The Town Council meet every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You can raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be on Monday 3rd October 2016 at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion.

The Chairman writes:

The Goats on Castle Hill and Long Hill are there to keep the vegetation and scrub under control. Without them, as we all know, these areas would soon become overgrown and virtually impossible for people to walk along and enjoy. Sadly a goat was savagely attacked by a dog on Castle Hill and was left with horrendous injuries. I would like to remind dog owners who use this area to keep the dog under control and on a lead.

I have yet again received complaints about dog mess not being picked up in the Recreation ground and dogs running loose. I urge all dog owners who walk their dogs in this area to keep dogs under control and on a lead, and please, clean up after the dog. Could I also remind dog owners that dogs are not permitted in the Duchy Manor Grounds.

On 5th September, Shaftesbury Town Council called a public meeting at the Town Hall in order to discuss the future of Shaftesbury Hospital. Over 250 people attended, a large number of people could not attend because the hall was full to capacity. The Dorset Clinical Commissioning Group stated at the meeting that they are proposing that Shaftesbury Hospital would become a community hub hospital but would no longer have beds.

Gillingham Town Council called a meeting on the 15th September and invited Mr Simon Hoare MP and representatives of the local Parish and Town Councils. The aim of the meeting was to provide a collective response to the Dorset Clinical Commissioning Groups proposals. I represented Mere Town council at the meeting.

The extensive drainage work at the new cemetery has now been completed and the cemetery footpath has been extended. I would like to thank all the residents that live along Angel Lane for putting up with the disruption while the work was carried out.

WEST KNOYLE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on 13th September where it was reported that the Parish Council had been successful in its bid for grant funding to Wiltshire Council's South West Wiltshire Area Board. The grant will go towards providing a new set of swings and some benches in the play area. During the summer the Parish Council has been in communication with Euro Garages (the owners of Willoughby Hedge Service Station) regarding the need to keep the bollards alongside their loading bay area in order to stop vehicles from parking in there and obstructing visibility for cars coming out of the garage on the B3089. The garage staff has been cooperative in this matter. We also complained about the number of overfilled rubbish bins now out on display at the rear of the service station and have been assured that efforts will be made to tidy them up in some kind of compound. The Parish Council is appreciative of the efforts that Euro

Garages have made and hope that we can continue with this good line of communication.

We have urged Wiltshire Councillor George Jeans to put pressure on Wiltshire Council for New Close (the road leading from the village up to Willoughby Hedge) to go on the priority list for resurfacing. Cllr. Jeans informed us that Wiltshire Council will be deciding on the priority roads during the next couple of months and there will only be 5 roads chosen for the whole of the South West Wiltshire Area. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on **Tuesday 22nd November**.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, WRITES:

Mere carnival has now taken place again. It was a great afternoon and evening. The garden furniture in the square with people sat eating and drinking before and after the carnival on a nice September evening was great. One float, 'Just Georges' from near Sturminster Newton had a generator fire; luckily we had the fire brigade in the procession who came back to give assistance. I understand three people had slight burns but as Mere fire officers are first responders for first aid, they were able to assist.

It has come to my attention (Co-responders as they are known) have been recategorised with a view to reducing unnecessary call outs. I am not happy about this. I would guess their call outs have been reduced by some 70%. A recent example on Bank Holiday Monday was where an elderly lady fell off her bicycle in Ivymead in Mere. Neighbours rushed to help the elderly lady who was unconscious. Being uncertain whether or not she should be moved, the emergency services were called. It was 50 minutes before a First Response arrived in an ambulance car and a further 20 minutes before an ambulance attended. I feel that 50 minutes is not an acceptable time for an elderly lady to be lying in the middle of the road on a very hot day. I am further concerned that Mere Fire Brigade (being First Responders) were not called to this incident. Similar local incidents illustrate the change in policy. I feel sure that had Mere Fire Brigade been dispatched they would have been on site in less than 5 minutes.

On the 22nd August I attended Wendy Bailey's retirement from the Fire Service. Wendy was one of a few female retained fire fighters in Wiltshire.

Dog control orders and DPP orders (for prevention of crime by removal of alcohol) are being merged into one piece of legislation called a PSPO (Public Space Protection Order). Most, I am sure would agree, that a Wiltshire-wide PSPO for dog fouling would be acceptable, but a PSPO related to the drinking of alcohol in public places may be more problematic. With a PSPO in place a Police officer can remove alcohol in the morning before trouble may begin; this is not possible with the existing DPP. For carnivals, Fetes etc. some blanket wording is needed I would think. The police on carnival day need the powers of the PSPO in some areas, however those drinking wine etc. in a street organised French style cafe event as Mere has, may be told to stop if they are in a PSPO area. Much thought is required to prevent inadvertent banning.

