The Town Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the town come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on Monday, 2nd October 2017.

The Chairman writes:

We had a long September meeting with much to discuss and an emphasis on housing in Mere: planning applications as usual, further news on the bungalows being built on Bramley Hill and much discussion of the Draft Wiltshire Housing Site Allocation and the provision of affordable housing. I know that many residents in Mere worry about large scale developments in the town, but we must also try to meet the need for more housing by sensible development and the site allocation is part of that process. As we develop our Neighbourhood Plan there will be consultation with you about how we can manage the development of Mere in terms of housing, employment, education and recreation - I hope you will be enthusiastic in responding.

I have been hearing more compliments about how Mere is looking and will pass one on myself. I have had a good few visitors, family and friends, who always get a walk about the town and, without fail, they comment of the well-kept look of so many houses and front gardens. Thank you, Mere. May I also compliment Mere Surgery on their outstanding rating in the Annual GP Patient Survey - a result of the hard work and the high standards maintained by the staff there.

Under the aegis of Mere Town Council, Mrs. Mary White and two other committee members have been organising the Mere Film Shows. These have proved to be very popular and over the last 14 years have raised £6,500 which has been given out in community donations. After 14 successful years, Mrs. Mary White has decided that the time has come for her to step down as the organiser of Mere Film Shows. I am sure you will join me and the Council in saying an Oscar-sized thank you to Mary.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

I have recently come across a book I have not previously seen, by Ralph Whitlock entitled 'Wiltshire published in 1976. It has several references to Mere. It states 'Once as lonely and remote as a frontier town should be, Mere has lately become far too busy for its comfort, for since the A303 has come to be regarded as the main highway from

London to the West, its narrow, sharp-angled streets are frequently, and especially at holiday week-ends, jammed with traffic. Normally adequate car parks, however, help to make it a popular mid-day halt for travellers'. This as I remember it (cannot quite remember it being a frontier Town!), not much has changed, complaints of slow moving traffic, over full car parks and a refreshment stop after travelling across Salisbury Plain.

I have in previous months referred to the now removed skips in The Salisbury Street Car Park at Mere. I have been asked several times face to face and also by some on the local facebook site, will the mini recycling centre return to the Salisbury Street car park? The Town Council was against its continuation; Wiltshire Council stated the closing of approximately seven sites would save about £7,000, plus stop commercial operators using them. I was against the removal of the skips, the paper bank did produce £350 per load in revenue, and the collection cost under half of this, the other banks may have cost money to maintain. Also much of the commercial use now goes to Landfill. The local school I understand will still take paper.

The parish areas of West Knoyle and Mere have seen road improvements recently. I have been questioned many times over the last year, regarding Barrow Street Lane (Old Barrow Street) and West Knoyle being resurfaced when it is all used so infrequently. The reason was its lack of skid resistance. Once a highway fails this test it jumps in effect to a high priority.

The South West Area Board still has funds to help fund community projects and the youth. Do you have a project? I am helping Lynch Close residents with an application at present, for a community greenhouse and shed. This will be considered at the next Area Board along with an application from West Knoyle village hall, both of which I currently support.

The National Trust has kindly agreed to sponsor a wooded pole for occasional use of a Speed Indicator Device (SID) in Stourton Lane. Also a good neighbour has agreed along Shaftesbury Road at Mere, to the same use. The community SID will be moved around the area, and a consortium of Kilmington, Stourton and possibly Zeals will also have access to a further grant aided SID.

Transport for London has successfully trialled virtual speed bumps at 45 locations across the capital. Officials painted a design on the road which acts as an optical illusion, tricking drivers into slowing down. A number of boroughs across London have also adopted the idea, and local authorities in other parts of the country might now be tempted to follow suit, particularly in light of Environment Secretary Michael Gove's call for speed bumps to be removed as part of efforts to curb pollution. Cambridgeshire County Council used inlaid bricks to create a 'fake' roundabout last November.

Sometimes political correctness can go a little too far. Women-only swimming classes that were scrapped by Stroud DC have been reinstated. The authority cited the Equalities Act 2010 when explaining its reasons for admitting men to the weekly

sessions at a Gloucestershire leisure centre, but now says it "should have taken legal advice" before acting.

I have been encouraging the local parish and town councils which I attend, to allow and promote very small social housing schemes in the same vein as that developed recently at Gasper to house local workers and those with local connections. In my opinion Gasper has been very successful. In decades to come, if such housing is not allowed, it is unlikely any key workers will be able to afford to live in our rural area. The Wiltshire Council housing needs survey is so complex in my opinion it does not give an accurate picture. I and many others and locally are aware of the situation and a locally developed housing needs survey is required, which I will encourage Mere Town Council and other parishes to do. Nationally as we know housing need is acute for many. I see an extreme case recently that Flintshire County Council has begun using the Pontins Holiday Camp in Prestatyn, North Wales, to house homeless people because of growing pressure on a housing waiting list, which has grown by a third since September last year. To make it clear, all I am promoting are very small schemes that are controlled, for local workers or those with local connections.

