

MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion **at 7.30pm on Monday, 4th April 2016**.

The Chairman writes:

On street parking was discussed at the March Town Council meeting: specifically badly parked cars on narrow roads which could impede the movement of the fire engine and ambulance in an emergency. A fire engine needs clearance of 10ft to pass safely. When you are stuck in a fire, every second counts. I would like to ask all drivers when parking their vehicles in and around the town, to make sure that they leave enough room for a fire engine to get through.

I have recently been made aware of two incidents were the ambulance service has taken longer than expected to reach the emergency scene. I would like to know if these are just isolated instances, or is the ambulance service failing to meet the needs of the people in our community. I also have concerns about the length of time from the first response to the time it takes to get a patient to hospital. In order to establish the current state of this vital service, information needs to be gathered. Please would you inform the Town Council Clerk if you or your family have experienced the ambulance service falling short of expectations.

On Thursday, 21st April 2016, the date of the Queen's actual 90th birthday, we will be lighting a beacon on Castle Hill to celebrate the event, forming a chain of beacons that will be lit throughout the United Kingdom. The Queen's official birthday will be celebrated on Saturday, 11th June and the Town Council would like to mark the event with a firework display. However, we only have a small amount of money set aside for this and we are, once again, seeking donations from our generous parishioners and businesses to help – the more money we can get, the better the fireworks!

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GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION WRITES:

Dark Lane in Mere, which is well used, has had a partial collapse of one of its walls, Wiltshire Council has been working with the owner to reinstate the wall to make it safe.

There was a Heart of Wessex Local Action Group meeting held in South West Wiltshire at Stourton Memorial Hall on 16th March. Wiltshire Council acted as the Accountable Body. The Heart of Wessex Local Action Group is working with local people and businesses to develop opportunities for improving the rural economy and quality of life for people living and working in the area through a targeted grants programme. Their aim is: "To act as a catalyst for supporting the development of vibrant, independent and interconnected rural communities based upon strong economic growth".

Strong leadership, effective local decision-making and an efficient, lean service were some of the findings from an independent review of Wiltshire Council's highway services.

The review saw a team of seven local authority and local government peers visit the council for three days in February. They met with a wide range of partners and staff at all levels to discuss how the service is currently run.

The peer challenge team concluded that the Council is successfully investing in the highways infrastructure, harnessing the knowledge and energy in local communities to improve outcomes and delivering Swindon and Wiltshire Local Enterprise Partnership schemes on time and to budget. Peer reviews are arranged by the Local Government Association and are designed to highlight strengths and identify areas for further improvement and learning.

The council's key strengths identified were:

- The service managed the termination of the highways contract and the very challenging procurement of the new contract effectively.
- Harnessing the knowledge and energy in local communities has led to improved outcomes and additional funding.
- There is a clear positive intent amongst staff and partners to ensure the service is successful.
- Strong and capable senior political leadership which gives clear and consistent vision.
- The case has been successfully made for investment in the infrastructure and in an asset management approach/methodology.

Areas for development included:

• Clarity needed about how the wider council vision and transformation cascades to the highways and transport service.

- Consider the development of a performance management framework to underpin delivery of strategic outcomes.
- Ensure IT systems support integration and workflow/ feedback.
- Recognise and plan for the risks associated with the significant challenges faced over the coming months.

The Mere Town Council and I have helped in the release of an assurance bond which was held by The National House-Building Council (NHBC). The Mere Town Council, myself, and the residents will now be looking for a finally complete road to adoption standard for the newer part of Downside Close, Mere.

Two new Council owned bungalows are proposed in Bramley Hill, Mere. I have been consulted on their design and have asked for as much parking as possible to be provided for the benefit of all in the Bramley Hill area of Mere.

The South West Wiltshire Area Board has been and will continue to closely examine the highways resurfacing schemes in our area, which have been prioritised for resurfacing, noting some schemes have been carried over to the next financial year, being the 1st April onward, making some of us suspicious as to where some of next year's possible highway schemes might have been removed. Driving around, some of the lanes remain very poor, but I am pleased that over the last year or so Wiltshire Council has resurfaced long sections on some roads in this area. Nevertheless, much remains to be done.

The board are in the process of trying to secure two mini buses, one for Zeals Youth Trust and the other for Sowing Seeds (Youth) at Mere. This involves hands on voluntary work by many.

