

MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the town - come and hear what they are doing for you!

You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on **Monday, 2nd November 2015**.

The Chairman writes:

Remembrance Sunday falls on Sunday, 8th November. We will be congregating at the Clock Tower from 10.30am. There will be a hymn before the two minute silence at 11.00am with the sounding of Last Post and wreath laying around the war memorial afterwards. All are welcome to come along. There will be a 10 minute road closure in The Square from 10.57am until 11.07am. A service will be held at St Michael's church after the ceremony at the clock Tower.

The Literary Festival week has just drawn to a close. I was invited to the Nineteenth Mere Literary festival award ceremony held on the 18th October. I am proud to say the Literary Festival attracts local, national and indeed international participants and has grown to be one of the biggest events in the Town's calendar and has helped put Mere on the map. Funds raised through the Literary Festival go towards our local Mere and District Linkscheme charity, providing a truly valued service to people in and around the community. I would like to congratulate the festival's Director, Mrs Adrienne Howell, as the driving force behind this successful literary festival week. I would also like to thank all the organisers, sponsors, and participants - well done.

Wiltshire Council is conducting a review and consultation concerning the future of Children's Centres in Wiltshire. At present Wiltshire Council operates thirty children's centres around Wiltshire. The proposal put forward is to reduce the number of these to fifteen. Where children's centre buildings are closed, services will be delivered by staff in the community through outreach support. Mere children's centre at Duchy Manor is one of the centres earmarked for closure. The nearest proposed children's centre to Mere will be the new campus building in Tisbury. I have attended two meetings with Wiltshire Council and children centre staff over this issue. I have been assured that this is a genuine consultation. I will submit a report to the Town Council at the November meeting so that we can send a collective response to the consultation.

With reference to the request from Mere Town Football Club for the two covered seating areas to be erected in the Recreation Ground as reported in last month's Mere Matters,

I can confirm that the Town Council has agreed to conduct some public consultation. The Football Club will be providing us with scaled plans and drawings of the seating areas, and these will be displayed in the Recreation Ground to show users where the buildings will be located etc.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

In line with Government requirements, Wiltshire created 30 designated Sure Start children's centres between 2006 – 2011. The initial centres were located within areas with the highest levels of deprivation, and additional centres were set up in areas with a higher population of children aged under five. Children's centres are facing budget cuts this year. An annual census by the charity 4Children, which shows two-thirds of England's children's centres, more than 2,300, have had their budgets cut in the past year. The census, which was conducted over two months in the summer, is based on 388 responses from managers in 124 local authorities across England. More than half of those who had experienced a cut said it would mean reductions to frontline services. 4Children warns that around 130 centre sites are at risk of closure, on top of hundreds that have already closed over the past five years.

The Government's policy on free entitlement to childcare for disadvantaged two year olds and the recent announcement on the increase of free entitlement to childcare for three and four year olds of working parents (from 15 to 30 hours) means that the council needs to look at how to create more childcare places as part of its early years strategy. There is an opportunity to consider this agenda alongside delivery of children's centre services. Mere's Children's Centre future is not guaranteed. One proposal of consultation is to close the Mere Centre and provide a service from Tisbury. On line Consultation is open and available to all.

Requests for repairs, or other services from Wiltshire Council, needs to be done by individuals or Parish and Town Councils via the WC website (www.wiltshire.gov.uk), or the 'My Wiltshire App'. Examples of issues I have lodged on the app in the last month are: Kilmington Street deep pot holes; Fords Water, Zeals/Gasper poor road and pot holes; Mere down B3095 long cable in road; Pettridge Lane, Mere, pot hole, and poor pavement condition outside F J Chalke and Son, Mere.

As I mentioned last month, I have asked for Downside Close roads to be finally surfaced. I have chased this again this month, although it was pointed out that the final

surface should not be laid in very cold weather, with which I agree.

