Mere Town Council

July and August has certainly been busy in Mere Town and our office.

Eric Mitchell Way: To bring you the latest news, a meeting has taken place to identify what the hold-ups are that need to be completed on the Eric Mitchell Way and I am pleased to say we are on target to have the lights working by the change of clocks at the end of October 2025.

Police Station: Mere Police station has now been closed, unfortunately we were unaware of this action until it was closed. This will now be replaced with drop-in days to a police van at the Fire Station. Please keep your eye out on social media for dates in Mere.

Police and Crimestoppers: I have had an opportunity to meet with the Sergeant for our area to highlight issues that I have been approached with by the community; from here we will be building a better relationship to communicate the safety for our community. It is quite often that crime is not reported due to fear of the consequences of the perpetrator. I have spent time with Crimestoppers and Fearless to understand the process of reporting crime anonymously. I do have a little more work to do, though I will start to place information around the

town via posters and leaflets. Please keep an eye out, if we report crimes then we can make a difference in stopping it. I hope in the future to arrange informational presentations from the police and Crimestoppers for anyone who wants not only to gain more information but also to get involved in spreading the education of the great work the police, Crimestoppers and Fearless do.

Beaumont Building: We received the Reserved Matters planning application for the development of the old Beaumont's Business Centre in Woodlands Road during July and held a meeting in August in order to consider this. As outline planning permission for the erection of 70 houses had already been approved, the Town Council felt able to support the application for 58 houses that had been submitted by the new owners of the site, Redcliffe Homes. The 58 homes will be a mix of housing with 41 mixed dwellings to go on the open market and 17 mixed dwellings as affordable homes (either rented through a housing association or shared equity).

Mere Cemetery Buddies: I would like to announce that CIIr Mead has organised a group of volunteers to support the Town Council's grounds staff in caring for the cemetery. I look forward to seeing the progress of this teamwork. CIIr Mead would be happy to include any volunteers that wish to help. He will be starting this project on August 26th at 11am. Please feel free to go and have a chat with him or contact Lindsey Wood.

Seeds4Success: CIIr. Rod Coward met with Jaki Farrell from Seeds4Success up on Castle Hill and Long Hill to assess scrub clearance work that the youth can help with. Jaki's youth team have been working hard and have achieved a lot of scrub removal. We are very fortunate to have Jaki and Seeds4Success. These young people work hard which gives a sound foundation for future employment. WELL DONE all of you.

Recreation Ground: Living so close to the Recreation Ground, I wanted to say how great it is to see all the activities buzzing, Tennis, Football, Seeds4Success, families enjoying the lovely weather having picnics while the children enjoy the skatepark and play area.

Dog fouling: Having spent time wandering around Mere, I have been pleased to see a reduction in fouling in the areas I have been, such as Dark Lane. As a dog owner myself I thank each and every other dog owner that picks up after their

dogs, to the few that don't, please be more mindful of our lovely town and keep it clear of mess.

Training: I am now 4 months into the role of Chair of the Mere Town Council, and I am enjoying learning and building relationships in areas to be the best I can for our community. This has been made possible by the knowledge of current councillors and thanks to George Jeans for answering my constant phone calls and questions. But a big shout out to Lindsey Wood our very knowledgeable Clerk who always points me in the right direction and makes sure I have access to any training to enhance my role to serve the community.

Halloween: Halloween is fast approaching. Halloween is always popular in Mere and we would like to have a Halloween event this year. Please volunteer to help so that we can make this event as creative, fun and scary for all ages – we really want to hear your ideas. Foodbank: I have asked Anne Rich to give a little feedback on what has been happening with the Foodbank - Anne thank you for all the hard work that you and your team do: Within one busy week in August, the kind hearted people of Mere, Kilmington and Bourton were able to help two families in the town, with donations of many pieces of furniture, bedding, towels, toys and various other things. The voluntary help of local businesses to transport these items was also invaluable. Mere Toddlers Foodbank and Mere Forest Charity are very grateful for the assistance, as are the families involved who were overwhelmed by such generosity.

Vice Chair Rachael Hansford attended the Area Board meeting on my behalf and her feedback and comments are as follows.



What was discussed at the 16th July meeting?

Policing: There was an update from the local neighbourhood policing team. They highlighted a successful operation in Mere in July which prevented a daytime robbery at Quarryfields industrial estate — thanks to a member of the public who called police, and the rapid response of several police vehicles. One man was arrested, but five others got away. The first police officers on the scene were luckily in Gillingham already but George Jeans reinforced that since police response has moved recently from Warminster to Trowbridge, response times will only get worse. We were glad to hear that the local PCSO would be returning from an extended sick leave.

Funding: The Area Board gives grants of up to £5000 to support local projects/events in our community. For more information, contact Karen Linaker, Strategic Engagement and Partnerships Manager, Karen.linaker@wiltshire.gov.uk or speak to George Jeans or any town councillor.

