The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on Monday, 14th May 2012.

The Chairman writes:

In this last month the Parish Council seems to have taken up the analogy of the swan swimming serenely along on the surface while underneath the feet are paddling furiously! Therefore the brevity of this month's report should not be taken the wrong way. Work continues on the HLS scheme for Castle Hill and Long Hill and also on the proposals for Mere water. The Parish Council has been granted the sum of £18,500 through the Area Board for our skate park project which will now get under way, as well as a grant of £2,000 towards the Diamond Jubilee celebrations which will go towards the beacon and firework display on the 4th June.

It does seem that for those planning Jubilee celebrations the list of rules and regulations, licences and consents required are enough to dismay the hardiest of planners. Whilst we are aware of various celebrations being planned, the Parish Council is happy for the sports field to be used as an open picnic area on the 4th June for those wishing to bring their own picnic and have a get together with friends and neighbours. If you have a particular talent of any sort – juggling, acrobatics, hula-hooping or playing guitar – bring it along and entertain your friends. Dress up or down, be regal ancient or modern and have fun! At the time of writing we are waiting to confirm the when and where of the Fireworks and Beacon as consents have to be obtained(!)

A small Diamond Jubilee orchard of 10 fruit trees has been planted at Kingsmere to mark this celebration. If you would like to sponsor a tree (£25 each) then please contact the Parish Clerk.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

Titanic memories have well been expressed of late, with the 100th anniversary of the sinking. My father used to tell me on more than one occasion that there was a young person in what was the Work House in Castle Street who had been orphaned by the tragedy.

I have been asked to reinforce again what can and cannot be done where a footpath exist across land. The following is my understanding of the law. It should be at least two metres wide for walking, three metres near a hedge. It must not be blocked by the landowner or anyone else. When walking a dog, this should be under close control on the line of the footpath. In reality this means that the dog should be on a short lead. Stopping to talk to others is reasonable, but it would not be reasonable to stop and talk if you have a barking dog and there are other animals in the field. Walk the line of a footpath. If a bull is kept in a field that has a footpath crossing it (be prepared to run!), the farmer has restrictions placed on him or her regarding the type of bull etc. Please **do not** leave dog excrement on the path, just remember that a child could be blinded.

Our Jubilee and Olympic celebrations should be good. Wiltshire Council's South West Wiltshire Area Board awarded West Knoyle £500, Mere £2,000, Stourton and Kilmington £1,000, and Zeals £1,000. Also Mere Parish Council was awarded £18,389 towards a Skate Park for Mere subject to conditions, and Mere Town Football Club was awarded £4,000 towards its Stadium Improvement Project.

I have been told that HM The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh will be in Salisbury on Tuesday 1st May. Jousting tents themed to our area will be all around the Cathedral Close. The city's Park and Ride arrangements will be free of charge from all five sites and the frequency will be in increased to one bus every 12 minutes. Salisbury will be well worth a visit on that day in my opinion.

A review of speed limits on C class roads is now underway and each Area Board has to produce two areas of concern to be considered for the introduction of a lower speed limit. There are none in the Mere area. Parish Councils can send any concerns they have regarding speeding on local C class roads to The South West Area Board as an issue.

Money has to be saved from the cost of The Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service. Public consultation commenced on 5th March and will end on Monday, 4th June 2012. At a presentation given to The Area Board, I asked if our 'First Responder' facility for Mere will remain, I was assured there would be no decrease of service for Mere, which was minuted. On a similar theme we now have defibrillators for Mere, Stourton and Kilmington; Mere hopefully will be operational from opposite The Butt of Sherry within a month subject to the unit being returned from America, where it had to be returned for modification.

It is possible that Councillors will be prevented from asking too many questions at Full Council meetings. We have had 12-hour meetings in the past, however I personally think democracy has to be seen to be done. If Councillors get tired, perhaps it is time for them to give up.

TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURES

Notice is hereby given that Wiltshire Council has made an Order under Section 14(1) and Section 14(7) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 to close temporarily to all traffic the following roads in and around Mere:

C59 Pettridge Lane/Edge Bridge/Clements Lane/Shaftesbury Road (Part); from its junction with Footpath 64 Dark Lane in a south easterly direction to its junction with UC 823101 (Limpers Hill Road). **Alternative route via:** B3095 (Mere), B3095/B3092 (Mere – Gillingham), C74 Bay Road, Gillingham to Lawn X-Roads), Dorset, C16 (Lawn X-Roads to Wiltshire Boundary), C59 (Wiltshire – UC 823101 Limpers Hill) and vice versa.

