I promised, a couple of months ago, to keep you informed about the clock tower. We are currently negotiating with a builder who has provisionally agreed to assess the damage and will be reporting back to us on how to proceed. Unfortunately, the clock has stopped again. Until we can stop the rain coming in, I doubt we can do anything permanent about that at the moment.

I must thank all of you who turned out for the last 43rd (Wessex) Division Memorial Service and Parade. A simple, poignant service was held at the base of Castle Hill and we are grateful to Jane Hurd who conducted it.

Zeals Parish Council had voted in favour of this application the week before.

The Chairman writes:

This is a belated report of our Annual Parish Council meeting which was held on 19th May. I was re-elected as Chairman for the forthcoming year and Andre Filleau was re-elected as the Vice-Chairman.

The Parish Council discussed the amended planning application for Copsford and invited the architect to attend the public session in order to explain the proposals. Whilst the Parish Council was not wholly comfortable with the contemporary design aspect of this building, members were aware that it was likely to be approved by the planning authority and therefore the Parish Council requested that mature trees should be planted around the boundary to lessen the visual impact and light pollution.

Community Speedwatch is still in progress, and the team is presently waiting for the regulation speed signs.

Following an internal audit of the Parish Council's accounts, kindly carried out by Mr. Derek Ward, the Parish Council approved the accounts and supporting statements for the year ending 31st March 2014 and the Annual Return was completed and signed so that it could be submitted to the external auditors appointed by the Audit Commission. GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

The adoption of roads over the years has always been problematic for me across the Mere Area. Adoption of a road or roads has often taken ten years. If the developer starts out to develop dwellings with a private road, then all the residents of the developed site would probably be responsible for the maintenance of its road. If the developer enters into a section 38 highway agreement with Wiltshire Council, the developer has to provide a bond, which is similar to an insurance policy. This is to

protect the residents by ensuring that money is available to complete the road should the developer fail to do so for any reason. The developer brings the road up to an adoptable standard, when the road should not require significant maintenance for twenty years, at which point the council will usually adopt it when, subject to traffic regulation orders, all road users can use the road.

Additional monies have been allocated to The South West Area Board for youth development (Youth club). This is a one-off non-recurring sum to fund the transition to the new ways of working within the Youth Services of a maximum of about £53, 000. These additional monies are available because over the last decade the Youth Service has received donations and funds from third parties in addition to council funding. The service has held these funds in separate bank accounts that have sat outside the Council's banking arrangements, in effect not the council's money. The Part Year Allocation for 2014/15 for youth will be £14,141 (a full year is not that much over £20, 000) to service Mere, Tisbury and Wilton. Disregarding the large transition payment above, the youth service in our area has been hit hard, about 265 children still need support in our area. It should be remembered some Counties have no youth service at all. The youth service in Wiltshire, as it is, will close on the 1st October 2014. Planned youth activities in the summer holiday have gone ahead, thanks to our conscientious youth worker Jaki Farrell.

The principal change will be moving away from the Council being a direct provider of positive activities for young people aged 13 to 19 and to becoming an enabler for local groups/organisations to deliver. Area Boards will be the local accountable body for delivery of the new youth model. A Community Youth Officer (CYO) will be appointed. Young people will be encouraged to be driving the priorities, to help design, plan and deliver projects. A Local Youth Network (LYN) will hopefully be formed.

A consultation has been launched about possible changes to the bus pass scheme, which applies all across Wiltshire. There is a fact sheet and separate online survey forms for individuals and organisations on the Wiltshire Council's Consultation Portal http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/council/consultations.htm. The closing date is Friday, 26th September 2014.

The financial plan for 2014-2015 identifies savings of £180,000 from review of free bus travel before 0930 by elderly and disabled bus pass holders. The options considered are to change the Wiltshire Bus Pass scheme so that passes could only be used after either 0930 Monday - Friday or after 0900 Monday - Friday. It is a legal requirement that they can be used all day at weekends. Because of legal requirements and lead times, the earliest date that any change could be made is 1st April 2015 and the decision must be made by Cabinet on the 11th November 2014.

The next Area Board meeting on 8th October at Nadder Hall is to be run very differently as it will be a health themed event, including a health fair. The full details are still to be

worked out, but here is a summary of the key points so far: An exhibition styled event, with various displays from local organisations (e.g. Mere Memory Group, Good Neighbours, Lunch Clubs, Community Transport, Stroke Club etc.) and Council services related to health (Public Health, leisure etc). The main focus is on issues that arose during the JSA (Joint Strategic Assessment) event (dementia friendly, combating social isolation, promoting activities) as well as interactive activities (e.g. local healthy food tasting, check your blood pressure etc.). A request for a display for the Fire Service consultation has been made. Please try and take part in the Fire Service Consultation, it could affect Mere Fire Station. Approximate time 3.30pm to 7-7.30pm. THIS IS A UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY.

