The Chairman writes

I would like to thank all the parishioners who attended the February Town council meeting. The venue was full to capacity. The views of all who spoke in the public session were certainly appreciated by members of the Town Council. The outline planning permission for 130 houses in Castle Street was not supported by the Town Council.

With regards to the development of the old Hill Brush Company site, members of the community raised concerns about future construction traffic servicing the housing development site at Woodlands Road. Although councillors felt that this issue could not be addressed on the planning applications considered at the meeting, the Town Councillors felt that the concerns needed to be raised and addressed by the developers, and Wiltshire Council informed.

Local government elections for both County and Parish Councillors take place on Thursday, 4th May. This is an opportunity for everyone on the electoral roll to vote for their local councillors. This is also an opportunity for anyone in Mere who fits the criteria to put their name forward and stand for election as a Town or County Councillor.

All current councillors welcome a contested election, it is in the best interest of local democracy and legitimacy of office. Those who would like to know more about standing for election can obtain information either by contacting The Town Clerk or approach one of the current Town Councillors.

REFLEXOLOGY with GEORGIE PEAURT

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GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR,

MERE DIVISION, WRITES:

When on a walk on Sunday,12th February through Burton, Mere, I was pleased to see two healthy parallel streams of water, I doubt it will last, however it was lovely to see.

The roads are poor in some areas of the Mere Division, which is addressed mainly by pothole repairs reported, of which I report many. Patching and resurfacing is best done in the warmer weather, when I am told the surface laid has a longer life expectancy. The road through Charnage from the A303 I am also told will be brought up to standard shortly.

Broadband, especially where it is poor, is still a concern for many in the Mere Division. Kilmington has poor mobile coverage and the North of the village poor broadband speed availability. Some good news is that a Council officer has advised he has reviewed Kilmington and Kilmington Common and overall believes that the story is very positive. The majority of premises will receive a superfast broadband service via the new fibre cabinet installed in the village. The North of the village is further away from the new cabinet, but it is anticipated there will still be a good uplift in speed from approx. 1Mbps to 20Mbps, in some places. This is known as a fibre to the cabinet (FTTC) solutions.

The officer goes on to report that he has reviewed the Common, which is believed to cover the BA12 6QY, BA12 6QW, and BA12 6QN postcodes. The good news is these postcodes are in the high level plan with a view to survey and build a 'fibre to the premise' solution (FTTP) subject to the usual caveats. We expect the survey and build to be complete by end of June 2017, but the FTTP solution for the Common is subject to successful survey and can provide not just superfast broadband but has the ability to provide ultra-fast.

The big news for the larger area is the "Save our Beds Campaign" regarding the closure of beds at Shaftesbury Hospital. In order to keep you up to date with what is happening you should be aware that the Clinical Commissioning Group's (CCG) Dorset Consultation about the future of the Westminster Memorial Hospital in Shaftesbury ends on Tuesday, 28th February. Those Wiltshire residents who are affected as they are living in the area but are not resident in Dorset perhaps are not being included in the consultation, but there are opportunities for you to see this information before that date.

Cllr Anthony Austin of Shaftesbury Town Council; is the Chair, Westminster Memorial Hospital Working Group, and his Council colleague, Barbara Carter, have been good at circulating information. Barbara's e-mail address is S BarbaraCarter@shaftesburytowncouncil.co.uk. It appears that Dorset has delivered consultation documents door to door in many if not all its own areas, but I could not see any evidence of delivery to anyone in Wiltshire until recently, when I assume the above working group had arranged some circulation of the consultation document outside Dorset. A West Knoyle parish councillor has offered to deliver some. I will have some put in the Post Office at Mere and Zeals if required, plus where else I can, depending on what number we can obtain for the Mere Area, which includes Zeals, Kilmington, West Knoyle and Stourton with Gasper.

