The Town Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion **at 7.30pm on Monday, 5th September 2016**.

The Chairman writes:

I am pleased to report that the amended Traffic management and modifications to the yellow lines in Mere has finally been approved by Wiltshire Council. Although a date for the work to be carried out is not known, the works order has been passed to the contractors to programme it into their schedule.

In July I was invited to the Mere Youth Football Club award ceremony and presented the young football players with their well-deserved medals and trophies. Youth football in Mere is thriving. I would like to commend the youth football club committee coaches and volunteers for giving so many young people a chance to play and enjoy football.

The Town Council ground staff are very busy keeping the grass and hedges cut back and the weeds under control. The Town Clerk and I have been inspecting the grounds that Mere Town Council is responsible for to see how we can do more to improve and tidy the areas. I would like to ask that the owners of properties with hedges adjacent to footpaths, pavements and the highway keep them trimmed back.

On Sunday, 10th April the Town Council ran a volunteer-led litter picking event which proved very successful. I was asked by the Volunteers if another litter picking event could be organised for September. If there is anyone or any groups who would like to take part in the September volunteer litter picking event, please contact the Town Clerk. The event will held on a Sunday morning starting at 10.00am and finishing at 12.00 noon. All equipment will be supplied.

We have been notified by Wiltshire Council that from 5th September 2016 all Wiltshire residents who wish to access the Wiltshire Household Recycling Centres in a van or with a large or medium-sized trailer will be required to present a permit at each visit. This free permit entitles each household to a maximum of 12 visits a year. Cars, 4X4s and trailers smaller than 1.8 metres long will not need a permit to visit the sites. These vehicles make up the vast majority of those used by visitors to the sites.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

July and August being the main holiday months, the Council slows down. Regular functions such as development planning and licencing still have to take place. Over the summer months several listed building applications have come to The Southern Area planning committee. These are decided very much on their merits; we allowed a sizable out-of-sight modern extension on one application for one reason to make the building more useable. On another application, although plastic windows on a rare occasion are allowed, we decided not this time.

A documented history of Mere Literary Festival has been requested, the festival now being a significant event in Mere once a year. The project to produce a book illustrating the history of Mere Literary Festival which, as well as raising funds for the local Link Scheme, has contributed to the cultural life of the community over two decades. Just 100 books will be published initially and these will be put on sale and any profit will be given to support the Mere and District Link scheme, which is the main focus of any profit of the Mere Literary Festival. Initially the plan is to launch the book on Sunday, 16th October at the awards ceremony. The Committee will be negotiating with both the library service and museum to promote the book. The South West Area Board on the 27th July kindly awarded a grant to help develop the project.

An area board grant has been given also to 'Our Time Project'. This project to deliver a series of inspiring creative and physically motivating theatre and movement workshops with the elderly communities in rural South West Wilts working around the SENSES, combating loneliness and encouraging group sharing through movement and simple improvisation. Our Time Project Company has particular expertise in working with those with dementia, very frail elders and those who have suffered strokes being highly qualified in mime and theatre. The project will work with Bramley House, Mere; Five Courts, Mere, and others in the area. By working with homes, which are committed and have voiced a need, is sensitively complimenting the output in Wiltshire. These are homes which are not part of the sheltered scheme.

Mere pre-school and nursery requested a grant for improvements and was awarded a grant for updating the pre-schools interior, replacing old and dated furniture, replacing existing areas with more appropriate child friendly equipment and making improvements to the general setting. The applicant reports that, as a charity, it works hard to maintain the pre-school and would like the opportunity for this project to be supported in order to improve the setting for future generations.

Help with the Firework Spectacular that Mere put on in June was received from a previous area board grant; we even had people from Tisbury attend. The two central pubs were full to overflowing. The other two, one club and one pub held their normal trade. Eight plus other functions in the area over the two days, helped as a catalyst.

The weather was just right, but we had to delay the display for two minutes when Russia scored in the last minutes of a thrilling game in the European Football Championships. 36 business and private persons finally gave to the Firework fund and 17 marshals came forward including two from the local youth, thanks to the efforts of Jaki Farrell, Service Manager at Seeds4Success, plus Mr and Mrs Collard, who gave £100 for another flag on the hill.

Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue gave a written report to the Area Board. Up to 20th July, the service attended four road traffic accidents (RTC) on the A303, which involved cutting people out of cars. For the Mere area in June, as an example of activity, the service attended two false alarms, one fire, five other calls and 3 special services.

The next area board meeting will be Wednesday, 5th October 2016.

A traffic management scheme for Mere, which includes extra yellow lines, has finally been approved by Wiltshire Council, but I still do not have a date for when the work will be done. To help the flow of traffic in Salisbury Street, I have managed to help secure traffic cones, which seem to have been well received.

We now have three working SIDs (Speed Indicator Devices). However, please note that they are only switched on for a short time, otherwise they lose their effectiveness. West Knoyle, Mere and Hindon have SIDs at present; one will shortly be moved to Zeals.

The South West Area Board has provided a grant for Seeds4Success to purchase and operate minibuses along with Zeals Youth Trust; this has worked well in the summer for the youth. I have taken a group from Lynch Close out in one of the minibuses on a trip to Stourton and Compton Abbas Airfield, which they all enjoyed as the weather was sunny.

I have said before, we have been fortunate to be offered an increased medical facility in Mere, which is at an advanced stage and now seeking planning permission. The proposal does impact on local parking and I hope the local area will be able to benefit from this enhanced facility, after the concerns have been addressed. I have suggested available land where all the surgery staff could park except the doctors themselves, thereby the

increased footprint of the proposed building should not impact on parking as much, which may address the concerns of many regarding restricted parking, including those who live at a distance from the surgery, including Zeals, Kilmington, West Knoyle and Stourton.

If you visit a Wiltshire recycling centre in future with a van or large trailer with qualifying waste, you will need obtain a permit from Wiltshire Council, which allows for a limited number of visits per year.

My family and forbears have been in Mere for 100 years this year. I see in an old poster for the 18th and 19th October 1916, the "Moonrakers" put on a Programme of Entertainment at The Victoria Hall, Mere, but before anyone enquires, I did not attend!

As a final thought I have learned that a robot, known as Amelia, is to be employed by Enfield Council in London for public services. The artificial intelligence programme will enable the robot to participate in thousands of conversations at once and answer in a human way, and will be used to help residents find information online and fill in forms, guiding users through a chat feature on their computer screen. Any questions Amelia cannot answer will be referred to a human colleague!

The programme, designed by American company IPSoft, has never been used in the British public sector before. It is said to be 60% cheaper than using a human worker, although the council has not divulged how much has been paid for the software.



BUILDING BRIDGES

Community First, Wiltshire's Rural Community Council, has been successful in leading a partnership, Building Bridges, which has secured £3.9million funding, to help those facing the largest challenges in accessing skills development, training and employment in Swindon and Wiltshire.

The Building Bridges partnership involves 41 organisations from the voluntary, statutory and private sector that have come together to help support those most in need. The £3.9m local funding is part of the Building Better Opportunities (BBO) programme, which is jointly funded by the Big Lottery Fund and the European Social Fund.

The focus is on supporting those furthest from the labour market in accessing the skills development, education and experience they need to be able to achieve and sustain ongoing employment. The programme will work with each person to develop an individual plan to support their aspirations, to be delivered at a pace which suits their needs.

It will run from September 2016 to December 2019 and aims to support 1,827 people, with at least 29% of those moving into education or training, and 21% moving into employment. The target group for the programme will be those who are unemployed or economically

inactive and facing multiple, complex challenges, and will be centred around five core delivery groups:

- Learning Difficulties and Disabilities
- Over 50s Unemployed
- Vulnerable Women (including Domestic Abuse)
- Young People not in employment, education or training (NEET) reduction
- Workless Households and Families

There will also be additional support in a number of key areas, including mental health and wellbeing, volunteering, sponsored employment opportunities, debt and financial advice, financial training, transport, in-work support, employer liaison and childcare advice. In order to fully support participants, a series of programmes and courses will be made available, and help will be tailored to peoples' needs.

Building Bridges aims to give those people the tools they need to be resilient in the work place, ensure they have the skills and qualifications that employers are looking for and address the practical things which are barriers to successfully entering employment, such as lack of transport and self-confidence. As a result, the programme will be working closely with employers in the regions and also other agencies who can help to support people as they make progress.

