### **The Chairman writes**

As winter approaches I am aware that the A303 will be closed in mid November for night traffic, and I am afraid map reading and sat navs are going to cause havoc in West Knoyle, Wet Lane and Pettridge Lane with people looking for short cuts. According to the website, there will be total closure for 5 weeks in Feb and March: Mayhem! Gillingham is bad enough now without the A303 traffic travelling through it. For years the Highway Agency has talked about Chaddenwick Hill and done nothing in view of widening it. If they had, we would not have this chaos that is about to descend upon us. The only consolation is that perhaps some people may stop for a cuppa in Mere and take in our beautiful countryside and, you never know, I might even get a drink for pulling somebody out of my ditch at Wet Lane. You have to look at the bright side!

At the October meeting, the Parish Clerk confirmed that the audit of accounts for the year ending 31st March 2009 had been concluded successfully and with no issues of concern. ## **GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES**

Development planning meetings can be interesting, the last Southern Planning meeting was indeed interesting and at one point amusing. One of the committee, Councillor Christopher Devine, announced he was unable to take part in one application because the applicant had assaulted him while he was canvassing at election time. He went on to explain the applicant had been arrested for the offence and as a Councillor he did not know whether to declare a financial or personal interest, however he thought it was best he left the room while the application was decided!

Swiftly moving on, a grant of £3.2m has been secured from the Government to build affordable housing in Wiltshire. A second bid for more homes in Trowbridge is being considered.

**I am concerned about possible charges to be made for using Mere's Car Parks. The doctor's surgery is in the main car park, and these charges would impact on all of us. I question whether Wiltshire Council have costed the profitability for small towns like Mere? The Environment Select Committee will be considering car parking at its meeting on 12th January 2010. The public can attend.**

The Council's Cabinet was told at its meeting on 20th October that the council's finances are set to be within budget by the end of the year and there are healthy reserves of £16.4m. At this meeting the Cabinet was expected to decide on the Council's key priorities for the next four years.

The corporate plan, which will be finally adopted in February 2010, identifies opportunities and challenges for 2010-14 and beyond. Nine potential priorities are being proposed. These are based on what residents say are important to them, their families and their communities. These priorities include roads and pavements, activities for teenagers and affordable decent homes.

These are reflected in the proposed priorities which are:

- Supporting vulnerable people and families
- Increasing the potential of young people
- Local voice, local choice
- Improving roads and pavements
- Supporting the local economy
- Meeting housing needs
- Reducing our environmental impact
- Achieving savings, efficiency and value for money
- Customer focus and improved access to services

Wiltshire Council is asking local people their views on the future development of the county and how the council should address issues such as providing housing, employment growth and building a prosperous and attractive county through careful planning. A major consultation exercise begins on 30th October 2009 and will run through until 31st December 2009. It will include exhibitions across the county, including one relevant to Mere, which will be staged in the Warminster Assembly Rooms on 10th November 2009 from 1.00 to 7.00pm.

Wiltshire Council is to reduce significantly the number of buildings it owns and uses as part of an innovative new scheme to transform ways of working. The council currently has around 95 administrative offices, but is proposing to reduce that number to four main hubs - Monkton Park in Chippenham; County Hall in Trowbridge; Bourne Hill in Salisbury and Browfort in Devizes - by 2012. The rationalisation will save £85.1m over the next 25 years and remove a large maintenance backlog.

Progress is being made on identifying alternatives to landfill. Wiltshire Council is working in partnership with Swindon Borough Council to identify cost effective and sustainable ways to dispose of the county's rubbish. The two councils are now investigating developing a "waste for energy" plan.

And lastly, do not forget we have a Children's Centre at Springfield Road, Mere. There will be 30 in Wiltshire in total and they are there to support young children and their families. To try and explain simply what a children's centre is, it is a government initiative set up as one body after the legacy of multi-agencies failing to identify major problems in families in the past that led to the death of a child.

## **MERE – A TALE OF TWO CULTURES?**

Wiltshire Council has produced a snap-shot profile of the area covered by Mere Matters. It makes for some interesting reading and may help us decide our local priorities. Relative to other areas in Wiltshire, Mere has an older population:

- the lowest percentages of population aged under 16 or under retirement age.
- the highest percentage of population over retirement age.

Wiltshire has one of the lowest crime rates in the country and Mere is one of the safest places in Wiltshire. We have:

- the third lowest rate of crime for criminal damage, theft, violence and vehicle offences but are average for other crime such as burglary and drugs.

