MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meets every month. While it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. Council members are working on your behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in Mere. You may raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be on Monday, 1st October at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion.

The Chairman writes:

In our September meeting we had a good few planning applications to discuss, which we had generated ourselves. These were about work on trees in the town. The council maintains a complete tree report detailing all of the trees (you may have noticed numbers on them) for which we are responsible. We are acting on the professional advice given, and taking action where trees need attention. There is quite a cost to this but as trees get older and larger it is necessary to manage them for the safety of all. The trees of Mere add so much to its charm and a quick look around from the top of Castle Hill reveals how many there are!

We talked briefly about the preparations for Remembrance this year and the Centenary of the end of WW1. We will be joining in with the rest of the country with bugle playing, bell ringing and a beacon on Castle Hill. Councillor Sims has been actively collecting

funds and organising getting large poppies for display. We are also preparing a remembrance, particular to Mere, of all of the WW1 soldiers on the Memorial in the Square. We will have, for each soldier, made a memento in the image of the rifle pushed into the ground with a helmet resting on it. This will be displayed for a few weeks in the street where the soldier lived, and we will be asking for residents to volunteer to have it displayed on their property.

Our planning is based on the book "The Proudest Uniform" written by Angela McDonald which is available in Mere Museum. The mementos will move to jubilee gardens for the last week. On a personal note, as a lifelong pacifist, I have sometimes struggled with the idea of remembrance and how it reflects on war, but as I read the personal stories of these men I did appreciate how different times were then and wonder how I, and my family, would have reacted were I a young man living in Mere in those days. What we are doing in Mere should bring home to us all what the town went through in those days. As I said at the planting of the centenary Oak Tree earlier this year, I do hope that we remember not only the nine million soldiers who died, but also the ten million civilians who died, and that it should turn our minds to the importance of peace.

We heard about progress with obtaining a new lease for the car parks and public toilets. We discussed, briefly, the proposals for boundary review and how these changes may affect Mere Town and Mere Parish and our representation on Wiltshire Council. We also heard from Councillor Norris about the next step in developing our Neighbourhood Plan, and we agreed on taking the necessary actions to obtain funding so that we can buy professional help with the progress.

I had the opportunity to represent Mere at the Southwest Wiltshire Community Safety Group chaired by our councillor George Jeans. While the meeting discussed policing with representatives of the police force, I stressed the importance of having a police presence at big occasions like Mere Carnival. It was pleasing, at the Carnival, to see that this year we did have policemen there and I hope that future public occasions are treated the same. More importantly, I stressed how important it is for us to see policemen in the town, and not only driving through but 'on the street'. While I mention carnival, can I say what a good carnival it was, with lots of noise and lights and brilliant costumes and good cheer. My thanks, and, yes, I am one of them, to the volunteers that make events like this happen. But, also my thanks to the volunteers who help with

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

Graham Avory is retiring as editor of Mere Matters; this is his last issue. He has been editor since September 2006, that is 12 years. I believe he must spend at least one week a month working with this publication. Much has changed in those 12 years I am sure, printing and computing methods, the local facebook account of Mere Mutters and more. However, in my opinion it is as popular as ever, being well received locally. I would like to give him a personal 'thank you' for all he has done, I am sure you readers also would equally like to thank him. Graham, I know, as I do, also works with more than one community group and he is a great asset to Mere. I hope he will have a little more free time which he thoroughly deserves.

Bus stops are few in this area, it appears the bus stop sign near Home Farm, Kilmington has been missing for some time, however it has now been noticed and I have reported it.

The Boundary Commission for England has published its final recommendations for new parliamentary boundaries that could see the number of UK MPs cut from 650 to 600. Regarding a review of the number of Wiltshire Councillors, which at present is 98, it appears this number will be maintained. The South West Wiltshire Area Board stretching from Mere to Wilton probably will stay as it is. When Wiltshire Council was created in 2009, much emphasis was placed on democracy and area boards. New or altered divisions such as The Mere Division need to be within an acceptable variance of 4,291 electors, which will probably mean little or no change for the area that I cover at present.

We in Wiltshire may find it difficult regarding obtaining some council services, however our neighbour Somerset County Council has announced major cuts to services and the loss of up to 130 jobs. The plans include reducing the winter gritting network, suspending park and ride services, removing Citizens Advice bureau funding, cuts to adult social care and support for people with learning disabilities, and cutting funding, and 80 jobs, from the GetSet programme which aims to keep vulnerable young people

from going into care. The council's cabinet will vote on the proposals next week. Research by the Local Government Chronicle shows that since 2010, councils in England have made more than 220,000 members of staff redundant at a cost of almost £4bn.

A National Audit Office report says local authorities, and Government departments, are deemed worse than private sector creditors for the heavy-handed way in which they collect debts and manage people in arrears, "additional charges" on those in debt created extra costs and did not result in more money being collected. The NAO estimates that problem debt costs taxpayers £248m a year and the wider economy £900m a year. "The government lags behind the retail lending sector in following good management practice", the report says, with only 19% of councils adopting best practice guidelines.