A pop up shop is available in Shaftesbury at 45 High Street. The link has an audio alternative. It mentions Dorset as would be expected, Wiltshire I heard mentioned once, however it is a long presentation and I did not listen in detail to all. It appears the preferred option is that Shaftesbury will become a community hospital with only care home beds, when another site is found it would close. I attended the public consultation event in the Grove Building on 4th February arranged by the Highways Authority for the improvements to the A303 at Stonehenge including the proposed 1.8mile long tunnel. However my conclusion was that when completed, many of us in this area from young to old will not see Stonehenge again. One of the main photographs in the entrance was taken in such a way that it appeared the public visiting Stonehenge were much closer to the passing vehicles than they are in reality. I put on my consultation response a dual carriageway is urgently needed, including for those in our area to get past Stonehenge in a reasonable time at peak hours. However I needed more justification that the cost of the tunnel section, which would be significant, could possibly be better used elsewhere.

The residential development of the old Hill Brush site will start soon, in the method statement the developer has offered to hold regular meetings with the local community to address possible future concerns. Those living in the access and egress roads for construction traffic obviously want due consideration. Points that have been raised with me: Pettridge Lane and Shaftesbury road traffic need to be assured of minimum disruption; Woodlands Road needs a sign saying "no large construction traffic beyond the site towards Gillingham" and the top of the Lynch requires a sign for those that have mistakenly come along Water Street to indicate the road is impossible for large lorries.

A community grant application for toilets within St Michaels Church, Mere was awarded at the South West Area Board on the 1st February. The church is a well used and free of charge tourist attraction in Mere. Hopefully also a further grant will be given to embellish some of our tired finger post road signs in Mere and West Knoyle. Various presentations were given during the evening, including one from the Fire Brigade, which will be offering "Safe and Well visits". We now have a South West Community Safety Partnership; the Police co-ordinator is Amy Hardman, a Police Constable with the Wiltshire West Community Policing Team, and she was very informative at The Area Board. One piece of advice from the police was to paint your power tools pink, a thief then has a more limited market!

The next South West Community Safety Partnership meeting will have Joe Power, a Rural crime volunteer, and he will highlight the recently created Rural Crime Partnership. Marc Jackson, from the Wiltshire Police Rural Crime Team, and Andi Witcombe, the National Farmers Union County Adviser for Wiltshire, are all coming to the March meeting......all we need now is the Audience!!!!! The Area Board was also shown Visit Wiltshire 2017 newly produced and useful publication "2017; It's time for Wiltshire". The next South West Wilts Area Board will be Wednesday, 8th March at Tisbury in the Nadder Centre at Tisbury.

As said last month, a planning application has been received by Wiltshire Council for around 130 dwellings at the west end of Mere. The Mere Town Council discussed this proposal at its meeting in the Grove Building, on the 6th February; the building was full with standing room only. I abstained should the application come before The Southern Area Committee on which I sit. It is worth noting that the application is outside the development boundary or the built environment.

A survey of England's 152 biggest local authorities shows that one in three have already drawn up proposed council tax increases of the maximum 4.99% that is allowed without the need for a referendum, including Hampshire, Wiltshire and Bristol.

DEMENTIA ACTION ALLIANCE



At the Area Board meeting on 1st February 2017 it was agreed that South West Wiltshire (the Mere, Tisbury and Wilton community areas)

would join the Dementia Action Alliance, with the work being monitored by the Health and Wellbeing Group. More information on the South West Wiltshire DAA is available on the Internet at:

As explained in the background, there is already work going on within the area to promote dementia friendly communities through initiatives such as Dementia Friends, Safe Places and local support groups. Dementia friendly communities are defined by the Alzheimer's Society as being 'villages and towns where more people understand dementia, there is less fear and avoidance, and people living with dementia are included and supported to live independently for longer.' The aim of joining the DAA is to draw all of this work together and support individual parishes/communities in their efforts to raise awareness of dementia and make positive changes, exchanging ideas of what can be done and sharing what impact this has made.

The Area Board has requested that Parish/Town Councils appoint a 'Dementia Champion', in a similar way that has been done with previous schemes (e.g. Rights of Way). This person would be a first point of contact for the Area Board to liaise with and could either be a Parish/Town Councillor or a nominated member of the community. We would like that person (if possible) to attend a conference after the local elections in May (date/time to be confirmed) so that the alliance can be formally launched; it is envisaged that the conference will be held once/twice a year to update communities on the latest developments in the area and give that opportunity to share learning experiences.

