MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on **Monday**, **5th September 2011**.

The Chairman writes:

The summer months of July and August often herald a slightly quieter time, when things wind down a little and holidays are on the horizon. On the 10th July I attended the annual 43rd (Wessex) Division Memorial Service and Parade with the Drumhead Service at Castle Hill. It is an event I always enjoy and it was very well attended, not just with our old soldiers but also with many of our young cadets which was good to see. Later in the month, I joined the launch of the South West Wiltshire Credit Union in Mere, which will be open in the Library every Saturday morning and should be an asset in these difficult economic times.

At our Parish Council Meeting in July it was agreed to support proposals for a 12m length of double-yellow lines to be laid outside the Lecture Hall which will not only allow traffic in Salisbury Street to pass more easily, but also enable loading and unloading of goods - and people - outside the Lecture Hall. At this meeting councillors also voted to co-opt a new councillor and from four candidates Mrs Jane Hurd was co-opted by a majority vote. Jane Hurd is known to many people in Mere as she has lived here for over thirty years and is also a Lay Minister in St. Michaels Church.

Concern has been expressed by residents in Mere over the low level of water in our streams and rivers. We are very aware of these low levels and are in contact with both Wessex Water, who extract water under licence, and the Environment Agency, to enlist their help to resolve this situation.

During the summer the Parish Council, Wiltshire Council and our Wiltshire Councillor became inundated with questions and complaints about overgrown footpaths but the problems usually arise because landowners are not carrying out their responsibilities relating to public footpaths. We would therefore like to kindly remind landowners of their responsibilities. The landowner must:

- Keep back side growth and overhanging vegetation which may be encroaching onto the path.
- Refrain from obstructing rights of way.
- Refrain from ploughing a footpath or bridleway which constitutes the headland of a field, or runs alongside a hedgerow.

- Ensure that paths across fields are reinstated two weeks after ploughing and making sure that the line of a right of way is clear through crops.
- Obtain the consent of Wiltshire Council before erecting new stiles or gates on rights of way and ensuring that all are kept in a safe and usable condition and replaced when necessary.
- Not allow any dairy bull over ten months of age free range of any field through which a footpath or bridleway passes.

The landowner may:

- Provide for improved access for dogs.
- Protect land against the acquisition of further public rights on their land.
- With our prior consent, improve the surface of the right of way beyond the standard required for its status (for example surfacing a footpath that also serves as a driveway).
- The landowner has the right to expect that visitors on their land will treat it with respect and care and follow the Countryside Code. Wiltshire Council will do what it can to ensure that rights of way are not used inappropriately.

Finally, as you are all aware, next year is the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and thoughts are turning to celebrations of this event. The Parish Council would be interested to hear if parishioners would like any particular celebrations to be planned, and also if any events are being planned by the various organisations in Mere.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

I hope you all had a good July and August.

Car parking for those of you who drive to Salisbury and park in the main car parks of Wiltshire Council, which I reported to you as being controversial, is still of great concern to many. I noted while in Plymouth that parking was £12 a day in the centre in some car parks. The charges for Salisbury are going to be reviewed, and the traders are hoping for one hour of parking to cost £1-20. Thankfully with support from our local traders, Mere Heath Centre and the local rate payer, Mere will keep its 'free to user' car parks.

Planning advice from Wiltshire Council now being chargeable has caused me many more enquiries regarding planning, ie 'Can I put a shed in my garden?' I was told once that as a Councillor, when I requested advice regarding planning from Wiltshire Council,

that I would be charged £30. I told them that they could send an invoice, but it would not be paid. At that point some rationality returned to the conversation.

I have had many complaints regarding poorly maintained footpaths. Wiltshire Council has a statutory obligation to keep footpaths open. However, please appreciate while out in the countryside, that walking through long grass is considered a reasonable expectation, but it would not be reasonable to find yourself walking through high crops. I know that Lindsey Wood, clerk to several Parish Councils, plans to write to some local publications with further information. I hope to see some of the tarmac footpaths (I am not referring to pavements) in Mere, resurfaced next year.

