#### MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the town come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be on **Monday, 8th May 2017** at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion.

#### The Chairman writes:

The closure of Lloyds Bank in Mere was confirmed last week by letters being received by their customers. The Bank will close on Monday, 25th September. I had a meeting with the Mere and Gillingham Branch Manager and expressed my regret at the loss of the Bank in Mere. I personally prefer to do my banking at the branch dealing with a real person. Lloyds are planning to run a number of workshops in Mere to show customers how to use Internet Banking, Mobile Banking, and Telephone Banking. Lloyds also plan to operate a mobile branch service in Mere after the closure.

The planning application for the conversion and renovation of the Old Ship Hotel into seven apartments and two three bedroom cottages and the construction of a new two bedroom Cottage, was approved by Wiltshire Council's Southern Area Planning Committee at Salisbury on the 6th April.

County and Town Council elections will take place on Thursday, 4th May in Mere. The Polling Station will be in the Lecture Hall. The elections are your opportunity to vote for councillors of your choice who will work on your behalf for the next four years. Please make time to vote.

#### WEST KNOYLE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on 7th March where it was reported that, despite the Parish Council & Cllr. George Jeans putting pressure on Wiltshire Council for the C297 New Close (the road leading from the village up to Willoughby Hedge) to go on the priority list for resurfacing, the response had been disappointing with the Highways Authority stating that the issue appeared to be with edge deterioration/verge damage and resurfacing would not fully address the problems on the road. They said that they would look at the potential of other treatments to address these issues.

The Council reported that members and volunteers had cleaned the play equipment in the play area, ready for use in the spring/summer. The Clerk confirmed that the Parish Council had registered its interest in adopting the BT payphone kiosk in the village, following the consultation by BT to remove the phone box. Unfortunately, owing to the sad death of Mr. Cumberlege from East Knoyle who used to administer the village website, the site is no longer registered and the domain name is no longer valid. However, thanks to Mr. Tim Thornley, the website will soon be up and running again under the new address: www.westknoyle.org and he is hoping that he will be able to retrieve all the previous information.

There have been a few incidents of fly tipping within the village over the last few weeks with one of them being particularly problematic to deal with as land ownership responsibilities have been questioned. There is, however, a contested Unitary Council (Wiltshire Council) election (1 seat). Your candidates are:

Two of our existing members have decided not to stand as Parish Councillors again and, on behalf of the Parish Council and the community of West Knoyle, I would like to thank Ruth Dresman and Brian Wessely for all the work that they have done for the village over the last few years.

Our next meeting will be held on Tuesday, 16th May at 7.00 pm – this will be the Annual Parish Meeting (Public Meeting) and the Annual Parish Council meeting will follow on immediately afterwards.

## GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

On account of the forthcoming election on Thursday, 4th May, at the time of writing, Wiltshire Council is now 'in purdah', a period that runs for six weeks. In this period I still attend regularity committees and panels such as planning, licensing etc.

On the 6th April, the Southern Area Planning Committee, on which I sit, was requested to allow change of use for The Old Ship Hotel, Mere to seven flats and two houses. The committee agreed this change. I had some conditions attached, for example allocated parking, the need for the splendid wrought-iron sign, the work of Kingston Avery, to remain a sign with a suspended sign board and not to be reduced to a bracket without a sign board. In its listing it is described as a sign. The need for the doors in the archway to remain as wood and not glass.

Future Southern Area Planning Committees appear to be brought forward to 3.00pm rather than 6.00pm as is now, which may be more difficult for working people to attend.

It saddens me the Mere branch of Lloyds Bank which is adjacent to The Old Ship will now be closing on the 25th September this year. It was perhaps inevitable. Interestingly, I was contacted by Lloyds around a year ago after I had suggested publicly that the branch being open only two days a week it was likely to close, I was told this was not the case! I appears now that it is the case.

