MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the town come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on Monday, 2nd July 2018. There is NO meeting in August.

The Chairman writes:

At out June meeting we spent time on financial matters, going through the accounting and governance procedures before the council's audit of accounts is published. We also looked at how the Town Council practice will adhere to the new GDPR regulations. These are two tasks which have occupied our Town Clerk this past month and which I am sure she is glad to see completed.

We heard from several councillors and our clerk about how the process of appeal had been conducted on the Outline Planning Application for the land at Gillingham Corner. I had an opportunity to put the Town Council's view based on the decision taken by the town council last year. Those of us that attended, felt that the process was being conducted properly and we were pleased to see the contributions by the CPRE and several local residents as well as our County Councillor. At the time of writing this, I have not seen a decision posted on the Wiltshire planning website.

I reported to the council that I had asked the Wiltshire Cabinet Officer for the white lining at the junction of Boar Street and the Square be repainted as I feel that the junction is now dangerous as there is little indication that there is a give-way there. I have complained previously at South West Wiltshire Area Board meetings about the quality of white lining in our area but this is an urgent case. I hope to hear that something is to be done, or better – see that something has been done. At another meeting I was able to put the case, as agreed by the town council, for width restrictions to be placed and signposted on the Lynch. Our request for this to be considered is now with Wiltshire Council but it will be some time before it rises to the top of their system of priorities.

At our May meeting I was re-elected as Chairman of Mere Town Council and I look forward to another year of working with the councillors and council staff to provide the best for Mere residents, my Vice-Chairman Councillor Symonds was also re-elected and I thank her for her support. At that meeting we confirmed and allocated links between councillors and various bodies in the town as well as the make-up of our committees. It is at times like this that I reflect on the amount of work that councillors do and also on the opportunity for members of the public to attend these meetings and, also, to put themselves forward to be elected to the town council. I do hope that some of you, when reading this, think of doing both of these things. At this meeting we heard

about the plans for the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the Clock Tower and the centenary of the end of the First World War. Both of these events will benefit from the cleaning of the memorial which is now taking place.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

Wiltshire Council previously gave £200 000 to Visit Wiltshire, enabling promotion of Salisbury after the world wide reporting of the attempted murder of Sergei Skripal and his daughter, I often attend Salisbury and I consider Wiltshire Council's collective actions are without doubt helping Salisbury to return to its former self.

I have received many complaints since the locking of the archway gates near Brainwave. These complaints are varied, for instants powered wheelchair users say that they find using Penny Bank Lane difficult when others in the lane are approaching from the opposite direction. Wiltshire Council are considering if it is possible to register a public footpath from near The Mere Town Clock tower to North Street.

It was interesting to note at The Southern Area Planning Committee, that a proposed footpath change of route at East Knoyle included a viewing spur. Normally a footpath goes somewhere, a path developed to a viewing point is unusual and the first as such I have ever seen. It was agreed to allow the application to proceed further.

Grass verges at road junctions etc. have been growing fast and not cut as quickly as perhaps required. Wiltshire Council, as I am sure Highways England respond, however they do not have the capacity to be everywhere at once.

It has come to my attention that the good intentions of many towards animal welfare have probably inadvertently caused Wiltshire Council to request some local attractions to have a Zoo Licence. These licence cause an expense of about £2500 for a small enterprise and may impact on their existence, when local knowledge may tell us there is no problem.

The recently completed new Bungalows and public parking spaces at Bramley will have been officially opened on June the 18th. I could not attend owing to been away. Parking outside the bungalows for four of the six spaces is for public use and not to be obstructed by flower tubs etc. Although only two more social houses, they will help go toward the many that require housing. More than 60,000 council houses have been sold nationally under the Right to Buy scheme in the past six years, some at half the market rate, with the Government taking some of the sale cash, it is claimed councils have been left with enough for just 14,000 replacements.

Changes to Wiltshire Council's Constitution have taken place. These changes will affect local Town and Parish Councils.

To summarise the proposed changes, the Government has made clear its desire to ensure that more housing is provided. One of the areas it wishes to see change is in a greater diversification of the market, allowing a larger number of smaller and medium enterprises to successfully obtain land for housebuilding. It perceives that there is a problem that needs to be addressed namely the difficulty that firms of this size have in obtaining planning permission on small sites. The Government have introduced legislation that will allow applicants to submit applications for 'Permission in Principle' for minor housing led developments of up to nine houses. This legislation will come into force on 1 June 2018. An application for 'Permission in Principle' differs from a planning application both in the reduced amount of information that is required to accompany the application, and the much shorter length of time that a local planning authority has to determine the application. The current Scheme of Delegation is predicated on the Council having eight weeks in which to determine planning applications for residential development and this allows time for consultation to take place with parish and town councils and for a request to be actioned. The new legislation provides a shortened timetable of five weeks for the Council to make a decision on applications for 'Permission in Principle'. This will mean that the current procedures for circulation of new applications and call-in of those applications are insufficient to determine 'Permission in Principle' applications in an appropriate timescale. It was considered that call-in of planning applications was one of the more vital of councillor powers, and did not consider that removing 'Permission in Principle' applications from call-in provision was appropriate. Instead, it has proposed a shortened time frame for call-in of these applications be put in place in line with the shortened time frame for determination, as well as expedited procedures for notification to local councillors.