There are four categories of rights of way:

- Footpath: public right of way on foot.
- <u>Bridleway:</u> public right of way on foot, on pedal, cycle, or horseback and leading a horse.
- Restricted Byway: public right of way on foot, on horseback and leading a horse, and in or on any vehicle other than a mechanically propelled vehicle at either 2nd May 2006 (where the restricted byway is a former road used as a public path) or the relevant date of the modification order that caused the way to be shown as a restricted byway.
- Byway open to all traffic: foot, on horseback and in or on vehicles, including motor vehicles and pedal cycles.

The public may have rights additional to those shown on definitive maps, but as yet unrecorded.

Some residents of new houses in our area have had problems with fixtures and fittings. I was interested to learn that the Trade Descriptions Act does not appear to apply to new houses, i.e. new double glazing fitted in a refurbished house, would be fitted with recourse to the supplier by the end user (excluding perhaps a genuine trade deal to a builder before he sells the whole house). However, windows in a new house (I assume because they were supplied to the trade in effect) are not covered by the Trade Descriptions Act to the end user when a purchaser buys a new house. You only appear to have the builder's guarantee on fixtures and fittings.

A Credit Union for the Mere Area now opens in Mere Library from 10.00am to noon every Saturday. Remember that Credit Unions can be used to invest your money, not

just to save for Christmas etc. and they help shield people from paying huge amounts of interest to private loan companies.

The Post Box at the bottom of Denes Avenue has been refurbished. Please use it; otherwise it is my opinion that if you do not, you will lose it.

The footway between Mere and Zeals should be as ready as it can be for Autumn, as it has now been "sided out" and cleaned by the parish steward.

The collection of surface water "run-off" at the junction between New Road from Zeals/A303 slip road and the B3092 following heavy or prolonged rainfall is a problem of which Wiltshire Council (WC) are aware. The suspended soil in the run off water from nearby fields gives a dirty appearance and quickly blocks the road gullies, which rely on soakaways to clear. To counter this nuisance, WC empty these gullies in addition to its normal programme, as and when required. For the longer term this matter has been registered with the drainage engineer and his gang who carried out recent successful works at Kilmington on a 'C' class road off the B3092.

WEATHER REPORT

The total rainfall for June was 115.5mms (4.53ins). Last year we had 30.5mms (1.22 ins). The second half of the month was warmer and drier than the first half, the last three days being quite hot.

July started hot and the total rain for the month was 53.0mms (2.09ins). Last year we had 36.0mms (1.42ins). From the 20th there was only 1mm of rain and until the 3rd of August we had some real summer weather. Then, until the 14th August, we had a few sunny days but mostly overcast with 58.5mms (2.30ins) of rain, mostly over night.

What Price Education?

Up and down the country, ordinary people have been so concerned that they've been protesting. What's got them fired up is the demise of our public libraries and their threatened closure... "Free" public libraries, access to books (and more), without the need for a "Kindle" (books on a portable screen), is part of our heritage, of which we should be justly proud. Ray Bradbury's story <u>Fahrenheit 451</u> envisions a society where

books are banned and if discovered they are incinerated at 451°F and the owner sent to a mental asylum. Ray Bradbury said "You don't have to burn books to destroy a culture, just get people to stop reading them."

Access to knowledge should be an inalienable right.

Over the past few decades the increasing privatisation of Dental Surgeries have moved us to a situation where many people find themselves having to pay the real cost of dental care - which not so long before would have seemed inconceivable. The dentist's bill showing us the real costs of what we had taken for granted, makes us realise how truly wealthy and privileged we are.

If it were not libraries which were at risk of closure, but the provision of secondary education, I suspect not many of us would have any idea of the real costs of a year's education. For the people of Malawi, one of Africa and the world's poorest countries, where 85% of the workforce is engaged in agriculture, a farmer has to sell 90 Kg of rice in order to put one of his children through secondary school for a year.

Whilst some pupils might like the suggestion of not being able to go to school and receive an education, if no one has more education than the average eleven year old, a country is going to be greatly disadvantaged in the future.

This year, Churches Together in Mere are going to be selling 90Kg of rice, grown in Malawi, to support one child's secondary education for the year. The rice will be featured and on sale at the <u>One World Week Fair</u> on Saturday, 22nd October in the Grove Building and from Church representatives. Please look out for posters and advertising of the 90 Kg rice Challenge, as promoted by <u>Just Trading Scotland</u>. We, as a community, can directly invest in Malawi's future by giving one young person the chance to gain a year's secondary education, merely by buying 1kg of rice.