Returning to dog fouling - Your Town Council are very aware of the problem. Over 20 piles of dog muck were found on one football pitch within the Memorial Recreation Ground and much along Burton path. I understand a video is required as evidence of a dog owner committing an offence in regard not cleaning up after their dog.

After Mere Carnival Bary Hansford was out early as usual, I was very pleased to see Mr Scarborough assisting cleaning the streets. Thanks to them and all for a great event.

The next area board meeting will be **Wednesday 5th October**.

The Doctors application to extend their surgery has been withdrawn after consultation with highways, planners etc. I do not know now if the expansion will be explored again in the near future.

Zeals are one of the six out of seven winners for a large grant to enable a reduced speed limit on Main Road from 40mph to 30mph. The funds have come from The Area Board "Substantive Highway Scheme" funding bid process.

I have attended a presentation from C G Fry regarding the development of the old Hill Brush factory site (Public consultation at **GB Weds 5th Oct**). Dwellings will start to be for sale in 2018. Some three storey houses are being removed from the proposal. 13 Social houses are being retained. Quality as in The Walnut development (Powndbury style) is being retained. A pond has already been made allowing the six months required to create a wild life habitat. I personally am happy that C G Fry are building the dwellings as originally envisaged. I pressed for an informative sign of no right turning on to Woodlands Road. The main arterial roads will be 5.5 metres wide as on the existing Walnut development. The proposed three story social housing flats have now been reduced to two storeys with the balance of social housing elsewhere on the development.

As said before if you visit a Wiltshire recycling centre with a van or large trailer with qualifying waste you will need to obtain a permit from Wiltshire Council which allows for a limited number of visits per year. Do find out before you attend what qualifies as household waste. I found out the hard way and was refused entry!

Wiltshire Council now has a 21yr old Councillor breaking the mould of us 'oldies' - a real plus.

Various meetings are being organized around Wiltshire regarding the Wiltshire Council budget for next year - Salisbury would be our nearest venue. Details can be obtained from me or from the Wiltshire Council web site.

Child Flu Vaccination

Children aged 2, 3 and 4 on 31 August 2016 (date of birth 01/09/2011 to 31/08/2014) are being offered routine vaccination for flu this year. The vaccination is given in the form of a nasal spray and separate clinic times for children have been set up. Please contact the surgery to make an appointment for your child if you would like them to be vaccinated.

Shingles Vaccination

Patients aged 70 on 31st August 2016 (date of birth 2/9/1945 to 1/09/1946) or aged 78 on 31st August 2016 (date of birth 02/09/1937 to 01/09/1938) should also be vaccinated against Shingles. Appointments can be booked through the surgery, please make an appointment at Reception. If you were recalled for a shingles vaccination last year but not yet had it, you can still attend for an appointment up until your 80th birthday. Patients outside of these age groups will be called for vaccination at a later date.

MenACWY Vaccination (only required if not previously vaccinated)

Patients aged 18 on 31/8/2016 (date of birth 01/9/1997 to 31/08/1998) and patients aged 19 years on the 31/8/2016 up to the age of 25 years on 31/3/2017 (date or birth 01/4/1991 to 31/8/1997). The National Citizen Service Graduation was a success with a number of parents and carers coming along to see the Team's presentation about what they had achieved over the summer. The young people also received their Graduation Certificates as well as certificates for all their other qualifications and achievements. Over 80 certificates were awarded! Well done everyone.

The late summer saw those young people who are engaged in gaining Leisure Credits, gravelling the footpath by the river in Mere as well as painting railings in Tisbury, and footpath clearance work in Semley. They were able to redeem their credits through reward opportunities. Some went to the cinema; others chose to take part in a camping and outdoor activity residential at Brokerswood Country Park. Another group went go-karting in Bristol. Leisure Credits work sessions continue throughout the autumn on alternate Saturdays as well as during the school holidays.

Young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities, or other additional needs, attend the 'Bridging Project' run at Mere Youth Centre on Tuesday evenings between 6:30pm – 9:00. The group have nearly completed their 3D arts project where they have created a large model fish which is going to be located at the new 'Nadder Centre' in Tisbury. We welcome new members to this group. Staff are happy to meet young people and their parents /carers before their first session if they would like this.