C303 Southbrook; from its junction with C59 Shaftesbury Road in an easterly direction to its junction with UC 823101 Limpers Hill. **Alternative route via:** C59 (Shaftesbury Road to B3095 The Square), B3095 (Salisbury Street – A303), A303 Trunk Road, C303 (Burton junction to Limpers Hill) and vice versa.

The Closures are to enable:

Wiltshire Council to carry out carriageway patching and storm water drainage surveying.

This Order will come into force on Tuesday, 1st May 2012. However, it is anticipated that works will commence for Pettridge Lane on Tuesday, 8th May 2012, and each closure will take between one and three days to complete, current programme being: closure of Pettridge Lane 8th – 10th May, Southbrook 11th – 14th May. As works are weather dependant, information boards displaying notification of dates will be erected on site.

This Order will be re-enacted at a later date to be notified in order to carry out final carriageway resurfacing, replacement of road markings and road stud replacement. The Order will have a maximum duration of 18 months.

Mere Neighbourhood Policing Team keep busy

We have been working alongside our partners from Wiltshire Council to resolve various neighbour disputes and to discuss on-going issues across the area.

Pc Salter and PCSO Noble have also assisted at the Military parade that took place in Warminster on 16th March. The

parade took place as the Yorkshire Regiment that is based in Warminster will be going on a tour of Afghanistan and it was a chance for the town to say 'goodbye' and wish them luck.

Mere NPT has been holding various consultations across the area based in Mere, Kilmington, Zeals, East Knoyle and Semley.

Shed Security:

With thoughts turning to our gardens and all that needs to be done outside, garden sheds are particularly vulnerable to thefts, as their structure can be flimsy. Protecting your garden equipment can also increase the security of your home as garden tools can be used to gain access to your property.

A good quality closed shackle padlock is a good starting point, but it must be secured to a good quality hasp fitted with a back plate and with the screw heads disabled. Back plates should also be fitted to the door hinges and any brackets, and their screw heads also disabled. If your shed has a window, fit some wire mesh on the inside or securely board it over if it is not necessary for light.

Marking your tools to make them identifiable as yours with bright paint or scratching your postcode on them makes them less desirable to steal. Any equipment with a serial number could also be registered with Immobilise.com, the UK National Property Register.

Chaining large items together makes them difficult to remove. If possible, more expensive items should be stored within a locked garage or inside the home.

MERE SURGERY NOTICES

Allergic Emergency! Are you at risk?

Mere is a long way from any hospital with an emergency department, as I am sure anybody who has made the journey to Salisbury Hospital will know all too well. This can be a problem for people who suffer severe allergic reactions.

Severe allergic reactions are sometimes called "anaphylactic reactions." These can occur quickly (within a couple of minutes) and may be life threatening. Symptoms of anaphylaxis vary but can include hives, itching, flushing, and swelling of the lips, and tongue. The airway is often affected, resulting in tightness of the throat, chest tightness and difficulty breathing. These reactions can also be accompanied by chest pain, low blood pressure, dizziness and headaches. Such reactions can be caused by a number of triggers, most commonly wasp or bee stings and certain foods like nuts. People can develop allergies to a wide range of things and sometimes it is difficult to identify the precise cause.

If you have ever suffered an anaphylactic reaction you should see your GP, who will assess you carefully and may prescribe an adrenaline pen device to use in emergencies. You may have heard of "Epipens" before, but the one we tend to use now is called "JEXT." It works in the same way but lasts longer, so does not need to be replaced so often.

I did a survey of patients in Mere recently and found that nearly a quarter of people who should have an adrenalin pen did not have one that is in date. If you have had an

Epipen in the past, or have suffered anaphylactic reactions before, it is vital that you make sure you get an up-to-date JEXT pen as soon as your current pen is out of date.

You should carry the JEXT with you wherever you go; because if you ever have a severe reaction and need to use the pen, you need it immediately. (It is no good if it is at home in your bathroom cabinet!)

Having your JEXT to hand is all the more important given that the nearest hospital is twenty miles away. If you use your pen, you MUST seek emergency medical attention immediately.

If you have any concerns relating to this article, do not hesitate to call the surgery to ask for advice. Remember: if you need a JEXT pen, make sure you keep it with you always, and check it is in date! *Dr Martin Allen*

You don't need to go to Casualty if you have an injury

If you need a doctor urgently, whether because you have been injured or are unwell, remember that Mere Surgery is on your doorstep and a doctor is able to see you at very short notice.

It is often much more helpful to our patients to be seen at the surgery by a doctor who knows you and has your records rather than at an A&E department some 40 minutes drive away, where you will probably be facing a long wait to be seen.

