MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meets every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. The Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You will be permitted to raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts.

The next meeting will be held in the Andy Young Pavilion at 7.30pm on Monday, 5th February 2018.

The Chairman writes:

In our January meeting we finalised plans for planting an oak tree in the cemetery grounds to commemorate WW1 – this will take place at 11.00am on Thursday, 8th February. It is our hope that this will grow to become another permanent feature of remembrance in Mere. We will also be putting large poppies on selected lamp posts in November and are looking for some local sponsorship to extend this throughout Mere – do contact Councillor Roy Sims if you wish to contribute.

2018 is the 150th anniversary of the Clock Tower and we shall be celebrating this with several events. We are researching the date of the original opening ceremony and what happened on the day. If you have any information, do let Councillor Hazzard or me know through the Town Office contact on the next page. The Lord Lieutenant of Wiltshire will be attending and, if it can be accommodated in his busy schedule, so might Prince Charles. We have not set a date as yet, but hope to reflect the original opening. We are also looking forward to seeing art work created by pupils at Mere School based on the Clock Tower.

We sometimes receive comments and complaints from residents about the general matter of parking restricting the flow of traffic throughout the town. Specific points which are most mentioned are the eastern end of Salisbury Street, Hazzards Hill and Boar Street with parking identified as creating unsafe conditions for traffic flow. We discussed the matter and will be taking the following course of action, with PCSO Peter Tscherniawsky taking this forward for us at Community policing level. We have stated that judging whether cars parked are infringing traffic law is a police issue, and we want the following actions to be taken:

- If traffic law is being broken, to enforce the law.
- If laws are not being broken but parking is creating a hazard we will request that police advise those who are parking that they are creating a hazard.
- We will request that these problem areas are regularly checked.
- If these steps have no effect or the police advice is that no laws are broken, we shall ask the police for recommendations, which would have an enforceable effect on traffic safety.

• We will consider the police recommendations and, if deemed appropriate, take them to wider consultation.

We will inform residents what is being done, and intend having done all the above by April 2018.

Residents may be wondering what is happening about the appeal by Richborough Estates for outline planning to develop the land at Gillingham corner. Their appeal will be heard in May, in Salisbury, where I and several councillors will be attending to restate our position on this application.

We have been asked about bee-keeping on allotments in Mere and the advice given by The National Allotment Society precludes the use of Mere Allotments for various reasons. Meanwhile, we would like to encourage bees in the area as they are important pollinators and are looking for suitable sites – if you have a site that you are willing to offer then, please, let us know through the contact below.

Finally, at the start of the year, it is usual to make some resolutions and I have a few aspirations that I personally, as Chairman, would hope to achieve. I would hope to encourage the sensible development of Mere with more opportunities for employment and appropriate accommodation for local people – our Neighbourhood Plan will be an important part of this. I hope that this year we will continue to improve the facilities in Mere - starting with an improvement in the Public Toilets - but also to find ways to help with the development of Mere Surgery. Similarly, I hope to make real progress with developing the old swimming pool site – we now have some of the necessary quotes for this and are in the process of gathering funding from various agencies. Mere is a good place to be, with much to do and see, and I hope to generate more interest in Mere as a place to visit through, excuse the phrase, raising our internet profile. Finally, I hope to make positive and substantive responses to the comments and concerns that I hear from residents.

WEST KNOYLE PARISH COUNCIL

I am happy to report that the Public Access Defibrillator has now been installed outside the village hall. A HUGE thank you to all the villagers who donated towards this facility. The defibrillator has been registered with the ambulance service and is ready for use. We are in the process of arranging an awareness session, so please keep an eye on the notice board if you are interested. I am also pleased to report that the kitchen refurbishment in the village hall has been completed and has already been used to great effect. A HUGE thank you to the Village Hall Social Club and to Wiltshire Council's South West Wiltshire Area Board for making this happen.

The Parish Council now owns the BT telephone kiosk in the village and we are in the process of smartening it up – suggestions for its use are still welcome – the only one received so far has been for a community book swap/library.

The Parish Council is required to have the play equipment inspected by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA) each year. Unfortunately, the swings in the village hall site failed to meet standards, and the Parish Council and Village Hall Committee agreed that they should be removed. If parishioners feel that they would like these replaced with new or alternative equipment, please let us know. Also, repair work is being carried out to the play equipment in the playing field in order to bring it up to required standards.

GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, MERE DIVISION, WRITES

Recently one proposal from Wiltshire Council has been that Mere be put in The Trowbridge housing market area rather than as of our recent history, which is the Salisbury Market Area. We have a History of pre-parished areas being in The Salisbury Diocese with Salisbury Cathedral. About 100 plus years ago we became a parished area, with Mere and Tisbury rural District Council who used the services of Salisbury for valuation. 1974 saw us join with Salisbury District Council. After the 2009 Unitary Council we were, and still are, in the Salisbury market area. Most of the public transport goes east to Salisbury, rather than north to Trowbridge, and the main road route on the A303 leads most east/west rather than north/south, certainly not to Trowbridge. Buses from Mere travel principally to Salisbury and Gillingham, Dorset, few if any make it to Trowbridge. From Gillingham station, residents of Mere again travel east/west. Some residents do work north of Mere and in Trowbridge, but I have argued Salisbury is thought by most to be where we associate, not Trowbridge.

It has come to my attention, that DIY items taken to household recycling sites in Wiltshire could become chargeable, I will report again if this measure is proceeded with.

Libraries have been a success storey, being maintained across Wiltshire by many volunteers. Extended Library hours are now available at The Nadder Centre at Tisbury, because of more volunteers coming forward.

West Knoyle Parish council and local residents have contacted me over approximately the last twelve months, regarding the parking situation at Stoney Bridge. This includes lack of parking and the possibly inevitable parking on the road and pavement at the entrance, making it necessary for some to have to walk in the road. I have met with a Wiltshire Council officer on site who has stated that in principal, she would not be against using the Wiltshire Council land to develop further parking and access. However, no funds are available from Wiltshire Council, therefore it would have to be financed by the residents or by a locally funded scheme. Some may consider this, as it may put value on their house, others may not be interested.

Our South West Area Board (SWWAB) has agreed to question why our defibrillator at Castle Street was not used in a recent emergency and why the relative was not pointed towards the one at the local school. I can report all was well with the person eventually. Ross Thompson monitors and reports on the device, for which I thank him.

Mere Snooker Club in Salisbury Street has survived for a little longer. After recent publicity more members have come forward, however more are needed.

The Gillingham Corner Junction in Mere could pose danger for those walking back to Mere. A hedge has been cut back and The Area Board Community Action Transport Group (CATG) are looking at further measures. It is one of their top five priorities, as is a request at a recent CATG that about £4,000 be awarded to survey the possibility of some double white lines in the areas of the Stourton junction with the Mere to Frome Road (B3092), which has been accepted. Mere Town Council has requested some of the pavement improvement budget awarded earlier in the year to the SWWAB. The proposal is to screed the pavement from Mere Post Office to St Michaels Church to help the ambulant disabled.

Although probably obvious, it should be remembered high speed broadband is required and it is to be found in your area, although a sign up procedure is required to receive it. Across Wiltshire, it appears some have assumed that because it is in their area, they will receive it. I recently reported back to the Wiltshire Council Management Scrutiny Committee, the following plus more detail. I have sat on the broadband project board since its inception. In 2011 40% of the Wiltshire Council area was in need of broadband or improved broadband. When our project is finished in 2019 this will be down to 4%, having used the combined efforts of our intervention scheme and commercial role out. This 4% may still benefit from payback Wiltshire Council will receive from the project. Those presently with less than 2Mb/s can use £300 to £350 government vouchers to club together forming a self-help scheme; however they then will be discounted from our intervention area (white area). Our small team has worked to win LEP (Commercial development Finance) and BDUK (Government Broadband Finance) funding whilst satisfying European directives regarding the spending of public money. The project has come in under budget. We have had our problems, for instance when BT had projected a number of premises to be completed by a certain date, then fell short. We cannot totally satisfy the final 4%, but if we look at this project as a whole, it is something Wiltshire Council and others can say is a success story. Currently, the government appears to be pursuing a universal provision by 2020; which should help address the last 4%.

All is on schedule for the completion of the first council bungalows in Mere for a long time, Leaflets will be distributed to all 254 affordable homes within the Parish, and amenities within the Town, as well as the addresses I and The Town Council have previously discussed.

