The Town Council meet every month. While it is not a public meeting, members of the public

are welcome to come and listen. Council members are working on your behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in Mere. You may raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be on **Monday**, 5<sup>th</sup> **November at 7.30pm** in the Andy Young Pavilion.

#### The Chairman Writes

I have had the pleasure of attending two local events this past month. I was asked to speak at a meeting of Merely Women about the work of the Town Council and the role of a councillor. I feel that it went well and they asked a good few pertinent questions at the end. I am impressed with how groups like this work in Mere bringing together residents for social and informative sessions – a far cry from the isolated screen

watching individuals that we hear so much about in the media. My second event came just before sitting down to write this. I was invited to attend the final session of this year's Mere Literary Festival. With a Lecture Hall full we were treated to hear young people read out their entries in the writing competition and very good they were. Later we heard the winner of the adult writing competition as well. It was a special Festival as it was the last one organised by Adrienne Howell who brought the festival into existence in 1997 and who has been the major force in keeping it thriving successfully these past 22 years. I had the opportunity to give the thanks of Mere Town to her for such an outstanding achievement which has helped put Mere on the map and has provided Mere with so many entertaining and informative occasions.

I have been working with other councillors and volunteers to put together a unique response to the centennial of the end of WWI and you will have seen it around the town. The 52 'sculptures', as the reporter from radio Wiltshire called them will have been on display for some time when you read this and they will soon be moving to Jubilee Gardens (on 6th November). What struck me was the interest and keenness of Mere residents to display them on their property when asked. Likewise, when the Vicar and I talked to the children at Mere school, the awareness of what they represent.



Altogether, this is another instance where Mere residents responded wholeheartedly and with keen interest. If you haven't managed to find all 52 'sculptures', there is a map, available from The Library, showing the locations.

There will, of course, be a Remembrance Service, starting at the **War Memorial** in The Square on **Sunday 11th November** and the Town Council is taking part in the WW1 Beacon of Light in tribute to the millions of men and women who died or were injured in World War One. We will be lighting a beacon on **Castle Hill at 7.00pm** along with Churches throughout the UK and overseas, as part of the 'Battle's Over

Commemoration', Mere Church bells will ring at 7.05 p.m.

In our October Town Council meeting we had a good few agenda items to discuss which were brought about as Wiltshire makes plans for the future. We are always actively involved on your behalf and try to put the position and needs of Mere Town clearly in these consultations. One aspect that we have contributed to is the review of electoral boundaries and electoral representation at county level. We have argued that the ward that includes Mere should stay much as it is now to avoid diluting our access to a County Councillor. Another area of consultation is on the future plans for development in the Wiltshire Core Strategy. This will have a direct effect on our local planning and on the demands placed on the Mere area for future housing and infrastructure provision. We made a positive contribution some months ago and are disappointed to find that our point of view is still 'under consideration' and the consultation is not resolved to our satisfaction. Several of us will be attending further meetings with Wiltshire County planning officials to put our opinions forward. This is another reason why we, as a Town, need to press on with our own Neighbourhood

Plan. If you have an opportunity, whether it be filling in a survey form or volunteering to help, please do so. The more involvement of residents across Mere that we have, the better the final outcome will be. The application to build a new estate at what we know as 'Gillingham Corner' failed in appeal but the company behind it may still appeal to the Secretary of State. The application raised different points of view amongst residents and we hope that having a Neighbourhood Plan will state clearly how the people of Mere see the town developing. Please take part to make your thoughts known.

#### WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR GEORGE JEANS WRITES

I must thank Richard Jefferies for taking over from Graham Avory as editor of Mere Matters. This is his first official issue and I am sure he will be more than capable. It should be noted he does this for the "love of the job" and nothing else, therefore please be kind to him, not that he cannot look after himself!

