

MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the **Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on Monday, 7th February 2011**.

The Chairman writes:

HAPPY NEW YEAR to all our parishioners. I hope you had a very good Christmas and I hope the 'big freeze' has not caused too much disruption and distress.

The feedback on the Parish Council's Christmas illuminations has been overwhelmingly positive. The risk assessment for decorating the tree in the island has been far lower than the risks of installing a separate Christmas tree. The number of man hours involved in erecting the decorations has been far less, the tree is more visible and, my personal opinion is that it looked prettier! We have even received letters from parishioners saying how pretty the tree looked. We had problems with the bulbs on the clock tower because they kept blowing due to the cold weather – we are going to rethink this scheme during the year so if you have any ideas, please send them in.

I would like to take this opportunity to extend the Parish Council's thanks to various people for their help with the Xmas decorations. Firstly to the Hill Brush Company for the loan of its "cherry picker" and operator, Mr. Hull, for all his help. Also to George and Michael Jeans for the electrics, and Melinda Emby for arranging the "switching on" ceremony. Well done everyone and thank you. As always, we congratulate the residents of Denes Avenue for their impressive Christmas lighting displays, which have now become a local tourist attraction.

Wiltshire Council has officially decided to implement charges for the two car parks in Mere unless the Parish Council agrees to lease and take on the management and associated costs of the two car parks. At the January meeting, subject to various conditions relating to financial contributions from businesses and other clauses within the leases, the Parish Council agreed to negotiate with Wiltshire Council to take on a two-year lease for the two car parks and a lease for the public toilets.

The financial impact of this decision was also considered at the January Parish Council meeting when members officially approved the budget allocations for 2011/12. The parish portion of the council tax on a Band D council tax property will increase by just under 3.4% from £69.95 to £72.32. Given that a budget of £3,000 (£2.52 per Band D property, per year) has been allocated for the possible maintenance and management of the car parks and public toilets, members felt that the increase was justifiable.

We would also like to stress the importance of letting us know your views on planning applications. The Parish Council is a "statutory consultee" on all planning applications

but we are finding that residents who have an objection to a nearby planning application are only sending in their objections to Wiltshire Council (the planning authority) and not sending us copies. How can we consider your views if we do not know what they are? Please send us a copy of your objection or support letter, before the Parish Council meeting, and we will consider your views. Better still – come along to the meeting and let us know your views verbally, in the public session.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

There were many Christmas trees around the Mere area. Zeals had a living tree, which was very effective, also local residents put up a traditional tree on Zeals Green complete with lights and a star, an excellent display for a small village. Mere had a super set of Christmas tree lights, but the Town Clock clear lights that failed bulb by bulb faster than I have ever known. Philip Coward from The Hill Brush Company gave permission to use its "cherry picker", for which I would like to thank him, to erect the lights, and then the "cherry picker" returned in the extremely cold spell to help replace the bulbs that had failed due to the cold weather. Would you believe it the "cherry picker" froze up and refused to function.

We may not have had the same quantity of snow, but it was as cold as I remember 1963 and 1977. Although the parishes may have a little salt/grit left, Wiltshire Council has decided not to refill the grit bins any more at the present time, although there is time for more inclement weather as yet, and the treatment of primary routes takes priority.

Wiltshire Council's main office in Salisbury is now Bourne Hill, but Milford Street is now the face of Wiltshire Council in Salisbury, and no longer Bourne Hill. Salisbury, I understand, will have a campus, a campus being shared services in one building, which will be extra to Bourne Hill. It is expected that every community area including Mere will have a campus, to deliver the big society agenda in an innovative and sustainable way that has not been done elsewhere. I will be a little sarcastic; we had a One-Stop Shop at the Library for a short time, until one by one many of the services were removed. Should we get a campus in the Mere Area, I hope it will last.

December saw the Wiltshire Council Cabinet deciding on car park harmonisation. The outcome is better than charges in our local car parks. Locally we have an offer to take over control of the car parks, which many local traders and commerce will help finance to keep Mere free of charges.

Regarding workplace transformation of Wiltshire Council, the first batch of workers have temporarily moved to Shurnhold School, Melksham, while County Hall undergoes modernisation. We are told the telephone numbers for the officers will not change, however finding them face to face will be more difficult for me on your behalf.





Anti-Social & late night behaviour

We have received reports over a period of time that there are on-going problems in the Town Square & Castle Street area of Mere, particularly weekend evenings. We are addressing this issue by patrolling this area on foot and by vehicles. We have already canvassed some local residents in order to assess their views, and we will continue to

monitor and patrol this area as a priority. Please feel free to contact us if you have any relevant information. Thank you for your assistance.

MERE WEATHER

In November we had a total of 93mms (3.66ins) of rain. Last year we had 243.5 mms (9.59ins). Most fell in the first half of the month. From the 14th to the end of the month we only had rain on one day. From the 15th we had many hard frosts with sunny days. On the 26th we had our first fall of snow. It soon melted but then on the 30th we had another fall of snow.

December started with snow in earnest with 50.8mms (2 inches) on the 2nd. We then had more frosty mornings, one day with a hard hoar frost which made the trees beautiful. On the 17th and 18th we had more snow which stayed with us right through Christmas and made the pavements very treacherous with frozen snow. Finally, we had rain on the 27th which cleared most it away. However, the total rainfall for December was only 30mms (1.18ins). Last year we had 114mms (4.49ins).

Up to the 15th of January we had 89mms (3.5ins) of rain.

