The Chairman Writes

I am writing this at the end of the day of Remembrance, a day where I had so many poignant conversations and felt that so many Mere residents were moved to join the rest of the country in commemorating the events of 100 years ago. What we had, here in Mere, was the result of the efforts of many: the people who organised the sale of poppies and the those who displayed them, the members of the church who provided a service involving so many, the lighters of the beacon, the bell-ringers, the council staff who organised and attended to so many practical matters, the team who made the mementos (inspired by Angela McDonald's book 'The Proudest Uniform) and put them in place and the residents who were host to a memento, the Royal British legion, the groups of young people - be they from Mere School or from the uniformed groups like Guides and Scouts, and the throng of people who filled the Square at 11 am and later, Jubilee Gardens at 7pm. I am certain you will join me in thanking them for their contributions.

I had great pleasure in attending the AGM of Seeds4Success where I heard about the exploits of a team of young people and the 'older' organisers. I use the word 'team' for good reason as that is how they work and it is such a success at providing opportunities for young people in the area. If you are unaware of what they do then I would urge you to look at their website or visit – it will paint a different picture of what

young people are doing to that made by a few miscreants elsewhere. Also, you may find an opportunity to volunteer and help!

I attended the CATG meeting for South West Wiltshire trying to gain further progress with several matters: looking at ways in which pedestrians can more safely negotiate Gillingham Corner; a feasibility study on a width restriction for The Lynch; the installation of dropped kerbs on Clements Lane. My efforts didn't make much headway in an atmosphere of so little funding available that progress seems snail paced. I also complained about the works done on Boar Street where a flotilla of equipment came and dealt with a part of a short road while not dealing with what most of us consider the worst part of the road (and only a couple of yards away). The answer is invariably technical and guided by 'the book' and that funding is short. To me, the only thing short is the sightedness of a system that does a bit here and a bit there rather than a proper job – which would work out less expensive in the end.

At our November Town Council meeting we were asked by Councillor Norris on behalf of the Mere Rivers Group to write to the Environment Agency to express the Town Council's concern that the river levels had dropped significantly since extraction had started in the last month. After a long hot summer where both of our rivers flowed well, iust two weeks of renewed extraction had the Ashfield dry in Burton and the Shreen down to a trickle. It was resolved that we write to the Environment Agency & Wessex Water and that was done immediately – please support us in this and write or phone to complain about too much extraction. At the meeting other matters were discussed but I won't go into too much detail as the minutes will be available on the Mere Town website and are available in hard copy from the Council Office. Likewise, agenda for future meetings are available on the website and in the display case outside the Lecture Hall. Please join in with us trying to get the best Mere possible by reading about what decisions are made and why and attending meetings where there are matters of importance to you. For example, I am hoping to schedule a discussion that Councillor Jeans requested, on parking in Mere and strategies to deal with the demand for spaces and the need for safe roads and pavements. At the public session before the meeting you could express your views on this matter.

There are a good few matters competing for time at the next meeting, so you need to check the agenda. Before the next Town Council meeting a group of councillors will attend what is usually the longest meeting of the year as we draft a budget for the coming year. Each year we try and find a balance between providing what residents want (in a climate where our County Council provides less) and the amount that it will cost. The cost is borne by all of us who are Mere residents in the precept added to the Council Tax bill we receive. I recall going into my local and being greeted as 'Mr Ten Percent' when the last precept increase arrived on tax bills. We had good reason to arrive at that figure but we set about, each year, with the ambition to keep any precept rise as small as possible.

WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR GEORGE JEANS WRITES

I felt very proud to lay a wreath on behalf of

Wiltshire Council, at The Act of Remembrance Service in The Square, Mere. It was the best attended I can remember, probably over 300 people attended. It was a special

year commemorating The First World War Armistice, being a cease fire until The Treaty of Versailles was signed. Mere Town Clock and nearby Church Clock struck almost simultaneously at 11am. I attended The Church service afterwards in St Michael's which was almost full to capacity. A soldier made locally by Ted Henson, was temporarily attached to an intricately-carved 15th century wooden rood screen in the church, which attracts visitors nationally.

Mere's Act of Remembrance concluded in the evening at 7.05pm with the 'WW1 Beacon of Light' in tribute to the millions of men and women who died or were injured in World War One. It was a beautiful evening and other beacons could be seen in the distance. The Mere Church bells rang out at 7.05pm as they would have done worldwide. On Saturday the 10th of November I walked

with an organized group around Mere to visit the areas where the 52 from Mere had lived, it was a very wet walk at times, ending in Jubilee Gardens, where a splendid memorial was displayed to those from Mere who fell.

LOCAL ISSUES:

- Information Technology is great when it works, however Wiltshire Council for about a day was at times without website, phones etc. The Southern Area Planning Committee that I sit on was cancelled as the agenda was not available for a long enough period because of the down time.
- Japanese knotweed is becoming more prevalent in the area, I have had several sites identified to me. Should you see it please report to Wiltshire council preferably on The My Wiltshire App, or otherwise let me know of its suspected whereabouts. It can really take hold and in some cases has affected the sale of property.

