MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the **Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on Monday, 7th November 2011**.

The Chairman writes:

The Public Meeting held on 26th September to address the deep concerns over the lack of water in Mere's rivers was very well attended and I am only sorry that quite a number of people were unable to get in to the Grove Buildings as it was so full. Present at the meeting were Fiona Bowles from Wessex Water and Christopher Greenwell from the Environment Agency who endeavoured to answer the concerns highlighted in a presentation from some of the residents of Mere. The residents made it quite clear that our rivers are not winterbournes as had been claimed and that they had never before dried to the present condition, even in more prolonged periods of dry weather. Wessex Water admitted that abstraction would have an effect on the water levels in our rivers and it is clear that a large number of parishioners believe that the amount of water abstracted is the cause of low flows. Climatic conditions and the lack of rainfall over recent months is another explanation or contributory factor for our low flows.

Whatever the reason, the fact remains that Mere has no water in its rivers and all the facts and figures given by Wessex Water and the Environment Agency did not provide any sort of a solution to the problem, although both parties were left under no illusion as to the strength of feeling of our residents. At the October Parish Council meeting councillors resolved to write to the Environment Agency with a firm request that a resolution be found and that details be sent to us as soon as possible.

We were very pleased to have Dr. Andrew Murrison, our Member of Parliament, with us at the October Parish Council meeting and he gave a brief overview of the 2013 Review of Parliamentary Constituencies in England, from which it seems that the boundary of our present constituency will alter and will take in part of North Dorset to become Warminster and Shaftesbury. These proposals are still being considered, however, and whether this is the final decision remains to be seen.

Councillors have also been looking in detail at the Draft National Planning Policy Framework in order to formulate the Parish Council's response to the document before the consultation closes later this month.

Finally, the fifteenth Mere Literary Festival has just drawn to a close, and it has been another marvellous week of events. I had the honour, on Sunday, of presenting some of the prizes awarded in the Poetry Competition, which had entries coming from all over

the country and beyond, and was delighted that the winners of both the Open Competition and the Local Prize, were two Mere residents, Peter Gillott and Colin White respectively. Many congratulations to them both. How fortunate we are to have such talent in Mere!

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

The Localism Bill is now in The House of Lords. Localism in development terms (houses and businesses being built or expanded) cross relates to development planning in the proposed national planning policy document, which is hoped to be reduced to about 50 or 60 pages. At the present time views are being sought on the Government's proposed approach to new regulations on neighbourhood planning. You may think this is of no interest to you, possibly so, however, I would suggest you look at it. An example of the contents is the possible suggestion of Parish Councils determining some planning applications, which would be a radical new approach.

The consultation document is only available to download on line. If you need help, Mere Library will help you log on and print a copy, at 10p per page, or read it off the screen in The Library. The consultation period is 12 weeks, from Thursday, 13th October to Thursday, 5th January 2012. E-mail is how Communities and Local prefer you to respond. Jaki Farrell from Mere Youth Club has agreed to clear some footpaths . Jaki has worked with young people from Bishopstone to clear footpaths this year; therefore The Youth Club will be approaching with some experience of footpath clearance.

The South West Area Board agreed to spend nearly £9,000 on a new Speed Indicator Device (SID) with data gathering on the 5th October. The equipment will be held and managed by Tisbury Community Safety Partnership (TCSP,) but deployed by Wiltshire

Council's Highways Department to supplement their existing schedule. A parish or town usually needs to set criteria for Community Speed Watch (CSW) or a Speed Indicator Device (SID). 69% of those present agreed to go ahead, but did question the use of the device in areas where no accidents have been recorded.

Our low river levels were well discussed at a very well attended public meeting at The Grove Building in late September. The Parish Council have since agreed to press The Environmental Agency to get some water back in to our rivers in Mere, noting that Wessex Water has a statutory requirement to ensure water comes out of our taps.

The South West Area Board, which covers our area, has a new Community Area Manager, Stephen Harris. Community groups who cannot easily raise funds should remember that the South West Area Board, at its discretion, can give community grants, usually up to £5,000. For example, Mere Bowls Club gained a grant at the Board's last meeting for a secure store.

Several street lights in Mere are not working. With winter approaching, I am pressing they are brought back in operation quickly.

WILTSHIRE AIR AMBULANCE APPEAL 2011-2012

Wiltshire's Air Ambulance would like to say a huge thank you to all those who have offered support and funds to help keep us flying these past 21 years!

We simply couldn't keep saving lives if the support of the public wasn't as strong as it is. We do not receive any Government funding but rely totally on the public and local businesses to support the running costs of the charity.

2011 sees the Appeal move into a new era by appointing its very own dedicated set of Trustees who will help to shape the future of the Appeal along-side the two new Appeal Staff members Claire Kelly, County Co-ordinator and Caroline Corrigan, County Fundraiser.

Currently the Appeal needs to raise $\pounds700,000$ to keep the Helicopter flying 19 hours a day 365 days of the year, but will have to increase income to beyond $\pounds1.5$ million if the current partnership with the police is not renewed in 2014.

Everyone in Wiltshire has a stake in the Wiltshire Air Ambulance. It is an essential service that serves all the people of Wiltshire whatever your age or gender. We are there for those life and death situations where the speed of the helicopter and the skill of the crew play a major part in the outcome of the patient.

In 2010 Wiltshire Air Ambulance attended 628 different incidents. 12% of these were night rescues. Almost half of all incidents the Air Ambulance attended were Road Traffic Collisions across our county roads or on the Motorways. Other situations include, cardiac arrests, horse riding accidents, work related injury, farm accidents, fires and burns.

