MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meet every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You can raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be on **Monday**, **3rd April at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion**.

The Chairman writes:

Last month I chaired the Annual Parish Carnival meeting. I would like to thank the Carnival Committee members, and their helpers, for all the hard work they put in to produce a successful carnival week in Mere. I had no idea that the cost of putting on the evening carnival procession is just under £3,000. Raising funds to support Mere carnival is a challenge in itself. To keep this tradition alive, what is needed is more carnival committee members and helpers. If you would like to get involved please contact the Carnival Committee or the Town Council clerk.

The 130 house planning application in Castle Street dominated the February Town Council meeting. The Town Council voted by majority not to support this planning application. The Town Council was asked at short notice to consider a revised planning application at the same site at the March Town Council Meeting.

The revised planning application included plans for a new Doctors Surgery. After careful deliberation the Town Council voted by a majority not to support this revised planning application. Whilst the inclusion of a new GP Surgery would undoubtedly relieve some of the pressure from the existing service provider, members did not feel that this would outweigh the pressure that 130 new houses in Mere would put on other services and infrastructure around the town, and did not consider it enough of an advantage to compensate for the unnecessary development of a greenfield site.

Wiltshire Council is conducting a consultation on Wiltshire housing allocations policy. The way the Council and housing providers in Wiltshire Council's area operate, the housing list is heavily influenced by legislation and following the

Localism Act 2011. The current policy has now been in place for 2 years. Wiltshire Council is conducting a review to make the policy more efficient and make amendments based on feedback being received. For those interested, please visit the Wiltshire council consultation portal and participate by completing the online survey.

The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Wednesday, 26th April 2017 in the Grove Building, Mere at 7.30 p.m. Refreshments will be available from 7.00pm. This is your

opportunity to find out what is going on in and around Mere, hear reports from various groups and organisations, and put your point of view forward.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, WRITES:

As I "pen" this information, Dame Vera Lynn is 100 years old today. Many more of us will see our 100th birthday, compared to those of past generations. This leads me onto the fact that our Area Board should receive their share of the £150K for pavement repair and creation, which was voted for at Wiltshire Council's full meeting recently. This may be less than £10K for our Area Board. This money will be to target small local schemes where repair is needed to improve the quality of lives. The methodology for allocation will be discussed at a scrutiny meeting to ensure the most appropriate method is applied to make certain there is equity across the county.

I have asked our Community Engagement Manager if, on a future agenda, we can look at the cost of the liquid type surface I have seen spread by a large blade. A mobile walking frame only needs about a 10mm ridge to throw a person over, which I found when a local resident demonstrated the problem to me. There are now many of these telescopic mobile walking frames about. A low cost self-levelling surface, although not deep, would smooth out the surface, making it friendly to these frames.

Local authorities are seeking to increase funds; Luton Council could introduce street nameplates that carry advertising as part of a plan to raise £450,000 from advertising and sponsorship deals over the next five years. At present, apart from getting an existing street name plate reaffixed, there appears no money forthcoming from Wiltshire Council for replacements. It would seem this is a cost that will fall on local parish councils.

Several councils including Wiltshire, with low levels of school funding, have written to the Prime Minister to warn of their "alarm" at inadequate school funding in England. The joint letter - from representatives of councils including Buckinghamshire, Dorset, Devon, Hampshire, Leicestershire, West Sussex and Wiltshire - says: "We are struggling to understand where more cuts can be made

in the lowest funded authorities. We are extremely concerned that the government is in danger of replacing one injustice with another." The councils say all schools need a guaranteed basic level of funding to cover essential costs such as staffing. Separately, too much money is being paid for the land and buildings needed for new government-funded free schools, the Public Accounts Committee has said.

I get many complaints regarding dog fouling, including those who collect and then dump the bag. I have had one resident volunteer to empty a dog bin if fitted. A women in Stoke on Trent who failed to clear the dog mess in her garden has been told to pay £860 after ignoring an order from the City Council to remove dozens of piles of poo, which it described as an "environmental crime".

The residential development of the old Hill Brush site has started with the demolition and site clearance phase, as I stated last month. In the method statement, the Developer has offered to meet with the local community to address possible future concerns. All large demolition lorries at present are being sent along Shaftesbury Road then to Gillingham, then if required to reach the A303 to travel back along the B3092 to Mere. This appears to be working well. Those living in the access and egress roads for construction traffic obviously want due consideration. I am told the following points will be addressed. Pettridge Lane and Shaftesbury Road traffic need to be assured of minimum disruption; Woodlands Road needs a sign saying "no large construction traffic beyond the site towards Gillingham" and the top of The Lynch requires a sign for those who have mistakenly come along Water Street to indicate the road is impassable for large Lorries.

As said last month, our area now has a South West Community Safety Partnership. I attended such a meeting recently at The Nadder Centre in Tisbury. There were presentations by Police and The National Farmers Union. I was made aware the Wiltshire population is close to 700,000 and over 200,000 live in Swindon, hence why Swindon has a need for a sizeable proportion of Wiltshire's Police Force. 20 special constables with power to arrest are being recruited as a specialist rural group. Hare Coarsing is a big problem: the dogs used are worth a lot of money and around £30,000 can change hands in bets in one night. Those involved damage fences, crops and 'eye up' that which could be taken, such as ATV's (quad bikes, etc). If approached, these people can be dangerous, and come from far afield such as Merseyside, East Anglia and South Wales. 485 incidents were reported in Wiltshire last year and there probably are more. At the Area Board, it was acknowledged dialling 101 could take more

time than the caller would wish, however it was acknowledged when dialling 999 for connection to the fire brigade, the average time was 7 seconds. The National Farmers Union reminded us that we produce 60% of our food; our landscape is not only a beautiful landscape but a productive landscape.