JUST AROUND THE CORNER:

 Councils are trialling the use of Amazon's Alexa digital assistant to help keep elderly and disabled company. Hampshire County Council began a trial of the Alexa technology this year in a pilot of 50 people with disabilities. Early results revealed that 72% said that it had improved their quality of life. Meanwhile, Oxfordshire County Council has begun to install the Amazon Echo speakers in the homes of elderly people. Council leader Ian Hudspith said that imaginative ways were needed to deal with isolated older people. "We are experimenting with Amazon Echos for older people to see if that provides some ability for them to communicate," he said.

- Following reports that waste sent for recycling is being dumped overseas and "ending up in landfill or worse" Swindon Council may tell residents to stop recycling plastic, The Environment Agency is believed to be investigating allegations of fraud in the recycling industry, it is believed that exporters have claimed for tens of thousands of tonnes of plastic waste that did not exist. Basingstoke and Deane BC has decided to close its 29 mixed plastic "bring banks," while Southampton City Council is planning to burn plastic left in bins to generate power. Environment minister Therese Coffey has written to Swindon BC urging bosses to reverse plans to stop recycling mixed plastic.
- Sativa Investments has been given planning permission to build the UK's first legal cannabis factory at a secret site in Wiltshire. The factory could grow up to eight tonnes of the drug per year. The development comes as GPs will be allowed to prescribe cannabis-derived products from next month.
- A local resident made me aware of plans by Bath & North East Somerset Council to set up a clean air zone (CAZ) in Bath, charging some vehicles to enter the CAZ. This will encourage even more traffic through Bradford-on-Avon and Trowbridge because it includes a small portion of the A36 route through the edge of Bath. I am assured by Wiltshire Council they are aware of the situation.

GENERAL:

A number of councils have introduced rules which mean residents can no longer pay bills by cheque or cash, with only electronic payments allowed. Charities have warned that some elderly people will struggle to adapt to an electronic system of paying. I hope Wiltshire will not follow the lead of these other councils, it is unfair on the elderly and most of us will be elderly one day and some of us will be unable to use the computers etc of that time. .

A reminder again that I have a facebook page Cllr George Jeans, for use to display some events I attend and may be other material. It is not a platform for conversation at present, therefore I do accept friends request on the site at present; I do not view it regularly.

MERE RIVER GROUP

River Levels Update

At the beginning of November, the water levels in our streams were critically low. This is because Wessex Water started abstracting again after a summer with no abstraction while works were carried out on the local pump. Throughout the summer it had been a point of comment by many people that our streams had kept flowing really well through one of the driest summers ever! From mid-October Wessex Water recommenced abstracting half the amount permitted under their Environment Agency licence, around 4 million litres every day. This renewed abstraction left our rivers in a state of crisis resulting in significantly reduced water levels leaving fish stranded. The potential knock-on effect on the invertebrates impacts on all the wildlife that rely on our streams.

We were informed by Wessex Water (in early November) that they proposed to start taking almost the full 9 million litres permitted, from 18 November. Our view was that this would totally devastate our water courses and the aquifers which supply our water. Mere Rivers Group (MRG) expressed its concerns, about the reintroduction of abstraction and its significant impact, to all relevant bodies including Wessex Water, The Environment Agency, our MP and the local media. As a result we are pleased to report that Wessex Water confirmed they would not be increasing the abstraction level.

Wildlife Sightings for October

Hopefully you took our advice during October and checked the ivy for birds and insects. Many thanks, as always, to those of you who reported what you saw. Sightings for October were: Little Egret and Grey Wagtail seen 3 times. Single sightings were reported of Water Vole, Hedgehog, Signal Crayfish, Kingfisher, a pair of Moorhen and a single Moorhen.

Your sightings are especially important now, as we demonstrate to Wessex Water and the Environment Agency the wildlife biodiversity supported by our rivers and streams and the impact of their changes, to abstraction levels, on this biodiversity. We now have a full year's record of sightings and your future reports enable us to develop a year on year comparison. So please, please continue to email us anything you see.

MERE RIVERS GROUP

REPRIEVE FOR THE SHREEN CATCHMENT

The Group Chief Executive of Wessex Water, Colin Skellet, wrote to Mere Rivers Group on 7th November to say that after the company 'resumed abstraction at 4 million litres a day (m/ld at Burton Field Pumping Station) on the 18th October 2018' that 'this rate of abstraction is sufficient to service your local community' and, also, following 'the real improvement in our water supply network we expect to be able to meet this target (up to 4 m/ld) regularly'. The local community covers places to the south of us including Gillingham and nearby villages.

The Rivers Group would like to see the present Environment Agency licence allowing Wessex Water to abstract up to 9 million litres a day of pure chalk water from Burton Field to be much reduced. Historically, the company has exported around half this full allowance up to White Sheet Reservoir and hence to Yeovil and towns to the north of us. It would seem that the need for export is no longer there.

