# MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meet every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You may raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be on **Monday**, **14th May at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion**.

#### The Chairman writes:

The April Meeting of the Town Council made further progress with planning some of the events coming up this year. Both, the Centenary of the end of WWI and the 150th Anniversary of Mere Clock Tower have working groups of councillors developing plans. We have a date for the anniversary, Thursday, 19th July and the Lord Lieutenant of Wiltshire will be attending. Further news on these events and the part you can play will be announced here in Mere Matters closer to the event.

We have had some news from Wiltshire Council about the car parks and public toilets. It seems that they will be leased to the Town Council again. We haven't been given any details except to be told that the Town Council will be responsible for repairs to the collapsing drain for the toilets. This was a major item in our budget planning and we await final details of the leasing arrangements. We were informed by our clerk of further financial demands as the boiler in the public toilets has broken down and needs replacement – this is making it difficult to clean the toilets.

Our Neighbourhood Planning Committee is progressing with its work and will be presenting information at public events in Mere so that members of the public can find out more about the process. An information gathering survey is being prepared which will give residents an opportunity to put their views about how they would wish Mere to develop. On the planning front, we are seeking advice from the barrister who will contest the appeal by Richborough Estates against the refusal of outline planning for Gillingham Corner development. We need to be clear on what role we, and members of the public, can play in the hearings.

We have now had a visit from Wiltshire Council's Dog Warden, it was a very productive meeting. Councillor Mead was able to show her around the places about which we

receive the most complaints about dog fouling: the recreation ground, Waterside, Dark Lane, Angel Lane and the Meads. The warden will be patrolling these areas to observe dog owner behaviour. We have asked that she, at first, makes herself highly visible so that owners can see that areas are being patrolled. The warden will, at some point, then start to patrol in ordinary uniform.

The warden stressed that she has the ability to fine dog owners and the fines can be considerable. The warden asked to be informed of persistent offenders and she would personally visit them and speak to them about their actions and the consequences. If you have information that you wish to pass to the warden then please contact the council office – please note we cannot act on anonymous complaints.

The warden clarified that in areas, like the Meads, owners should pick up. Fields are the property of a landowner, usually a farmer, and they are not public dog toilets. I have had the delight of being a foster dog owner for a couple of weeks and appreciate the companionship a dog can bring but that brings with it the responsibility to clear up after your dog. I spent an hour with the litter pickers on Sunday and picked up on the path around Castle and Long Hills – it was disappointing that part of my collection was six 'poo-bags' dropped by the path.

There can be no excuse for the attitude that a few owners have. In the words of a dog warden – 'pick it up and dispose of it in a proper place – your dog cannot do that so you must'. Our dog warden will be reporting back to us, we hope to hear about improved behaviour from the few offending dog-owners rather than about residents who have been fined.

On a more pleasant note, it was good to hear recommendations by a group of councillors that our Risk Assessment and internal control measures are fit for purpose and the full council adopted them. I would thank our Clerk who keeps these matters in order and note that regulations keep being added, giving a small town council much to do before it starts on the more visible council work.

We heard from Councillor Hazzard on work being done by Mere Museum to preserve the Rutter Scrapbooks which contain documents relating to life and activities in Mere in the 19th century. A good deal of money has been raised towards this, and the Town Council resolved to commit an amount to help this project to be realised.

Another date for your diary was announced at the meeting. 'Healthy Mere Walking – Great Bottom walk' on Sunday, 10th June. There is more information elsewhere in Mere Matters.

#### Public Enquiry for Land at Castle Street, Mere

The Public Inquiry notice shown below relates to an outline planning application made by Richborough Estates for 130 houses off Castle Street (Gillingham Corner). Mere Town Council objected to the planning application, and Wiltshire Council refused planning permission. Other objectors included Campaign to Protect Rural England who stated: "It would be contrary to CPRE's objectives and principles for development in the countryside, especially in South Wiltshire, and we are happy to support Mere Town Council's objection."