Community First has brought together an extraordinary partnership of local organisations, including some of the county's major employers, local VCS organisations, learning providers and public bodies, to develop this programme – each dedicated to making a difference in their own way. Working alongside such competent, diverse and capable partners will enable the organisations to effectively tackle these issues more collaboratively.

With the aim of strengthening communities, encouraging enterprise and tackling the disadvantaged across Wiltshire, it provides technical advice, practical support and grant aid to promote local initiatives. NEW RECYCLING CENTRE PERMITS

Do you take rubbish to a Witshire Recycling centre in a van or trailer? If you do, you need to read on, as from Monday, 5th September, Wiltshire residents wishing to take their waste

to any of Wiltshire's household recycling centres (HRCs) in a van or large trailer will have to show a permit – available for free from the council.

The scheme means anyone using the sites to dispose of their household waste in a van, large trailer (between 1.8 and 3 metres long), pick-up truck or similar will need a permit. The permits will allow a maximum of 12 visits per year, and Wiltshire residents can apply for one online at any time.

Anyone using the sites in a car or with a small trailer under 1.8 meters will not need a permit.

Toby Sturgis, cabinet member for waste and recycling, said: "We know our HRCs continue to be very popular and these permits will help reduce the traffic queuing, whilst ensuring anyone using commercial vehicles to dispose of their own household waste at our HRCs, can continue to use the sites."

Seasonal Vaccinations

Adult Flu Vaccination Clinic to be held on Saturday, 8th October 2016 9 00am to 1.00pm

Flu vaccination is recommended for the following patients:-

Patients aged 65 and over Carers Pregnant women (at any stage of pregnancy)

Patients aged 6m – 64 years at risk including the following conditions:-

Diabetes

Asthma (if you are using a steroid inhaler as well as Ventolin or Salbutamol)

Chronic Respiratory Disease

Chronic Heart Disease

Chronic Liver Disease

Chronic Kidney Disease

Chronic Neurological Disease

Patients with a low immunity

Morbid Obesity (adults with a BMI more than or equal to 40kg/m²)

If you are unsure if you fall into one of these risk categories or not please check at the surgery.

Child Flu Vaccination

Children aged 2,3 and 4 on 31 August 2016 (date of birth 01/09/2011 to 31/08/2014) are being offered routine vaccination for flu this year. The vaccination is given in the form of a nasal spray and separate clinic times for children have been set up. Please contact the surgery to make an appointment for your child if you would like them to be vaccinated.

Shingles Vaccination

Patients aged 70 on 31st August 2016 (date of birth 2/9/1945 to 1/09/1946) or aged 78 on 31st August 2016 (date of birth 02/09/1937 to 01/09/1938) should also be vaccinated against Shingles. Appointments can be booked through the surgery, please make an appointment at Reception. If you were recalled for a shingles vaccination last year but

have not yet had it, you can still attend for an appointment up until your 80th birthday. Patients outside of these age groups will be called for vaccination at a later date.

MenACWY Vaccination (only required if not previously vaccinated)

Patients aged 18 on 31/8/2016 (date of birth 01/9/1997 to 31/08/1998) and patients aged 19 years on the 31/8/2016 up to the age of 25 years on 31/3/2017 (date or birth 01/4/1991 to 31/8/1997). Vaccinations are recommended for any patient within one of these age groups, please contact Reception for an appointment.

As you may now be aware, Under the Pensions Act 2008, every Employer in the UK will be required to put certain staff into a pension scheme and contribute towards it. This is called 'Automatic Enrolment'.

The Chamber has arranged for a Guest Speaker from Work Place Advice Group to come along and speak to local businesses on What Pensions Auto Enrolment means; how to comply; and some of the costs involved.

The date for the presentation is Wednesday, 28th September 2016 at 7.00 pm at The Grove Building in Mere. Please take this opportunity to come along and find out more about what this will mean for your business.

Safe Places

As part of our activities to support the community, we shall be arranging a meeting to bring together as many organisations as possible who are concerned with people who may become confused, upset, or are vulnerable. A scheme is being introduced in Wiltshire to develop a number of "Safe Places" in communities. This has been piloted successfully in Salisbury and Devizes and is now being rolled out throughout the County. Funding has been received from Wiltshire Police and Crime commissioner. The intention is that Safe Place stickers will be placed prominently in the window of any business or service which agrees to take on this role. A confused person will be able to recognize the symbol and know they can be safe and receive assistance to return to their own home or relations. A plastic card will be available for people who have this disability. This will have their name and the contact details of a responsible person and any other information which will help to keep them safe. Details will be published later.