An environmentally friendly heating system has been installed at Stourhead House, but for The National Trust to use its own supply of woodchips and to store it

undercover, known as a biomass store, has proven controversial to some local residents. I have put in much time into trying to improve the impact of this application on nearby residents, but some local residents and Stourton Parish Council were still concerned. Therefore I had the application referred to committee, which will now be decided in public, and is scheduled for the Tuesday, 30th May, at 3.00pm in Salisbury.

The Mere Snooker club is in danger of closing unless more members can be found. Recently, after publicity, some have come forward. If any of you in Mere, West Knoyle, Zeals, Stourton or Kilmington would like to play Snooker, please consider the above. The Mere Social Club has a table, however it is not dedicated just to Snooker.

Wiltshire Council still survey for the skid resistance of highways. However, at present much reliance is placed on the 'My Wiltshire' app, which is used amongst other matters to report highways issues, especially potholes, of which we have many. I read back in January that under Government plans, a national trial was to be carried out that refuse lorries were to be fitted with high-definition cameras to identify defects on roads that could become potholes. I attended the Overview and Scrutiny Management Committee on which I sit recently when the question was asked as to where Wiltshire could participate. It was affirmed that the Council would do so. Identification is one thing, providing the finance to remedy the situation is another!

I have been assured that some road maintenance in our area will take place in the summer. While discussing highways, I receive regular complaints regarding litter and street cleaning. I have witnessed local individuals doing litter picks themselves for which I thank them.

Potholes can be expensive. Peterborough Council has been ordered to pay £10,000 for repairs to a Ferrari owner after it was damaged from a pothole. The sum for the pothole, which could have been repaired for £53, was awarded in the small claims court with driver Scott Nicholas saying he will donate the money to charity.

I attended a two-hour slot at a Zeals presentation regarding a scheme costing tens of thousands of pounds, which will implement a reduced speed limit for Zeals. It is

proposed to introduce a priority scheme though Zeals on Main Road that many of us use. I am aware of some concerns that have arisen since the public presentation, such as a incomplete pavement at Portals Lane and traffic priority structures in some areas of the scheme.

I receive complaints of vehicles parked on pavements in the area. Parking on pavements could soon be banned in the UK if local authorities are granted more power to enforce new legislation. The DfT is examining the issue as part of its cycling and walking investment strategy and, should the ban be passed, drivers could face a fine of up to £70.

#### **Vehicle Parking and Obstructions**

We have been dealing with some instances of disputes over parking in Mere and the surrounding area. Here are a few guidelines.....

Please do not block access to other vehicles and leave enough space for vehicles to exit and enter. Do not park on a dropped kerb.

The space outside of your house is NOT yours (unless it is a space marked with your house number by the council or you have a disabled marked bay). We often get calls when people who think that it is their space and have to tell them 'It is not!'.

Parking on Zig Zags by a Pedestrian crossing is illegal and police officers will ticket you.

If you suspect a vehicle has been used in crime, call police on '101'.

If a car is parked in your street and you suspect it has been dumped, you can check on the DVLA website to see if it is taxed. If it is SORN (notified off road) DVLA will clamp and tow it away! If you want to report a dumped car to Wiltshire Council, it has a web page to do this, and after putting a notice on it for 14 days the Council will tow it away.

Parking on double yellows is only allowed if you display a disabled badge, and you must not be parked where you are causing an obstruction. Traffic wardens now issue tickets for these, not Police. We only deal if a vehicle is causing an obstruction. We have the power to tow away a vehicle that is doing so.

Buses are allowed to park on yellows to load and unload passengers.

Most people park sensibly and we tend to notice the 'bad' ones. If anyone blocks someone in after being spoken to by police, then we have the option of ticketing for 'Willful Obstruction', which carries a heftier fine! Beware....

If you have an issue with parking, call me on the number below and I can advise you. Remember, my phone number at the end of this report is only to contact me. I may be on a rest day, so if you need something dealt with call 101 for non emergencies and 999 in an emergency. You can text me on my phone if you need to. You can leave a

#### Hare Coursing is an Offence!

If you spot males with (usually) Lurcher type dogs and see them chasing Hares or Deer, call police on 999. If you can safely get an index of a vehicle, write it down and give it to us. We have had several convictions in North Wiltshire backed up by good evidence from the public. The offenders use 4 x 4 type vehicles and damage crops and fencing during these activities.

