MERE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion **at 7.30pm on Monday, 4th December 2017.**

The Chairman writes:

I am writing this a long time before Christmas and New Year, but I will start by wishing everyone in Mere and nearby a happy holiday season. I know that a good few public events are planned (just look in the rest of Mere Matters) and I hope that you, one and all, can participate in at least some of them.

The town council had an additional October meeting to consider what we would wish to do with the Car Parks and Public Toilets. There was a good representation of people at the meeting and considerable discussion. We resolved to negotiate with Wiltshire Council to have these assets transferred to us or, failing that, to lease them again. We also resolved to make appropriate improvements to the toilets and to not charge for their use nor for car parking. We hope to find a way to prevent car parks being used for

Before the meeting, I went door knocking to find out what residents thought and the opinions were many and varied. If you have opinions or suggestions then do let me, or other councillors, know what they are.

When discussing the car parks and toilets the word 'free' came up quite often. Several of us pointed out that these facilities are not free and have to be paid for out of the precept or by sponsorship. In November a committee of councillors will be meeting to look at the budget for next year. This is a difficult meeting where we try to balance the cost of what we feel Mere wants and needs, against the cost of providing those things. We also have to build into the budget contingency funding in case emergencies arise. By the New Year, the full council will have agreed the precept to be made on Wiltshire Council for the 2018/19 financial year. All the Minutes will be available for public inspection on the Mere website.

Yesterday I had the privilege to place Mere Town Council Wreath at the War Memorial, and at our last meeting we resolved to mark next year's WWI centenary by planting an Oak Tree. We will also be joining in a larger Wiltshire Scheme of planting, putting trees in several other public spaces.

Another centenary comes to mind – our clock tower will be 150 years old next year and plans are being made to celebrate it. Our recent expenditure on the clock itself meant that it rang out 11 beats precisely at 11.00am at the Remembrance Ceremony.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION WRITES:

Councils are increasingly short of funds. Wiltshire Council has fortunately not found itself as Northamptonshire County Council, whose workers have been told they must take a day's unpaid leave as part of the council's plans to save £2m a month before the end of the financial year.

A planning application in Kilmington for 5 shepherd's huts for tourist use has been very controversial, probably more so than many other larger applications in my division. The problem of alternative uses for agricultural land can often be challenging, especially when many villages are losing their local services, housing development boundaries etc., becoming little more than dormitories. Whatever the outcome I have found it is true you can never get a hundred percent agreement.

The loss of services is not just confined to rural areas, new figures have revealed that almost 1,000 shops have disappeared in five years from 12 towns nationally that were awarded Government funding through the "Portas Pilot" scheme to get consumers spending in their local area. The towns were given access to the expertise of retail guru Mary Portas, but she was critical of the scheme, saying it was a "weighted PR campaign" that hadn't kick-started growth.

Broadband is often not good in the rural environment, which is also true of mobile signals. With the finance Wiltshire has injected and grants received, which has helped many with little or no broadband in the non-commercial areas or 'intervention areas' as Wiltshire Council call them, plus the roll out of commercial areas, within a reasonable time, 96% of Wiltshire will have access to workable broadband. It is also notable Wiltshire Council have come in under budget so far for this project, which in my opinion is unusual for public projects.

I would like to say thank you to an ex-resident of Mere who was visiting, found a wallet by Castle Hill, visited the owner's present and previous address plus the Local Police Station, but finding no one at home came to me. I took the wallet in and returned it to its owner. There are some very thoughtful and honest people living in this area.

For the benefit of Kilmington, Stourton with Gasper and Zeals, Wessex Water is visiting the Mere area giving free visits to repair leaky taps etc. Therefore subject to positive ID you may choose to let them in.

I attended The Wiltshire Assembly, which is a forum that discusses current issues of many public bodies; on this occasion mostly discussed was regarding the Army rebasing. Those coming back from Germany are being rebased in Wiltshire; one quarter of the British army will then be based in Wiltshire. The process has started and soon 4,000 troops and 3,200 family members will be rebased around Salisbury Plain. Apparently The Army have permission for more dwellings than they intend building, which was considered unfortunate by some, as we all know there is a housing shortage. An expansion to Porton Down has brought investment to Wiltshire, which will start opening after Christmas.

A Local Plan consultation is now taking place, the number of future dwellings etc. to be considered. One option being considered regarding Wiltshire Council's development planning department is, three areas, these being Swindon, Chippenham and Salisbury. This would require a partnership between Wiltshire Council and Swindon.

Wiltshire needs affordable homes. Suitable sites with good infrastructure is what the plan will try and achieve. Some councillors present at the briefing suggested perhaps four new small settlements within Wiltshire, with the roads, schools etc. all developed together, rather than tagging more and more houses on to existing settlements that often have not the services or roads to cope. In my opinion existing settlements need

some room left for limited growth for local people and/or local workers. Remember to have your input. Research by the Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) shows that builders are missing targets for affordable homes in the countryside by 18 houses a day, meaning a shortfall of 33,000 such properties can be expected over the next five years. Analysis of 60 local plans found that the average rural authority needed 68% of new homes to be affordable. Over the past three years, only 26% of new homes in the countryside were classed as affordable.

Many of us visit Bath. It may be of interest to you, the last remaining Georgian sedan chair garages in the UK, built in 1734, have been sold for £159,000 at auction after being listed with a guide price of £25,000 each. The Grade II listed buildings were sold for commercial use by Bath and North East Somerset Council.