Dubbed Generation Sensible, the 18-year-olds of today are much more likely to be found in the university library than the local pub, according to a paper from the ONS comparing their habits with those of 18-year-olds around the year 2000. Modern teenagers consume less alcohol, binge drinking is less common, and smoking rates among today's young people have also dropped - from about 35% in 2000 to about 18% in 2017. They are also socialising less - by about 25 minutes a day, but they also do more sport - eight minutes more a day on average. This leads me on to the young people from Seeds for Success; they have in Mere removed much vegetation and tidied up the front of The United Reformed Church and much improved the public area of Bishops Close. I was proud to be present when they were having their awards at Mere. They were dressed very smartly and were a credit.

Wiltshire Council, as I have said before, is responsible for public health, therefore I will mention that, the World Health Organisation has branded the UK the third fattest nation in Europe – fuelled by a fondness for alcohol. Research on 53 countries found Britain rising up the obesity league tables at an "alarming" rate.

I, and Graham Cotton, chair of Kilmington Parish Council, and others have had many residents from the Norton Ferris area contacting us about the blind junction when they turn North towards Frome. I said last time I think the probability of a fatality will be much higher without a mirror. I am pleased to announce the mirror can stay, all be it on private land, for which I thank the owner.

A local person asked me this year why potholes are not ringed in yellow, I sent this request into highways. I have been informed this cannot be done because claimants use the fact that a hole is ringed to try and force liability on the council.

The cost of rural crime has risen to £44.5m, according to NFU Mutual, with the cost to farmers at its highest point since 2013. Police said that thefts of agricultural equipment had driven the 13.4% increase in crime over the last year, aided by the "collapse" of

close-knit rural communities and modern transport links that allow thieves to export stolen machinery in a matter of hours.

Data obtained from 20 councils shows £11m has been spent on 20mph limit zones between 2012 and 2017, covering 1,536 miles of roads. However, in some cases rates of serious accidents have gone up, prompting AA president Edmund King to urge councils to instead make improvements to dangerous junctions and create more pedestrian crossings.

Many thanks to all who attended the Community Safety Group meeting, and a special thanks to PC Matt Holland and PC Lee Pelling for once again giving their time to take part; we had representation from 13 out of 38 parishes within the South West Wiltshire area. To those parishes who do not currently attend, please be aware that this is an opportunity to ask questions directly about community safety issues in your local communities with officers who work directly in those areas. The next meeting will be early in 2019. I was pleased to see police at Mere Carnival and so, I believe, were the public for which I have sent an e-mail to thank the police.

It was asked if vehicle dashcam evidence can now be accepted. PC Matt Holland advised 'yes' and a policy is in place. Dashcam evidence can be handed in at any Police enquiry office (Salisbury or Trowbridge being nearest), and the procedure for submitting 'dashcam' evidence to Wiltshire Police. is explained on the Wiltshire Police

website via this link - **:** https://www.wiltshire.police.uk/article/2162/Dash-camfootage-of-dangerous-or-careless-driving

Vehicles obstructing people's property, especially parked on pavements, was enquired about. The Police advised the threshold for action is quite high whilst understanding it can be a very frustrating issue for people. Parking on a pavement is not an offence, but causing an obstruction is. Issues about parking around schools were also discussed. It was advised Wiltshire Council had instructed recently that two cameras are to be purchased to cover illegal parking outside schools. It was asked why speed cameras in Wiltshire were taken away. It was advised that revenue generated was collected by central government. I asked the meeting how many would support bringing back speed cameras. Less than 50% supported. It was said supported speed cameras were there to help saving lives and not just to generate income.

A joke about being fired from a Jobcentre has been named the funniest at this year's Edinburgh Festival Fringe. Liverpool comedian Adam Rowe won the award for Funniest Joke Of The Fringe with the line: "Working at the Jobcentre has to be a tense job-knowing that if you get fired, you still have to come in the next day." Taken from his Undeniable show, it picked up 41% of a public vote.

Patients aged 6m - 64 years at risk including the following conditions:-

Chronic Kidney Disease
Chronic Neurological Disease

Child Flu Vaccination

Children aged 2 and 3 on 31 August 2018 (date of birth 1/9/2014 to 31/8/2016) are being offered routine vaccination for flu this year. The vaccination is given in the form of a nasal spray and separate clinic times for children have been set up. Please contact the surgery to make an appointment for your child if you would like them to be vaccinated. Children aged 4-9 years will be vaccinated at school.

Shingles Vaccination (only required if not previously vaccinated)
Patients who turn 70, 78 or 79 during the year are encouraged to make an appointment for vaccination against Shingles. If you were recalled for a shingles vaccination last year but have still not yet been vaccinated you can still attend for an appointment up until your 80th birthday.

Men ACWY Vaccination (only required if not previously vaccinated) Patients aged 19 on 31/8/2018, or those attending University or secondary education for the first time are encouraged to attend for vaccination. This vaccine is also recommended for anyone up to the age of 25 years on the 31/8/2018 if you have not been previously vaccinated. Please contact Reception for an appointment.