Whenever export occurred in a dry summer the springs feeding the Shreen and the Ashfield dried up at source as did the five brooks which flow over the southern pasture and agricultural land into the Shreen to form the Shreen Catchment. In 2011 the drying was so severe that the Mere Rivers Group was formed. In 2015 Wessex Water agreed to operate OFWAT's five year Abstraction Incentive Mechanism (AIM) trial which decreed a small fine if the flows in the Shreen and Ashfield fell below a certain point at which export had to cease.

Colin Skellet goes on to say 'there is no doubt that abstraction in Mere impacts stream flows. By keeping to the AIM target, flows have been better than in the past'. The Rivers Group feel that it is time for the Environment Agency to reduce the Licence to 4m/ld right now rather than wait till the end of the trial in 2020. The design of their five year AIM trial of data collection has been severely compromised by events: the need for export in 2016 even when the trigger point had been reached because of works at Codford; the closing of Burton Field Pumping Station for around 5 months in 2018; an exceedingly dry 2018 summer after a very dry winter and unusual spring rains and, above all the completion of work on the ring main which has removed the need for

Burton Field export. If in time to come Gillingham develops so much that there is a strain on supply from Burton Field the business case for Wessex Water to supply 'new' Gillingham customers from the ring main would make it sensible for them to build the 4 mile link to supply them.

MERE RAILWAY MODELLERS

In late October the club held its Annual General Meeting when it discussed the activities of the

current year and its proposals for 2019. The Chairman's report reflected on an excellent year for the club. It was well represented at the first Wessex Association of Model Railway Clubs' Model Railway Exhibition at the Cheese and Grain at Frome in January of this year, as the club had taken its "00" gauge "Three Bridges by the Sea" layout to display at the show, together with a small "N" gauge layout. It had been the club's first exhibition outside Mere which provided new logistical challenges for club members but was enjoyed by all.

Following on from this event the club's own annual exhibition in the Lecture Halls in June was well attended and earnings increased over those from the 2017 exhibition. Tom Snook, the founding father of Mere Railway Modellers and the club's Exhibition Manager explained that a change of emphasis had assisted in increasing the earnings and he would be building on that for the club's next exhibition, which is to be held in the Lecture Hall over the weekend of **15th and 16th June** 2019.

Modelling wise both the OO and O gauge modellers are well catered for, the former trying a novel modular approach. Although joined by a common rail track every club member participating in the venture had been provided with a personal display board and under the guidance of Peter Hudson, our Layouts Manager. Given the brief: "to show off their skills." The method certainly helps in developing individual modelling experience!

A more traditional approach is being used on 'Mere Abbas,' our new 'O' gauge layout. This is progressing well and is now showing signs of developing into a first class exponent of the railway modelling art. Taking both models into account the Chairman reflected that: "a common bond of knowledge flowing between the members could only increase the skills of all".

Peter Lord was thanked for his dedication in arranging garden railways in the summer months. Nancy Broach, Secretary and Treasurer, who had provided the meeting with the annual accounts, was thanked for her secretarial and financial acumen together with her sterling efforts in running the galley at this year's June exhibition in the Lecture Hall.

Expressions of thanks were given to Tom Snook (ably assisted by his wife Lyn) and colleagues were reminded that: "without Tom's drive and enthusiasm, we would not be where we are today" - a great model railway club in Mere, settled in its own distinctive clubhouse.

The club wish the community of Mere, who made up most of those attending our Railway Exhibition last June: "best wishes for Christmas and the New Year".

LETTER FROM THE CHURCHES

Revd Carol writes



Christmas greetings from St Michael's Church.

I have started to ask my nearest and dearest: "what would you like for Christmas?" Frequently I'm met with blank looks which makes it hard to get the gift they'd truly like: unless we are clear in what we want and need we are almost certain to fail in getting it!



This Christmas, as Vicar of St Michael's I need to tell you - our friends in Mere - that despite generous giving and your support of us at open events we are in financial difficulties. The church cannot pay our way this year for the first time in a very long time. We have certainly had to put our church improvement plans on hold (though most of that money should come from grants).

I know the Church of England is perceived as wealthy but much of the wealth is held in its buildings and these old places are additionally expensive to insure and

maintain. The central church has its own expenses and is not able to contribute to local parishes.

Our core church membership is 107 people and to cover our annual costs we need over £13 per week per person. For many people on fixed incomes this is too much to achieve and the rest of us just can't cover the shortfall. The only paid member of the congregation is the Vicar who also oversees West Knoyle and Maiden Bradley, everyone else are volunteers.

For centuries our nation proudly spoke of our Christian heritage, but these days that hope burns less brightly. We still sing "Jerusalem" and know the words of Christmas carols but vote less with our feet by attending church. However when I talk to people in Mere I am aware of how much love and pride there is in our church and how much the Christian way of life means to you. A key part of leading and bringing this together falls to the Vicar and resourcing her or him.

Christmas is a time of gift giving and I haven't been shy in saying what is on my Christmas list this year:.
