MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts.

The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on Monday, 5th March 2018.

The Chairman writes:

In our February meeting we had the cheerful news that our nomination of Councillor Raymond Hill, as a representative for Wiltshire to attend the 2018 Buckingham Palace Garden Party, was successful and that he and his wife will be going. We heard from members of St. Michael's Church about the reordering plans for the church and had the opportunity to ask questions. The council heard from residents of The Lynch about traffic issues raise and, after discussion, agreed to make enquiries with Wiltshire Council about a possible width restriction on the road. Councillor Norris presented a report from the Mere Rivers Group on the effects on our rivers of extraction this past year, and how further monitoring of the situation will be done.

We also received the results of a recent Traffic Speed Survey carried out within the 40mph speed limit of Shaftesbury Road (north of Wet Lane) – the results showed that the average speed at which 85% of the traffic was travelling at was 34.2 mph. Notice was given of two temporary road closures: one in Woodlands Road from Monday, 5th March to Thursday, 29th March and again between Tuesday, 3rd April and Monday, 16th April (to enable sewer connection works), and the other in The Square on Sunday, 29th April 2018 for the Mere Cancer Research Classic Car Event.

I was able to tell the council that PCSO Peter Tscherniawsky has been out on Mere roads and speaking to drivers of cars whose parking is creating a hazard and I also had a chance, at another meeting, to speak to the Senior Inspector for the area who assured me that the matter would receive continuing attention.

We have been asked by the national Pageant Master about the town's involvement in

national tributes to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War in November and we resolved to look to having a beacon on Castle Hill and to work with the churches on bell ringing. The proposal from the pageant master that the town has a piper piping at 6.00am on the day was not taken up!

I was able to make representations to County Councillors at the SW Wiltshire Area Board about our strong feeling that proposed changes with regard to housing allocation and planning are ill-judged. The proposals are to link Mere to Trowbridge, Westbury and Warminster for housing development and we are arguing the case that Mere should remain with its traditional link to Salisbury area. My thanks to Councillor Norris and Councillor Jeans for their support at the meeting. This will be a continuing battle until we achieve the result that we desire – we do not want to be in a housing area that seeks to find 6,500 more houses.

I was looking for some dates to plan special events for Mere and went to the library to check with the shared calendar there. There are only a few of the many events, that we are fortunate to have in Mere, which are recorded there. Can I ask that organisers do take the time to enter their events in the calendar so that we can avoid clashes. Thanks.

Finally, I had the privilege to finish the planting of an Oak Tree whereby Mere is marking the centenary year of the end of World War One, with a living feature of remembrance. We hope that the Oak Tree growing in a peaceful field can be an important counterpoint to the terrible scenes in fields abroad 100 years ago. This should become a place, for generations of Mere residents, for tranquil remembrance of the sacrifice made by so many military and civilian people and, hopefully, a place to aspire for peace.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

A very interesting presentation was made to the South West Wiltshire Area Board (SWWAB) by James Body on bringing Super Fast Broadband and 4G mobile coverage to the Chalke Valley. Several in my Mere Division require faster broadband. This presentation illustrated there are more ways than fibre to deliver a service where broadband is lacking. By 2020 the government appear to me that they will legislate for a universal access service. In my opinion this may be at an additional cost to the end user sometimes.

On 14th February I took some of Mere First Brownies in a mini bus for an overnight stay

near Lyndhurst in Hampshire, returning again the next day to collect them. I drove them in a bus kindly provided by the local youth group, Seeds4Success. Also I have taken Lynch Close Residents on day trips. I have a D1 endorsement on my driving licence, have passed a MIDAS test and drive the mini bus on a Section 19 permit as it is known. It is only the UK that allows this type of community transport within the European Union.

The all-party parliamentary group on hunger has called for funds to be redirected to support elderly people "withering away in their own homes" through loneliness. We are lucky in our area where we are small enough to have a true community spirit, even so I know many are lonely and we are again lucky to have several worthy groups such as The Rosemary Goddard Centre at Lynch Close, Friends Together in The Grove Buildings and recently Ann-Marie, Health and Well Being Champion for our South West Area Board, providing a 'Pop-Up' café in The Andy Young Pavilion.

DfT figures show that maintenance spending by councils on B roads, C roads and unclassified routes in 2016-17 was £1.87bn, the lowest level in 10 years and down from £2.46bn in 2004-05. This I can easily believe driving along The Street (or lack of it) at Kilmington. Also Wiltshire Highways have recently erected a sign on the main B3092 that directs you to Kilmington when travelling south, but not north. I am informed the signage problem will be addressed quickly.

I do not want Mere in the Trowbridge Housing Market as now proposed. The South West Area Board has agreed to support me with this, working with our Town Council. I have had a meeting with officers and it appears market areas are not directly aligned with land supply for proposed building. Evidence is required as proof that those who work or volunteer, do so locally or towards Salisbury and indeed Dorset and Somerset. Also that many of these workers when moving dwelling or workplace, move within in this area. I think so, do you know otherwise? I do not believe we have our market area around Trowbridge, it being in West Wilts.