Area Board business is to take place in the seated area at 6.00pm; this will be my Chairman's Announcements; any grants, CATG funding, any other essentials and will again take place as the Health Fair continues. After this has finished (30mins to 1 hour total depending on how many grant applications we have), people will be encouraged to go round the Health Fair, if they have not done so already.

From time to time, Councillors receive reports from the public regarding Travellers who set up unauthorised encampments in their local areas outside normal office hours, as happened in The Mere Recreation Ground not so long ago and in Zeals several times in years past. Where an unauthorised encampment is causing specific problems out of office hours the Police should be notified using the 101 number. If the necessary criteria is met a Police Officer may choose to take immediate action. During normal office hours the Enforcement Team within Environment Services deals with all reports along with the Police where required. Unauthorised encampments in Wiltshire have totalled more than 90 in the past year.

I am a strong supporter that some Council work should be carried out by local tradesmen, which happens little, if at all, at present. I believe they would have more thought to their area as a general rule. A national committee has made a string of recommendations that are essentially for local government, rather than for Whitehall to take forward. This was deliberate, reflecting the Committee's support for localism. The committee stated Individual councils should consider the potential for sub-dividing at least part of a contract to enable smaller organisations to bid for smaller parcels of work, and I believe some carpenters, plumbers and so on, living and working in or near our area, should be considered for Wiltshire Council work.

I informed readers over the last months that Mere Swimming Pool, which was a memorial for The Second World War, is at risk of being lost. It may not be possible to keep the swimming pool, if no one person nor group of people come forward to save it. Mere should receive some of a £600K planning gain monies that could result from residential development in the Mere area. The Mere Parish Council has sent a request for suggested use of some of this proposed £600K. When the dwellings are marketed, I have asked the developer to please note Wiltshire Council has named 21 Towns in the

Wiltshire Council Area and one city. The City is Salisbury and Mere is one of the 21 towns. We have a Town Clock in the centre of Mere etc. We have a significant factory moving across Mere and staying in effect, we have two industrial estates, we have more than one shop and a pub, and therefore we are more than a large village.

People are being asked to have their say on changes to kerbside garden waste collections which could save Wiltshire Council thousands of pounds. Garden waste is currently collected at the kerbside every fortnight; however the council has put together three proposals to reduce the cost of the service.

People are being asked to choose which of these three options best meet their needs:

- A three month suspension of the kerbside garden waste service with no collections taking place in December, January and February.
- A five month suspension of the kerbside garden waste service with no collections taking place in November, December, January, February and March.
- To introduce a chargeable kerbside garden waste collection service instead of the current service.

People are reminded that the household recycling centres in Wiltshire still accept garden waste, and the council will continue to provide subsidised compost bins which can compost your garden waste and food waste at home. Let the council have your thoughts on the options for change by:

The consultation runs from 1 July until 1st September 2014 and I suggest you send your views, even if out of time.

With The South West Area Board being less able to give grants than we were, it is worth noting The Community Foundation for Wiltshire and Swindon give both Community and Individuals grants. Telephone 01380 729284.

We live close to three county borders therefore I think it appropriate to mention, Somerset County Council Learning and Disability Service has job opportunities, 201373 456516. Not many job opportunities come from councils at the present, and Frome is not too distant from us.

ARE YOU READY FOR WINTER????

In a very short time summer disappears and no sooner than we are talking about autumn than its winter with dark nights,



short days and its cold. Few people love the winter months and as we get older coping with the cold becomes more difficult and health problems can develop. It is time for your Winter Check List:

Outside

- 1. Are there any loose or missing tiles on the roof?
- 2. Are your gutters clear of leaves?
- 3. Are there any damp patches on the walls?
- 4. Have a supply of salt and sand to put on your path and/or steps so that you can walk outside safely when it is icy.

Use a known and reputable company to do any repair work <u>now</u>. Don't wait for the rain or the snow falling when a rogue trader comes knocking on your door telling you that they have noticed a problem!

Inside

- 1. Have you had your central heating boiler serviced?
- 2. If you use fires have you had your chimney swept? It is the landlord's responsibility to get these carried out if you live in rented property.
- Check your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms are working. If you haven't got any, get some installed. They could save your life if your air vents become blocked.
- 4. Have you considered draught-proofing doors and windows, loft insulation and lagging your hot water tank? These actions help keep your home warm and lower your heating bills.

Personal

- 1. If you are over 65 you are entitled to a free flu jab. Most GP surgeries have a flu clinic. Make sure you are booked in.
- 2. Ideally, your living areas should be 18-21°C in the day. Heat your bedroom before you go to bed and keep it at about 18°C overnight.
- 3. Keep moving. Don't stay in your chair all day, get up every so often and wander around as this generates heat. Eat at least one hot meal a day and lots of hot drinks. If you have difficulty walking, try some exercises in your chair to keep you moving. Remember wearing thin layers of clothes is more effective than one thick layer.
- 4. Have a torch at hand in case of power cuts, and also a supply of tinned or dry provisions in case you can't get to the shops. Make arrangements for your regular prescriptions to be delivered by the pharmacy.