A poll commissioned by the Independent newspaper has found that nearly 4m adults in the UK have used food banks. Thanks to all our local volunteers in supporting and running our Food Bank

I attended a local meeting in The Angel Tearooms regarding voluntary caring including representatives of Carer Support Wiltshire being in attendance. I have noted from

information elsewhere a study to mark Carers' Week has highlighted how the UK's 6.5m unpaid volunteers looking after relatives are risking their own health, with 72% having suffered mental ill health, while 61% feel their physical health has worsened. Almost 70% struggle to get a good night's sleep, and two in five fear providing less care or no care as their own health starts to fail. Despite their health concerns, data obtained from 88 councils show that 52 now charge them for respite breaks. Twenty councils said they had raised charges over the last three years. Regarding non voluntary care, analysis shows that nationally social care spending has fallen by 9% per person since 2009-10, despite efforts by councils to protect services by switching money from other budgets. The Institute for Fiscal Studies (IFS) found that local authorities' spending on adult social care dropped by 10% in real terms between 2009-10 and 2014-15, although this was partially offset by additional funds since then from central government, the NHS and higher council tax receipts.

Mere Town Council is offering to donate a gas-fuelled beacon to a local Council. The gas beacon comprises a burner unit, 2m high stand with anchor, 10m hose and regulator to connect to the gas cylinders, lighter, spanner, hose assembly and Y manifold to link the 2 cylinders, plus instructions .The beacon could be useful for a Council taking part in this year's centenary commemoration of the end of WW1.

The Mere area had four main events one weekend plus other functions, we were spoilt for choice. Kilmington Ball, Healthy Walking in Mere, Mere Church Fete and Dogwise amongst others. I attended The Kilmington Ball on Friday 8th June, a fantastic event in a rural setting, a mighty fund raising event for such a small area.

I was informed last month that from July your black box will be for glass only, however most plastics except black plastic will be able to be placed in the blue recycling bin (see Page 27). You will receive a list of what may now be recycled. The collection days or times may change. This has now changed I understand to 1st April next year. The period in-between is now known as the interim period, the staff are in place, however some facilities are not. Although some may know, it is useful to remember you can at present put textiles in the black box.

The following application could appear. A planning application at Court Farm, Lower Woodford for the storage of electrical energy on a large scale has been presented to The Southern Area Planning Committee on which I sit. The application with batteries in containers of a total weight of one hundred tons, attached to the national grid. Woodford and Durnford Parish Councils objected. I attended a special site meeting at which it was interesting to view the setting. The site can be seen from Old Sarham or nearby to Old Sarham. The above parish council asked the committee to give consideration of alternative sites. A proposed Telecom Mast needs to show alternative site considerations however we were informed this is not the case for proposed battery storage sites. The above local parish council complain of the same problems we get in the Mere area, the above parish councils stated in a letter:- "The Wishford Road is constantly being obstructed by vehicles unable to pass each other and the T-Junction by the telephone box is always very congested at school times morning and afternoon. Just this morning on my way to look again at the Quidhampton site I was delayed for ten minutes." The application is yet to be determined.

I hear complaints sometimes regarding weight limits not been enforced. Two more companies have been successfully prosecuted for breaching the weight restriction limit on Bradford on Avon Town Bridge. Yvonne Bennett, Wiltshire Council trading standards manager said "These prosecutions are further examples of positive partnership working and the dedication of local volunteers. Our aim is to prevent breaches of the Town Bridge weight restriction and we hope that these successful results will serve as a reminder that a disregard for weight restrictions in our communities will not be tolerated. Inspector James Brain said, "Wiltshire Police rely on the time and efforts of volunteers who report offending vehicles to the Wiltshire Police Lorry Watch Support team.

With our high streets around us in decline, I note ministers are working on a fairer tax system in an effort to help high street stores compete against their online rivals. During a Parliamentary debate last week, Mel Stride, Financial Secretary to the Treasury, revealed he was looking at tax reform proposals that would reflect the consumer switch to shopping online.

Wildlife Sightings for May

As we predicted the leaves made it more difficult to spot wildlife particularly as the greenery 'exploded' with a very warm May, so well done to those who spotted and reported their sightings to us.

Moorhens were seen daily on their nest and by the end of the month seven chicks had hatched, now being carefully tended by their parents. The nine ducklings have now grown into young ducks and are still together on the Shreen. Other sightings reported have been:

Water Vole seen three times and a pair of Red Kite have been sighted. The Yellow Iris is growing along the Shreen. Single sightings of the following have been received: Tree Creeper, Greenfinch, Weasel, a Beautiful Demoiselle, Orange Tip Butterfly and a dead Signal Crayfish.