Support for vulnerable people: The meeting heard about the Shared Lives project. This is an adult social care scheme supporting vulnerable adults in the homes of trained carers rather than in institutions, either short or long term. See https://adults.wiltshire.gov.uk/Services/1366 Alzheimer's Support spoke about the services they offer, like a one hour 'understanding dementia' workshop. New Mere bus service: A new demand-led transport service is coming to Mere from 1st September. It's a bus which can be booked via an app/phone up to half an hour before you need to travel, and has no fixed routes — it will take you where you need to go in the area. Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

At full council a fairly rare event took place at full council on the 22nd July, 75 councillors present voted unanimously in favour on a motion. Wiltshire Council resolves that the Highways Department work in collaboration with Wiltshire Police to develop and implement an effective enforcement mechanism for roads with weight restrictions.

I mentioned in previous months Practical Help with Technology would be available at The Grove Building, Mere on 1st July. Bring your phone, laptop or tablet. Free of charge and refreshments provided. At the IT function at the Mere Library to help some develop IT skills, the internet went down for a while. This has reminded me, we have a need for a good reliable broadband connection for many in the Mere area, with the availability of ultra-fast fibre where required. West Knoyle and Stourton plus parts of Kilmington have had improvements in recent years. Kilmington at present is one Wessex Internet as a provider can further enhance, enabled by schemes from BDUK as a government body, however not Mere as I am informed. A commercial provider (private finance) may do so, who that provider is I cannot find at present.

I understand that an on-demand bus service from September 1st that covers Mere and locality is still to go ahead.

Road condition in Mere, Kilmington, Stourton, West Knoyle and Zeals was something I heard much about while the election was in progress, I have contacted the new leader of the council and said I will in principal support any motion to improve highway condition across Wiltshire. "In Wiltshire over 30% of your highways network is classified as amber or red according to the DfT's Road Condition Statistics." Manor Road has had repairs as has Kilmington recently, which is an improvement however much more needs doing and in some cases to a better standard. Manor Road Mere where fairly extensive Bobcat patching works have taken place, badly delaminated patches in the centre of the road at both the Castle Hill end and also the Jack Paul Close may see a revisit in months to come.

Insurance abi.org.uk (Association of British Insurers) and FloodRe.co.uk British Damage Management Association 01858 414278 www.bdma.org.uk Wiltshire Police has seen a significant 14% increase in the reporting of drug offences over the past year according to new figures published yesterday (July 24th) by the Office of National Statistic — a rise which indicates an upward trend in community intelligence. The latest figures, covering the year ending March 2025, show 1,194 drug offences recorded across the county, up from 1,048 the previous year. Regionally across the South West, there has also been a 14% increase, with reports rising from 9,932 to 11,295.

Operation Scorpion is a collaborative initiative between the five South West police forces and their respective Police and Crime Commissioners which aims to make the region a hostile environment for drug dealers and organised crime groups. A crucial part of this work involves encouraging residents to report any concerns around drug related crime to enable the force to build a richer intelligence picture.

Wiltshire Police are continuing to reduce crime in Wiltshire and Swindon. Wiltshire has the lowest total recorded crime rate in England and Wales of 53.3 crimes per 1,000 population against a national average of 87.2 per 1,000 population.

The reporting of sexual offences in Wiltshire rose by 190 reports to 2,116 (+10%), which indicates increased public confidence in reporting.

South West Wiltshire Area Board Priority and Action Plan is being updated. The Area Board's primary purpose is to deliver the Council Plan at a local level through engaging with its communities and delivering agreed actions.

Mere was not technically a police station; it's owned by the fire service. The previous arrangement was that the Police had access to a small room and a toilet within the building, public footfall was poor (no Police there, they had to report to Warminster from a few years ago), space was rarely used by officers only volunteers in years past and the PCSO. Then the PCSO was informed to loose time each shift some considered and report to Warminster firstly. As a result, the Police have cancelled the contract, which saves £6000 a year, however the fire service have still said the Police are welcome to use it as a drop-in point at no cost. I spent much time when Mr Stone worked at Wiltshire Council heading up centres for each community area, we had to share one with Tisbury being The Nadder Centre, the Police station was agreed so as Mere had something. Warminster is now just community Police, PCSOs and some officers. Response has been moved to Trowbridge, it takes on average longer to attend emergency incidents. I have asked and they have agreed, The Area Board will be contacting the Police regarding response being moved to Trowbridge with Community Police being left at Warminster, response should return to Warminster. I personally think we have to get through to the Police, we sympathise with the

many cuts they have endured; however, we consider they are taking too much from us.

. I am getting increasing numbers of complaints about Dog fowling again. By highlighting it here hopefully it will send out a message again to curb the problem, however any improvements always seem to be forgotten in a short time.