Dog fouling continues despite the knowledge it can cause children to lose their sight. To the public: <u>Please</u> do not let your dog poo on farmer's fields especially when the grass is being cut. This is winter food for the cows, also please not when animals are grazing. Dog excrement can cause Neosporosis/abortion of calves which could lead to a cull. Farmers work hard all year round to look after the cows and a 5 minute run for an uncontrolled dog can cost the lives of animals and money.

All please note that an initiative to provide and plant trees to commemorate the end of The First World War is underway. Parish and Town Councils have to submit an application by 30/11/2017. Mere Town Council has now decided, however my division has several other villages considering proposals.

If SIDs (Speed Indicator Devices) are continually triggered, of which there are a few that move around in this area, indicating excessive speed, locals will report their findings, as has happened at Shaftesbury Road, Mere, and the police will put in "speed traps".

A reminder again that I have a facebook page 'Cllr George Jeans', for use to display some events I attend and may be other material. It is not a platform for conversation at present; I do not view it regularly, whereas A: george.jeans@wiltshire.gov.uk or U 07710 441599 I can usually answer quickly.

I will leave you to draw your own conclusions on the following: "Medway Council has said it will assess the appeal of a grandfather who received a parking ticket after wrestling a gun from a robber attempting to hold up a store."

You may have noticed the rivers are very low at the moment and we are agitating with the environment agency to try and make conditions better for biodiversity.

Drivers - Can you spare some time?

The Link Scheme relies upon drivers who volunteer to take Mere and District residents to their medical related appointments. Can **YOU** spare a few hours a month to help?

Most journeys are quite local or to Salisbury or Bath Hospitals. You choose when you want to drive. There is no regular time commitment and usually you would have two or three days' notice of journeys. Sometimes you may be able to help on more than one occasion: at other times you may have other commitments. It's when you CAN help that makes the difference.

Why do we need more drivers? First of all we have had a number of retirements, but more significantly, the demand has grown. We covered some 40% more miles this year than three years ago. We are a Charity and your time, of course, is freely given, but

there is a mileage allowance to cover running expenses. Age is not a barrier if you feel you are happy to drive others safely.

We do ask all drivers to take a DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) check.

Without this service, elderly and less mobile people, or those living a distance away from the surgeries, would find it almost impossible to have their medical needs satisfied.

From the Trustees

Research by Age UK shows that more than two million over 75s live alone, and report that isolation and loneliness is their biggest problem. More than a million said that they can go for over a month without speaking to friend, neighbour or family member. The lack of mental stimulation has been shown to exacerbate feelings of depression, and can hasten the progress of dementia, as well as making physical ailments less bearable. All this places extra burdens on already hard pressed social services and the

NHS. Research shows that the lonely are more likely to visit a GP, have a higher use of medication, higher incidence of falls and increased risk of needing long-term care.

Currently 15 guests are registered at the Day Centre, 11 are over 75 and of those 4 are over 90. With the onset of winter and shorter days many of us may be less inclined to venture out without a specific incentive, but at the centre we provide just such an incentive. Here guests feel they are valued and can make a positive contribution to the community; new friendships are forged, and opinions are valued and respected. We know from feedback from guests and their families that this has a highly positive effect on general well-being.

As we approach the Christmas period, a time of increased susceptibility to loneliness and its attendant issues, we will be providing entertainment, carols and a Christmas lunch. During the weeks leading up to Christmas our guests take part in a concert



LETTER FROM THE CHURCHES

Rev'd Carol Wilson-Barker, Priest in Charge of St Michael the Archangel, Mere; St Mary's West Knoyle and All Saints Maiden Bradley, writes:

The yearly battle is on between the big retailers to catch your attention and to entice us to buy from them this Christmas. We wonder between the big glossy adverts: John Lewis, Debenhams, Iceland....the list goes on? There is so much choice and all designed to part us from money we can't afford on excessive presents and food. It is nice to be thoughtful and thankful to others but also easy to be seduced by the drive to "spend more".

I'm just reading the book "No and Me" by Delphine de Vigan about Lou, a school girl, who befriends an 18 year old street girl called No. Lou is making a class presentation about the homeless and No agrees to answer lots of questions for drinks in warm cafes. Lou wants to "befriend" her but No becomes very angry saying: "this isn't your life...go away". Lou suddenly hates her friend and thinks that all homeless people need to do is be nicer, less dirty and they'd be fine. Such a human reaction to someone who won't be like us or do things our way.

Beneath our modern cosy Christmas certainties is the story of Jesus' birth in a makeshift home. His family faced cold, uncertainty, fear and anxiety about where the next meal was coming from. As we surround ourselves with material comfort we can forget about the needs of refugees, the homeless and those who live in poverty in our own country. We too are guilty of wishing they would be more like us – settle down, get a job or go back home.

Jesus came as a fellow human being full of care, kindness and love and was an adorable baby too for a while. He came as one who constantly challenges us to live thoughtful lives, loving not just the easy friends and family but our neighbours too whoever they are.

May you find the peace, joy and love of the Christ child in your deepest heart this Christmas. Blessings.

Recent research has shown that the regular supplementary education classes provided, together with a wider range of creative learning experiences and the opportunity to read books in their own first languages (which Suchana has pioneered), significantly improves results.

The number of little villages helped and encouraged through Suchana's mobile library (+ healthworker) – which we have particularly supported in the past – has increased to 24 so that about 1600 children are now involved every week.