**Armistice:** There are at present mementos to appear as the image of a helmet resting on a rifle all around the town of Mere to commemorate the end of The First World War, which was known as armistice. Ted Henson kindly has provided three silhouette soldiers free for the commemoration for which I would like to thank him, one being on The Mere Post office. I would also like to thank everyone involved in the great community effort being made to commemorate the end of The First World War.

Pettridge Lane - Road Closure 27th November: Wiltshire Council has made an Order to close Pettridge Lane temporarily to all traffic from its junction with Dark Lane to its junction with The Lynch. This to enable Wessex Water to complete manhole replacement works. This Order will come into operation on 27 November 2018 and the closure will be required between the hours of 9:00am and 3:00pm for 1 day. It is anticipated that the works will take the stated duration to complete depending upon weather conditions. Access will be maintained for residents and businesses where possible, although delays are likely due to the nature of the works. The Order will have a maximum duration of 18 months. **Housing:** Based on the latest National Planning Policy Guidance and the government's wishes to provide more housing, Wiltshire Council will be given a number of housing units it has to allow for being put into place, from government level. Wiltshire Council is required to set a housing requirement in the new Local Plan for each existing and new neighbourhood plan once the new Local Plan is agreed. Wiltshire Council will work with Parish and Town Councils to find an indicative figure to use where work is just commencing on new neighbourhood plans and they look beyond 2026, the end of

Wiltshire Core Strategy plan period. I noted with interest from 2006 to 17, Amesbury developed 1450 dwellings of which only 12% were on previously developed land and Corsham developed 597 of which 98% were on previously developed land.

Benefits: Many people know of the single person's 25% discount regarding Council Tax, however some are not aware of further rebates that can be applied for on a needs basis. I say this because benefits are not retrospectively claimable and the claimant may not realise their ability to claim entitlement, maybe for years causing unnecessary financial difficulty. A quote from a National Audit Office report says local authorities and Government departments are deemed worse than private sector creditors for the heavy-handed way in which they collect debts and manage people in arrears, this would include council tax.

**Town Crier:** Salisbury for many of us is the natural market city for this area, Salisbury have joined the town crier revival. Demand for town criers is growing across the country as local officials look to enliven ailing high streets and catch the attention of shoppers. More than 150 towns and cities now have a crier, including Salisbury, partly a decision to reassure visitors that the Novichok poisoning "nightmare" is past. Salisbury wants to get across that people are safe in Salisbury.

**Salisbury:** Another much larger initiative is a £69m transformation of The Salisbury's Maltings shopping centre being planned in a further bid to revitalise the town centre after the Novichok poisonings. The plans would include a hotel, gym, restaurants and a new cinema, along with new shopfronts and a covered arcade.

**Clean air:** Although not local this may interest you, vehicles can be used for more than just transport, Wiltshire proposed to have on board cameras on some waste vehicles to survey the road, now a new bus in Southampton is being tested that cleans the surrounding air up to a height of 10 metres as it travels along, removing 99.5% of particulate matter.

Animal Licensing: At the last licensing committee meeting on 3 September, we were informed about the new animal licensing regulations that would come into force from 1 October 2018. The legislation has sought to ensure more robust measures for animal welfare and Officers would seek to award well run establishments a full 3-year licence. The existing Dog Warden service will be utilised to help carry out the inspections whilst a couple of members of the Licensing Team gain the relevant training and experience. The new regulations have meant that the Team have been pulled away from their current licensing work.

**Public Transport:** With a minimal number of bus services in our area I note, the LGA (Local Government Association) has warned that funding free bus passes is becoming "nearly impossible" for local authorities, with the number of journeys down to its lowest since 2006. Department for Transport figures show that nationally 1.2bn local bus journeys were made between April and June, down from a high of 1.33bn between July and September 2008.

