There will be no meeting in August.

The Parish Council has now settled into its new term and we were pleased to welcome our new PCSO, Peter Tscherniawsky, at our June meeting. Peter has assured us of his intentions to be an "on the beat" officer and I am sure some of you will have already seen him around the town. He is very amenable and approachable and I am certain he is going to be a great asset to Mere.

You may have noticed that the sign for the 43rd Wessex memorial has been removed from the approach to Castle Hill. It will be replaced soon by a new sign, thanks to a private donation, and in good time for the annual service taking place this year on Sunday, 14th July.

Sport continues to thrive in Mere and I must congratulate the men's football team in winning their league. The cricket season is in full swing with teams covering a wide range of age groups. Home matches are held on the ground by The Andy Young Pavilion. I have recently attended a meeting which showed plans for the proposed skateboard park and it was gratifying to see so many youngsters there. There is a little way to go yet in regard to funding, refining the details and logistics, but hopefully this can all be achieved fairly soon. GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

The South West Area Board was held on the 5th June at South Newton Village Hall. Jose Green was elected Chairman and I was elected Vice-Chairman. I mentioned last month, The Southwest Area Board awarded grants for some fingerpost direction signs in our area to be refurbished, these have or are being refurbished at present. The Area Board has now agreed a sum that should allow for another application per parish this year. The Parishes of Mere, Stourton, Zeals and West Knoyle need apply if they wish to take up the offer for this year. Community Area grants, which I have encouraged community groups to take up over the years, now have to be applied for via the Internet. Stephen Harris the Community Area manager will help with applications. His e-mail

address is: **stephen.harris@wiltshire.gov.uk**. Grants will be aimed mainly at a capital project this time as opposed to revenue for maintaining a service.

Balfour Beatty Street Scene is now responsible for all Wiltshire Councils highway maintenance. As before, contact Clarence 20800 232323 or out of hours 201722 413834. The Area Boards and Parish and Town Councils have a co-ordinator, which should be an improvement; I and the local councils now have this one point of contact. The contract, which deals with key services such as highway maintenance, grass cutting, litter collection and street lighting, will now come into operation. Note litter collection is contracted out by Wiltshire Council, unlike the household waste collection. On a lighter note regarding Highways, I have been told the highway signs near Bramley House in Mere, which show elderly people crossing the road, may have to be removed because it could be argued, the display of such signs is 'age discrimination'!

I mentioned last month those of you requiring a local authority stamp on a document should please contact me as I can now confirm I have a Wiltshire Stamp.

The old band hut in Castle Street car park, which I helped get transferred to Mere Parish Council, has created much interest from local community groups. The Mere area has a wide range of activities from sports to leisure.

Mere is fortunate to have a new PCSO, Peter Tscherniawsky. I have found him very helpful. The police performance figures for Mere show continuing good news, with detection of crime improving. There has been an increase in anti-social behaviour and criminal damage, but it is hoped with the arrival of our new PCSO, anti-social behaviour will decrease.

Major changes have been announced regarding Wiltshire Council housing. A Housing Board and Focus Groups are to be formed. This is in addition to the present Tenants Panel and Scrutiny. A designated person can be approached after eight weeks from the start of a complaints procedure; the designated person can be a Councillor or an MP. Welfare of tenants will be reformed, including making available the services of a financial inclusion officer. Two million pounds of extra money, which has been achieved from good interest rates, will be used to build more houses. Just four contracts have been awarded, rather than many small ones for services to property. This is a good idea on the face of it, less and more effective administration. However, I am not sure it is good for local communities, where there are many self employed who could do the work.

Wiltshire Council has improved its safeguarding of children services. All Wiltshire councillors have had to have additional training. Wiltshire Council has a Safeguarding department for all ages. If you have any concerns please contact them.

Anti-Dog fowling posters that were effectively distributed by Alan Mead and printed by me, had my phone number printed incorrectly, my business number is \$\alpha\$ 01747 860215.

