The Chairman writes:

Firstly, I would like to congratulate Mere Carnival Committee on the excellent activities that were held during carnival week culminating in the wonderful carnival procession held on 19th September. The weather was perfect, and it was a delight to see the crowds of people, young and old, lining the streets of Mere and enjoying the procession. It certainly looked like the collection buckets were being filled as a sign of appreciation.

The Parish Council has received communication from a councillor in the village of Méré, France, asking if we might be interested in twinning. The Parish Council discussed this at a recent meeting but felt that it was not within the Parish Council's remit to discuss whether or not Mere should be twinned, and any such project would certainly not be an appropriate use of ratepayer's funds. However, members did suggest that there may be residents who would wish to give this matter some consideration or who may want to form a twinning association. GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

The Leader and Chief Executive of Wiltshire Council regularly write a "blog", being a diary of events and experiences published on the Internet. Monthly, when I can, this is my "blog" for the very local magazines.

Hitherto Councillors have been being addressed as "Mr" and not "Councillor" for official purposes, but at a recent full council meeting it decided that Wiltshire Councillors are now to be called "Councillor" and not "Mr" for official purposes. This is to differentiate at meetings between Councillors, Officers and members of the public, etc.

Harmonisation is one of the "in" words at the present time. For example, I was told that for Wiltshire Car Parks it was just a matter of taking the lowest charge and the highest charge across Wiltshire and deciding what one consistent charge would be, probably ending up somewhere in the middle bracket of existing charges. A charge put onto Mere local car parks will not be helpful, particularly for the local Doctors Surgery, the viability of local businesses, etc. On the 3rd November 2009, the WC Environment Select Committee will discuss harmonisation of car parking charges. This meeting will be held at the old West Wilts offices at Bradley Road, Trowbridge. The public can attend and speak however, do check nearer the time if you intend coming to this meeting. Similarly, harmonisation of waste could reduce our collection to once every two weeks. Harmonisation also affects enforcement and other areas.

Voluntary groups, amongst others, may be interested to know that The Wiltshire Cabinet will be deciding very shortly whether or not to allow 22.5 hours, or pro-rata thereof, for voluntary working in council time for employees of Wiltshire Council, excluding most School workers. In the present economic climate, the members of the Southwest Wilts Area Board are against this.

I have copies of the South Wiltshire Core Strategy Development Plan Documents (DPD), publication stage representation forms and notes, should you wish to respond non-electronically to The South Wiltshire Core Strategy proposed submission document (That is enough words!!!!). 270 homes are proposed for Mere itself over 20 years, but allowing for those already built since 2006, I am told this gives less than 170 more homes to be built in Mere. Employment land is that already available and "reserved" in the last published plan. The villages around Mere, including East and West Knoyle and Sedgehill will only be able to develop a total of 20 houses between them in the 20 years. I would ask readers resident in villages around Mere to consider if this is enough, because concerns were raised at the last South West Area Board meeting that this may not be enough for those villages.

"JUST A MINUTE" Wiltshire Council's New Local Newsletter

The South West Wiltshire Area Board of Wiltshire Council, which comprises the Mere, Tisbury and Wilton Community Areas has now published "Just a Minute", as a regular newsletter.

Councillor Bridget Wayman, Area Board Chairman in her welcome column writes: "We would like to keep you posted about what the Board is doing, the decisions that are being made, when the various events are being held and guides to raising issues and applying for grants. If you attended the first meeting in Mere in July I hope you found it informative. Future meetings will concentrate on real issues that affect you. Do come along". Too late for our September edition, the second Area Board meeting was held in Tisbury on Wednesday 16th September 2009, but the next meeting is on Wednesday 21st October at a venue in the Tisbury Community Area that has yet to be determined.

The Newsletter tells us that our Community Area Manager is Richard Munro who has been appointed to support the Area Board and to work in all three community areas. His role is another important feature of the way Wiltshire Council will work with communities. Richard will work very closely with the Area Board, but he will also work with many other organisations in the locality helping to promote the area and make things happen. The Area Board ask you to contact Richard whenever you want more information about the work of the Area Board, and especially if you want to be kept in touch.

With that in mind, a community area network (CAN) is being be established in the Mere, Tisbury and Wilton community areas. This will be open to anyone who wants to sign-up for email alerts and information about the work of the Board and its partners including agendas, reports, minutes, diary of events, forward work programme, links to local organisations, contacts and more. MERE SURGERY

Swine Flu Vaccination Programme

Following instructions given by the Department of Health, the Surgery has been informed that the Swine Flu vaccination programme could begin mid-October, although this date is yet to be confirmed.

Priority will be given to the risk categories in the order listed below:

 Individuals aged between six months and 65 years with a diagnosis of chronic respiratory disease, asthma (that requires continuous or repeated use of medication), chronic heart disease, chronic renal disease, chronic liver disease, chronic neurological disease (stroke or TIA), diabetes, immunosuppression or individuals who are the main carer for an elderly or disabled person.

- 2. All pregnant women
- 3. Any individual who has contact with a person who is immunocompromised.
- 4. Individuals aged 65 and over in the above risk categories.

If you fall within one of the risk categories we anticipate using an open surgery system for vaccinations. You will not need to phone the surgery for an appointment, patients will be vaccinated in the order that they arrive at the surgery.

Full details of when we expect to receive the vaccine together with clinic dates, will be shown on posters displayed at the Surgery, Mere Post Office and the Pharmacy.

GREENER LIVING ROADSHOW

The new series of Wiltshire Wildlife Trust's Greener Living Roadshow events will kick-off with a host of family-friendly activities on Saturday 3rd and Sunday 4th October, as part of the Green Living Show at 'Stourhead Uncovered'.

