MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you!

You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on **Monday, 2nd February 2015**.

The Chairman writes:

Before Christmas becomes a faint memory, I would like to thank all those parishioners and councillors who helped with the Christmas lights. Also thanks to our local Cancer Research Committee for organising a delightful Victorian Market during which the lights were switched on.

As you aware the lights on the clock tower have, of late, remained during the year. This year they have been removed. To keep you up to date with the tower, we have received one quotation for the work needed and are awaiting others.

Congratulations to Mr and Mrs Dick Morris of Downside Close who won the prize for the best Christmas light display, a truly whimsical, delightful sight.

Many people have commented on the goats grazing on Castle Hill. In fact, living very close, I know of visitors who have come especially to see them!

As you may recall the possibility of losing our Youth Club in Mere has become a concern. I am pleased to report that we have been working with Jaki Farrell, our established youth co-ordinator with a view to keeping our youth club with youth services to be run under the Registered Charity "Seeds4Success", and with Jaki still very much involved.

The Annual Budget meeting, held in December was, as ever, challenging and lengthy: this meeting was the Council's Annual Budget Setting meeting where members have to consider likely expenditure over the next year in order to determine the precept requirement (parish council's share of the council tax) for 2015/16.

The precept will show an increase of 2.8% or £2.58 for the year on a Band D house within the parish. Whilst members were mindful of the need to keep any increases to a minimum they faced extreme difficulties since the Parish Council's grant from Wiltshire

WEST KNOYLE PARISH COUNCIL

At the Parish Council meeting held on 25th November, members and parishioners discussed a pre-application enquiry put forward by Valetcraft Property Developers regarding the possibility of building low cost homes on land between Dhuli Fou and Oderne.

It was generally felt that the building of four homes on this site could not be supported as there was insufficient demand for young people to live in West Knoyle and there would be a lack of off-road parking facilities.

The Clerk was asked to inform Valetcraft of this reaction but also to advise them that if they wanted to submit a formal application to Wiltshire Council then the Parish Council, as statutory consultees, would consider the matter formally at the appropriate time.

The Parish Council had submitted a scheme to the Community Area Transport Group for improved signage and direction arrows on the B3089 at Willoughby Hedge in the hope that this would make drivers more aware that they are entering two-way traffic.

Mr. Paul Yates was thanked for carrying out repairs to the play equipment. I would also like to thank Mr. Andre Filleau for carrying out the weekly checks on the play area and its equipment.

The Parish Council also considered the likely expenditure over the next year in order to determine the precept requirement (parish council's share of the council tax) for 2015/16. The precept requirement will show an increase of just over 18.97% or £8.08 for the year on a Band D house within the parish.

Whilst members were mindful of the need to keep any increases to a minimum they faced extreme difficulties since the Parish Council's grant from Wiltshire Council has been reduced by 27% and they are under pressure to help with financial support to provide services that are under threat or being cut by Wiltshire Council.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Tuesday, 10th March 2015 at 7.30 p.m. in the Village Hall.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

Firstly, an important piece of information for residents of Mere. **Mere Post Office**, (but not the shop, Waltons of Mere), will close early on Wednesday, 25th February and not re-open until the afternoon of Thursday, 5th of March. This is for conversion to a Main Post Office model. Zeals and Bourton Post Offices are the alternative Post offices for that period.

I stated last month that Wiltshire Council's support grant from Central Government is projected by the Treasury to reduce to zero, by 2022-23. According to a survey conducted by the Independent on Sunday, communities will be forced to start fending for themselves as funding cuts to local government start to bite. Government cuts to council funding mean that authorities will be surviving on 14.6% less in 2014-15, according to council finance directors. In Darlington, the council is asking residents to take over the management of green spaces and keep pavements clear of rubbish. Elsewhere, in Oxfordshire, subsidised transport for the elderly and disabled will be cut back. Barnet is handing over responsibility for community events and support groups to local businesses. Buckinghamshire will only provide school transport to poorer households. Each month I try to keep you up to date with what Wiltshire Council can provide with ever diminishing funds: for instance Wiltshire has allowed some funds to help maintain a youth service, whereas some other councils have cut all funding for youth services. Wiltshire Council's forthcoming year's budget will be decided at County Hall at 10.30am on Tuesday, 24th February.

