MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion **at 7.30pm on Monday, 7th March 2016**.

The Chairman writes:

Wiltshire Council is conducting a public consultation on the future provision of subsidised bus services in Wiltshire. For a number of people living in Mere and the surrounding area this is a vital service which they rely on. For those people who do not use the bus services now, would you need bus services in the future? Wiltshire Council would like to know the views of bus users, residents, stakeholders and other interested parties. This is a consultation only about subsidised bus services, which are those services that are not viable for a bus company to run without Council funding. Further information can be found on <u>http://consult.wiltshire.gov.uk/portal</u> and on page 7. The consultation questionnaire can be obtained from Mere Library or answered on line. The questionnaires need to be completed by Monday, 4th April 2016. The Town Council will be discussing this matter at the March Council meeting (to be held on Monday, 7th March at 7.30 p.m. in the Andy Young Pavilion) with a view to preparing a collective response to the consultation. If you have any views that you would like the Town Council to consider, please come along to the meeting or send us your views via e-mail before Monday, 7th March (*Complexed Counce)*.

At the February Town Council meeting, Councillors decided to apply for litter picking equipment which has been made available by the South West Wiltshire Area Board for a community litter picking scheme. If there is anyone or any groups that would like to take part in a volunteer led litter picking event, hopefully during March or April, please contact the Town Clerk. Depending on how many volunteers come forward, we may be able to form groups of people who can work in certain areas of Mere, and the groups will need to decide on the date or dates they wish their event to take place.

Finally, for many, goats grazing on Castle Hill have not only been an attraction but a vital component of our programme under the Higher Level Stewardship scheme. Grazing animals mean responsibility and the Town Council has endeavoured to keep the goats confined to appropriate areas within the extensive fencing. Unfortunately, there have been times when the goats have "escaped", and it has been seen that 25 goats in a garden cause a lot of damage in a very short space of time. On most of these occasions it has been discovered that gates have been left open. Could I ask all

who use the hill to be conscientious about closing the gates securely and report any breaks in the fence to the Town Clerk.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES:

I recently attended a site meeting for the new Nadder Centre (Tisbury Campus). It is intended for use by the Mere area as well as Tisbury and is extremely impressive. It has a hall large enough in which to play a tennis match, with ample height and distance from the base line, and it has many rooms for delivering varied facilities. Tisbury is very lucky to have such an impressive facility on its doorstep.

Responsibility for fire and rescue policy has moved from the Department for Communities and Local Government to the Home Office. The Government has a manifesto commitment to deliver greater joint working between the police and fire service, and it recently consulted on proposals to enable Police and Crime Commissioners to take on greater responsibility for fire services at local level.

Would a fire engine be able to get to your house in an emergency? That's the question Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service is asking local people. A fire engine needs clearance of 10ft (3m) to pass safely. Anyone parking on the roadside is asked to park tightly to the kerb and to fold in their wing mirrors, plus basically to follow the Highway Code.

The Mere Town Council has agreed to contact the National House-Building Council, asking it to release what information it can regarding the assurance bond it is holding, to finally complete the roads and street lighting of the newer part of the Downside Close roads.

If anyone is intending locally to celebrate The Queen's 90th birthday, Wiltshire Council has prepared an excellent little publication "Your guide to organising a street party". This is downloadable from the web at http://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/comm-living-organise-street-party-guide.pdf.

I was pleased to hear at the last South West Area Board that Child Poverty has now reduced in Wiltshire

The Wiltshire Council Budget interest many as it will determine what non-domestic rate is paid. Funding from central government continues to reduce. This combined with the increased demand for some council services, particularly for vulnerable children and adults, and the cost of inflation, means that Wiltshire Council need to make savings of

£28 million. The council remains committed to investing in services aligned to its three priority areas to protect those who are most vulnerable, to boost the local economy by creating new jobs and safeguarding existing ones, and to support and empower communities to do more for themselves.

The Police are requesting the maximum amount of \pounds 3.12 increase for the year. Wiltshire Council is likely to increase its requirement by 1.9% plus a 2% levy now allowed by Government for care provision which also needs to fund pressures such as the introduction of the living wage. More redundancies are expected at Wiltshire Council. Please note your parish rate will be extra to that above.