A green Subaru Forester was seen recently in Stourton. Offenders made off when a member of the public drove towards them! Do not confront these people, but be vigilant and get descriptions etc. If they make off, give direction of travel. At night they use lamps so be alert to this.

#### Warm Weather Security!

Spring is here and we ask you to be secure when in your garden; lots of criminals are opportunists who spot an open window or door. If you are in the back garden, don't leave the front door open! Close windows, especially on the ground level when you go out. Get some lamps put on timers so they come on randomly when you go out at night, you can get these from supermarkets now and they are cheap. Some for under £5!


Keep garden furniture locked away, chain it all together when you go away to make it more difficult for a thief. Lock bikes etc in sheds, so often we have them stolen as they are left outside on the front lawn or on a driveway.

Get a shed alarm fitted. Think now... What would it cost to replace my tools etc.? A shed alarm is a deterrent to the casual burglar.. A light on a sensor is also a good idea.

#### **WYLYE VALLEY ART TRAIL**

The wait is nearly over: the 2017 Wylye Valley Art Trail is nearly upon us. Painters, sculptors, potters, glass artists, jewellery and furniture makers, photographers and even a milliner are throwing open their studio doors to the art-loving public from Saturday, 27th May until Sunday, 4th June.

The Wylye Valley Art Trail is the largest and most diverse open studios event in Wiltshire, and takes place in some of the most gorgeous countryside this beautiful county has to offer. There are 73 venues in locations from tiny rural outposts to bustling

market towns, all within a ten-mile radius of the centre of the Wylye Valley in south Wiltshire. Some artists are exhibiting in their own studios, others have grouped together to show in larger spaces, such as village halls and even galleries.

There are award-winning artists with an international clientele exhibiting close by others who are only just starting out along their creative path, traditionalist landscape painters near abstract digital artists, glassblowers not far from scrap metal sculptors, potters hard by jewellers: there's something to suit every taste and, if you're in the market to buy, every budget.

Artists are, in the main, a fairly reclusive bunch, working as they often do in splendid isolation; the Wylye Valley Art Trail offers both the visitor the chance to meet the artist and discuss their creative world, and the artist the chance to get direct and hugely helpful feedback on their work.

Many artists will be demonstrating their working techniques, and may even be encouraging visitors to have a go themselves in "take pArt" sessions. It's easy to find out where you can "take pArt" and how to plot your route around the venues: attractive brochures, available free from many locations from Tourist Information Centres to shops and pubs, list all the venues and artists, giving directions, opening times and an illustration of what's on view where.

If you can't get out to find a brochure, there's always the website #: www.wvat.co.uk, which will have all the brochure bumf, plus links to artists' websites and the Wylye Valley Art Trail Facebook page.

On Thursday, 25th May we are showing the BAFTA and Oscar nominated film 'Lion' (15). This film has two acclaimed stars in the lead role, Sunny Pawar as the young Saroo and Dev Patel as Saroo in adulthood. It was the acting debut for Sunny and if children were allowed to win Oscars he would most assuredly have won for what is an extraordinary performance from so young an actor. Dev Patel won the BAFTA for his excellent performance.

In 1986, Saroo was a five-year-old child of a poor but happy family in rural India. On a trip with his brother, Saroo finds himself trapped alone in a decommissioned passenger train that takes him to Calcutta, 1500 miles away from home. Totally lost in an alien urban environment and too young to identify either himself or his home to the authorities, Saroo struggles to survive as a street child until he is sent to an orphanage. There Saroo is selected to be adopted by the Brierley family in Tasmania, where he grows up in a loving, prosperous home. However, for all his material good fortune, Saroo is plagued in adulthood by his memories of his lost family and tries to search for them, though he tries to hide this from his adoptive family. West Knoyle is in the catchment area for Hindon Primary School and on Monday, 6th February, the older pupils in Kestrel Class took their learning to a new dimension in order to learn about Democracy, one of our most traditional and established British Values, with a trip to London!

