### DR ANDREW MURRISON, OUR LOCAL MP AND MERE RESIDENT, WRITES

Thank you for returning me so handsomely at the general election. I was truly humbled by the result in the new South West Wiltshire constituency.

I'm no sage but I did predict a long time ago that the Lib Dems could very well lose seats at the general election but, paradoxically, end up in a more powerful position. However, nobody could have predicted the situation that we now find ourselves in. It is hardly surprising that Lib Dem MPs, especially the large number who have landed up as ministers, look like cats that have got the cream.

Although the marriage is a gritted teeth affair, I do support the coalition since it appears to offer our best hope of putting in place the framework for economic recovery. Time and again on the doorstep during the election campaign people told me that the state of the national finances was their top priority, so it should be mine.

I believe that the new session has got off to a reasonable start, albeit one shaken by the cabinet's first casualty in the form of David Laws, the Lib Dem MP for Yeovil. The new boys and girls seem a good bunch and many of them, mercifully, have experience of something other than politics.

I am pleased that an early move has been to tackle the disastrous regional spatial strategy. I hope that this will mean a more rational approach to development in areas like ours and one that is more locally determined. I look forward to further measures that will advantage our small market towns and villages in the months and years ahead. Let's, at long last, have some proper rural-proofing of government policy.

### MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Lecture Hall (small room) at 7.30pm on Monday, 5th July 2010. There will be NO meeting in August.

### The Chairman writes:

Having to write this in early June, we still do not know the outcome of the decision on the proposed car parking charges in Mere. However, the Parish Council has been very vocal, in different circles, to try and prevent it happening. The Vice-Chairman and myself met with Jane Scott (leader of Wiltshire Council) and showed her around Mere, pointing out its shops, churches, library, cemetery, the recreational & sporting facilities and the two car parks! She fully understood why we are so anti-car parking charges. Let's hope she will influence the right people. On that subject, however, I do need to tell you that the car parking review will NOT now be discussed at the next Area Board meeting to be held on 25th June. There is, apparently, a delay in producing the consultation documents and it looks likely that the matter will now be raised on the

agenda for the Area Board meeting to be held on Wednesday, 25th August. Of course, members of the public are entitled to attend any Area Board meeting to raise issues of concern but if you are eager to 'have your say' about the possible imposition of car parking charges in our two car parks, it may now be better to wait until August. ### GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

From 1st April 2010, the charge for the collection of bulky items of rubbish has been harmonised across Wiltshire (increased in our area). 1 to 4 items cost £19.50 then through steps to 9 to 12 items costing £55.10. While we are on harmonisation, I will make a statement at the Wednesday 23rd June meeting near Wilton in South Newton and Wishford Village Hall regarding our wish to keep our car parks in Mere free of charge. The consultation will now be at East Knoyle Village Hall on Wednesday, 25th August 2010. I hope some of you will come, especially to the latter meeting. The PCT will be present on the 23rd June, 2010, should you wish to express a view on access to a NHS dentist, the government (department) says 72 percent of us should have access to a NHS dentist.

I noted that Wiltshire Council signed off a decision which could impact on the advertising of charitable events etc. locally. Upon checking, I find The Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005, which relates to fly-posting only if an authorised officer witnesses an individual in the act of placing an illegal poster. The powers contained in the Town and Country Planning Act and the Highways Act, are unlikely to be enforced if the advert is for Charitable and community events etc. Common sense does prevail, sometimes.

On 6th April, 2010, legislation came into force to allow local Councils to impose Community Infrastructure Levies (CIL) for needed roads etc, This is a developer's contribution to bridge the gap between funds available and those required, and may be a good idea. However, in the present financial situation with a possible increase in new

house prices plus the impact it could have on affordable houses (no new houses means no affordable houses), I am not sure that Wiltshire Council should implement it in the foreseeable future.

### **MERE SURGERY**

### **Out of Hours Cover**

On the first of April 2010, Wiltshire Primary Care Trust commissioned Wiltshire Medical Services to provide Out of Hours care for our patients. Part of this contract allows patients in this area to continue to be seen at Shaftesbury Treatment Centre during their opening hours, which includes evenings up to 11.00pm and weekends but not overnight.

We have been informed by some patients recently that they have been asked to attend the Treatment Centre in Trowbridge or another centre in Wiltshire rather than being offered to be seen in Shaftesbury.

This is partly because the base for Wiltshire Medical Services is in Chippenham and the initial telephone calls are being handled by staff there, who do not know this area or are not aware of the contract to see patients at the Treatment Centre in Shaftesbury. We have of course taken the matter up directly with Wiltshire Medical Services.

We would however, encourage all our patients who are asked to attend a Treatment Centre by the Out of Hours Service to ask to be seen in Shaftesbury if this is the most convenient centre for you to travel to.

I would also ask patients to feed back any problems encountered with the Out of Hours Service to the surgery so that we can pass it onto Wiltshire Medical Services and the Primary Care Trust.

### MERE DENTAL PRACTICE NEWS

It has come to my attention that there is perception that the practice has gone completely private. This is not the case and I would like to reassure you that this is far from the truth. Mere Dental Practice remains committed to the NHS. Jacquie is seeing patients who are either fee paying or exempt patients under the NHS, whilst Stephen continues to see patients who are exempt under the NHS. There are NHS appointments available to people in Mere.