The South West Area Board have had three Speed Indicator devices for a while in the Mere area, and now a fourth one has been acquired for the Mere area, which includes the villages around. Unfortunately, you will recall when I wrote last month, that I had to return one to Melksham for exchange as it was faulty. This month two of the four seem to have problems. Eventually the scheme will be in place and for those in the villages around, I would ask for their patience.

I attended the 13th year of The Three Counties Charity Fundraisers which took place on Sunday, 6th March, 2016. The Ploughing Competition had 75 plus entries raising about \pounds 1,200 for the Local Air Ambulance. The Competition was held on a large site - the

fields were both sides of the B3092 on the road from Mere to Stourton and Kilmington. Young and old attended on a pleasant early spring morning.

A Green Fordson tractor with a bag attached stating "I am really hansom", is owned by Peter Barnaby whose grandfather bought the tractor after the Second World War from The War Ag (War Agricultural Executive Committee), for use on the family farm. The War Ag sold off tractors etc used by the land army. Therefore the tractor still working would have been used for food production during The Second World War.

WILTSHIRE CITIZENS ADVICE CLEARS UP PENSION JARGON BAFFLING CONSUMERS

"Flexi-access drawdown", "open market option" and "safeguarded benefits" are some of the pension terms most confusing for consumers, reveals Wiltshire Citizens Advice

The local charity, which delivers face-to-face Pension Wise appointments in Wiltshire, South Gloucestershire, Bristol and Bath says people would find it easier to understand their pensions if the industry used simple, standard language to describe their products.

Some people are also unclear about terms which appear to be more straightforward, putting them at risk of missing out on the best pension options for them. For example; staff have reported cases where consumers wrongly believed that their 'selected retirement date' was set in stone as the date they could access their pension, when in fact they could have accessed their savings ahead of this date.

To help people get to grips with their pension, Pension Wise guiders have identified the pension's jargon which people find most perplexing and have explained them in simple terms. Recent research from national Citizens Advice shows more than a quarter of people with defined contribution pensions feel that they don't understand their pension plan, while fewer than one in five feel very confident.

Albert Ball, Pension Wise Project Manager said: "Pension decisions can be hard enough without having to translate tricky wording. Many people coming to visit us are mystified by the jargon being used and our staff are here to help clear up the confusing language. Having a better understanding of what the terms mean puts consumers on a better path to choosing a retirement option which suits them."

A lady in Kilmington saw me directing traffic in the pouring rain and kindly bought out a cup of hot tea. The community spirit shown by the public never fails to impress me. 

Visit One Tuesday, 17th May 2016 John Boyd Textiles and Castle Cary

John Boyd was a travelling textile merchant from Scotland, who saw a potentially expanding market for horsehair fabric and, liking the town of Castle Cary, settled and began weaving the cloth in his cottage. NEWS FROM HINDON PRIMARY SCHOOL

This term, pupils and staff Celebrated Chinese New Year with a trip to the Dragon Chinese Restaurant in Salisbury. The whole school, for which West Knoyle is in the catchment area, including South Hills Hindon Nursery, travelled by train from Tisbury to Salisbury and walked the short distance to the Restaurant in Fisherton Street, where they enjoyed a traditional Chinese Dim sum buffet lunch. The children were encouraged to try foods that they wouldn't normally eat and returned to the buffet many times in order to sample the wide range of Chinese food on offer! Everyone agreed that it was delicious! WEST KNOYLE SUPERFAST BROADBAND

Thanks to very generous donations from a number of individuals in the village, West Knoyle now has access to superfast broadband through Wessex Internet (: wessexinternet.com).

The donations have covered the cost of their 'pole' (transmitter) and up to 4 'omnis' that can bounce the signal to properties not in the line of sight of the pole. It is anticipated that the majority of households will be able to connect to Wessex Internet once they have registered with the company.

The Government and Wiltshire Council have invested with BT to provide rural broadband speeds of up to 2mbps, and BT have said that the two green cabinets (one in East Knoyle and one in Mere) that serve West Knoyle will eventually be upgraded.

Because West Knoyle is too far from the cabinets, there will be little or no benefit as the connection from them will still be old fashioned copper cable and not fibre-optic. Hence our collaboration to purchase the more modern Wessex Internet solution, which will provide a choice of superfast 30 or 50mbps.

Wessex Internet have now been approved by the government department, Broadband Delivery UK (BDUK), as an alternative provider in Dorset, and I am working hard to ensure that they are also approved in Wiltshire.

When this happens, it will mean that the £350 connection voucher that is available to all households where speeds are less than 2mbps could be used to cover the cost of the connection to Wessex Internet. Bridget Wayman **Ta**: 01747830406