Wiltshire Council is reviewing the "Taxi Buzz" bus, Connect2Wiltshire service, see separate article that follows. The cost of the service is high in relation to the number of passengers carried, and is well in excess of the Council's maximum subsidy guideline of £3.50 per passenger trip set out in the 'Guidelines for funding of supported services'. However, a number of ways have been identified of reducing the cost to the council while retaining a service which it is hoped will continue to meet the needs of the majority of users.

To remind you again, A Diamond Jubilee DVD to commemorate Queen Elizabeth's Diamond Jubilee in the Mere Area, is on sale in Waltons of Mere, priced at £4.99, a present with a difference perhaps. All proceeds will go to The Link Scheme.

Police and Crime Commissioner Launches £1 Million Innovation Fund

The Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire and Swindon, Angus Macpherson, has launched a £1 million Innovation Fund. The Commissioner is looking to fund community and voluntary initiatives throughout Wiltshire and Swindon which will help

towards achieving his six main priorities as set out in his Police and Crime Plan. The Commissioner's six main priorities, working with communities as partners, are to: A) Reduce crime and anti-social behaviour. B) Protect the most vulnerable in society. C) Put victims and witnesses first. D) Reduce offending and re-offending. E) Drive up standards of customer service. F) Ensure unfailing and timely response to calls for assistance.

This fund is about supporting innovative new ideas which will make a lasting difference to community safety, and I'm particularly interested in projects that help to break cycles of crime and antisocial behaviour, including supporting repeat Offenders.

The funding will be awarded in three tranches as follows: A) £400,000 by 31 July 2013 in respect of applications received by 15 July 2013. B) £300,000 by 30 November 2013 in respect of applications received by 15 November 2013 and C) £300,000 by 31 March 2014 in respect of applications received by 15 March 2014.

Any organisation with aims and activities that meet the criteria can apply for funding. Any funds not awarded in one tranche will be 'rolled-over' to the next funding tranche.

The £1 million Innovation Fund is being funded from the Office of the PCC reserves. The Commissioner will consult with an advisory panel, made up of representatives from Wiltshire Police, Wiltshire Council, Swindon Borough Council and The Community Foundation for Wiltshire and Swindon, before deciding which applications to fund.

If you want to speak to him in a formal setting 'Drop-ins' are regularly held in Mere and surrounding villages. The July 'Drop-in' for Mere is on Thursday, 25th from 3.30-4.30pm in the Library.

Peter is eager to forge links with the community and will actively be looking to start new 'neighbourhood watches' or rejuvenate old ones. His current priorities are Dog Fouling and Parking Issues in Mere centre. Peter is looking forward to working in the Mere Neighbourhood Policing Team with Beat Manager PC Richard Salter to provide a safe and secure place for our public.

STAYING SAFE IN YOUR HOME

Part 3 Keeping out strangers

When opening the door to a caller do you lock, stop, chain and check? Ensure you lock any other external doors before going to open your front door especially if you are not expecting someone.

Do **stop** and think if you are expecting someone. Have you made an appointment – check your diary. Put **the chain** on the door and look through your door spy hole or through a window to check if it is the person you are expecting. **Check** them out. Make sure the person at the door is who they say they are. Do not be deceived by uniforms.

Remember Water, Gas and Electric do not cold call and if you are expecting one of the services for a repair or meter reading you can arrange an agreed time. They will give you the name of the person who will visit and you can have a pre-arranged password, which they have to give before entry.

If someone else wants to come into your home, ask for ID and ring their office. Do not take the number from the identity card they show you, but look it up in the phone directory.

Make sure you keep the chain on the door while you check out who they are. If you are in any doubt – lock them out. If you are concerned about who is calling and you feel unsafe ring the police.

MERE SURGERY For Out Of Hours Medical Advice, Phone 111

From mid-February this year the means of accessing medical care and health advice when the surgery is closed has changed. NHS 111 has replaced the Out of Hours medical triage service and NHS Direct.

In order to speak to a Health Adviser or nurse or doctor, all patients should phone 111.

In a medical emergency patients should still phone 999

The drive behind this new government initiative is to improve efficiency and effectiveness of health care advice for patients out of normal surgery working hours and to complement GP services in hours.