MERE SURGERY

Results of a national GP patient survey held between January and April this year were compiled from responses from almost 760,000 people across the country on their experience of healthcare services provided by GP surgeries, including access to GPs, making appointments, the quality of care received from GPs and other health professionals, waiting times, and satisfaction with opening hours and out-of-hours NHS services.

Only one Wiltshire practice made the national top 10 - Mere Surgery was rated the highest in Wiltshire for overall experience this year, but more importantly it was ranked

seventh in the top 10 surgeries in the whole of England. That was number 7 out of the 7,109 surgeries in the country.

Doctors Ed Halsey, Eve McBride and Tim King commented: "We are obviously delighted by the results of the recent GP patient survey. Wildlife Sightings for August

Thank you to those of you who contributed their records for August. There were fewer bird sightings, but this was probably due to adult birds going through their annual moult! However there were young birds out and visible. Also the water vole made its reappearance. Sightings for August were Water Vole 5 times, Grey Wagtail twice. There were single sightings of Kingfisher, Crayfish (probably signal) and common blue butterfly and daily sightings of the Moorhen family on the Shreen.

Nature Notes:

The dry summer may have taken its toll on the range of species we have all been seeing and recording. For example, we noted that there has not been the range of

butterflies, that we might have expected. This is possibly due to the dry weather impacting on both the availability of nectar in the flowers and on the host plants which provide sites for laying and caterpillar food. As we write we note for example that we have seen very few peacock, commas and tortoiseshell butterflies. The variety which does seem to have been abundant, sorry gardeners, is the cabbage white!!

October is the month when animals and birds are stocking up their food reserves for winter so it should be a good time for seeing all forms of wildlife. We are grateful for and rely on your observations. Please keep these observations coming to:

SHREEN HARMONY IS 20 YEARS OLD!

In 1998, Shreen Harmony was formed as part of the three-year Millennium Confluence project to help and encourage people to create new music for the River Stour neighbourhood.

Confluence was a national project with a local focus. It offered participatory music projects, workshops, courses, concerts and events for people living in the catchment area, from Wiltshire, where the Stour rises in Six Wells at Stourhead, through Dorset to the sea at Christchurch.

Helen Porter was Confluence's music animateur and Karen Wimburst its Composer in Residence.

Helen was active in bringing people together to sing, write and perform, for example helping inexperienced singers to enjoy their own voices in workshops, and setting up choirs and singing groups such as Shreen Harmony, who are the only remaining choir from the Project. Helen remained Shreen Harmony's Musical Director until 2004.

The music composed and played embraced many styles, but the inspiration for all the new compositions and events came from the river itself – from places, history, local stories, legends and myths.

The twenty-year anniversary was celebrated on Sunday, 9th September in Fontmell Magna Village Hall with performances of "watery" songs by Shreen Harmony and a performance on home-made instruments, followed by archive film of many of the moments from the project.

Remembering and acting with thankfulness

Who could forget that this year we will be marking the 100th Anniversary of the end of the First World War. It is strange that it falls on a Sunday on the 11th itself; up and down the country special memorial plans are being made. Mere Town Council is erecting metal silhouette images of soldiers throughout the town in the streets or close to the locations where they lived.

On Saturday, 10th November starting at 11.00am by the Clock Tower I will be leading a walk of remembrance around the town to as many of these locations as we can. Pausing at each place to think of lives changed by war. We will gather at the Clock Tower as usual on Sunday morning for the Act of Remembrance followed on by a community service in the church.

This year the threat of violence from belligerent countries has come close to us not just terror attacks in London but more locally. I sat on the bench in Salisbury just a few months before the Skripals were found poisoned on it, then there are the two closed restaurants in Salisbury, and the sad death of a member of the public just 35 minutes from here. Russian state agents so close to the security of our homes.

Over the summer I saw the Russian punk rock group Pussy Riot. They were the women who staged a musical protest in St Basil's Cathedral in Moscow against the corrupt closeness between the church and Putin. Maria Aylokina, a band member, was brutally questioned and imprisoned for this protest. Her performance in music and film were a passionate testimony to a regime which is corrupt, vindictive and cynical. These things strengthen resolve to stand strong as a nation against Russian bullies.

Remembrance Sunday is the occasion when we remember as a nation those who have served their country standing up against tyrannical behaviour. This isn't a jingoism or a blind trust in all things done in our nation's name. It is a time to pause the good lives which many of us experience of relative wealth, health and freedom of expression. A time to remember with thanks those who died, whose lives are blighted in living and whose families are affected. We come together in quiet and thankful gratitude. Nothing should dilute that sense of thankfulness or sensitivity to those affected.

Jesus' central teaching was that we should love God with all our heart and love our neighbours as our selves. Remembrance Day asks that we renew our commitment to following that way of life *all the weeks of the year* as an act of thanks to those who died or were injured for the freedom and security that we enjoy.
