## DR ANDREW MURRISON, OUR LOCAL MP AND MERE RESIDENT, WRITES

### Westminster's worst week ever

On Sunday 10th May, I stepped off a Tristar at Brize Norton after visiting troops in Afghanistan and right into the eye of a storm that has shaken us to the core.

I hesitate to write about MP's expenses because everything is changing so fast and I am at risk of being out of date by the time this goes to press. However, I'm an optimist and hope that Westminster will regain some sort of even keel in the days ahead.

Past performance suggests that I may be disappointed.

The unusual thing about this scandal is that it touches politicians right across the political spectrum and implicates all of us. There's some grim comfort in that, but what it has meant is that people have no apparently virtuous organisation to turn to and, as a consequence, have turned on the collective, Parliament itself.

There is a temptation to accept the headlines that have been screaming at us without question. But, for all its hubris about public interest, the press is motivated by its voracious appetite for increased market share to benefit proprietors and shareholders and pay the mortgages of its employees. Whatever journalists may suggest to the contrary, it is counter-intuitive to suppose that MPs are any more or less venal than any other sector of society.

What then had led us to this sorry pass?

Well, firstly the most extraordinarily relaxed rulebook, secondly an over-reliance on the Commons authorities as arbiters of what is reasonable, thirdly risible checks and balances based on the conceit that MPs are 'honourable members' when they are no more honourable than anyone else. Finally, an ethos that the sum allotted for allowances was to be regarded as virtual income, apocryphally a mindset fostered over years as a sop to MPs that were required to exercise wage restraint.

And the pity of all this, is that had the Commons not bent over backwards to prevent disclosure we would not now be in the pit of despair that threatens the very fabric of democracy in this country.

At times like this, it is customary to search for a glimmer of hope and I suppose it is that, even with this scandal, our politics are probably among the least corrupt and avaricious in the world. In that thought lies the Mother of Parliament's last vestige of dignity and the foundation of its recovery.

### **MERE POLICE NEWS**



### Lock up - safe and sound

The spring weather is encouraging us all to spend as much time as possible outside either in the back garden or catching up with friends on the front door step. The sunshine makes us want to open the windows and let the breeze blow away the traces of winter.

Wiltshire Police want to remind people that unlocked doors and open windows can be a gift to opportunist burglars. There has been a recent increase in such crime which is being actively policed by high visibility patrols and detailed investigations. Residents can help prevent becoming victims themselves by following the advice below.

By remembering to lock front and back doors and not leaving accessible windows open in unoccupied rooms, it will reduce the chance of a "walk in" burglary taking place. Thieves will often target UPVC doors because they have a 'double lock' system, which means that when the door is closed it is not necessarily locked. Once inside handbags, wallets and car keys are usually easy to find and the burglary can take seconds rather than minutes.

When going out, securely lock <u>all</u> doors and windows – no matter what the temperature and no matter how long you intend to be away. 'Just popping across the road for a minute' or 'just nipping down the shop' is ample time for a criminal to strike.

Do be a nosey neighbour – tell us if you see anyone acting suspiciously in or around premises in your neighbourhood, and if possible, take the registration numbers of any unusual vehicles in your area.

Don't approach any suspicious persons – tell us about them with as much detail as possible, and try to include personal descriptions, and what clothes they were wearing.

Detective Sergeant Andy Beaven said: "We live in a very safe part of the country with a very low burglary rate but there are still people who will enter your home to steal given the opportunity. It's important that the public take a good look around their homes to see if they can identify possible entry points. If they can see any - then an opportunist thief will also spot them."

DS Beaven continued: 'Generally, thieves like the easy option so simple efforts like making sure that doors and windows are secure when you go to bed will put them off. Burglaries also happen during the day so if, for example, you are in the back garden, lock the front door. Simple advice but often forgotten.'

## THE REV'D PAUL BARNES, VICAR OF OUR PARISH CHURCH, ST MICHAEL THE ARCHANGEL, WRITES

I know this is highly unlikely...but if you attend a church in Birmingham on 7th June, Trinity Sunday, there is a good chance that the preacher will be a student who is training for the ministry at Queen's Theological College (or Queen's Foundation for Ecumenical Theological Education to give it its full title!!).

Every Sunday, students from Queen's are sent out to practice their preaching skills in one of the churches around the city, but the Sunday the college gets most requests for a student to preach is always Trinity Sunday. Why? Because most preachers find it very difficult to say something comprehensible about the Christian doctrine of the Holy Trinity, a doctrine which many people find totally incomprehensible!