SEEDS4SUCCESS

You may have been celebrating Christmas and New Year, but we have been busy

Activities of our local youth

supporting the youth of Mere and the surrounding districts of South West Wiltshire. As a charity we have to submit our accounts and report to the Charity Commission and you can find it at **(a)**: **https://tinyurl.com/jsswn9c**. Have a look. It makes encouraging reading.

Financially, we have had a successful year receiving funding from The Big Lottery Fund and the European Social Fund as part of the **Building Bridges** programme. This programme supports people across South West Wiltshire who face significant challenges in developing their skills, accessing education or moving towards the world of work. The programme is a partnership of organisations who are experts at supporting people and giving them the skills and confidence they need to move forward.

Taking part is entirely voluntary and all advice and support is offered free of charge. **Seeds4Success** are working with young people aged 15 - 19 years old who are at risk of becoming or who are already NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training). This is both on a 1:1 basis to develop a personalised action plan, and through weekly group work sessions.

These sessions involve practical activities to develop skills, training courses, volunteering, CV writing, and other activities that young people feel will enhance their employability. Recently they have completed a big 3D model of a fish, made nest boxes for small birds as well as participating in cooking sessions, games and a night walk.

Are you a local employer who would be able to support a young person with work experience or paid employment? If so, please get in touch. There is more information at I thtp://buildingbridgessw.org.uk/ on the Building Bridges website.

Seeds4Success also run a National Citizen Service team for year 11 & 12 students. You can find out more information about any of the programmes listed, book a space, arrange transport or even meet with a youth worker before coming along. Please do get in touch with me to find out more.

If you would like to nominate a young person for the project or you are a young person who wished to get involved, or would like to be a "peer leader" we would like to hear from you. We rely on young people to help with the youth committee and general running of our work and it all forms good experience.

MERE COMMUNITY POLICE TEAM

Helping us to help you

Community Policing is now well and truly with us. Your Police Community Support Officers are out in the community speaking to everyone and assisting with issues daily that directly affect you. We submit intelligence reports on a daily basis and our response officers

then know what is going on in the area. They will deal with any issues and can target areas where you have told us that you have a concern. This is already working well as our response colleagues stopped a vehicle being driven with no MOT and fined the driver. A drink driver in Mere was stopped as a direct result of you telling me what was happening. My mobile number is at the end of this report. Call me if you need to speak about something, but remember I may get the occasional day off! So if I don't reply, leave a message, I will get back to you when I return. Call 101 if you need it dealt with now.

Break-ins to sheds and vehicles are being reported almost daily... Thieves target vehicles that they suspect have tools within. Please remove tools from a vehicle, or get an alarm fitted to it. If you have power tools in a shed, fit an alarm. They are not expensive and will give peace of mind. Don't leave anything on view in a vehicle as a criminal may smash your car window to find out what it is! Fit security lights and loud alarms if you are in a rural location. Join a Neighbourhood watch.

Keep Informed on Crime

There are lots of ways to be updated about what is going on in your area. WILTSHIRE COMMUNITY MESSAGING is free to join and you can get local crime alerts and news when it occurs or is reported and tailor it to your needs. You can get e-mail news, text messaging etc. about items that concern you. It takes about 4 or 5 minutes to sign up and you can change the way you receive alerts at any time.

MERE POLICE FACEBOOK PAGE is another way of being informed. We put reports of any scams, frauds and cybercrime on there, with reports from ACTION FRAUD, DORSET CYBERCRIME UNIT and THE NATIONAL CRIME AGENCY. We will tell you what kinds of telephone frauds are being reported by others. You will be surprised how many there are. We also post on 'MERE MUTTERS' Facebook page.

WILTSHIRE POLICE WEBSITE is a useful place to visit, they have reports and news on county wide issues there.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH is still going strong and there is a dedicated website where you can get news and even find out where your nearest watch is and join online. Also, remember your local newspapers are always available.