Are you drinking alcohol in safe quantities?

Recommended drinking levels for us are no more than 3-4 units daily for men with at least 2 alcohol free days a week and 2-3 units daily for women, again with at least 2 days a week without alcohol.

Does your drinking habit fit into this pattern?

Do you know how much wine or beer makes up a unit? Most people don't.

Unsafe alcohol consumption is responsible for so much harm. As far as your health goes, it can cause heart disease, high blood pressure, gout, diseases of the liver, pancreas, nerves and muscles as well as depression and anxiety.

Older people may feel that since they have kept to the same heavy drinking habit over many years that they are unlikely to suffer ill effects, but the elderly are particularly susceptible to memory problems and falls through alcohol consumption.

A victory for Mere CC then, by 15 runs in the opening match of the season. It was billed as a warm up match, and whilst it did serve useful purpose as practice before the league matches begin, everyone present can testify that it was anything but warm; hurry up summer!

FR. TOM SMITH, PRIEST AT THE ROMAN CATHOLIC **CHURCH OF ST MARY'S, WRITES:**

It is a great pleasure to be writing for this edition of Mere Matters. I have been in the area for only six months as the Parish Priest of St George's Catholic Church in Warminster. St George's serves St Mary's in Pettridge Lane, which originally started out as a satellite of St George's, but eventually became attached to St Luke's in Wincanton. However, a few years ago after St Luke's lost its curate, Fr Bede at St George's willingly agreed to provide mass at St Mary's.

I came to visit the Parish in the first week of August when I was on holiday in Salisbury, which is where I grew up and where my parents still live. I drove down to Mere with Fr Bede not really knowing anything about Mere except that I had driven through it once a few years before. I have to be honest that when I first saw St Mary's I had to stifle my shock. I had half expected to see a quaint little country church, but I was certainly not prepared for an old Nissen hut! God works in funny ways though, when he became

man he did not chose luxury but the poverty of the manger so I don't know why I was so shocked at a Nissen hut.

My feelings changed somewhat when we went inside, although there had been a leak and there was quite a strong smell of damp, I was greeted by the beautiful simplicity and quaintness of the Church and immediately felt at home there. There is a beautiful atmosphere in St Mary's and I am sure that those of you who have been inside will have noticed it. What caught me most were the words Sanctus, Sanctus, Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy) beautifully engraved over the altar. From that first visit I have always looked forward to my drive down to Mere on a Sunday morning.

I have to pinch myself every time I drive to Mere, 'is this really happening?' I ask, 'am I really this lucky to have this beautiful drive as part of my ministry?' I have recently come from the Cotswolds, which is a very beautiful part of the country. I lived in Cheltenham for the last five and a half years and thoroughly enjoyed it. I was the curate at the Church of St Gregory the Great in the centre of Cheltenham itself. I used to love driving and cycling into the hills along the country lanes and finding bits of stunning and remote countryside to gaze at. I have to say that the vale on your right as you ascend the hill from Kingston Deverill towards Mere takes my breath away every time I see it, it is both secluded and stunning and then as I look for birds of prey on the hill, I have the excitement of seeing Dorset and the Blackmore Vale open up before me as I descend down into Mere. I am very grateful to the Lord for sending me here.

St George's Parish covers a huge area, from Tilshead and Codford to the north and east to Mere and Stourhead in the south and west. Much of the parish is uninhabited but this type of rural ministry is taking me a while to get used to. In Cheltenham the parish covered a relatively small geographical area, but a very densely populated one, so there was a collective identity of those who lived in Cheltenham. I am beginning to see that St George's lacks that sense of identity being made up of disparate areas. For many parishioners, while they identify with St George's or St Mary's they also identify very strongly with a village and look to their village for their social life, not particularly to Warminster. I am beginning to realise also that I cannot be in twenty places at once, I would love to be, but I know it will take me a lot longer than I thought to get to know the different villages, towns and communities that make up St George's Parish. This is a challenge which I am looking forward to meeting.

In an attempt to meet this particular challenge, the time of Sunday Mass at St Mary's will be changing from the Sunday, 6th May. Currently Sunday Mass is at 11.30am but this means I am unable to spend any real time in Mere itself, so I hope that by moving the time of the mass to 5.00pm, I can spend some time in the area beforehand and in the summertime after mass too. I am very aware that I have been unable to commit any time to Mere Churches Together and I hope that having a little more time in Mere will enable me to build up some links with the different Churches in and around the town.

If you do see me walking around Mere, I usually wear a black shirt with a collar, and am in my early (just!) thirties, please say 'hello' as I would love to get to know this wonderful little town and its people a lot better.
