselves or ask God to help us to believe in. Christianity is open to all – I can assure you there is no one too "bad" to receive God's loving peace, even if for various reasons you personally feel otherwise!

There are many challenges: economic uncertainty at home and the heart searing images of injured people in Syria. We can feel overwhelmed, but as Christians we must remain, and practice remaining, hopeful and determined. We need to look for green-shoots to fortify us when things look too black: who would have thought at the height of the troubles in Northern Ireland there could ever be peace and yet it now sends peace emissaries around the world to help build peace elsewhere.

May we see the face of Christ in everyone we meet, and may everyone we meet see the face of Christ in us.