**Housing:** Mere has seen two new council houses developed recently. A bid for additional funds to create 49 new affordable rented council homes across Wiltshire has been endorsed by councillors. Wiltshire Council has submitted a bid to Homes England for £610k grant funding and also for £7.51m additional borrowing approval to build the homes. If successful it will ensure one to six homes will be built in 16 areas across Wiltshire. The homes could also be boosted with funding from the use of £1.36 million Right to Buy capital receipts. The overall development is likely to cost around £9.48m

**Roads:** I note the roads in our area deteriorate further. Mill Lane is one example which I am trying to get addressed. The RAC has said that motorists are nationally almost four times more likely to suffer a breakdown from hitting a pothole than 12 years ago. The motoring organisation said 14,220 of the callouts it has received over the past year were caused by Britain's crumbling roads. Local authorities say they are £556m short of the funds they need to maintain the roads this year.

**Waste Recycling:** Wiltshire has bi-weekly waste collections and to my knowledge this will stay for the foreseeable future. The sign of the times is however shown by a statement I have read, "Conwy County Borough Council is to roll out monthly bin collections from Monday following a trial - the first area in Wales and England to make the move".

**Broadband:** On the 18th September 2018 I made a report to the Overview and Scrutiny (OS) Management Committee. The Wiltshire Online (WOL) programme is designed to provide a fibre broadband service via a variety of technologies including Fibre to the Cabinet (FTTC) and Fibre to the Premises (FTTP). The areas we intervene in are where commercial providers consider the area to be financially non-viable – this is known as the Intervention Area. Without Wiltshire Council's investment, approximately 40% of Wiltshire would not have access to superfast broadband. The council's approach is designed to deliver fibre broadband to the greatest number of premises for the budget available. There are very small pockets of premises possibly not provided for. The main broadband infrastructure provider sometimes provides a commercial service in Wiltshire's intervention areas, this actually lowers the cost that Wiltshire pays, providing further funding for broadband

**Parking** on the streets of Mere away from the centre is now becoming more difficult as the years pass. I have suggested to Mere Town Council at some point a review of many highway problems including parking, dangerous junctions and more away from the centre perhaps needs review. The answer is somewhat harder to find. I note with interest, data obtained from 20 councils shows £11m has been spent on 20mph limit zones between 2012 and 2017, covering 1,536 miles of roads. However, in some cases rates of serious accidents have gone up. The Department for Transport has revealed that 86% of cars broke the speed limit in 20mph zones last year, with drivers travelling at an average speed of 26mph.

### **WEST KNOYLE PARISH COUNCIL**

The Council last met on 18th September when members

of the Parish Council noted that the C297 road up from the village centre to Willoughby Hedge had improved following recent works carried out by Wiltshire Council. However, we talked about the problems encountered by drivers coming out of the garage/Starbucks onto the B3098 on the wrong side of the road. This is a longstanding problem that has been discussed at numerous Parish Council meetings and we have urged Wiltshire Council to help address the problems. Some signage was installed and arrows painted on the road outside the garage but it is obvious that the problem is still ongoing. We are going to try and make more representations.

The old telephone kiosk, now owned by the Parish Council, has received a makeover, thanks to Councillors Tony Davis, Paul Yates & Andre Filleau. Andre is going to be installing some shelving for book swaps and fruit & veg excess swaps for everyone to use. Please do make use of it once it is all up and running.

The Parish Council has agreed to send a letter of support for the Cranborne Chase AONB team to submit a bid to be an International Dark Sky Reserve. The Parish Council was keen to preserve the character and tranquillity of the area, including its night skies — which are some of the darkest in the south of England — and felt that achieving this status would help to maintain this for the future.

In order to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War the West Knoyle Social Club felt that it would be appropriate to hold a get-together in the Village Hall, hopefully on **Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> November**. There will also be a Remembrance Service in the church on **Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> November**.

#### **NEWS FROM THE BELL TOWER**

On **11th November 2018**, 100 years since Armistice, bells will ring out in unison from churches and cathedrals in villages, towns and cities across the country.