If you feel strongly about this potential development then you should attend the enquiry.

# GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, WRITES:

I attended The Southern Planning Committee on Thursday, 12th April in Salisbury and afterwards I attended The Civic Society annual Planning Forum, which this year had the title 'New Settlements: an Alternative Approach to Meeting Housing Demand'. New settlements have proved their worth elsewhere, by relieving the pressure to find new sites round the edges of existing settlements, and by being large enough to enable a strategic approach to creating the necessary infrastructure. One speaker was from Winchester City Council, and spoke regarding the northern extension to a new settlement at North Whiteley, between Winchester and Fareham. With the need for so much housing, continually adding to existing settlements can put strain on existing settlements. I was interested to hear that to achieve a new settlement takes around 20 years. If this is the case, although a good idea for the future, it will not help those in need now.

While in Salisbury, I noted that parking is now free for a period of time, an increase in the number of people, which should help Salisbury's economy, especially after recent events of the reported attempted murder of Sergei Skripal and his daughter. Alistair Cunningham, the corporate director of Wiltshire Council and the chair of the Salisbury recovery co-ordination group, has warned that the city will not be back to normal until the summer of 2019. He said that Salisbury was a "resilient city", with "a history of a thousand years", and that while the attack would be part of its history, "the city is bigger than that." He said the decontamination process would begin after the Easter holidays.

I recently gave an after dinner talk to The Rotary Club of Gillingham, who kindly offered to donate £75 to a charity of my choice, I chose The Dorset Air Ambulance, many of us are aware when an air ambulance has been a life saver, the average cost of a mission is  $\pm 3,000$ . Also I noticed the Projector at The Olive Bowl was to be changed and suggested the old one could be used for community use, I am please to say the projector has been donated to me for this purpose.

Mere Town Clock seems now to keep good time. With clocks across the country adjusted by an hour on a Sunday morning recently, Dorchester Town Council found itself with a little more work on its hands. It was found that the dial on the 200-year-old clock in Dorchester town centre showed a total of 61 minutes, with an extra digit between the 7 and 8. The deputy town clerk noted it was "incredible to think that no one has ever noticed this before." The dial has been removed and repainted, and is awaiting reinstallation.

I receive complaints sometime regarding people parking partly on the pavement. I have read recently, parking spaces in Bath are painted half-on and half-off the pavement and are being hailed as a success by Bath and North East Somerset Council. Exeter also has half-on half-off parking in areas.

Dorset are pioneering a push to link hospital and community care. The FT analyses Integrated Care Systems (ICTs), 10 of which are being run across England. ICTs see

NHS organisations and councils work collectively to manage resources and improve people's health. I note that The Government has announced a major expansion of schemes, which see NHS patients given control of spending on their healthcare and home-help needs. Up to 350,000 regular users of healthcare will be given "personal budgets", using allocations from NHS and council budgets. Ministers said a more individual focus on care need will form one of the "key principles of reform" when a green paper on social care is published this summer. Care Minister, Caroline Dinenage, said the initiative will "reduce pressure on emergency care by joining up health and social care services at a local level".

I am still trying to get Wiltshire Council to sort out the many street lights that continue to fail or have failed in Mere. There are 4,000 streetlights in Wiltshire at present, 7% are LED and more are being changed to LED. Wiltshire Council is responsible for public health, therefore I noted Public Health England has raised concerns about a new generation of LED streetlights, which are cheaper to run and produce lower emissions. However, it has been alleged that they could disrupt people's sleep and potentially damage their eyesight. In the Chief Medical Officer's annual report, it was noted that councils are increasingly replacing mercury and sodium streetlights with LED alternatives. I have noted myself LED street lights appear very bright in one area of a light pattern but the light diminishes quite quickly around the edge of the pattern. Sodium lights to me appear more of what I would call a "night time light".

