Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Flood Preparedness and Contact Information

At the last meeting of the South West Wiltshire Area Board, it was discussed that with winter appr oaching, flooding may become an issue for some residents. It was stated that it is your responsibility to take appropriate measures to defend your property against floodwater if you know it is susceptible to flooding.

As part of your flood planning, you should ensure you have a supply of sandbags—at your own expense. The council's supply of sandbags is reserved for protecting strategic assets and important infrastructure.

If your property is in imminent danger of flooding, please call: 0300 456 0105

You can't stop flooding, but by understanding the risks to your community and working together with local councils and other agencies, you can help develop a flood response plan that will assist in responding and recovering as quickly as possible.

Whenever there is excess water on the roads, always slow down. Driving through floods is the number one cause of death during flood events. Flooding Contacts:

Smoking Cessation Support in Wiltshire

Currently, 44,000 people still smoke in Wiltshire, and the goal is to reduce this number to 22,000 by 2030. Wiltshire Council's stop smoking service is here to help. The service is free and can assist you in accessing free stop-smoking aids, including vapes.

Wiltshire Council is supporting Stoptober and encourages people across the county to 'quit together.' Whether you join forces with a family member, friend, or colleague, making a quit attempt this October could be the first step toward a smoke-free life.

Stoptober is a national campaign that motivates people to quit smoking for 28 days. Research shows that if you remain smoke-free for four weeks, you are five times more likely to quit for good.

Council & Community Efforts to Keep Wiltshire Clean

Every year, the council and its contractors work hard to keep Wiltshire clean, but the cost is significant. Since February alone, the council's contractor, idverde, has cleared more than 2,100 km of A, B, and C roads, collecting almost 4,740 bags of waste and around 28,300 kg of litter. While this work is essential, it is costly and diverts resources from other vital services. Thanks to the efforts of local volunteers and community groups, the council has been able to focus its resources on major highways. So far this year, 140 community-led litter picks have taken place, removing nearly 1,370 bags of rubbish from streets, parks, and the countryside—the equivalent of more than 1,400 hours of volunteer time.

Holiday Activity \ Food Programme Success

More than 1,700 young people participated in Wiltshire Council's Holiday Activity and Food programme over the summer holidays, enjoying a range of activities and nutritious meals. The programme, branded FUEL (Food, Unity,

Energy, Laughter) in Wiltshire, has been funded by the Department for Education (DfE) since 2021. It provides children who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals with free access to activities, food, and nutritional education during school holidays. Since the start of the programme in Wiltshire, more than 100,000 activity places and nutritious meals have been provided.

South Western Railway Safety Measures

South Western Railway is expanding the use of body-worn video cameras for frontline staff, such as train guards and gateline assistants, to help tackle the rising incidents of assaults and abuse. Over two assaults per day have been recorded so far this year, and the number of reported incidents has doubled since 2020-21. A new poster campaign has been launched to warn potential offenders of the consequences, including possible criminal prosecution.

Road Conditions in Mere Area

There have been several discussions about road conditions in the Mere area. West Knoyle, for example, has received a long stretch of resurfacing, which was overdue in my opinion. While some have noted it's not perfect, it is certainly a great improvement.

Fly-Tipping Enforcement in Wiltshire

A couple from Swindon has been issued with fixed penalty notices (FPNs) totalling £3,000 after being caught on CCTV cameras fly-tipping in the Wiltshire Council area. Covert CCTV cameras, set up by Wiltshire Council's Environmental Enforcement team on a quiet rural road near Royal Wootton Bassett, captured the couple fly-tipping on two separate occasions. Wiltshire Council is actively pursuing fly-tippers across the county.

Dog Fouling Concerns

I've been receiving an increasing number of complaints about dog fouling. By highlighting this issue again, I hope to send a strong message to curb the problem. However, any improvements in this area often seem to be short-lived.

Decline of Late-Night Venues

New research from the Night Time Industries Association (NTIA), in collaboration with CGA by NIQ, shows that one in four late-night venues in the



He smashed his target of £300 and actually raised a grand total of £600




Thank you so much to everyone who sponsored Quinn, supported him and left some really lovely comments both on social media and when you have seen us!





Frank Legge Celebration Day Match Report





Devizes and Wilts Gazette, 21 April 1825

On the 14th inst. An inquest was held at Bourton, Dorset, by Mr. Bell, Coroner, upon the body of Thomas Ryall. It appeared that the deceased had suffered much from rheumatism, and to obtain sleep he took some pills which were offered to him by a stranger whom he accidentally met on the turnpike road. Soon after he had swallowed the pills, he went into a neighbour's cottage, where he had not been a quarter of an hour before he felt very drowsy, and attempted to go home, but was unable to do so without assistance. When Ryall got home, the person with whom he lodged became alarmed, and sent an express for Mr. Newman, Mere, his medical attendant, who arrived shortly after but found the deceased in a state of insensibility which baffled every attempt to relieve him, and he died in the course of the evening. In giving his evidence, Mr. Newman expressed his belief that the deceased died from the effects of some narcotic poison, and adjournment of the inquest was proposed, in order that the body might undergo a post-mortem examination - the result of which proved that the deceased had swallowed a large quantity of opium and the jury returned a verdict of Manslaughter. A warrant was immediately issued by the Coroner for the apprehension of the individual who gave the deceased the pills, and it hoped that he will be brought to punishment for his offence.

Letter from the Churches

What a summer we have had, wouldn't you agree? Week upon week of sunshine, lovely weather for the beach, or woodland walks, amazing to be able to attend local events so ably put on by so many and not get wet, to have a Great British summer! However, for nature, which had no option to pour a nice cold drink in the shade, it has been really tough. The grass died, trees dropped branches and leaves early as a

stress response, cracks appeared in the fields with some in the Vicarage garden over 4 feet deep. I got quite worried about the plants. Many of you worked really hard to save your allotments, vegetable patches and gardens. Our farmers have struggled to provide enough grazing for livestock and the wheat harvest came early, with yields really varied, dependent upon whether there was any nearby underground water source, of which we are blessed to have under the Downs.

What I have been amazed about is, despite the intensely dry weather, there has been an abundance of fruit! Hedgerows were full of blackberries and sloes, huge amounts of apples, plums and other fruits growing, something I wouldn't think possible given the drought. But it seems, somehow, that the dry weather spurred the trees on to produce lots of good fruit. If their roots were deep enough, they could reach a source of water that the sun could not touch, and use the sun to be fruitful.

In the Bible, in chapter 17 of Jeremiah, it says this:

"Blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, whose confidence is in Him.

They will be like a tree planted by the water that sends out its roots by the stream. It does not fear when heat comes; its leaves are always green.

It has no worries in a year of drought and never fails to bear fruit."

In our lives, we often go through real periods of difficulty, maybe loss of loved ones, physical pain or illness, loss of relationships and times of intense stress. We may feel really scorched by it, like we are withering up inside, intensely suffering through the heat of our circumstances. But if we turn to God in these times, if we choose to trust in Jesus Christ despite our situation, if we put our roots down deep through prayer into the source of Living Water, we will always be ok. We need not fear difficulty, our leaves will not wither, in fact we can use our hard times to help us to grow and our lives to bear more and sweeter fruit.