This year we managed to increase the attendance by nearly 30%. Unfortunately your local councillor was verbally abused by a couple of male drivers who were obviously a legacy of the 1992 Child Act. Perhaps they did not understand that with Yapp's Tasting Day on the Saturday, the preponderance of traffic in Salisbury Street generated by 500 visitors to Mere enjoying either this function, or our exhibition meant car parking was at a premium. The solution appears to indicate that traffic lights affording a switching single directional use are needed in Salisbury Street if the town continues to hold these events.

As the business argument that the Railway Modellers presented to the then Parish Council stated that we would endeavour to promote a railway exhibition which could attract up to a 1,000 visitors, it is maybe time for the Town Councillors to consider alternative parking arrangements for visitors, as even with double yellow lines installed, we have had permission and guidance from Salisbury to the effect that we can off-load all items required to run this show at all times.

For Railway Enthusiasts we hope to run a day of visits to PENDON and DIDCOT RAILWAY CENTRE on Monday, 10th October, starting from Mere at 8.00am. This outing is open to the community and should we achieve suitable numbers a coach will be hired.

SEEDS4SUCCESS

Activities of our local youth charity

Not all young people spend their summer holiday peering at their smartphones and tablets!

Fourteen of them on our National Citizens Service (NCS) team, as well as an additional young person as a peer leader, have been busy on a Social Action Project. The team spent five days in Pembrokeshire on a Team Building Residential course, followed by a second residential spell based in Wiltshire taking part in various skill development and training courses. Participants have gained a Level 2 Certificate in Food Safety, and qualified in First Aid and sports leadership (Go Lead). They are currently working towards further Leadership and Volunteering Awards.

For their Social Action Project they have been running a Junior Leisure Credits project. This involved them organising a work day for children aged 9-12 where they cleared weeds from around the Church in Mere, and pulled out Ragwort on Mere Down. In return for their efforts the juniors are attending an Outdoor Activities day at Brokerswood Country Park. The NCS team have organised and will be leading this (with qualified support from staff from Wiltshire Outdoor Learning Team – WOLT). They have also done a day's volunteering at an old people's home talking to residents and playing games with them as well as spending a further day working with Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, pulling Himalayan Balsam from the banks of the River Nadder. Their Graduation event will have taken place at Mere Youth Centre, unfortunately, by the time you read this, but we hope that friends and supporters will have been there to acknowledge the efforts of these young people.

The Leisure Credits group are only in their second week but have already supported activities at Hindon Flower Show and cleared some footpaths in Wilton. They have also worked with Wiltshire Council's Rights of Way team to clear brambles, nettles and overhanging branches from footpaths on the far side of the river in Mere along Burton Path. Digging out a path so that gravel can be laid down to make a circular accessible route involved some energetic work!

A footpath at West Knoyle, which turns into a bog for most of the year, has been cleared and a drainage pipe installed, which it is hoped will eliminate flooding in future.

With a little direction and encouragement, it shows that a whole series of worthwhile projects can be undertaken by young people, while learning new skills and how to cooperatively make a difference to their local environment - and more projects are still to come in the rest of the summer!

Once again, our thanks are due to all the trustees, staff volunteers, and members of the local community. Without their dedication and the enthusiasm of the young people involved, very little of this would be possible. If you have a specific skill or area of expertise

that you feel you could offer, or just want to help by supporting the committee, or even becoming a trustee, we would love to hear from you.

September is a month of thanksgiving. Maybe you are just grateful that your children have gone back to school after the long summer holiday, or perhaps you are looking back on a special trip away or time spent catching up with friends and families.

September is also the beginning of the Harvest Festival season, when we thank God for all God's gifts to us. We may no longer take produce such as apples, marrows or carrots to school or church but we offer non-perishable goods to our local Foodbank in a gesture of solidarity to those who are struggling to feed their families.

We are fortunate here in Mere that we are surrounded by farmland and our church services still reflect this.