This month I would like to endorse the fact that the two affordable rented bungalows for the over 50s at Homefield, Mere are on programme for completion in the Spring. These bungalows are aimed at those who have a larger house and would like to downsize to a modern residence, freeing up two houses for families. Leaflets to promote these have been distributed to all 254 affordable homes within the Parish, and to amenities within the Town, as well as to the addresses which have previously been discussed and in public areas. Appropriate wording to publish the details in newsletters and websites to raise the profile of the bungalows was made available. If you or someone you know is interested in one of the bungalows, you will have until the end of March to register with Homes4Wiltshire, before the adverts are made live for one week. Therefore, by mid April the occupants for the two bungalows will be known. Then fixture and fitting choices will be arranged (carpets/curtains), and any additional grab rails etc that may be required. It is a fact that the number of Police stations with front counters where the public can speak directly to officers has fallen from 901 in 2010 to 510 now. Across the country a number of alternative contact methods have been made available including, as in Dorset, civilian volunteers staffing a police contact point in a library two days a week. Mere please note we still have a Police Station, which is open some days to the public being manned by volunteers: Roy Sims and John Hancock our ex Policeman, for which I thank them.

Last month I stated West Knoyle Parish council and local residents had contacted me over the last twelve months, regarding the parking situation at Stoney Bridge and I can now report that I have had three residents contact me regarding being involved in a self help scheme.

Mere Snooker Club in Salisbury Street has decided to stop being a limited company in the hope it will ease the bureaucracy and help secure the longevity of the club.

Mere Town Council had requested some of the pavement improvement budget awarded earlier in the year to the SWWAB. The proposal was to screed the pavement from Mere Post Office to St Michaels Church to help the ambulant disabled; this has not been awarded after Wiltshire Highways made a priority report. I have noted this well used pavement has deviations of up to or more than 20mm in places, which is unacceptable to the ambulant disabled, therefore I shall continue to pursue its repair.

Make a date in your diary. "Mere Makes Music' is proposed for Saturday 28th April 2018. Wiltshire Rural Music School based in Trowbridge, but which is also a county-wide charity, is trying to work out in communities more. Wiltshire Rural Music School is also offering to fund six workshops afterwards.

A303 STONEHENGE CONSULTATION

Stonehenge is one of eight planned Highways England improvement schemes along the A303, A358 and A30 to link the South West and South East of England.

Progress Report

Since the announcement of the preferred route in September 2017, Highways England has been developing the scheme proposals to the stage where it would now welcome the public's views on its proposals.

The public consultation is now open, and will continue to run until closure on **Friday, 6th April 2018** at 11.59pm.

Feedback from this public consultation will help Highways England in its continued development of the scheme to the time when it submits an application for planning consent (known as a Development Consent Order) to the Planning Inspectorate.

FREEVIEW TELEVISION RECEPTION PROBLEMS

How to Cure

Over recent months many people in Mere have found their television reception has degraded significantly. The cause of this is the new 4G mobile services which are now available in this area; these cause interference with the Freeview signal. Filters which cure this problem are available from 'at800' which was set up specifically to deal with the issue. The website **:** <u>https://at800.tv/</u> is where full information can be found.

For example from at800's FAQs:

What are filters and how are they fitted?

at800 domestic/household filters are small boxes which block 4G at 800 MHz mobile signals, and in most cases enable you to carry on receiving watching Freeview as normal – we provide them free of charge. Each filter is smaller than a pack of cards and needs no batteries or external power supply. It will normally plug into the lead between the TV

and the aerial. If you have a TV signal amplifier or booster, the filter must be fitted between the aerial and amplifier.

To contact 'at800' **T**: 0808 13 13 800 (free from landlines). The company will supply filters at no charge. We needed an engineer to fit a filter to our rooftop aerial and that was also free.

Wildlife Sightings for January

Many thanks to all of you who went out in January, despite the intrepid weather, and passed on your wildlife sightings. These were Little Earet – 14 times, and Kingfisher – 4 times. Grey Wagtail, Water Vole and a 9" Trout were all seen once and a flock of 10 Long Tailed Tits were seen on the Shreen along Waterside.

Now the days are getting longer, and spring flowers are in our hedgerows and on the river banks, there are many more opportunities for you to take a stroll along the rivers and streams and let us know your wildlife sightings. Please send them to M: mereriverwildlife@btinternet.com

Nature Notes

Over the next month we would expect to see less of the Kingfisher and Egret as they will be moving to their nesting areas. We should see more activity from our Water Voles as they start to breed.

Water Voles breed from March to September and have up to 4 broods a year. The young born in March/April can themselves breed by the end of the summer. The average life of a Vole is about a year as they are killed by most predators e.g. mink, rats, owls and domestic cats

At the end of the month you may see the return of the first summer migrants, Chiffchaffs and Willow Warblers are usually first.