The pupils were able to enter Parliament in the footsteps of the Queen, and sat on the red benches in the House of Lords and green benches in the House of Commons. Perhaps you wonder occasionally what on earth a churchwarden and church secretary do with their time and how much they get paid. Well first things first, we don't get paid as it is a completely voluntary job, we might have expressed an interest in or have been asked by someone in the church to consider doing. Neither job is something to be taken on lightly as they do require quite a time commitment. Both are jobs which need

lots of prayers prior to taking on the roles and a desire to give back something to the community, spread God's love and ability to keep smiling.

As churchwardens we try to keep the running of the church on an even keel. ## WILTSHIRE COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

Wiltshire Community Foundation is an independent charity which gives grants and funding to the voluntary sector and charities

across Wiltshire and Swindon. It is an expert on local need and disadvantage in communities and offers high quality advice and support for all types of donors who want to make a difference in their local area. In 2015/16 Wiltshire Community Foundation supported 87,625 people across Wiltshire and Swindon through projects it funded. It achieved this by awarding grants of over £1.03 million to groups and individuals in need.

Wiltshire Community Foundation has made a significant contribution to local communities by making grants of £10 million since 1991, giving money and support where people in Wiltshire and Swindon need it most. Over the last 40 years, with the

support of individuals, companies and trusts, it has built an endowment of £18 million to generate grants for the future benefit of local communities and young people.

#### **Grants to Groups**

Wiltshire Community Foundation offers a range of different grant funds for community groups and charities in Wiltshire and Swindon where the majority of their beneficiaries are disadvantaged in the following ways:

**ECONOMICALLY** – e.g. facing financial difficulties

**SOCIALLY** – e.g. not able to participate in normal activities without support

**GEOGRAPHICALLY** – e.g. living in an isolated or disadvantaged community with limited access to services

**PHYSICALLY** – e.g. having additional needs, a disability or mental health issues.

The Foundation particularly awards grants to projects taking place in communities with limited financial capacity and benefitting people who cannot afford to cover the costs themselves

#### The #iwill Fund (Youth Social Action Fund)

Currently, 4 in 10 young people regularly engage in social action – such as campaigning, fundraising, and volunteering. The **#iwill campaign** has been launched to increase this to at least 6 in 10 10-20 year olds taking part, by the year 2020.

The Youth Social Action Fund is part of the **#iwill campaign** and offers grants to groups working with young people between the ages of 10 and 20 years old (or 25 for young people with disabilities) in Wiltshire and Swindon.

Grants of up to £5,000 are available to fund social action opportunities for young people. The fund is not to cover general youth club provision nor to fund general activities for young people. The fund is to cover specific activities for young people aimed at developing their skills and confidence as volunteers in their community.

#### The Foundation Main Grant

The Foundation Grants Programme will support projects which will make a sustained impact in the lives of disadvantaged people in Wiltshire and Swindon. Applicants must demonstrate that the majority of people benefitting from the grant experience disadvantage either economically, socially, geographically or physically. Groups of any size may apply to this programme.

- You can apply for up to £5,000 per year, and three year funding is available (total £15k).
- If you choose to apply to, or currently hold, a Small Grant you will be unable to apply for a Foundation Grant.

**Apply now - Expressions of interest close on Thursday, 25th May 2017.** Closing dates for the full application will be advised if you meet the criteria to apply.

#### The Foundation Small Grant

Grants for organisations with an income of less than £50,000. The Foundation Small Grants Programme will support projects which will make a sustained impact in the lives of disadvantaged people in Wiltshire and Swindon. Applicants must demonstrate that the majority of people benefitting from the grant experience disadvantage either economically, socially, geographically or physically.

- You can apply for up to £2,000 per year and you can apply for two years at a time (total £4k).
- You can chose to apply instead to the Foundation Main Grant but you cannot apply to both programmes.