Just in case you don't know what I mean by the Christian doctrine of the Holy Trinity, I offer you this quote from the extremely long Creed of St Athanasius, a 3<sup>rd</sup> Century Bishop of Alexandria who suffered great persecution and exile due to his defence of the doctrine of the Holy Trinity against very powerful and influential opposition.

"And the Catholic Faith is this: That we worship one God in Trinity, and Trinity in Unity; Neither confounding the Persons: nor dividing the Substance. For there is one Person of the Father, another of the Son, and another of the Holy Spirit. But the Godhead of the Father, of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, is all one: the Glory equal, the majesty coeternal".

Put more simply...Christians believe in One God who has revealed himself to us as Father- the creator; as Son - Jesus Christ, the redeemer, the human face of God; and as Holy Spirit - the unseen presence and power of God in the world today.

Why did Athanasius, and many Christians through the centuries, believe so strongly in the importance of the Holy Trinity that they have been willing to suffer and even die in its defence?

One answer to that question can be found in a recently published novel that has quickly become a bestseller in the USA and in this country. The novel is called 'The Shack' and it was written by William Paul Young and published by Hodder & Stoughton.

The main character in the novel is called Mack. The story begins with him suffering the great sadness of the death of his youngest daughter. She was abducted while the family were on a camping holiday. And although her body has not been found, her blood stained clothes were eventually discovered in a shack in a remote country park.

Mack receives a mysterious invitation to go to the shack which is signed 'Papa', his wife's name for God. Mack responds to the invitation and while he is at the shack he meets God, who, without giving too much away, is the Holy Trinity. God the Father, who happens to be a black woman (!), God the Son, a very recognisable Jewish carpenter, and God the Holy Spirit – an ethereal being called 'Sarayu' which means 'wind'.

What Mack discovers is that God is a relationship of love, and it is by observing and experiencing the relationship of love between Father, Son and Holy Spirit and finding his place within it, that Mack is eventually healed and is made whole.

What 'The Shack' reminds the reader is that God is love, and that love is the origin and the meaning of life, and when we live in a relationship of love we are reflecting the very nature of God. Without the doctrine of the Holy Trinity there would be no Christianity, and without Christianity we would not know that at the very heart of God there is an eternal relationship of love from which we came, in which we live, and to which we will return.

## **EAST WINDOW** at St Michael the Archangel Parish Church

Thanks to the splendid efforts of Karyn Sheppard and Judy Bickerstaff, we had raised the money for restoration, but our application to restore the window and replace the "quarries" with clear glass was rejected by the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC), which favoured the replacement of the window with one of a new design.

We considered designs and designers and asked the congregation and community if they had suggestions, which resulted in the submission of eight designs. These were exhibited in the church throughout February 2009 for the congregation to consider, and they provided helpful comments to the Church Wardens. The results provided the information to write a detailed design brief to put to selected approved specialist stained glass designers.

At that point we had to consider the comments made on the window by Mr Martin Cherry in his new report on St Michael's under the "Rediscovering our Parish Churches

– English Heritage and Diocese of Salisbury Partnership Project". Mr Cherry writes: "restored in 1852 and probably pre-184O and possibly by William Wailes of Newcastle., an unusual mixture of grisaille, scrolls and emblems of the Passion - the fact that it is not entirely successful aesthetically needs to be weighed against its historic interest since 1830s glass is relatively uncommon. Proposals to modify the glass in the east window (or replace it with one to a new design) are still at an early stage but have been considered by the DAC. The window is unusual and it is hoped that a full analysis and evaluation of its significance be carried out before a final decision is made."

Having heeded the Report's advice, then although a new window would be preferable, the financial climate is not right to seek grants to augment the money we have raised locally, which does at least cover the cost of restoration of the existing window. We are now eighteen months past the deadline given by our Inspecting Architect for its restoration and re-leading and are keen to do the work before next Winter, to avoid structural failure and collapse.

We believe that our parish wide enthusiasm to create a new stained glass window could be satisfied in the longer term by working up a design to replace one of the several large clear glass windows on the North side of the church, once the country's financial position improves and we can raise the necessary funds locally. We asked the DAC to issue a Faculty to restore the East Window in its current form, and it has agreed in principle to our request.