In terms of quality of life for people of working age, we do well on unemployment but badly for disability; and housing is more expensive:

- the third lowest percentage claiming job-seekers allowance.
- average for income support.
- the second highest percentage claiming disability allowances.
- 20% above average house prices (£270k).

According to the figures, our greatest weakness appears to be the well-being of our children:

- we are in the bottom 10% for child well-being (which includes material well-being, health and disability, education, crime, housing, environment and children in need).

But for older people Mere appears to be an idyllic place to live:

- highest percentage satisfied with their local area as a place to live.
- highest percentage saying they are informed about how they can get involved in local decision making, and the second highest agreeing that they can influence decision making.

## GRANT AGREED FOR MERE YOUTH SCHEME

South West Wiltshire Area Board has approved a grant of £5,000 to the Mere development centre for young people to assist funding the Leisure Credits Scheme.

Young people in the Mere area undertake work in the community at weekends and in the holidays earning themselves leisure credits which can then be redeemed on fun outings organised by staff and volunteers from the development centres. The decision was taken at the last meeting of the area board on 16th September.

For the past couple of years the young people have helped Mere Parish Council clear Long Hill of the trees and scrub that have grown in the past two decades. They have helped build footpaths and steps and also gained certification in strimming, fencing and tree felling with hand tools, enabling them to access employment or training opportunities.

Parish councils generously help fund the leisure credits scheme along with grants from the Wiltshire Young People's Opportunity Fund, but this does not cover all the costs of this popular scheme which include training courses for the youth as well as the earned leisure activities, hence the application for funding from the area board.

Jaki Farrell, Wiltshire Council Youth Development Co-Ordinator, said: "We are always on the lookout for work we can do for all the parishes in the area. In fact, we are going to help Donhead St. Andrew soon with removing a holly bush blocking a footpath."

On behalf of the area board, chairman Cllr Bridget Wayman praised the work carried out by the young people and thanked Jaki for her hard work and dedication. "I know that Jaki is an incredibly hard-working youth worker and we are pleased and proud to have her in our area". For more information, contact:

## **A303 LATEST**

You may recall that in the July/August edition I drew your attention to the petition on the No 10 Downing Street Website asking the Government to dual the A303 trunk road throughout. The Government has now responded to the petition as follow:

“Thank you for your e-petition. The Government is committed to improving the safety and reliability of the strategic road network. Dualling the remaining single carriageway sections of the A303 would involve a number of expensive schemes however, and these cannot be afforded within existing budgets for transport schemes in the South West, given competing priorities for investment in the transport infrastructure to support economic growth in the south west’s major cities and towns.

The Government has accepted the advice from the Region that £40m should be invested (in the period to 2018/19) in the A303/A30/A358 corridor to improve the reliability and resilience of the route. The Highways Agency has already begun a study to consider what smaller-scale, more affordable local measures may be introduced within this broad indicative timescale to secure a satisfactory service for traffic using the A303. This could range from modest improvements to junction layouts to measures such as adding climbing lanes”.

Perhaps because only 561 people signed the petition, the Government showed little interest in taking any positive action.

May I remind you that the Highways Agency’s contractors will be starting Phase 2 of the A303 Willoughby Hedge to Mere carriageway renewal and major maintenance scheme for five weeks during the week commencing 16th November 2009. This entails preparation work for the widening, continued drainage works, signage and safety fencing. For this period, the A303 will be closed overnight from 10.00pm until 6.00am nightly and traffic diverted. *Editor*

## **MERE SURGERY**

### **Swine Flu Vaccination Programme**

We now have a confirmed date for the delivery of the Swine Flu Vaccinations.

**BECAUSE OF THE RESTRICTED CRITERIA FOR VACCINATIONS WE HAVE DECIDED TO ASK PATIENTS TO PLEASE BOOK AN APPOINTMENT FOR ONE OF THE SPECIAL CLINICS RATHER THAN HOLDING AN OPEN SESSION.**

Current information is that one vaccination will be sufficient for the majority of patients although some will require two vaccinations at three week intervals. Patients will be advised which category they fall into when they attend for their first appointment.

The surgery will receive a restricted supply of vaccinations and request that **ONLY THE PATIENTS WHO FALL INTO ONE OF THE CATEGORIES BELOW CONTACT US FOR AN APPOINTMENT TO BE VACCINATED.**

Priority will be given to the risk categories in the order listed below:

1. **Individuals aged between six months and 65 years** with a diagnosis of chronic respiratory disease, asthma (that requires continuous or repeated use of medication), chronic heart disease, chronic renal disease, chronic liver disease, chronic neurological disease (stroke or TIA), diabetes, immunosuppression or individuals who are the main carer for an elderly or disabled person.
2. All pregnant women.
3. Any individual who has contact with a person who is immunocompromised.
4. Individuals aged 65 and over WHO FALL WITHIN THE ABOVE AT RISK CATEGORIES.