I am requesting another finger post for the junction of Woodlands Road to East Swainsford, Mere. The present one has only the pole left standing.

RINGWAY Infrastructure Services Limited have been awarded a £15m per year highways maintenance contract by Wiltshire Council - months after they ended their previous contract when complaints were high. Coming into force from April, the new contract takes over from the previous one with Balfour Beatty Living Places which was terminated in September by mutual agreement two years ahead of schedule.

Ringway will now be responsible for the maintenance of roads, street lights and pavements, clearing drains, gritting roads and emergency repairs. The contract will run for five years, with a possible extension of a further two years.

It is proposed to develop two new Council bungalows in Bramley Hill, Mere. The preapplication process is now underway (i.e. collating comments from the Councils stakeholder teams, planning, highways, drainage etc).

Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group (WCCG) has awarded Wiltshire Health & Care the contract to provide adult community health services in Wiltshire for the next five years. Wiltshire Health & Care is a new organisation formed by Great Western Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, Salisbury NHS Foundation Trust and Royal United Hospitals Bath NHS Foundation Trust. The new contract is due to start in July 2016, and will mark the start of a period of change, where more care will be delivered closer to local communities. People will be supported to maintain their independence, and reliance on hospital services will be reduced.

As part of WCCG's five year plan to bring health care closer to home, the changes to adult community health services will ensure that the focus is very much on patient centred care with GP practices firmly at the heart of community provision. Delivered through integrated community teams across the county, Wiltshire Health & Care will support WCCG to meet the challenges of an ageing population and to enhance partner working. A new pilot service for an out-of-hours GP service for children has been launched with the aim of avoiding unnecessary A & E attendances. Parents of children aged 0-10 can now book a same day appointment to see a GP at the Salisbury Walk in

Health Centre, at Avon Walk, Salisbury, SP1 3SL. The extended service provides health advice and treatment for minor illnesses and injuries and provides parents with a local alternative to A&E when their child is ill and their surgery is closed. The pilot service, which is already helping to reduce some of the pressure seen at our A&E departments over the winter months, will run until the end of March 2016. It is available for children under the age of 10, between 6.00pm - 10.00pm Mon - Fri and between 4.00 pm - 8.00 pm at weekends.

Parents should ring 111 in the first instance. If necessary the call handler will either make an appointment directly with the centre or advise the parents to contact the walk in centre for a same day appointment (2:01722 331191)

At the South West Wiltshire Area Board, the LYN (Local Youth Network) Management Group met in December, and received two Interesting presentations from potential Grant applicants. Suzanne Maxwell offered a 'hands on' session to demonstrate the work of 'Anyone Can Cook', a Community Interest Company (CIC) already providing cooking courses across the south. The LYN were treated to tasty noodles along with the information, and supported funding for cooking and accredited Food Safety courses to be delivered to young people in Wilton, Tisbury, Mere and Broadchalke.

WILTSHIRE LOCAL TRANSPORT PLAN

Public Transport Strategy Review

Wiltshire Council is reviewing its Local Transport Plan (LTP) Public Transport Strategy and service delivery (Wiltshire Council supported bus services). The review is being undertaken because of growing pressures on the Council's budgets, which means funding is no longer available to continue delivering services at the level that was envisaged when LTP was published in 2011. The review of the Public Transport Strategy is part of a wider review of all areas of Wiltshire Council's passenger transport remit (except rail and taxis). The wider review will include re-examining policy and spending in home-to-school and college transport, Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), and social care client transport.

As a first stage in the review, a pre-consultation exercise was undertaken during July and August 2015 to provide key stakeholders and partners (e.g. town councils and bus operators) with an opportunity to shape the scope of the review.

We are now keen to hear the views of bus users, residents, stakeholders and other interested parties to help us shape a new Public Transport Strategy. No decisions have

POLICE NEWS



Armed Robbery at Willoughby Hedge

Two males entered the service station on Saturday 23rd January at 3.16am and demanded staff hand over money whilst brandishing a suspected shotgun. Staff handed over money and the men left on foot across the A303. A red VW Passat was recovered later on, at the top of Chaddenwick hill on the old drove road that leads to The

Deverills, it had been abandoned after being stuck in the mud. The vehicle was discovered to be on cloned plates and the vehicle was registered in Bristol.