Mere Parish Council has agreed to allow a charity, Seeds4Success, (which will take in Mere and also may be Tisbury and Wilton) to take over The Youth Club Building in The Mere Peace Memorial Recreation Ground. This building was formerly leased to Wiltshire Council. Wilton Town Council has found a source of funding for a youth worker, and has taken over responsibility for the youth club building, which it has taken over from Wiltshire Council. Tisbury Parish Council has contributed towards the youth in its area as well. The South West Wiltshire Area Board is now charged with providing a youth service for young people aged 13 to 19. Local Youth Networks (Chat LYN) are being established in Mere, Tisbury and Wilton. A LYN embracing all three (and being effectively a LYN management committee) will guide how the money allocated for the purpose by the WC South West Wiltshire Area Board will be spent on youth.

Last month The Deputy Leader of Wiltshire Council asked if local parish councils will fund the SIDs (Seed Indicator Device) programme. At a recent CATYG meeting interest was shown for their retention in this area, but the SIDS programme will not now be Wiltshire-wide as not enough Town and Parish Councils came forward to provide coverage for all of Wiltshire.

A Pedestrian Salt Spreader has been awarded to Mere for use by Mere Parish Council by the South West Wiltshire Area board. A local charity agreed a Salt bin for Westfields, Zeals recently, and now another local charity has given one for Barnes Place Mere. These bins are for use by very local residents, and near by residents hold the keys. The Mere area from West Knoyle to Kilmington now has salt, powered vehicle spreaders, trained drivers, snow shovels and so on, so we have one of the best prepared areas in Wiltshire for inclement weather.

The Lecture Hall Trust in Mere informed some or all of its tenants in residential and commercial property that it may need to sell some of its property. Some of the local tenants have approached me to speak to the trustees. The Lecture Hall Trust has agreed to this request.

I am pleased to say after my request for a Digital Champion to volunteer last month, to train those with little experience of a computer, some success has been achieved.

The assessment of Gypsy and Traveller accommodation needs is a statutory requirement under Section 225 of the Housing Act 2004. A Gypsy and Traveller Accommodation Assessment (GTAA) has now been completed by independent consultants, Opinion Research Services, in line with the latest adopted government guidance. The GTAA can found on Wiltshire Council website the following be the at address:http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/planninganddevelopment/planningpolicy/gypsyandtrav ellersdpd.htm. Local authorities are also required by national planning policy to produce development plan policies that set requirements for new traveller pitches and travelling showpeople plots, and allocate sites to help deliver this requirement. While the Wiltshire Core Strategy already identifies requirements for the period to 2021 in Core Policy 47, in order to satisfy the Core Strategy Inspector, a commitment was made in the Core Strategy to carry out a full GTAA to review and roll forward the requirements in Core Policy 47 to ensure adequate provision across the plan period to 2026. It concludes that overall there is a requirement for 90 traveller pitches between 2014 and 2029, and seven additional plots for travelling showpeople.

A document that sets out the policies required for planning permission consisting of 546 pages, named the Wiltshire Core Strategy, will almost certainly be adopted at a meeting on Tuesday 20th January.

I am familiar with the role of work of a project board, having worked with the Wiltshire Online Project and others, and I am pleased to have been accepted to work on another project board, Paperless working. I shall have a lead input to reporting back at key milestones in the project to the select committee and/or task group as necessary (with appropriate officer support). The knowledge gained also should help locally.

The Campus for many services is underway at Tisbury. It was proposed at the Tisbury Campus team meeting that members of the Community Operations Board visit local

Parish Councils to provide an update on the campus programme and explain how the wider community area can get involved/benefit, after contractors started work on site on 5th January 2015. Local Parishes can receive such a presentation.

Superfast Broadband has reached Wilton in my South West Wilts Board's area, and the local councillor said they had 80Mb/s download and 20 Mbs/s upload which is a very fast internet speed. Hopefully within the next year ours will be as fast in the Mere Area.

Kilmington have had measures approved at CATG, which hopefully will slow the traffic a little along Kilmington Common. I have put in a similar request for Stourton Lane after a resident pointed out they were also an extension of the same road.

A GOOD OFSTED INSPECTION FOR HINDON CEVA PRIMARY SCHOOL

The Early Years, Little Owls class is judged to be **Good** because: 'The children are rapidly learning classroom routines and cooperate well with each other under the caring approach of the teacher in a well-planned classroom with exciting activities.