Another important driver is to reduce the number of unnecessary 999 ambulance calls, with an alternative number for patients to phone if they do not have a medical emergency.

The service is still in its very early days and some of our patients have experienced long delays in getting through to an adviser on the phone, and have at times been frustrated by the prolonged process of questioning that is required before receiving advice.

The providers of this brand new service are well aware of the current difficulties patients are experiencing and are working hard at improvements. A lot has been achieved already.

The Surgery would like to ask you to be patient during these teething troubles and to rest assured that phoning 111 is the correct way of accessing medical care and health advice when the surgery is closed.

Please do let us know if you experience any particular difficulties so that we can feed this back to the providers of the service. They want your comments!

MERE RESIDENTS IN THE FLOW!

A joint trial between Wessex Water and the residents of Mere will be going ahead this summer to monitor watercourses in the small Wiltshire town.

Mere Rivers Group agreed to carry out the trial last year to see how much abstraction affects flows and whether residents can help by reducing water use. However, the wet summer in 2012 meant it couldn't take place, but now equipment to monitor the flow of streams in Mere has been installed to measure the effects of abstracting water for public supply and the trial is now set to get underway.

The gauges have been installed on the Shreen and the Ashfield Water following consultation with local residents and other organisations. Temporary fences are in place at the sites of where gauges have been installed.

At the moment up to 9MLs of groundwater a day can be abstracted from Mere, with roughly half being transferred to supply drinking water to people in the local area towards Yeovil.

During the trial, Wessex Water will attempt to replace the water that is usually moved to the Yeovil area with water from other sources so all of the abstracted water from the Mere source can be used locally. The rivers group will then encourage residents dependent on that local supply to save water to see how much the abstraction can be reduced by the public.

lan Sheppard, of the Mere Rivers Group, which is made up of representatives from the local community, local councils, the Environment Agency and the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, said: "We are pleased this trial is going ahead and hope we can find out more about the effects of abstraction on the flows. Hopefully the results will show if anything needs to be done to maintain healthy river flows in the area and how much our local residents can affect the rivers in their area."

Fiona Bowles, Wessex Water's environmental investigations manager, said local residents had welcomed the trial. She added: "We are committed to protecting the local environment and through the trial we hope to find out if we need to be doing more to protect the river flows. We are hoping for a dry summer so the results will be as conclusive as possible."



REV'D HELEN CAINES, METHODIST MINISTER, WRITES:

Churches hit the headlines for all the wrong reasons. So I was delighted recently to see one of the campaigns churches have been involved in, making the news in the way they intended. I would like to keep the conversation going on this topic too.

"Poverty, Truth and Lies" was a report published by the Methodist, Baptist and United Reformed Churches' Joint Public Issues Team. Its purpose was to highlight truths about poverty in this country, measured against the lies or myths that are often perpetuated, including among churchgoers. The report seeks to contribute to the debate about welfare, in the public spending review.

In 1753, John Wesley, founder of the Methodist societies, later to become the Methodist Church, wrote, "So wickedly, devilishly false is that common objection, "they are poor, only because they are idle." The sad truth is that even today, the general public and church congregations alike are willing to believe that the key factors driving poverty in the UK are the personal failings of the poor — especially idleness. For example, the report demonstrates that child poverty is more prevalent among in-work households, than those out of work. Many parents are juggling several low-paid jobs, to make ends meet. Most professionals working with children and families would attest this too. In the report it is just one instance where truth is set against the myths we have all heard and read, about "the undeserving".

It may be you think this is a topic too controversial for a local magazine. However I make no apology for drawing your attention to the fight for justice, which I believe was central to the good news in Jesus' manifesto. (see Luke's gospel chapter 4 verses 16 – 21)

Mere Matters does not have the space to cover the whole campaign, but those interested can read about it on the Internet at: jointpublicissues-news.org.uk If you share the concerns about the plight of the poorest people in our country, then you may wish to contact the decision-makers. Those with power and influence should be kept aware that the welfare of the most vulnerable people is of utmost importance to a sizeable body in the country, including many Christians.