This brings me on to inclement weather. I read recently that heavy snow and strong winds welcomed in 1976, with snow falling heavily from the afternoon of 31st January and within a couple of hours roads had become treacherous for drivers. UK is sure to see a repeat of this type of weather at some time. Wiltshire Council has snow ploughs, but possibly no snow blowers, which I remember being used in 1963. With further cuts expected from Wiltshire Council, I have asked if the farmers, who agreed to assist will be kept on stand-by, and I am told this will still be the case. Kilmington, West Knoyle and Mere I know use stand-by farmers. Mere, Zeals and Stourton have spinners and Salt. Also West Knoyle and Kilmington have salt, plus there is a hand spinner in Mere. Snow shovels and salt shakers have been given to some, to clear areas outside and adjacent to their property. I have a few snow shovels stored by the Salisbury Street car park given by The Hill Brush Company. Hopefully none of the above will be required this coming winter, however it is there if required.

Wiltshire has 14,000 tonnes of salt in stock, which is strategically placed throughout the county, and there are three new salt depots with undercover salt storage. During the winter people obtain updates on both the weather and road conditions on Twitter by following @WiltshireWinter and @WiltshireRoads

If a resident thinks a gulley is blocked superficially, with leaves or grass, they can, with care on the highway, clear it themselves. If the blockage is not easy to clear or they have any other concerns, these can be reported to Wiltshire Council using one of the following methods:

- On line at <u>www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywilts</u> where users will be able to leave their e-mail address and receive updates.
- By using the MyWiltshire app on a smart phone, which again will provide updates to users.
- By telephone on 0300 456 0105 the customer services team will provide a log number

After attending a Mini Bus training course, I shall be taking some sheltered housing residents on much needed days out. Already, on Sunday, 4th October, I took a group from Lynch Close and Bishops Close for an outing in a Wiltshire Council minibus. They had a ride in a barge along the canal at Bradford on Avon. I took a wrong turn in Trowbridge on the way home, however we made home and a good time was had by all.

Our community SID (Speed Indicator Device) is at Kilmington for an extended period, the total closure of the B3092 Mere to Frome road has caused many to divert along this road, therefore there is an increased need for the SID at this time.

As part of The Chairman's announcements at a recent South West Area Board, the

question was asked about whether there was any need to consider the plight of dairy farming. Granted it was not on the agenda, however no one requested that we should consider it on a future agenda. Kilmington has lost dairy farms recently, cows in the local fields will be a sight we shall see less of.

Seeds4Success had 15 places available for students in Year 12 to attend an Autumn NCS (National Citizenship Scheme), which included a Residential course at the end of October, followed by 30 hours work on a community project that will run through November and early December. More details are available from Jaki Farrell it is jaki@seeds4success.org

Exceptionally, Seeds4Success has been given up to £60K by Wiltshire Council to run a youth service in Mere, Tisbury and Wilton. This will be for a two year contract. The recent Community Youth Officer's (CYO) report to the South West Area Board on 23rd September 2015 showed that there have not been many applications for funding for positive activities from the Youth Grant fund, resulting in the cancellation of the LYN (Local Youth Network) in September. The next planned event is a Consultation on Tuesday, 10th November 2015 which will be open to existing members of the LYN

Management Group, as well as previous members of the ChatLYN's (Local Youth Network chatlines), and any other interested parties from the community. It is hoped that this event will either create interest from existing organisations to apply for a Youth Grant, or will suggest suitable activities or projects that the Area Board may like to procure.

The Bowls Coach who attended the activity session in Tisbury came from Mere Bowls Club, and expressed an interest in making the sport available to young people in Mere. The CYO has discussed this further with members of the Mere Bowls Club, and they are now in the process of submitting an application to fund the set up of this facility in Mere.

I read with interest that BT has announced a strategy to make the UK the fastest broadband nation. It revealed plans to connect 10m homes to ultrafast broadband by the end of 2020 and raise the minimum broadband speed for homes that cannot get fibre to 5-10 megabits per second. Although much of Mere has access to fibre broadband, I shall be interested to see if the more rural parts of the Mere Community Area benefit from this announcement anytime soon.