The total rainfall for 2010 was 730.5mm (28.8ins). In 2009 was 1,008mms (39.68ins). It is interesting to see that in 2008 the total rainfall was 1,280mms (50.39ins) and in 2007 it was 1,304.5mms (51.36ins). *Peter Durkee*

Believe it or not, we not only learn lip-reading and communication, but we have fun along the way and meet other people in the same boat which is a great comfort. Last year there were 291 requests for appointments at Salisbury District Hospital, which involved volunteers driving 15,000 miles. 809 requests were for medical appointments and 328 for non-medical. The non-medical requests included shopping, visiting relatives in hospital and taking members to social clubs.

FOOTPRINTS

Children's Centre Update

My last Mere Matters article, brought you the (to me) devastating news that Wiltshire Council planned to consult on the Children's Centre's closure, the major activity of Footprints. I also mentioned our forthcoming event in Hindon. Well, that event did run, and it really bought home to me, if ever I can forget, what a valuable service we offer. Our event there was well attended, with many not having used Children's Centre facilities before and/or wanting us back, as accessibility to transport and facilities for children were a problem – a common issue across our area.

With the closure threat we could not promise another event. But now our future looks safer, with Wiltshire Council confirming that, having reviewed their decision, they would not close the centre. However, it was decided to temporarily cease Children's Centre activities from January-March, and that is where we are now. This period is allowing us to focus on topping up our training, skills and qualifications and on preparation for a change of management; the Children's Centre contract between Footprints and Wiltshire Council ceases at the end of March. We are looking forward to working with and developing the Children's Centre under the guidance and management of successful tenderers, a national children's charity, "4Children".

If you require information on children's centre activities locally, or other support and advice, we are manning the centre during this period, and can signpost you to other agencies and neighbouring childrens' centres until we re-open.

We are also using the closure period to contact our users/partners to research what activities and programmes they think the re-opened children's centre should offer. If you have anything on your particular wish-list, please do let us know.

Other Activities

While children's centre activities have ceased, we continue to host organisations not related to the Children's Centre, so Messy Church, Speech and Language Therapy and Lipreading, for example, will continue to run from Footprints as usual.

In addition, Footprints' management committee is looking to continue its other activities in some form. This is being discussed by them at the present time and will be announced once decided.

Team Update

At last I am delighted to report that Kate has joined her husband in Ireland, sadly leaving us on January 18. Also having just got Danielle back from maternity leave following the birth of 'Smiley' Riley, she has now confirmed that she too is leaving to set up home in Southampton. So our thanks and very best wishes go to both of them and their families and thanks to Jane S for covering during Danielle's absence.

And finally, grateful thanks to outgoing Chairman of Footprints, Robin Field-Smith, for all his support for the team through a difficult, uncertain year and for his significant contribution in ensuring the survival of Children's Centre service in Mere. Footprints and the Children's Centre futures will certainly be very different but at least the facilities appear to have survived. So thanks to Robin and welcome to Mandy Connelly, who has taken the chair to lead Footprints into the future. We are very grateful to her too, for rising to that challenge.

Two Final Things

- 1. I was recently speaking to Scrapstore who have visited the Children's Centre once a month bringing mobile craft activities and materials. It seems that their service is under threat of cuts, and they are seeking words of support from anyone who has used and benefitted from their service. THE REV'D ELIZABETH KEMP, UNITED REFORMED CHURCH MINISTER, WRITES:

A lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path. (Psalm 119vs 105)

Which would most people in your street opt for:

Instructions for flat-pack assembly; or wordless diagrams in sequence?

Deciphering a chemical formulae; or a following a cooking recipe?

Instructions for programming your self-time recorder; or getting someone under 18 to sort it out?

We grasp things more easily if we comprehend the language in which they are presented. Today we believe Plain English is the best written way to reach people. We take for granted that if we want to find out about something we can look it up on-line, search an encyclopaedia or even phone a friend, but it has not always been so.

The story of God, and the story of God's people began as an oral tradition - stories passed from one generation to another. In time certain stories were written down, then teachings of wisdom and prophesy were also recorded and all of these were in Hebrew. The stories of Jesus and letters to the churches were recorded in Koine (everyday) Greek. As the legal language of the Roman Empire was Latin, religious books were translated into Latin and there they remained.

In the 16th Century access to knowledge was guarded. Few people could read, and when it came to matters of faith, the scriptures were available in the original Hebrew and Greek, or Latin. This effectively prevented any ordinary person from reading the Bible for themselves. William Tyndale in the sixteenth century translated the Bible into English directly from the Hebrew and Greek and utilizing the new printing press, opened up the possibility of Christian learning to this nation. This added to the Reformation challenging Europe, but in 1535 Tyndale was arrested, tried for heresy and gruesomely executed for daring to translate the Bible. Not for another 76 years was there any substantial change. In 1611 under the patronage of King James, the Bible was translated into an English version (authorised for use in parish churches). The intention was that even the humblest plough-boy should have access to the word of God. 54 scholars were tasked with the work of translation. In fact the scholars used over 75% of Tyndale in the Old Testament and over 83% of Tyndale's version makes up the New Testament.

This year we commemorate 400 years of having the Authorised (King James) Bible and give thanks that our forebears were able to read the Bible in their own language. Having the Bible so widely accessible, undoubtedly played a crucial role in so much of our national history and politics, and has shaped this "secular" nation. Today there are many English translations and paraphrases of the Bible available and each of us will have our preferred version to read, study and be challenged by. Commemorating 400 years of the King James Bible doesn't mean we have to read 16th Century English, but it will remind us of our story and all that we can be thankful for.