Those attending this project are supported by a small team of peer leaders who are taking part in the 'Young Leaders' programme.

The 'Young Leaders' and the 'Youth Committee' are now taking a greater part in carrying out a number of tasks and planning activities in support of the charity, the wider community, and their own personal development. One is the Junior Club whose next meeting will be on Wednesday 12th October when the main activities will be a variety of arts and crafts.

The young leaders are also taking part in training sessions and developing and updating social media for the charity. They are putting together some resources to raise awareness around appropriate and safe use of social media for younger children. They made a successful funding application themselves for this and have since got it up and running.

Our Healthy Living Project has restarted on Monday evenings and the group will be taking part in some outdoor activities whilst we have daylight on our side. After half term there will be 6 weeks of cooking workshops delivered by 'Anybody can cook'. STAR GAZING

New interactive maps offer most detailed ever picture of England's light pollution and dark skies.

The most detailed ever satellite maps of England's light pollution and dark skies, were recently released by the Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE). They show that 52% of Cranborne Chase AONB is in Band 1 – which is the darkest category.

The maps, produced using satellite images captured at 1:30am throughout September 2015, show that as well as having 52% of the AONB in the darkest category, 40% of the AONB is in the next darkest category. This makes the Cranborne Chase AONB one of the darkest places in England!

Benefits of dark night skies:

• People:

At its simplest, our sleep can be disrupted by too much light at night. At worst, it can lead to more serious health issues

• Wildlife:

Many birds and animals are affected by stray light at night, affecting their breeding cycles and feeding habits. Controlling stray light helps bats, birds, moths and other nocturnal creatures to thrive

• Enjoyment and education:

There is increasing interest, wonder and amazement at the incredible array of stars above us. Stargazing is a fabulous educational activity

• Money:

Substantial savings can be made by Local Authorities, businesses and individuals from turning off or dimming down unnecessary lighting

• Saving energy:

There is no point shining light into the sky. Energy wastage can be considerably reduced by ensuring light is directed only where it is needed

• Rural tourism:

Areas designated for their dark skies have seen greater visitor numbers, even in winter, leading to increased business for B&Bs, retailers, and caterers

• AONB: 50% of the AONB is above us! Dark night skies are definitely outstanding, historic, natural and beautiful, and should be conserved and enhanced along with the rest of the AONB.

FINAL REFLECTIONS FROM THE METHODIST MINISTER

Dear Friends,

This is the final article I shall write for Mere Matters.

The Methodist Church in Mere will close at the end of the month – the final service in the building will take place on **Sunday 23rd October**, **6:00pm** (please see notice elsewhere for details...). At that final act of worship we shall give thanks for the life of the Methodist people who have lived and served in the town and we shall ask for God's blessing on the remaining faith communities based in Mere.

In recent weeks, as the news of the closure has circulated, several people have commented with sadness, saying it is such as shame that things have to change. The themes of change and constancy have certainly been in my thoughts recently – change, because of all that is going on in the life of our church and constancy because of those enduring qualities of faith that give assurance and peace.

Change is something we must all live with – change is essential to life itself. Our bodies are in a constant state of change – old cells are dying and new ones are being created to replace them. In a physical sense, I am (literally) not the person I was a year ago! As Christians we also hold at the heart of our faith the idea of change or 'conversion' – the idea that individuals can, and indeed must, be changed from what was into what can be. This process of change that we call 'conversion' or being 'born again' is, or should be, an on-going journey as we grow in the likeness of Jesus – our constant desire is to die to what has been (our former, sinful attitudes and actions) and rise to New Life with Christ – caring, serving, working for justice and peace for his sake.

The great sadness of many church communities is that they resist change and mistake that for tradition – and I am sure that the Methodist church (locally and nationally) has been guilty of that! At its best, 'tradition' allows us to see where we have come from and therefore how to become the best individual/community that God wishes us to be in the future. Tradition reminds us of the constant and enduring qualities that can be relied upon – the constancy of God's love and the perpetual availability of the Holy Spirit to inspire and equip us in our living and our dying.

As we embrace change at this time, we also hold to the promises of God who in Jesus is, 'making all things new' (Rev 21. 5) and trust that God's faithfulness will enable us to respond to the new opportunities that will come our way. Constancy and change are seldom easy, but they are the essential givens of faith....