I would like to outline to you the reasons of why the recent changes have occurred. On the 1st April 2006 NHS Dentistry was radically reformed in this country. NHS dentistry funding and running of dental practices was directly placed in the hands of Primary Care Trusts. The idea being that Primary Care Trusts bought NHS services from dentist. Out of this change, "dental contracts" were created, where dentists are awarded an amount of NHS funding from their local Primary Care Trust and in return dentists have to reach a certain level of dental activity set by their local Primary Care Trust. Each individual Primary Care Trust sets the amount that it will pay their local dentists, which is why nationally dentists are no longer paid the same amount unlike pre-April 2006. Also dentists could now mix NHS & private treatment plans, which was previously never

allowed. The latter change was introduced so private dental work would subsidise dentists individual NHS contracts. For the first three years of this new NHS contract the funding was 'ring fenced'. Primary Care Trusts could not use this money for any other reason than NHS dentistry, and it gave dentists time to adjust to the changes in their NHS funding. The 'ring fence' has now been removed and dentists are fighting to maintain their levels of NHS funding within the present economic climate.

Mere Dental Practice remained 98% NHS in this period of time, but now like all the other dental practices in this country we cannot survive solely on NHS funding and have to offer more private dental care. Hence, the reason why Stephen has reduced his fee paying NHS patients and is offering Denplan Care; a budget system which enables people to pay either in instalments for their dental care (not an insurance scheme) or alternatively a 'pay as you go' alternative on a 'fee per item' basis.

In a recent issue of the "Blackmore Vale Magazine", I saw an advert for a Dental Practice offering NHS appointments; I also noticed that within this advert the Denplan logo was displayed. The days of purely a NHS dental practice are sadly no more and unfortunately, Mere Dental Practice has had to adjust to this.

**Yandles of Martock** 

Yandles is the name of a timber merchant and sawmill established in Martock in 1860, which grew into a thriving business particularly concerned with making coffin boards from elm. In the middle of the twentieth century the supply of their raw material disappeared with the onset of Dutch Elm disease and the company had to diversify. It found its way into the growing crafts and hobby woodworking world. Though it remains a working sawmill and continues to supply timber goods, its old buildings now house a splendid tool shop and timber store for the hobbies and do-it-yourself market, together with a comprehensive craft materials department and a gallery of wonderful items created by local artists and craftspeople.

On arrival at Yandles, we will be given a talk by David Mountstephen, who has followed his father as managing director of the company, and has a wealth of knowledge of the history of the company, the town and the surrounding area. Then we will have a tour of some of the workshops following which there will be time for you to wander through the stores, the gallery and to take tea in the cafe, (which does exceedingly good homemade cakes).

### REV'D CHRIS MOORSOM, RECTOR OF UPPER STOUR, WRITES

### Moving on, moving in.

There's been a lot of moving on or moving in over the last few weeks: a new Prime Minister moving into No.10 and the former one moving on; a new cabinet and a change of style of government, with a coalition finding ways of working together that seems to be fresh and promising. Change is of course an essential part of life, and yet we can easily see it as an unwelcome threat, to be ignored, or avoided. Yet without it, the world could not exist, human life could not have developed, the Church could not have been born, Christian faith would become stale or lifeless. Change can be welcomed, if it brings hope and new life. So I'd like to tell you briefly about some changes in the ministry for some of our churches that are recent or imminent:

- 1) The Rev'd. Tim Heaton, Curate in Upper Stour, is about to begin a new chapter in his ministry journey: he is to be ordained Priest on Saturday 3rd July at Salisbury Cathedral at 11.00 a.m. A coach is being organised by Sheila Williams, (01747 840220) if anyone would like to come along. Bring a Picnic lunch for afterwards on the Cathedral Green (or if wet, in the cloisters). He is then presiding at his first Parish Communion at St. George's Bourton on Sunday 4th July. Then he will be starting an extended placement in the parishes of Gillingham and Milton on Stour, working with Rev'd. Peter Greenwood, the new Priest in Charge there. It is expected that he will return to join the ministry team in this area once again, at the end of this period.
- 2) The Revd. Ros Hollingsworth received her Final Ordination at Portsmouth on 26th June, marking the next stage in her ministry in this region.
- 3) The new URC Minister has been appointed, the Reverend Elizabeth Kemp; she will be inducted in Blandford on Saturday 31st July and her first service in Mere will be on Sunday 1st August. We look forward to welcoming her to our Churches Together fellowship soon after that.

No doubt changes of various kinds will affect our own lives and communities over the coming months and years, some more welcome than others. Such changes demand some adjustment from all involved, and this can prove challenging and sometimes painful. But the lesson we can draw from the birth of the Church at Pentecost, is that it needed such changes for the disciples to be open to the new things God wanted to do with them. If Jesus had not gone to the Father, then how could they have received His Spirit and begun the explosion of creativity that launched the early Church?

So as we pray for those moving on, moving in, or facing changes of many kinds, let's aim to be open to the new growth and opportunities that arise, and ask the Holy Spirit to be our guide and inspiration for whatever the future brings.

It is now a year since we started up a Mere support group for Suchana - a health and education programme for very disadvantaged children in West Bengal, India. In that time, we have managed to raise £2,334.55, through fund-raising events, and also a number of very generous donations. We have just received their Annual Report for 2009-10, an exciting wish list for 2010-11 and a statement of accounts which shows that in the 8-month period from August 2009-March 2010, the Mere group raised 1/8 of the total amount raised for the project, contributing very significantly to its recent key developments.

Suchana now has its own building with a small library which is open 7 days a week and available for private study and support, as well as for a wide variety of special teaching projects (previously it ran only 2 ½ days a week). Hopes for the future include building a clinic and latrines, as well as an upstairs with more teaching space, and a solar power system – to avoid interruptions caused by power cuts. Short term goals include increasing the number of teaching sessions and the book supply, and producing more books in the children's mother tongue, as well as publishing some of their own writing – all of which help to build up confidence. So, you can see your support makes a real difference! A very big thank-you to all who have supported us so far and to all who will do so in the future!
