MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen.

The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be **on Monday, 11th June 2012** at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion.

The Chairman writes:

The Annual Parish Meeting took place at the end of April on an evening of torrential downpours, which did not encourage attendance. However, on the subjects raised for discussion we were unable to promise improvements in parking in Mere as improvements are really down to the drivers themselves parking sensibly and considerately and in accordance with the Highway Code and the law.

Again, on the question of large lorries using Water Street and The Lynch inappropriately, some of the blame for this lies with 'satnav' equipment sending drivers who do not know the area that way and, to a degree, the drivers themselves not observing the weight restriction notices at the beginning of Water Street.

The meeting was informed that consents had been applied for the lighting of a beacon, as part of the Diamond Jubilee celebrations, on top of Castle Hill. At the May Parish Council Meeting it was confirmed that this had been obtained and the beacon will be lit at 10.15pm on Monday, 4th June.

The lighting of the beacon will co-ordinate with a firework display which will take place in a town centre location so will, hopefully, be seen by all wherever you are celebrating in Mere.

On the 1st May the Queen visited Salisbury as part of her Diamond Jubilee tour of the country. Each of the Wiltshire Community Area Boards had a large jousting tent on the Cathedral Close lawn in which many of the towns and parishes in their area had displays.

I am happy to say that in our own South West Area Board tent, Mere had an excellent display thanks to the invaluable help of Jenny Wilding, Curator of Mere Museum, and Dr. David Longbourne, Curator Emeritus, to whom I am very grateful for their considerable efforts.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

By the time you read this The Year of Celebrations will be well underway. The Olympics are in the UK, and our wonderful Queen will have her Jubilee celebration on all of four days, from the 2nd to the 5th of June.

I attended The Queen's visit to Salisbury on Tuesday, 1st May, and saw The Queen at the Cathedral who visited the many colourful medieval tents around Cathedral Close. I say The Queen is wonderful for many reasons, not least that at the age of 86 she walked a considerable distance in Salisbury, met with many and after having attended a similar event in the morning at Sherborne. There were around ten thousand people in the Cathedral Close to welcome her. Both adults and children were waving flags and flags lined Fisherton Street and many other areas; the sun shone and the excitement was everywhere. It was something that I shall always remember.

The Olympic Torch arrives in Salisbury on Wednesday, 11th July with an event in Hudson's field that evening, and then setting off from Salisbury Cathedral on Thursday, 12th July. It is a year to remember - especially as some of you football fans will be pleased that Chelsea has won The European Champions League Cup! Remember Kilmington, Stourhead, Zeals, West Knoyle and Mere all have Jubilee celebrations on the Jubilee weekend, which has been helped by funding from The South West Area Board.

In Mere we will be having our official beacon lit on Castle Hill at 10.15pm on Monday, 4th June and we shall be having a firework display in the centre of Mere once the beacon is lit. I would like to thank Bill Deeker for organising and supplying the fireworks,

and also thank Philip Coward of The Hill Brush Company for providing the beacon on Castle Hill. The Walnut Pub with The Mere Carnival will be having a large event – from 2 pm on Monday 4th June.

The Kilmington defibrillator is now in place and ready for any 999 calls. Mere is still waiting for its device to arrive back from the USA.

For the younger reader, Mere Parish Council hope to have at least the start of a skate park area in place by the end of this year. A meeting for the youth (children and probably the younger adult) to get connected with this project will be in the Youth Development Centre, the Mere Peace Memorial Recreation Field, on the evening of Thursday, 14th June. To the older ones among you, it is really important to get users to this meeting. We need extra grants to those we already have, and we need proof that the facility has been consulted on by potential users.

If you do not understand what I am talking about in the following, you probably do not need to know! Believe me, I wish I did not need to know sometimes, especially when I have to print documents from a slow running computer! Great Western Broadband, a partnership of Swindon, Wiltshire and South Gloucestershire Councils plus finance from others, will roll out a minimum broadband speed of 2Mbps at peak time at around 5.00pm for all (virtually) in Wiltshire by 2015. By this time between 85% and possibly 95% of all premises will have high speed broadband availability of upwards of 24Mbps. For those who wish to improve the availability in their area, there will also be options for local community involvement .

Rights of way widths

I have been asked to correct my last month's information regarding footpaths across open land. The following is an extract of Wiltshire Council's guidance: ultimately the decision relating to the width of path is a matter of evidence, which may need to be decided in the courts.

- If the width of a path is recorded in the Definitive Statement this is conclusive evidence of the minimum width of the path.
- In cases where the path runs between two established boundary features, such as ditches or hedgerows, the whole width between these boundaries can be presumed to be available, provided the features were laid out with reference to the highway. For example, ditches lining an ancient green lane can be used as reliable evidence of the width. However, fencing surrounding a garden or other property is unlikely to be reliable evidence. Where there are no clear boundaries or specified width, and a dispute arises, evidence from users may be sought to establish the width of way habitually used.
- The minimum widths specified for a new or diverted right of way, is 2m (6.5') for a footpath, 4m (13') for a bridleway, and 5m (16.5') for a byway or restricted

byway. Increased widths will be specified where high levels of use are

anticipated, or (in the case of diversions), where the 'old' route of the path had a greater width.

- All rights of way should have 3m minimum overhead clearance.
- The Rights of Way Act 1990 sets out "minimum widths" in relation to ploughing and cultivating on farmland. When ploughing or cultivating crops, the landowner or occupier must ensure that the minimum width is reinstated, remains clear of crops and is apparent on the ground. The minimum width for a footpath is 1m across the field or 1.5m on the field edge; for a bridleway it is 2m across the field or 5m on the field edge. These widths only apply to the law on ploughing and cropping and do not affect other aspects of the law on rights of way.

