The consultation gives three options that are being considered in order to save costs. The Parish Council feels very strongly about the importance of our local fire service, especially as they are emergency First Responders in this area, and we want to do all we can to ensure that our fire station is retained. # GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES:

The Mere Carnival was excellent this year; however I had to communicate with BBLP, which was repairing some roads locally, and AMEC, putting a new gas main in White Road. I must thank the two companies who left the roads in a reasonable condition on Saturday, 13th September such that the Carnival could take place.

A local person asked if I would make those in the area aware that it is easy to be left on some trains at Gillingham Station, the reason being the exit button does not respond after a certain default time and they then had to travel on to Sherborne. I did that once when younger, but that was because I fell asleep!

Wiltshire Council's existing model for the youth service will cease on the 1st October, 2014. The South West Area Board will now be charged with providing a youth service for young people aged 13 to 19 - however it may be a lesser one in my opinion. I am sure that all the members of the South West Wiltshire Area Board will do their best for the youth of Mere, Tisbury and Wilton.

Please note again. The next Area Board meeting on Wednesday, 8th October at Nadder Hall is to be run very differently as it will be a health themed event. There will be a "Health Fair" including Mere Memory Group, Good Neighbours, Lunch Clubs, Community Transport, Stroke Club etc., and Council services related to health (Public Health, leisure etc). Please see the following article. Also, please note that a display for the Fire Service consultation will be featured. Please try and take part in the Fire Service Consultation, as it could affect Mere Fire Station. The approximate times are from 3.30 - 7.00/7.30pm. Remember, it is a unique opportunity. Area Board business will take place in the seated area at 6.00pm.

I wish to inform readers again that Mere Swimming Pool, which was a memorial for The Second World War, is at risk of being lost. It may not be possible to keep the swimming pool, if no one person or group of people come forward to save it.

I have attended Warwick Conference Centre again for two days; I have two more days to do in October. I find it very useful; it informs us how to approach a challenge that we may have locally and how best to achieve a good result. It enables us to understand and communicate with those who may oppose our local wishes.

Wiltshire Council is still working towards providing at least four older persons bungalows in the South West Wiltshire Board Area, to release existing larger houses for young families.

# WHAT IS THE FUTURE FOR NHS SERVICES IN WILTSHIRE?

Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group is led by local GPs. We plan and pay for the majority of NHS services that you use across the county. Over the next five years, we know that demand for NHS services in Wiltshire will continue to increase, although the money we have available to spend on these services will not increase at the same rate.

Modern advances in healthcare are helping people to live for longer than ever before, which is a cause for celebration. However, this does mean that the demand for NHS services from the over-65s is expected to increase significantly over the coming years. As a result, the CCG needs to adapt the way we provide NHS services so that they better meet the needs of our ageing population.

#### How will we meet this challenge?

The CCG has developed a Five Year Plan to enable us to respond to this challenge. Our plan sets out how we can continue to provide high quality but affordable health services in Wiltshire between now and 2019. We won't be doing it alone either. Our key partners like Wiltshire Council, GP surgeries, local hospitals and other NHS providers are vital to the success of the plan.

It will mean some major changes to the shape of health care services in Wiltshire. Our vision is that health and social care services should support and sustain independent living, and as the organisation responsible for designing and commissioning those services, we are keen to make them both affordable and the best possible for local people.

Our model for the future of health care in Wiltshire is based on three key principles:

- 1. Encourage and support Wiltshire residents to take on more responsibility for their own health and well-being,
- 2. Provide fair access to a high quality and affordable system of care for the greatest number of people,
- 3. Provide less care in hospitals and more care at home or in the community.

To achieve these aims we will need to change the way in which we spend our budget. We will:

- 1. Spend more money on health education and prevention to help people take more personal responsibility for their health and well-being,
- 2. Spend more money to improve community care, and increase the range of services provided in a local setting.
- 3. As a result, we would need to spend proportionately less money on providing bed-based care in hospital.