Activities will include making winter 'bug hotels' for ladybirds and lacewings, creating beautiful hand-crafted papers and sampling traditional varieties of Wiltshire apples– and what's more, you'll discover why these things can make a difference in reducing your eco-footprint and living a greener lifestyle.

"The Roadshow is ideal for anyone interested in making a difference," writes the WWF, "Whatever it is that you do – be it recycling, composting or growing your own vegetables – it's always possible to make improvements on what you're doing".

Trust staff and other advisers will be on hand to offer advice and information on a range of issues, including climate change and wildlife; how to cut down waste, reduce energy use and save water; grow your own vegetables, collect seeds and make gardens wildlife-friendly; environmentally-friendly transport options available; how to make ethically and environmentally sound choices at the shops; and how to get involved in your local area by taking part in volunteering opportunities.

The Trust's education team will run 'make-it and take-it' craft activities. On Saturday they will be making hand-crafted paper from old magazines and newspapers and on Sunday making underwater sea creatures from hard-to-recycle items, like plastic bottles and cardboard.

The compost team will be demonstrating how to make seed pots out of old newspapers and providing seed and Hills compost so that people can take home their seed pots together with an information sheet on how to care for their plant.

And with winter fast approaching, it's also the perfect time to make a bug hotel so that insects like lacewing and ladybirds can hibernate during the cold months. The environmental action team will be on hand to show you how to build your own which you can then take home with you.

And there will be plenty of information leaflets to take home with you, from SMART (Save Money and Reduce Trash) Shopping to Fairtrade Directories and the popular 'What to do with leftovers'.

REV'D PAUL BARNES, PRIEST IN CHARGE OF ST MICHAEL'S CHURCH, WRITES:

Harvest Festival, which will take place at St Michael's on 4th October, is one of my favourite Sundays of the whole year.

The church is beautifully decorated with the fruits of God's creation; baskets of home grown produce; sheaves of wheat and the harvest loaf placed on the altar, and magnificent flower arrangements, not in the bright, brash, 'in your face' colours of spring and summer, but in the golds, oranges and crimsons of autumn. Young and old, tuneful and tone deaf, gather to belt out those wonderful harvest hymns, 'Come, ye thankful people, come', and 'We plough the fields and scatter'.

More recently this festival has been renamed 'Harvest Thanksgiving' and I am quite happy with that re-branding because a day of thanksgiving it certainly is. We have so much to be thankful for and yet far too often we forget to count our blessings, we take the good things we enjoy for granted, and perhaps worst of all we leave God, our creator and sustainer, from whom all blessing flow, totally out of the picture.

Alongside our thanksgiving for a good harvest is God's call to share our riches with those less fortunate than ourselves. In the Bible, God instructed the Israelites to leave parts of their fields unharvested and not to pick-up any grain that was dropped so that it would provide a source of food for the poor.

This year we will once again be supporting the important work carried out by the Trussell Trust, the Salisbury based organisation that provides food boxes as three-day emergency food relief to people experiencing crisis. The economic downturn that we are currently living through has led to a growth in the number of people being helped by foodbanks. So far this year 24,000 people have been fed compared to 14,000 in 2008.

Foodbank network manager, Jeremy Ravn, writes: "ecession means more people who would never have thought they'd need help are hitting a crisis forcing them to go without

food. The UK public is beginning to understand hidden hunger in the UK and, through the foodbank project, is responding to meet this growing need. We are so encouraged by the rising number of foodbanks opening across the UK, and by increased community participation in current foodbank projects: in the last year alone communities have donated over 200 tonnes of food to help feed people in crisis."

During the Harvest Thanksgiving service at St Michael's there will be the opportunity for us to bring forward gifts of non-perishable foods such as cornflakes, UHT milk, pasta, tinned vegetables, rice pudding, orange juice, and having given thanks for them we will deliver them to the Trussell Trust warehouse for distribution.

The church service is a joyful celebration for all ages and everyone is welcome to attend, but if you are unable to be there and would still like to support the Trussell Trust, food can be left in the church or in the porch.

As usual this year we will be giving all the produce, and the money collected, to the TRUSSELL TRUST in Salisbury. They are a voluntary organisation who help local people in crisis. SUCHANA: WHAT NEXT?

First of all, a very big thank-you to everyone who came along, or wished us well for our house-warming and Suchana evening in August. It was a very happy event, and we are very grateful for everyone's kindness and welcome to the occupants of the new top floor of Grove Cottage as well as your interest in and support for Suchana. The evening wasn't really intended as fund-raising event, but actually raised nearly £800, as well as the spontaneous donation of two lap-tops for Suchana. This was wonderful!

'Suchana' – for those who don't know – is creative basic education and health project started by our niece, Kirsty and her husband, Rahul in rural West Bengal. Working with parents, teachers and other members of the local community, Suchana provides help in literacy and accessible education for 140 children from the most disadvantaged local groups. Most of them have parents who cannot read or write and many do not speak Bengali (the language used in government schools in the area). Without the kind of support that Suchana provides, these children tend to fail in ordinary schools in very large classes with no special help.

Suchana has a flourishing and well-used children's library and has just opened a new building to provide all-weather classes and space for study. The programme also includes sports and creative activities, and an amazing annual show in a variety of local languages, as well as English, in which every single child takes part. Basic health-care issues are covered too, for parents and children.

As a follow-up to all the interest in and support for Suchana, we're holding two coffee mornings at Grove Cottage (round the corner from the Grove Buildings, opposite the Library entrance) on Tuesday 27th October and Tuesday 24th November from 10.30am-12.00noon to which EVERYONE IS WELCOME. Whether or not you came to the evening in August, please come along if you can and would like to.