It is the Footpaths Warden who enforces usable width. Again PLEASE do not leave your Dog excrement on a path; <u>please</u> remember a child could be blinded.

HAVE YOU GOT WORKING SMOKE ALARMS?

The national Fire Kills campaign is focusing on the importance of working smoke alarms throughout May.

A smoke alarm is the easiest way to alert you to the danger of fire, giving you time to escape from your home. They are cheap, easy to get hold of and easy to fit.

Station Manager Kathy Collis, from Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service's community safety department, said: "You are more than twice as likely to die in a fire at home if you haven't got a working smoke alarm. The more alarms you have, the safer you'll be - as long as they are working - so make sure you test them weekly. You should have a minimum of one alarm on each floor. However, if you have only one alarm and two floors, put it somewhere you'll be able to hear it when you're asleep."

It usually takes a few minutes to install your smoke alarm yourself - just follow the manufacturers' instructions that come with it. The best place for your smoke alarm is on the ceiling, near or at the middle of the room or hall. The alarm should be at least 30cm (one foot) away from a wall or light.

To keep your smoke alarm in good working order, you should:

- test it once a week, by pressing the test button until the alarm sounds
- change the battery on the low warning signal or once a year (unless it's a tenyear alarm)
- replace the whole unit every ten years

Every time a tanker comes out to make a delivery, it is using a lot of diesel - a full tanker can get as little as a horrifying eight miles per gallon. If deliveries are organised so that one tanker delivers to several customers in a village instead of making lots of individual deliveries, the fuel consumption is reduced and so is traffic in the village.

Five easy steps to cheaper heating oil

Step 1: Join the CF Bulk Oil Buying Scheme

Step 2: Wait to hear from your local co-ordinator

We will let your local co-ordinator know that you have joined the scheme. Each month they will e-mail you to ask whether you want to place an order. The minimum order is 500 litres.

Step 3: Place an order

Let your local co-ordinator know you want to buy oil.

Each month they submit a total village order to us. Your order increases our negotiating power, so once submitted we regard it as binding.

Step 4: Sit back whilst we negotiate the price

We negotiate the best price from a whole range of suppliers. Your local co-ordinator will advise you who the supplier is, the price per litre (exclusive of VAT, currently at 5%) and the approximate date of delivery.

Step 5: Take delivery of the oil and pay the company

The oil will be delivered as soon as possible and you pay the company supplying the oil direct. *Can we tempt you?*

Beauty spot thefts

We are very lucky in Wiltshire to be surrounded by beautiful countryside and many people spend their leisure time walking the footpaths and public areas available to us all. Mostly people will park at the locality either in designated parking places or in local lay-bys, and the security of your vehicle and its contents is something that should be considered before leaving home. Try to remove anything that you will not need from the car before setting out.

Park your car in the most visible and best lit part of any car park, and leave the glove compartment open to show nothing is hidden within. Do not leave items such as bags or coats visible even if nothing of value has been left in them as thieves may break in to check what they contain. Preferably put items in the boot before entering the car park to avoid people seeing what you are storing and always make sure electrical items are completely switched off. If you notice anyone acting suspiciously at any time, don't be reluctant to call the police. We would rather check out a false alarm than have to deal with a crime.

ACTION FOR MERE RIVERS (AFMR)

Save our rivers - Save water

It is great to see running water again in Mere's rivers and Burton Pond. However, this improvement is mainly due to run off from the recent rainfall and the aquifers beneath the surface – the source of river and household water – are still below normal levels due to two successive dry winters. This situation was explained at the inaugural meeting of ACTION FOR MERE RIVERS held on 2nd May. The meeting was facilitated by Mere Parish Council as promised in the Chairman's April report to Mere Matters. In attendance were representatives of Wessex Water, The Environment Agency, Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, Country Land & Business Association, Mere Parish Council, Gillingham Town Council and local residents led by river monitor, Ian Sheppard, who took the chair.

The meeting proved informative and constructive. A map was provided showing that the Mere source supplies water to a catchment area that includes Gillingham and its many surrounding parishes as far as Marnhull. In addition, a transfer of approximately 3.5million litres a day is at present exported south to Yeovil. Local residents reiterated their stance that the abstraction trial of 2008 to determine the effect of this transfer should not have been based on Mere's rivers being classed as winterbournes. The trial also took place in a wet year and conclusions needed to be tested in drier conditions.

The following main points were agreed:-

- The aim is for Ashfield Water and the Shreen to be clean, fresh, vibrant streams flowing 365 days a year.
- Wessex Water to be asked to run another trial into the effects of abstraction from the Mere source. This would involve turning off the Yeovil transfer and recording flows and demand.
- Local promotion of water efficiency measures to involve town and parish councils and schools. Local contact to be made within the catchment area.
- Local residents to decide on river management with advice from Wiltshire Wildlife Trust.
- Monitoring of the rivers to begin asap.
- More river monitors to be recruited locally with the possibility that Wessex Water will fund their training.
- WW to install gauges and to supply a notice board on the Shreen giving information on the monitoring, water use and other initiatives. A Wessex Water website relating to Mere will also be set up.

The many concerned residents who packed the Grove Building for the earlier river crisis meeting will see that a good start has been made to avoid a repeat of last year's dried up river scenes and the loss of an important town amenity. But ACTION FOR MERE RIVERS needs your help. At present, water for Mere and the surrounding catchment area can only be supplied from the Mere aquifer – the same source that supplies the rivers. So water saved in every household helps our rivers.