We are going to split Wiltshire up into 20 clusters of approximately 20,000 people. Each cluster will have an integrated team of GP surgeries, community nurses and therapists together with social worker support, who will work together to ensure that we have a more joined up system of health and social care.

#### How can you get more involved?

The CCG has already been carrying out a wide-ranging consultation about our Five Year Plan across the county and this has included public meetings, outreach events, and presentations to a variety of organisations. You may have been involved in one of these events?

Over the next few months the CCG will be giving presentations at the 18 Area Boards across the county. Each Area Board is planning a Health Fair with lots of different stalls for you to visit followed by presentations from the CCG and Wiltshire Council about our plans for improving health and social care. # POLICE REPORT



#### Social Networking Works

We have had two good examples of Social Networking, working particularly well recently and helping the police deal with Anti-Social Behaviour. Wooden benches at Lynch Close were vandalised in early September when wooden slats were removed. Alert residents were able to get photo's of the suspects

and pass them to Police. We have identified the 3 and are currently investigating the incident.

The second was when a local resident parked his car on the newly painted Zig Zag lines in Salisbury Street. An eagle eyed resident spotted the offending vehicle and took a photograph and put it on 'Mere Mutters', which is a website for things going on in Mere.

Police were able to deal with the resident and give him 'words of advice' about where NOT TO PARK in future.

Both are good examples of Neighbourhoods working with the Police to assist us.

We would remind any would-be 'posters' to be safe as some people may take offence at a photo of their car being taken, and to be aware that when you post on social media, your details are on there too.

We remind people not to use a website for reporting crime or issues. Call '101' or '999' if serious.

Look for us on "Facebook", we issue frequent bulletins and reports of crime in our area, along with security advice, plus PCSO Pete posts photos of his beat, and it is a very beautiful area! # LIP READING AND MANAGING HEARING LOSS

Here are some tips to help....Ask the speaker to face the light and sit at your eye level so you can see their face clearly, and relax – lipreading takes concentration and is tiring, but is easier if you are relaxed in a quiet place without distractions.

**Ask** to be told the subject so you can use your own knowledge to help you, and for a whole sentence to be repeated or reworded – it's easier to lipread a whole sentence than a single word.

**Watch** how the lips, tongue and whole face moves as the person speaks to help you recognise sounds you no longer hear clearly, and it may help if you try to recall the sound of voices as you watch the speaker's face to help understand the conversation more clearly.

# FR. LOUIS BEASLEY-SUFFOLK, PRIEST AT THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH OF ST MARY'S, WRITES:

Taciturn – definition – habitually silent, reserved or uncommunicative, not inclined to conversation. *Collins English Dictionary*.

That adjective could never be ascribed to any Scot I know. Why Scots in particular?

Well, I am writing this a couple of days before the referendum on devolution between Scotland and England, the result of which will decide whether Scotland remains part of the UK or 'ploughs its own furrow'. Tremendous passion has been generated by supporters of both camps; even families are feeling the tension with members opting for different sides of the discussion.

Tension foments tension, and I wonder how long it will take for the visible divisions which have arisen from this debate between the people of Scotland, to heal. Divisions in any community are remembered with greater intensity than any 'union' or positive success. In Scotland, whichever way the vote goes, disunity will prevail as the healing of wounds received in verbal battle can take a long time to be completely healed; and in some cases, that healing never happens.

One only has to reflect on the many countries which have been divided during the last century to know how painfully true that can be. Historically, momentous decisions are never forgotten, and the proof of that is visible in our own islands; in our own country.

Christians in this country are divided and we know the reasons only too well. Consider how many hundreds of years it has taken for religious scars to heal; consider how many men and women from all denominations have put their energy and their love for both God and man striving for Christian unity. The drive for Christian unity is a duty for all Christians and currently we are enjoying the fruits of the hard work and love for unity that is the legacy to us from our forefathers. Whatever the result of the referendum in Scotland, may the scars received in verbal battle not take hundreds of years to heal.