Our area is relatively safe regarding crime, however it is worth noting, nationally two thirds of burglary cases are closed without investigation. Last year almost 130,000 burglary investigations across England and Wales were closed without any suspect being identified - up more than 35,000 since 2014 when the statistics were first collected and published.

Wiltshire Council has upheld a decision to close two activity centres in Wiltshire because outdoor education is 'not a priority' for its children's services. An announcement to close Braeside in Devizes and Oxenwood in Marlborough caused shock and sparked a petition that gained over 14,100 signatures. The decision was made behind closed doors at a private cabinet meeting on 5th April. However the Overview and Scrutiny Management Committee voted eight to five (with one abstention) to reject the claim that the decision had not been made fairly. Councillors also debated whether the sites were 'massively dilapidated' and would have been in need of £1.4m worth of investment to continue operating. Any charities or external companies which were interested in keeping the sites open as activity centres had until Tuesday, 24th April, to submit a business case to the council, which said it would consider all serious bids to keep the centres open. Seeds4Sucess locally use Oxenwood, and I understand they would have liked to have seen this service continue. I believe more effort and time should have been allowed to have found a charity etc. to have maintained these facilities.

GDPR The (European) General Data Protection Regulations will come into force in the UK on Friday, 25th May 2018. This will affect almost all people. Wiltshire Councillors have until early June to finish training. From my perspective it heightens the need to keep electorate's data secure and only keep as long as required, which I have always tried to do.

I am pleased to say that the recently completed new Bungalows at Bramley have been awarded to local people. Because of the parking problems around Bramley House, I have had the following fact minuted in The Town Council minutes for use in the future. Parking outside the bungalows for four of the six spaces is for public use, and is not to

be obstructed by flower tubs etc. Although, only two more social houses, these will help the many that require housing.

Dog excrement in public areas and hung in plastic bags in hedges etc. needs preventing, please help by reporting to me or your local council. I understand the Dog Warden will take up each case. Some dog owners or walkers deserve to be prosecuted in my opinion, when deliberately refusing or trying to evade picking up.

The leader of Wiltshire Council, Jane Scott, has been in the media because of a rival challenge to her party political position. I think it worth noting that Jane Scott would be free to continue in the role as Leader of Wiltshire Council until the next elections in 2021, what ever the outcome.

Our roads in Wiltshire still are poor in areas aggravated by the recent inclement weather. While in Dorset recently, I used some non-classified roads which were nearly impassable to a small vehicle. Nationally, The Farmers' insurer, NFU Mutual, has warned that increasing numbers of potholes on rural roads are putting horse riders and cyclists at risk, and a combination of severe weather and a lack of maintenance means some roads are in such a poor state they might need to be closed altogether.

I have had local people consult me when having signed agreements in their home with the provider of the service present. Should you or someone you know, especially the elderly and vulnerable, are considering such action please advise that they need to be allowed a 'cooling off' period. Although by law there is usually a cooling off period, an immediate signature can, on reflection, be regretted.

Passport countersignature and witnessing photocopies of documents to be certified as a true copy, is a requirement many have. I complete several of these a week. Should you have need of either of these services, please remember I will help if I can.

Mere Matters and other local community magazines are usually available a few days before the end of the month, therefore remember "Mere Makes Music" on Saturday, 28th April 2018 at Mere School and Children's Centre.


# LINK SCHEME FUNDRAISER REQUIRED

# MERE RIVERS GROUP

#### **General notes**

Anyone walking along Burton path recently will have seen activity at Wessex Water pumping station. This is regular maintenance and updating of equipment and facilities.

One of the effects of this is that all water abstraction from Mere will stop for approximately three months. The stoppage is now scheduled to start at the end of May and run through the summer. We expect that the levels of our streams will benefit from this and therefore an increase in wildlife sightings and diversity of species.