Once the leaflets are within the community, each recipient, if interested in one of the bungalows, will have until the end of March to register with **Homes4Wiltshire**, before the adverts are made live for one week. Therefore, by mid-April we will know the occupants for the two bungalows. The lucky residents will be able to choose and arrange (carpets/curtains), and any additional grab rails etc that may be required.

The Police have been consulting regarding a £12 a year increase on a band D property. This hopefully will improve the general situation. I note the closure of police stations and sale or closure of police buildings. The number of stations with front counters where the public can speak directly to officers has fallen from 901 in 2010 to 510 now. Alternative contact methods that have been provided in some areas across the country, including an unmanned electronic "contact point" in a Warrington shopping mall, civilian volunteers staffing a police contact point in a Dorset library two days a week, and scheduled police meet-ups in cafes. We may see more Police nationally, however I doubt we will see more Police stations.

Dog fouling is often complained about to me. I was pushing my mother in law along in her wheel chair narrowly missing dog excrement in Water Street. Had the wheels gone through it, with a user propelling themselves, they would have probably had this on their arms and may-be hands. Those who do not pick up, it is antisocial, nearly as bad is picking up and then leaving the bag suspended or thrown in the side. These acts can lead to blindness in children. Although extremely rare, just one is too many. Ocular toxocariasis is a rare infection caused by roundworms, Toxocara canis and Toxocara cati. It was first recognized to be associated with dogs in the 1940s. It typically affects children and can lead to profound monocular loss of vision despite known medical and surgical therapies.

When walking a dog in the country the problems with dog fouling was highlighted in a Country File article. Veterinary surgeon Laura Higham said: "Neosporosis is an infectious disease of cattle caused by a parasite transmitted in dog faeces, and is the most commonly diagnosed cause of abortion in cattle in the UK". I understand owners can help by having the dogs and cats "wormed", but you would need consult a vet.

Health minister Jackie Doyle-Price has said the proposed £72,500 cap on social care costs due to come into effect in England will be scrapped. The proposed limit was to be on an individual's care costs, at which point that person would have been state funded.

I attended a meeting in Mere, when it was agreed a music making event, called "Mere Makes Music", is proposed for Saturday, 28th April 2018. I believe this date to be correct. Wiltshire Rural Music School based in Trowbridge but also a county-wide charity, are trying to work out in communities more. Wiltshire Rural Music School is also offering funding of 6 workshops afterwards.

Ann-Marie Dean, the Health and Well Being Champion for our South West Area Board, has booked The Andy Young Pavilion as a 'Pop Up' café for afternoon teas, from 3.00 to 4.30pm on Tuesday, 20th February and again on Tuesday, 20th March. I hope this will bring many people in the area of Zeals, Mere, Kilmington etc. together.

To finish, some councils have less than a festive cheer. A minicab driver has criticised Durham County Council after officials ordered him to remove Christmas stickers from his car for breaching rules!!

The Health Trainer will also be able to offer the chance to have your blood pressure checked. This is a free service, so well worth a visit.

We have for many years had a Community Diary in the Library which can be filled in by anyone who is thinking of having an Event in Mere.

This is already used by many of the Local Fund-Raising Organisations so that they can see what dates are available, so that hopefully not too many Organisations hold Events on the same day. The Library is Open Mondays 10.00am - 7.00pm, Tues/Thurs/Fridays

9.30am - 5.00pm and Wednesdays and Saturdays 9.30am - 1.00pm, so if you are thinking of planning an Event, do pop in and enter the details for others to see.

MERE RIVERS GROUP Wildlife Sightings

In the 7 weeks since the last lot of recordings, the following have been seen by Mere residents: Grey wagtail – seen daily, Little Egret - 9 times, Kingfisher - 5 times and Water Vole - 4 times. Heron, Tree Creeper and Bullfinch were all seen once. Most exciting to see was a Water Rail in the river by the bridge near the Lynch. This small brown bird has longs legs and a bright red bill.

Please email any sightings at all to A: mereriverwildlife@btinternet.com. Of course, the same creature could be reported many times or may be seen just once. Multiple recordings of the same creature shows that the habitat is just fine for it, so this counts as valid information about the biodiversity of The Shreen and The Ashfield. Please keep those sightings coming in by going for a walk along your rivers, keeping your eyes open for any wildlife and spend a relaxing time with nature.