We have had reports of a similar robbery at Nunney Catch services near Frome a couple of nights before. Enquiries are ongoing. The shop have taken precautions now and the shop doors are closed at night. Fuel is still available overnight, service is via the hatch.

Other Robberies

Gas canisters have been stolen from the burger van at Old Willoughby Hedge on the A303 overnight on two separate occasions recently. Have you seen persons overnight acting suspiciously in the lay-by? Call Wilts Police on 101 if you can assist.

A DFDS lorry had diesel worth £350 taken from it's fuel tank overnight whilst parked up overnight at the lay-by near to the Charnage turning on the A303. Again we are asking if anyone saw anything which may help us catch the offenders to please call us.

King Alfred's Tower car parks have again been targeted by thieves, this time at the main one near to the tower. This was near dusk, a female walker returned to hear her car alarm sounding and a male ran off, there were two vehicles parked in the road and both made off at speed. I have been in the car parks recently speaking to dog walkers reminding them of the danger of car thieves operating in this area. I put signs up warning people not to leave anything valuable in the car, but still see boxes etc. on display. Remember a thief will smash a window just to get a look inside what may be an empty box!! Don't hide valuables, thieves will watch and they know where you stash them. Be aware.

Mere Primary School

I have been in local schools this week talking to the new intake of children and telling them what we do and giving bits of advice. Showing them the police vehicle and explaining about how to keep safe. I have also been out on foot in Queens Road, near Mere Primary School after reports of some parents driving too fast up that road at drop off and pick up times. Any drivers who use this route, please drive at a respectful speed up to the social club car park. We don't want someone being knocked down!

Traffic Matters

This week I was at the scene of a 2 vehicle collision in the Semley area doing traffic control as the road was partially blocked. The Semley/Motcombe road is a minor road with lots of bends, and I was amazed at the amount of drivers who were still speeding along during the rush hour! Luckily the two vehicle head-on crash was minor injury only, but both vehicles were write offs Please think about your speed and expect there to be another vehicle just around the corner and slow down accordingly!

We had a report of a vehicle incident on the A303 at Mere where a vehicle overtook and seemed to deliberately brake so as to cause a collision, then sped off. Another driver witnessed this and called in to tell us what he had just seen. An independent witness is useful for us when we only have the drivers involved accounts, so thank you to the third party for reporting it on 101.

FR. LOUIS BEASLEY-SUFFOLK, PRIEST AT THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH OF ST MARY'S, WRITES:

Ever Closer Union

Within the next six or eighteen months, the Nation has the opportunity of voting whether we should stay in or out of Europe. The EU referendum debate seems always to have been in the background and one of the big questions is if we stay in Europe, are we going to lose more of our sovereignty which means are we going to have less control over our own future and be run by faceless bureaucrats in Europe. I suspect that that is one of the fears that many people have and when one considers that there are 28 nations in the European Union I suspect that such a fear is international.

There's a parallel with church unity.

I suspect that denominations are concerned over closer union because of the perception that heritage; the beliefs and the structures which one holds dear will be surrendered. That attitude is understandable because it's a fear of the unknown, a fear of surrendering fidelity. When one considers in small communities how well people know and trust each other, why is it that when the subject of faith enters the conversation there is a reticence to discuss it openly. Again, I suspect that it is because no-one would wish to cause offence over a personal choice of religion.

So let's look at the positive side. Church unity is a duty and you will recall that Jesus prayed that 'they may all be one'. As friendship and trust is based on love, surely it is possible that friendship and trust can just as easily be the basis of unity under the one God. Mutual respect of each other's denomination can so easily become part of friendship and trust which will avoid the need for unnecessary confrontation, and as we approach Easter, the core celebration of our Christian Faith, we have a glorious

opportunity to show our love for each other by taking part in celebrations which are non-confrontational.

May Holy Week give you this opportunity of being together under the Sign of the Cross, and recognising the dignity that is within all denominations.