WAA can be at an incident within 11 minutes. You may have heard the phrase 'Golden Hour' - this is used to describe the hour directly after an incident has taken place. It is imperative that the injured party receives medical attention within this hour to **minimise** the risk of life changing injuries or in some cases death.

Some of the main ways the Appeal raises the funds include our wonderful Westbury Shop which continues to grow each year; Dot and her dedicated volunteers have now raised over £1.5 million for the Appeal. Our own Lottery continues to bring in thousands of pounds and pays out £1,000 a week to the lucky winner! Our new Fundraising events include Parachute Jumps and The Toubkal Challenge which will see Paramedic Joanne Munday, Claire from the Appeal, and 18 other members of the public climb the highest Atlas Mountain raising funds for WAAA. We wish them all good luck.

WEATHER REPORT

MERE SURGERY

Mere Surgery wish to thank you for being tolerant and patient during our conversion to a new computer system. Hopefully everything is now running smoothly.

You can still book both appointments and order repeat prescriptions on the internet by going to our website: **www.meresurgery.co.uk** and following the links at the bottom of the page. You do need to register for this service if you have not used it before; if you contact the surgery we will be able to issue you with a password and log on details.

The website will be used to update patients on developments at the surgery including details of flu vaccination clinics and at risk groups. Also some of the regularly used patient forms are now available to download from the clinics and services/clinical forms link.

We have now stopped the automatic prescribing of prescriptions each month. One of the reasons for this is because of wasted medications; many drugs were being returned not used each month for various reasons. In the interest of reducing this wastage, we are now asking that you order the medications that you need, when you need them. We would prefer if you ordered using the internet, but you can also still drop the counter side of the prescription into the surgery or phone up to request medications in the afternoons.

You will also notice that the counter side of your prescription has more information on it. This now includes a reminder when you are due for any annual reviews. It requires you to make the appropriate appointments, hopefully allowing you to book follow up appointments at your convenience. If the period when your review is due expires, we will write to you organising an appointment, as we did with the previous system. Most Wiltshire practices are on this new computer record system, which should allow a more smooth transfer of information if you move house. There are also plans for the technology to be installed in the out of hours, accident and emergency, and the acute medical wards, so in the future (and only with your consent) can your notes be shared with other medical providers that might be involved with your care.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 13th November. We gather around the memorial by the Clock Tower at 10.45am for an Act of Remembrance before proceeding to St Michael's church for a short remembrance service.

THE REV'D PAUL BARNES, PRIEST IN CHARGE AT ST MICHAELS, WRITES:

Whilst on holiday in France last August we visited a village called Oradour-Sur-Glane which is about 20 kilometres from Limoges. I have to admit that I had never heard of Oradour, or the horrendous events that took place there until I read about them in my 'Lonely Planet' guidebook.

On 10th June 1944, a unit of the Waffen SS surrounded this quiet, rural village and rounded up all the inhabitants, separating the men from the woman and children and then proceeded to massacre the whole population. 642 people were murdered that day. The worst atrocity involved the woman and children who were locked inside the church which was then set on fire.

The reason the village of Oradour was chosen by the Nazi army for this evil act is still not known and probably never will be. It has been suggested that it was a reprisal against the French Resistance movement who were very active in the Limoge area, but Oradour was not particularly linked with Resistance activity. It was also suggested that coming four days after the D.Day landings in Normandy it was meant to be a reminder to those in Vichy France that the Third Reich was still in power and was willing to do whatever was required to remain so.

Oradour has been left just as it was after the massacre took place, burned out shells of buildings and vehicles, and as you walk around you can easily picture what it must have been like before 10th June 1944. You see the café opposite the church, the school, various shops, garages and farms, and you can imagine a fairly sleepy community that could never have imagined the horror of what was to take place there.

In the years immediately after the war there must have been a great debate about what to do with the village. I am sure some will have said that the remains of the buildings must be demolished so that a new village could be built on the same site with, at its centre, some sort of memorial to those who died. Rebuilding would provide a powerful statement that evil does not have the last word, that the human spirit of goodness cannot be defeated, and even in this place of darkness and devastation new life has risen from the ashes. It would have been a statement about not being chained to the pain of the past but moving forward into a better future – hope from despair.


However, that wasn't the decision that was made. They decided to preserve the ruined village as a memorial to those who died, and it is still called 'The Martyred Village'. There is an impressive 'Centre de la Memoire' that you have to pass through before you enter into the village that contains displays and archive films detailing the rise of the Third Reich, the occupation of France and the Resistance movement, and testimonies of the events of 10th June. In the final room before entering the village you are

encouraged to write a message of peace and reconciliation, and it was very moving to see how many different languages those messages were written in.

Although it was a warm day I felt a strange sense of coldness and chill as we walked around the village streets. Somehow the evil that had taken place there remained, and I was delighted that visitors were encouraged to walk around in silence as a mark of respect for those who had died, and most people were responding to that request and even the children spoke in hushed tones.

That silence allowed each person to reflect on the horror of war, to think about the innocent victims, the pain they endured, the pointless destruction of what had been a peaceful community. It also made me reflect on more recent similar atrocities and how the human race never seems to learn from the lessons of the past.

For me the most powerful and helpful act on Remembrance Sunday (13th November) is always the shared silence at 11.00am. As we reflect on the horrors of war it is best to be silent, but then having remembered, the greatest tribute we can pay to the fallen is to do all we can to promote peace and reconciliation and work and pray for the day when to quote the prophet Micah, "swords will be beaten into ploughshares, spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore."