The South West Wiltshire Area Board (SWWAB) still has funds to help fund community projects. Do you have one? A presentation was made to SWWAB regarding a proposed railway station for Wilton. It was claimed this would reduce the travel pressures on the A36, reducing the need for Network Rail to provide additional commuter parking in Salisbury as commuters would be able to use the Wilton Park and Ride (P&R). This could also be a location for visitors to Stonehenge travelling by rail to

be able to transfer to coaches for their visit to the World Heritage site, which would again relieve the traffic problems of Salisbury. A local group is determined that there will be a train station in Wilton again and have done much to see the project on its way.

On 1 September 2015 Balfour Beatty Living Places transferred their sub-contract to The Landscape Group (TLG) working directly under the management of Wiltshire Council. TLG is now providing local services for grounds, street cleaning and minor maintenance. Wiltshire Council is currently working on preparing the new highway contract for 1st April 2016, taking into account local views and the innovations and improvement priorities to be introduced. The Community Day Service to Towns and Parishes has ceased, but, in its place the council intends to return the Parish Steward Scheme to Towns and Parishes in the new highway contract from 1st April 2016.

POLICE REPORT

Keeping you informed

A timely reminder to ladies out for the night. Keep a watchful eye on your handbag. We had a theft at the George Inn in Mere. The customer only realised that it was gone when someone found it in the toilets, minus cash and credit cards. With the festive season fast approaching and parties galore - be aware.

The firearm found in the vehicle at Zeals turned out to be an air rifle and the owner will be given advice about leaving such a weapon in an insecure vehicle. I would like to add that it was not linked to the pub!

Two thefts from motor vehicles whilst parked in beauty spot car parks. One was targeted as we think someone was watching the owner as he stashed his wallet in the glove compartment. We put signs up warning not to leave any valuables in your vehicle as even an empty box inside may get you a smashed window by a thief.

The Street in Kilmington and Westfields in Zeals have had lots of police activity linked to two residents who have caused issues. We are working with Wiltshire Council and other agencies to deal with these people, who will ultimately be evicted, if they do not heed the warnings.

We sometimes get calls from worried walkers who see the kids (goats) on Castle Hill on the wrong side of the fence. Happy Wanderer (sic) who owns them assures me that they will find their way back to their parents! The worry is that they will wander onto the A303, but I have never seen them that far down.

We have had a few reports of suspicious activity around rural locations especially around heating oil tanks as thieves will be aware that they are being filled now for the onset of the colder months. Please beef up security around yours, ie, lights that come on when approached, locks and alarms on tanks all make them harder to steal from.

Finally, please remember to wear something bright at night, darker evenings make it more difficult for pedestrians to be seen...

FRIENDS OF ST. MICHAEL THE ARCHANGEL

King James II Coat of Arms, (Part 7)

At the end of last month's instalment of this episodic account of Mere's Coat of Arms, we asked if anyone could suggest why Arthur Coward undertook his renovation of the painting when he did (1896). A welcome response has come from the Rev'd. Ben Elliott, who was the vicar at St. Michael's from 1981 - 1999, who took - and takes - a very great interest in the painting. He points out that Frances Lovibond, the daughter of the well-known Mere Historian, T.H. Baker, was, at about that time, painting 16 shields bearing coats of arms on the balcony above the Still Chapel at the end of the north aisle.* At that time, the Coat of Arms hung on the wall above the balcony. It is clearly visible in that position in a photograph taken by Frederick Holmes dating to about 1910, though it would originally have hung above the chancel arch.

The Rev'd. Elliott himself had the Arms moved to its present position above the north porch in about 1997, where it is more visible from the body of the church. He suggests that if (and we can't at present be sure of this) the coat of arms was hanging on the wall above the chapel in the last decade of the 19th century, the brilliant colours of the newly-painted shields with their coats of arms on the balcony below might have suggested to T. H.Baker or to the then vicar of Mere, the Revd. John Lloyd, that Arthur Coward, as a professional painter and decorator, might be asked to renovate the large coat of arms, repainting it to match.

* The present coats of arms are fixed over those painted by Frances Lovibond.