#### Wildlife Sightings for March

At the time of writing, which is the beginning of April, we have had a very cold and wet March. However, despite the weather (or because of) there have been sightings of several different birds. These have included Fieldfare and Redwings, which are types of thrush and are winter migrants and were certainly looking for food in the cold weather. Snipe, which is a type of wader, was also seen. It was once a frequent visitor to our rivers so the two sightings are a good sign.

The following are your sightings for March: Fieldfare - flock of 12, Little Egret - 6 and a pair; Redwing, Moorhen and Collared Dove each seen 3 times; Grey Wagtail, Goldcrest, Snipe and a pair of Mute Swans each seen twice; Wren, Green Woodpecker and Chiffchaff each seen once; Long Tailed Tits - a small flock of 6 and a pair. The water vole was seen twice. A small shoal of stickleback and the bright yellow Brimstone Butterfly were also seen. Spring flowers have been appearing and this has included primroses, lesser celandine and butterbur.

#### Nature Notes

With spring's arrival, the summer migrants are arriving and the Swifts, Swallows and House Martins will be skimming the streams catching the various river insects. It would be good to know the earliest date they have been seen. At this time of year it is also good to note the insects eg: mayflies, butterflies, damsel flies and demoiselles, as well as the plants they may be using for their food, resting places and for laying eggs.

Looking forward, we hope for no further unexpected events (certainly no closures), and with hints of Spring in the air, we anticipate our summer programme, which includes a visit from the children of Mere School, always a pleasure to chat to the young people; art and craft, a trip to the seaside in June and the celebration of the thirtieth anniversary of the opening of the Rosemary Goddard Centre in July to be held where we have our twice weekly sessions, in the community room at Lynch Close.

## **MERE MUSEUM**

There's nothing but good news from the Museum this month! First, the South West Wiltshire Area Board has just awarded the Museum £2,000 toward the costs of conserving the Rutter Scrapbooks - a two-volume compendium of posters, newspaper cuttings and other documents relating to the history of, and activities in, Mere during the 19th century.

The Town Council has also generously agreed to contribute £225 which, together with two grants (2016 and 2017) totalling £2,700 from the Lecture Hall Trust, means that we now have just about enough money to proceed with the work. We are extremely grateful for this generous local support.

Not, however, before the Museum's Big Event on Saturday, 16th June from 2:00 – 5:00p.m. We are very lucky that Wiltshire Museum Service's Conservator will be carrying out the conservation of the Scrapbooks and has agreed to join us. She will describe what is involved in such a huge conservation task. The Scrapbooks will remain at the Museum for anyone to see until later in June when they go to the conservator. Other plans for the Event are shaping up nicely – details in the next issue of Mere Matters.

In mid-May the present and much acclaimed exhibition about Mere's Amazing Neighbours will come down and we shall be showing two WWI travelling exhibitions from Wiltshire Museum's Service: 'Keeping the Home Fires Burning' and 'A Child's War'. These will be on display for about 2 weeks.

After this we shall mount a new exhibition about Mere's water coinciding with the updating of the Water Treatment Works at Burton field. Our streams should be fuller for the duration of the updating works and so this is an opportune moment to look again at the question of water in Mere. The exhibition will be jointly mounted by the Mere Rivers Group and the Museum, and will be entitled 'A Tale of Two Rivers', opening to the public on Tuesday, 12th June.

## **NEWS FROM HINDON PRIMARY SCHOOL**


"Remember to look up at the stars and not down at your feet. Try to make sense of what you see and wonder about what makes the universe exist - Be curious!" Stephen Hawking

This quote from the eminent physicist; Professor Stephen Hawking who died on 14th March 2018, was on everyone's mind at Hindon Primary School as the pupils and staff enjoyed a Science curriculum enrichment week. The children were challenged to be curious, to wonder and to try and make sense of the world around them and they had, quite literally, a 'hair-raising' time!!

During the week, the school hosted a Mad Science Day for pupils from local Primary Schools. The Physics workshops, based around the principal of Static Electricity were electrifying!