**Patients aged above 65 who do not have a chronic disease as listed above do not need to be vaccinated at this time.**

If you fall within one of the risk categories PLEASE CONTACT THE SURGERY TO MAKE YOUR APPOINTMENT NOW.

You will be asked when you make your appointment to confirm which "at risk" category you fall into and your name will be checked against our clinical system.

At this time we are unable to vaccinate any patient who does not fit the above criteria.

Appointment sessions will be held on the following days weekly from the 11th November until the 18th December inclusively:-

**Wednesday afternoons - 4.00 – 6.00pm**

**Friday mornings 10.00am – 12.00pm**

**(Delivery dates may be delayed by 2 weeks, we are therefore booking patients into clinics from the 25th November and earlier clinics will be opened if deliveries are received before this date.)**

It will be difficult for us to vaccinate patients outside of these clinic times so we would appreciate your help in keeping to these dates if at all possible.

If you are unsure whether you should be vaccinated or not, we will have special telephone sessions for the Practice Nurse to contact you to discuss the vaccination process.

On Carnival Day itself, there are many people who volunteer their services freely. A big thank you goes to all the marshals and judges, many of whom come from other local towns to help. Also the street collectors who are mainly from local organisations like Mere Football Club whose members collected £227, Mere Swimming Club, local firemen and the Carnival Committee.

The cost and work involved in staging Mere carnival are increasing. Members of the Carnival Committee deal with health and safety, insurance, public safety, policy and procedures, etc all on a voluntary basis in between the demands of their everyday lives.

The need to encourage carnival entrants grows each year; hence we have to pay appearance money to carnival clubs and entries to ensure we get as many floats, walking entrants, marching bands etc, as possible. They do not pay to enter Mere Carnival as many people believe. This year's Mere Carnival cost over £4,500 to run. The street collection during the afternoon and evening processions (which was down by £200 this year) along with the fundraising throughout the year raised over £6,000. This is enough to cover this year's costs but leaves little to give to local charities as in previous years and to invest in next year's Carnival.

As the committee of volunteers battles on to ensure the survival of the carnival, the biggest fear is that increasing costs will bring about an end to this fun event. So if you see a fundraising event for the carnival then please support it if you can. We realise that times are hard for everyone but a few extra attendees at an event or the sale of extra raffles tickets can make a difference. The committee are always looking for new ideas for fundraising so any suggestions are welcome, or if you can spare a couple of hours each month to help with carnival this would be appreciated. ## **THE REV'D TIM HEATON, CUTATE OF THE PARISH OF UPPER STOUR, WRITES**

### **When the voices fall silent**

Harry Patch, who died in July aged 111, was the last surviving British Army veteran of the First World War. He served in The Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry and was badly wounded at the third Battle of Ypres (Passchendaele). Just a week before he died another veteran of the Western Front, Henry Allingham, was also called into God's kingdom. At 113 he was the oldest living man in the world.

Henry, who served in the Royal Naval Air Service, spent the last years of his life as something of a celebrity, making frequent public appearances to tell his story so that it might live on as a legacy to ensure we never forget. But, shortly before his death he said this of his wartime service: "I wanted to forget it! And I did forget it. It's only by the merest fluke I was discovered, and I didn't like it. It's fair to say that any man that's really seen war wanted to forget it. He didn't want the memory, and most of them did just that, successfully."

That must surely be the sentiment of all who have seen the horror of war, whether fighting the Germans in Flanders, the Japanese in Burma or the Taliban in Helmand Province. But, we must never forget *them*. Harry's and Henry's voices have now been silenced, and there are just three known remaining survivors of the Great War – one Briton, one Canadian and one American.

Their voices, too, will soon be silenced, and it is only by our remembrance of them that their stories will be kept alive. And their story is God's story: our God is the God who participates in human history; God meets us in history and speaks to us as one who has been involved in history.

So as we commemorate the moment when the guns fell silent, let us remember the voices that have fallen silent – the dead of all wars and the survivors who are now passing away – as well as the maimed and the broken and those who are facing danger this day. Please join us if you can at the War Memorial by the clock tower in the Square on Sunday, 8th November for an act of remembrance at 10.45am followed by a service in St Michaels Church. "They may forget, yet will I not forget thee" (Isaiah 49.15).