Penny Fennon gave July rainfall for Salisbury Street as a total of only 5.5 cm with 2.0cm being the wettest on 20th July.

Pam Baldock this month gave the rainfall for Lordsmead in July, 15 out of 31 days had rain however too little to measure some days. Heaviest rainfall was on the 20th at 6.00 mm. Hail fell on 17th. Total for the month was 19.5mm (0.78 inch) Rain fall in July 2024 was 99.5mm 3.98 inches.



Victory in Japan Day



Service expansion: South-West Wiltshire

The popular Wiltshire Connect demand responsive bus service will be expanding to serve the south-west Wiltshire area from 1st September 2025. The service



has been successfully operating in the Pewsey Vale and Marlborough area for over two years and has received positive feedback from passengers. Unlike a traditional bus service, Wiltshire Connect does not have a fixed route or timetable and operates to pre-booked ride requests which can be made on the Wiltshire Connect app or by phone. Rides can be booked up to 7 days ahead and on the day with 30 minutes notice subject to availability.

Key features



Q. Where will the service operate?

Please see map overleaf. The service will operate in two zones in the Warminster/Frome area and Warminster/Mere area with rides available to Gillingham and Shaftesbury in North Dorset.

Q. How many vehicles will operate and are they wheelchair accessible?

All Wiltshire Connect vehicles are wheelchair accessible. Four vehicles will operate each day, two in each zone. The vehicles will be brand new Mercedes minibuses, and we will be piloting an electric vehicle on one service.

Q. Where can passengers be picked up?

We will have a large number of pick up and drop off points available including normal bus stops and virtual stops which are normally local landmarks. In addition, passengers who have a disability or mobility impairment can request a home pick up/drop off.

Q. Where can you travel to?

The service can be used to go anywhere within each zone up to a maximum journey distance of 15 miles. Local journeys within Warminster itself can not be made as a Town bus service is available. (If a timetabled bus service is available to make the journey around the pick-up time requested, passengers will be asked to use this instead).

Q. Will there be changes to other bus services in the area?

Yes, we will be making changes to services 54, 56, 58, 82 (Fridays only) and the Mere shared Taxi bus scheme will end and will be replaced with Wiltshire Connect. A new timetabled service 57/57A will operate between Warminster – Sutton Veny – Mere – Gillingham to compliment the new Wiltshire Connect service. More information will be available shortly.



A Triumph to have Stags in Wiltshire

Triumph Stags are and have been for many years a classic car of distinction. Sunday 10th August saw the Stag Owners Club meet up in Stourhead by the Bristol Cross for a Summer country experience. Bristol High Cross is a monumental market cross said to have been erected c.1373 in the center of Bristol. In 1764 it was moved to the Stourhead Estate in Wiltshire, where it still



stands. The Stags then moved off to Alfreds Tower nearby, the 49-metre-high (161 ft) triangular tower is climbed by means of a spiral staircase, some Stag drivers took the challenge, it is a folly built in 1722 on the site where it's believed that King Alfred the Great rallied his troops. It commands views over three counties. The Stags then moved onto the Old Brewery at Wyke, Gillingham, a restaurant known locally for its display of motorbikes. Henry Cole an English TV presenter, producer and director, best known for World's Greatest Motorcycle Rides, highlighted the business recently.

Some of the Stags are approximately 50-year-old vehicles, however still travel significant distances. Although the club is named Somerset and Dorset, they sometimes visit Wiltshire as today. One owner purchased a Stag in 1972 for about £2,300.00 which was a £100 over the new cost, you had to pay then if you wanted one as they were in short supply.

Mere Rivers Group

It has been a very difficult time for our streams with very little rain and two heatwaves. Demand on our drinking water was so great that Wessex Water were forced to turn off the stream support a number of times because of shortages in their network. But even with no support for a short time the upper reaches of both streams dried and we lost a number of small fish and many invertebrates. Our support is back on at the moment but with very little rain in the forecast we could be in the same position again.

July was the fifth consecutive dry month in Wessex. An average of 30mm of rain, 50% of the long term average (LTA) fell across Wessex. When considered

alongside the preceding 4 months, this has been the second driest 5-month period (March to July) since records began in 1871. Soil moisture deficit (SMD) initially increased in July before briefly falling following a period of rainfall in the middle of the month. By the end of July, SMD was rising again and was close to the historic maximum. Monthly mean flows recorded across Wessex in July were largely below normal or notably low. The majority of groundwater sites, including most sites monitoring the Chalk aquifer, reported below normal or notably low levels at the end of July. Overall reservoir levels for Wessex Water were approximately 57% capacity at the end of July while for Bristol Water, levels were approximately 52% capacity.

We need a prolonged period of rain for the gardens, farmers and our streams but let it rain at night.