The South West employ directly, or indirectly, 10% of employed people in agriculture. Fly tipping, which we suffer from in this area can be unkind to Farmers. Also, if waste is dumped on their land, the farmer has to pay to remove it and if asbestos and other such materials are involved, this can be expensive. I was informed that one farmer recently had been prosecuted because what had been dumped on his land, he moved onto the verge, and he was found guilty of fly tipping of waste which was fly tipped originally by others.

The South West Area Board has provided £500 to each parished area which applied to refresh some white road markings in its area. Several Parish Councils have agreed to add to this amount, and in some areas such as Stourton, third party money has been added. The National Trust has contributed because its car park entrance is part of the scheme. In Mere, the Duchy Grounds, which includes the school entrance, will have its junction white lines off Springfield Road, to the site refreshed.

As I said last month a planning application has been received by Wiltshire Council for around 130 dwellings at the west end of Mere. This application has now been resubmitted with the addition of a Doctors Surgery. It is worth noting that the application is outside the development boundary or the built environment.



FARMLAND CONSERVATION PROJECT IN THE FRAME FOR AWARDS 'OSCAR'

THE South Wiltshire Farmland Conservation Project, an initiative aimed at improving bird and wildlife numbers and habitat on farmland in a 450 square mile area in and around the Cranborne Chase AONB, is one of three projects shortlisted for the Wiltshire Life Awards 2017. Listed in the category 'Conservation Project of the Year', the scheme has been running for two years and is a spin-off of the area's original South Wiltshire Farmland Bird Project.

Led by Farm Conservation Advisor Tracy Adams, the new project is still seeking to enhance the habitat and foraging areas of vulnerable birds, namely the corn bunting, lapwing, grey partridge, yellow wagtail, turtle dove and tree sparrow, and consequently boost their numbers, but its remit has widened to additionally include wildlife, as well as protecting soil and water.

"We were already working closely with around 150 farmers, advising them on managing their farms for food production side by side with the six bird species," said Tracy. "We had good relations with them and wanted to capitalise on that, and funding from Wessex Water's Partners Programme allowed us to broaden our environmental remit."

The basic concept behind the South Wiltshire Farmland Conservation Project is to bring together groups of farmers, or 'clusters', to work together on improving soil, water and biodiversity, as well as submitting wildlife records, so that a better picture of the biodiversity of the area can be constructed. Beneficiaries of the scheme are set to include rare butterflies, including the marsh fritillary, as well as the 19 species of bumble bee.

"We are looking to join up and fill in the gaps of foraging habitats," Tracy explained. "So, for example, by improving the network of nectar producing plants we are hoping to safeguard bumble bee species and increase their numbers."

"This is an exciting project that's all about bringing together groups of farmers and changing attitudes," continued Tracy. "A number of the farmers we work with are already participating in government funded agri-environment schemes, but our new cluster approach is the proverbial icing on the cake".

The cluster concept of environmental management was first trialled in 2012 by the farmer-led Marlborough Downs Nature Improvement Area. It was then piloted nationally by the Game & Wildlife Conservation Trust (GWCT) in partnership with Natural England. It involves a group of farmers coming together to devise their own targets and record the progress of wildlife on a landscape, rather than a single-farm scale.

Protecting Your Belongings.....

This last month saw a slowdown in break-ins to sheds and non dwelling breaks. This is no reason to become complacent though. We suggest that you need a shed alarm fitted if you are storing valuable items in outhouses. Thieves are generally looking for hedge

trimmers, lawn mowers, electric drills and chain saws. You can get alarms quite cheaply, battery operated and even solar powered ones! If you value your valuables, get one fitted.

If you live in a remote location, why not fit a spotlight that will come on when someone approaches. If you are thinking of planting a hedge, consider a thorny plant. It's called defensive planting. And now that most people have a smart phone, take pictures of your tools and keep them safe, so that if they get stolen, we have more chance of getting them back to you! Remember to include any marks or serial numbers in the photos.

Would You Spot a Cannabis Factory?

After the recent 'find' of a cannabis factory in Chilmark area, some locals have asked how would we know if there was one in our locality. The one at Chilmark in a bunker was massive, but most of the ones we find are in a rented house. Signs to look out for are.

- 1. Rent paid for in cash.
- 2. Person renting not living there, but lots of coming and going with vehicles and equipment being moved in, mostly at night.
- 3. Windows blanked off, sometimes curtains taped to the frames.
- 4. Neighbours adjacent to the building would hear a constant whining noise from fans needed for venting going day and night,
- 5. Cannabis production gives off a pungent smell it is different to the smell of smoking it. You may get a smell of it when walking past.
- 6. Lamps growing the plants give off lots of heat, if it is snowing the roof would thaw

out quicker than others.

7. A massive upsurge in electricity usage.

If you suspect something like this may be happening in your neighbourhood, call Wilts Police on 101. Or as I found out in Trowbridge when I was out on patrol a few years ago, they can forget to close the door and I could walk in and find the whole upstairs used as a cannabis factory! Perhaps they had been using the stuff themselves and it clouded their minds!!

Tourism

MERE FILM SHOWS

Our film for April, on Thursday, 20th, is the spy drama 'Allied' starring Brad Pitt and Marion Cotillard. In 1942 Max Vatan (Pitt), a Royal Canadian Air Force Paratrooper, is parachuted into French Morocco to meet Parisienne Marianne Beausejour, (Cotillard) a skilful member of the French Resistance.