We are reminded that not all of our residents have access to a computer, so if you know someone who wants to speak face to face with me, call me on \square 07471 029519. I will arrange to come and have a chat.

101 or 999

Often when people panic they remember the 999 number and call it. We are here 24/7 365 days a year to help you, but if it's identified as being a non-emergency then you may have to wait for another operator. We need to free up the 999 lines as there could be a life or death emergency waiting to get through.

Advice for calling 999

- call when it's an emergency
- crime is in progress
- someone suspected of a crime is nearby
- when there is danger to life
- when violence is being used or threatened

If you don't need an emergency response, then you should call **101** or use our online reporting form on our website. This could be to report a crime or to seek advice, for example: your car has been stolen, your property has been damaged or you suspect drug use or dealing in your neighbourhood. Calls to 101 incur a 15p charge but this is a flat fee for the entirety of the call [mobiles included].

However, the outline planning permission for was not supported by the Town Council.

You may have seen the 'Safe Place' stickers which have been placed prominently in the window of businesses that have agreed to participate in the scheme, which is run by a separate organisation. The intention is that a confused person will be able to recognise the symbol and know they can be safe and receive assistance to return to their own home or relations. MERE PEOPLE AID SYRIAN REFUGEES

Samara's Aid Appeal, a self-funded appeal operating under the auspices of the UK registered charity, Feed the Hungry, which helps Syrian refugees and which Mere people have been so generously supporting, is excited to tell you that a huge lorry left on Monday 23rd January bound for Iraq and Syria, where millions are suffering unimaginable hardship. It was packed to every spare inch with boxes of clothes, shoes, bedding, care packs for babies and even the occasional wheelchair and walking frame.

Over the preceding two weeks, bags and bags of donations had been carefully sorted and packed in banana boxes (these being just the right size and kindly donated by local shopkeepers), then labelled ready to be transported when the lorry arrived. To these contributions were added those collected by other volunteers from other areas. A local farmer provided temporary, dry storage and access for both volunteers and finally access to the massive lorry.

A cheerful group of volunteers formed a chain to pass the boxes into the lorry. This time we were lucky enough to have the help of a fork lift truck as well, which made the job so much quicker than on the last packing in October. This shipment was an extra one, a top-up to the one sent in the autumn. We hoped its cargo would relieve the refugees a little as they faced the harsh weather of winter. Finally the doors were closed and the lorry set off on its long journey to the Middle East.

Like many people, I find it hard to say 'no'. Not simply to chocolate, another pint, or another flick around to TV channels to see if there is anything worth watching, but also to requests to take on additional responsibilities or events. Perhaps that is why I am writing this letter!

It has taken me far too long (and I still haven't cracked it!) to realise that if I am to take on something new, something I am already doing must go. And If I don't choose what is to go, then that 'new thing' will take time away from those things that are important, but not urgent.

It may take the place of sleep, time with my family, time to read or pray, time to exercise or eat sensibly. And the result of unintentionally giving up those things means that I am then no good to anyone, or for anything.

Lent is a good time to think about the big questions of life. It is the time when Christians recall the temptation of Jesus in the wilderness – his time of preparation for the beginning of his ministry. For many today, Lent is simply a time to give up something they should probably give up anyway.

May I challenge you this Lent, not only to consider what you might *give* up, but to think about what you might *take* up? Why give up something and make time to come and join us at one of this year's Lent Groups? You will find new friends, and a lively, thought-provoking discussion. Again, you will find details elsewhere in this magazine.

The Diocese of Salisbury has produced an excellent Lent resource called 'Praying Together'. For every day in Lent, it includes a short reading from the Bible, a reflection on that reading, a prayer, and an action we might take in response to the reading. Copies are available in the Anglican churches or, I'm told, you can download it on an app.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, 1st March, with a special service in your local church (details elsewhere). We'd love to see you there.

And finally, to make you smile - (especially if you made a New Year resolution to lose weight!) "I don't mean to boast, but I finished my 14-day diet food in 3 hours and 20 minutes."