- 5. Just because it is cold out don't give up on your friends or your regular social groups. It is important to socialise we are happier and healthier when we meet and chat to others. If you can't get out, keep in touch with your friends and family by phone. Hearing about someone's day can help lift your spirits.
- 6. Some people are anxious that they will not have enough money to cover their fuel bills. There are grants to support elderly people who spend more than 10% of their income on fuel.

GIANT'S CAUSEWAY LINKS WITH SOME MERE RESIDENTS!

Finn McCool, of Ireland's Giant's Causeway fame, was dressed up as a baby by his clever wife to fool a rival giant – if this was the size of the McCool baby, how big was the father?? The rival fled as the ploy worked! An example of things not always being what they appear to be at first sight! And in Mere, 1 in every 6 residents might not appear to be what you expect at first sight!

The Finn McCool legend is similar to when someone with hearing loss appears to act differently to what you expect. You expect an immediate or automatic response to your question or comment and when you don't get that, you wonder what's going on! What's going on is that the person is concentrating on looking at your face, your mouth shapes as you speak, your gestures, considering the subject, whilst their brain is working out what you've said so they can respond – it can take a few seconds to do this, which is usually what makes you think "what's happening?" This 'working out' by both people can be made easier by clear speaking, not shouting, facing each other....because it's 'lip reading' that makes communicating with someone with hearing loss so much easier. It takes a moment of thinking.....just as you would if you met someone who, because of their stick or dog, you saw to be blind – you'd consider how best to communicate with them: look at which hand is holding the stick or dog lead, ask how you can help them. Remember, someone who can't hear you properly doesn't have a stick or a label saying so which is what causes the initial confusion (although they might have a Hearing Dog!).

Mere residents with (or without!) hearing loss can meet to discover how lip reading works - and other things that can be done to make it easier when communicating with friends, family, work colleagues, neighbours - in fact anyone and everyone you come in to contact with daily! The Finn McCool story was used at our last meeting and is an example of as a practice topic, and Lip Reading Awareness Week is 8th – 12th September.

THE SHAFTESBURY AREA TALKING NEWSPAPER A search for Editors

The Shaftesbury Area Talking Newspaper, which is circulated in Mere, comprises a weekly recording of ninety minutes or so of news and features read mainly from the *Blackmore Vale Magazine*, the *Salisbury Journal*, and the *Western Gazette*. Items from local community and parish magazines, such as Mere Matters, are also included as a supplement.

The recordings are made onto small memory sticks and listeners are supplied with compact, easy to use receivers; if required an explanatory home visit can be arranged. The service is completely free to those who are blind or partially sighted and includes all postal charges and the loan of the receiver.

A team of some thirty volunteers - editors, readers, recorders, copiers, and dispatchers – publishes the Talking Newspaper and we are now seeking, with some urgency, to recruit more Editors.

An Editor's main task is to select text from the weekly newspapers and then present it in a way that is easy for the readers to read aloud. The editors add connecting passages to open and close the readings and to provide cohesion. Interestingly, listeners greatly value descriptions of photographs from the newspapers; this enables the editors, occasionally, to employ some vivid and imaginative language.

The local newspapers are made available early on a Thursday so Editors have until mid-afternoon on the Friday to prepare their edition for the readers. A negotiated rota determines when an Editor is called upon, usually every six weeks or so.

Please don't let this put you off pearls as the mummified worm is removed when the pearl is drilled ready for stringing. 

For the first time this year we are going as a family to hire a boat and "cruise" on the Norfolk Broads; we're hoping our sons will pilot the boat and leave us reading and relaxing. The gospels have a number of stories about the disciples' struggles with boats on water. The Jews were very wary of water and thought it was where sea monsters and all manner of evil lived.

In the story of Jesus walking on water, we are given one of the many demonstrations of Jesus' Godlike qualities. Jesus' power over the water was absolutely amazing to his followers, all they can do when he gets in the boat is worship him. The children's worship song says "Our God is so great, so strong and so mighty, there's nothing that he cannot do". Jesus was quite clear in his final instructions to his followers: you too can do surprising things by faith. Peter manages it when he trusts in God, but not when he doubts. God's power is great and it is a power which can transform us as individuals and as communities, if we allow it in both big and quiet ways.

In ministry I have met some truly lovely people. One of them was a lady who had spent her life serving people with great kindness. Sadly she contracted cancer and was given months to live. It was extraordinary because as her body diminished in vigour her spirit came even more fully alive. As you left her after a visit you felt invigorated, not downhearted. Her Christian faith and that of her devout sister shone out. She was full of hope- what a paradox by ordinary thinking isn't it?