Church bells across the UK remained restricted throughout the course of the war and only rang freely once Armistice was declared. On 11 November 1918 the ringing of church bells erupted spontaneously across the country, as an outpouring of relief that 4 years of war had come to an end.



Over the past year there has been a national campaign to recruit 1,400 new bell ringers to honour those ringers who lost their lives in the Great War. David Gatehouse and Jenny Lucas of Zeal's tower have been busy teaching new recruits and on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> there will be newly recruited members as well as long standing bell ringers joining in with the nation's commemorations.

For the morning service which begins in the Square, St Michael's bells will be rung for half an hour, the bells will be respectfully half muffled giving a more sombre tone to the ringing. Fully muffled bells are reserved only for the death of a reigning monarch. At 12.30am the bells will be rung alongside churches from all over the country. In this area you will hear bells in many of the local villages. At 7.05pm the bells will once again ring out joyously as the beacon is lit on Castle Hill.

Should this bell ringing marathon inspire you to have a go please come along to monthly practice night which is held in the tower on the first Wednesday of every month. The next practice will be on **Wednesday 7th November** at 7.30pm.

## **Wildlife Sightings for September**

September and the arrival of autumn, saw the return of some of the species which go elsewhere for breeding during the summer. This was reflected in your emails to us for which we continue to be very grateful.

In September you saw Little Egret 5 times, Grey Wagtail 4 times, Brown Trout and Kingfisher both seen three times, Water Vole twice and the following were all seen once: Moorhen with older chick, Slow Worm (one dead and one alive on different occasions) and a kaleidoscope of Copper Butterflies.

#### **Nature Notes:**

As our fabulous summer faded, we were fortunate that it was followed by some beautiful bright sunny autumn days. An often overlooked but important plant for wildlife is the common ivy. Its late supply of pollen is invaluable for our insects as a last source of food before the advent of winter. Insects also feed our birds which benefit from the dense cover the ivy provides during the colder months. Do keep an eye open in and around the ivy as you walk along our waterways .... You never know what you might spot. Keep us informed of any interesting sightings.

MERE RIVERS GROUP EXHIBITION, AGM, AND MERE MUSEUM

'A Tale of Two Rivers' closes on **Tuesday 30th October**. That evening, Mere Rivers Group will hold its 2018 AGM in the exhibition space at 6.30 pm. The meeting will also mark the 7th year of our efforts in working with Wessex Water and the Environment Agency to gradually reduce the amount of water abstracted from, and often exported out of, the Shreen Catchment. We have achieved a marked reduction under the Abstraction Incentive Mechanism (AIM) when flows are low but really feel it appropriate that the licence itself be reduced markedly. Our purpose is the preservation of Mere watercourses so that both wildlife and Mere people can enjoy them.

#### LETTER FROM THE CHURCHES

# Rev Duncan Goldie writes:

#### A HUNDRED YEARS OF REMEMBERANCE

On the 11th of November this year it is a hundred years since the First World War came to an end and apart from aftermath, the loss of life on all sides was halted. This year it is impossible not to notice the extra reminders that have been put up to remind us of our need to remember and give thanks for the sacrifice that so many made.

If you have ever stood in a military cemetery, with all the neatly laid out head stones it is a sobering experience, and will cause you to ask what it was that necessitated such a tragic loss of life. At the time of the First World War, it was said that it was 'The War To End All Wars.' That has sadly not proven to be the case. As that would have been a great and worthwhile legacy.

At the heart of the Christian faith is the sacrifice of Jesus's life on a cross as God's Son in order to bring about our forgiveness and to change our lives for the better in this world and in eternity. The soldiers that fought and died, or were injured made that sacrifice in the hope that a better world would come out of it. So we who follow on from them in the world that we now live in and create are their legacy. We cannot change the events and decisions that led to the First World War, or for that matter any war or conflict that has happened, but we can learn from them, so we can try and avoid repeating the need for such sacrifice in the future. And so create a legacy that honours their sacrifice for us.