Refuse firm Biffa has called on the Government to rethink its national policy on handling waste amid concern about stalled recycling rates, not enough incinerators being built and insufficient landfill space. A report from the company says the UK is now recycling about 45% of household waste and 59% of commercial and industrial waste, but existing measures are only likely to see modest improvements. CEO Ian Wakelin also says that local authority waste disposal projects will provide long-term returns but there is a deficit of commercial investment money available for such schemes

South West Wiltshire Community Safety Partnership (SWWCSP) will meet four times a year, with invited representatives from Wiltshire Police and Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service. A meeting was held at the end of September when the agenda included Local concerns raised on: Drug taking; road safety regarding tractors, and hoax callers. Local needs, priorities and outcomes were discussed.

At a recent meeting regarding planning, I learned the government is considering changing the community infrastructure levy (CIL) again. At present it is attracted mainly by domestic property, now I understand the government to be considering an infrastructure levy to include many commercial buildings when developed. Another planning issue I have read of with interest, bus operator Stagecoach has warned that its fleet is being forced to avoid a number of newly built housing estates because planners are failing to provide wide enough roads. Sharp bends, overzealous traffic calming measures and parked cars have also been cited as concerns. The company has issued guidance to councils, urging them to build roads at least 6.5m wide. The Walnut development has 5.5m roads, which I championed at the time of development as The Fields development, which just preceded it, were 4.5m. I am aware of our ever

decreasing number of buses and have displayed the new X4 time table locally. I have copies for those who request.

In the Children and Social Work Bill 2016 the Government has signalled a clear intention to extend services offered to care leavers. This will ensure that every young person who has been in care will be entitled to personalised support until their 25th birthday (it currently terminates when reaching 21). This will also increase the financial burden on Wiltshire Council.

Government figures suggest the number of pupils in England's secondary schools is set to rise by almost a fifth by 2026. The increase in pupil numbers is equivalent to 267 average sized secondary schools. The Department for Education commented that the increase is "primarily because increased births from 2002 onwards means there are now larger numbers entering secondary schools at age 11 than are leaving them at age 16."

The visit will identify potential risks within the home and how to reduce or prevent these risks. It covers electrical safety, escape plans, cooking, smoking, personal safety and the immediate installation of smoke alarms, if needed, all free of charge.

Adult Flu Vaccination

Patients aged 6months – 64 years at risk including the following conditions:-Diabetes

Asthma (if you are using a steroid inhaler as well as Ventolin or Salbutamol) Chronic Respiratory Disease Chronic Heart Disease Chronic Liver Disease Chronic Kidney Disease Chronic Neurological Disease Patients with a low immunity Morbid Obesity (adults with a BMI more than or equal to 40kg/m²)

Child Flu Vaccination

Children aged 2 and 3 on 31st August 2017 (date of birth 1/9/2013 to 31/8/2015) are being offered routine vaccination for flu this year. The vaccination is given in the form of a nasal spray and separate clinic times for children have been set up. Please contact the surgery to make an appointment for your child if you would like them to be vaccinated. <u>Children aged 4-8 years will be vaccinated at school</u>.

Shingles Vaccination (only required if not previously vaccinated)

Patients who turn 70 or 78 (date of birth 2/9/1945 to 1/9/1946) or (2/9/1937 to 1/9/1938) during the year are encouraged to make an appointment for vaccination against Shingles. If you were recalled for a shingles vaccination last year, but have still not yet been vaccinated you can still attend for an appointment up until your 80th birthday

<u>MenACWY Vaccination (only required if not previously vaccinated)</u> Patients aged 18 on 31/8/2017 (date of birth 1/9/1998 to 31/08/1999) are encouraged to attend for vaccination. This vaccine is also recommended for anyone up to the age of 25 years on the 31/8/2017 if you have not been previously vaccinated. Please contact Reception for an appointment.

CHRISTINE MARSH, LICENSED LAY MINISTER AT ST MICHAEL THE ARCHANGEL CHURCH, WRITES: October Thoughts

Did you know that a word for patience in Arabic is cactus? They both have the same root meaning 'to endure thirst'.

The Cacti, like other drought resistant plants, manage to survive against all odds in the most inhospitable environments. They are an illustration not only of living in harmony with the environment but also of patience, adaptability and perseverance.



Some years ago I visited the Namibian desert. Trudging along a dry dusty valley floor we suddenly came across one lone thorn bush, a Narra plant, the only sign of life in this barren landscape. Due to its bitter taste this prickly plant is not eaten, but its fruit, a melon shaped gourd, when ripe, splits and disperses thousands of seeds. These in turn are eaten by animals which are then eaten by larger animals which in turn are eaten by bigger creatures. This plant had, over some 20 years, persevered and patiently adapted all around it. It was now providing shelter and sustenance for many to make its small world a better place for many not just itself.

In our journey through life change is one of the few certainties. Things change, sometimes slowly and imperceptibly over many years, other times suddenly and challengingly.

Some of our life changes may be known or expected, but more will be as yet unknown. The changes may be wanted or unwanted, happy or sad but they will come regardless.

How we deal with these changes and challenges is likely to be affected by our own personalities and beliefs.

One of the most popular of church hymns is:

'Through all the changing scenes of life, through trouble and in joy, the praises of my God shall still, my heart and tongue employ'.

A hymn not asking that any problems be removed but pointing to God for strength to face challenges ahead.

September in particular is a month of great change. Children go back to school; some for the first time, some to a larger school, some from school to college, some into the workplace.

Life experiences and social groups change; many challenges and maybe much upset often loom ahead.
