#### MERE TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council meet every month. Whilst it is not a public meeting, members of the public are welcome to come and listen. Council members are working on YOUR behalf to sustain and improve the quality of life and the environment that we enjoy in the parish - come and hear what they are doing for you! You can raise questions in a public session before the meeting starts. The next meeting will be on **Monday**, **3rd September at 7.30pm in the Andy Young Pavilion**.

#### The Chairman writes:

In our July meeting we had quite a few planning applications to discuss. Our conclusion goes on to Wiltshire Council to inform it of our decision. We sometimes hear from applicants in the public session before the meeting and this can help explain the reasons behind the application. At other times, in the public session, residents bring up issues and concerns about matters in Mere. I can recall a good few times where these public statements have helped direct our attention and have led to positive changes for Mere. Sometimes, as councillors, we get an ear-bashing in the street about how this should be done or that hasn't been done. I had someone apologise to me the other day "Sorry to complain, but..." and my reply was "No need to apologise, call it informing me," and the matter discussed will be dealt with.

One such issue, raised some time ago and followed up by my pestering Wiltshire Council and eventually finding the right person to ask, was the state of white 'give way' lines in the square. I was pleased when I saw that they have now been repainted making the situation clear as to who has the right of way. Needless to say, there are more areas which need dealing with, as well as the state of road surface, and we shall persevere with trying to have these improved.

The small part of White Road which runs past the Social Club to the back of the school and the beginning of Burton Path is in a sorry state, and I have gone from one department to another to find who should maintain it. Despite a sign saying White Road is 'unadopted', so the 'highways people' will not deal with it, it is a Right of Way but the 'Right of Way people' don't resurface roads, so now I am trying to find someone in the 'housing department' as they must have made the road in the first place and, so I am told, they should maintain it.

To return to our July meeting. We heard that there is still no decision on the appeal about developing the land at Gillingham Corner. We heard from Councillor Norris about progress with the Neighbourhood Plan, which will provide a local framework for future planning applications. We now know that Mere Town will be offered new leases, on very similar terms as before, for the Castle Street and Salisbury Street Car Parks and the Public Convenience. We voted to take on the services of a solicitor and proceed with securing the leases. We have allocated a good deal of money in our budget to improving

the Public Convenience and when the leases are signed we shall be able to proceed. One matter, which prompted lively debate, was the condition of the play area at Walnut Road. We had allocated funds in the budget for the maintenance and our clerk is working with local interests to try and get the best outcome with the available funds. We are looking forward to some funding which will come as the Hill Brush development comes to completion.

The dry weather gave our groundsmen a break from grass cutting and they have turned their hand to improving the shed in the corner of the playing fields which was in need of repair. We are making a start on clearing up the old swimming pool site so that we can go to equipment installers for new quotes on making that space into a useful area for exercise equipment, sporting facilities and as a space for organised events. With reasonable quotes we hope to obtain funds from several bodies who support local initiatives for health and well-being.

As stated in the opening paragraph of the Town Council's report, our next meeting is on Monday, 3rd September – do come along and hear what local democracy is about and, perhaps, think about taking on a councillor role yourself in a couple of year's time.

## GEORGE JEANS, WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR, WRITES:

Summer holidays for schools will be almost over by the time of publication. This year we have enjoyed or otherwise a hot summer. In the heatwave of 1976 I was young and fit and found some nights it was difficult to breath, many did not work in the afternoon and the heat lasted to early in September. In 1976 it was dry from March to September. In that year the country was hit by a plague of ladybirds, this time around we've seen a big increase in bloodsucking horseflies - they are now at levels commonly found in Mediterranean countries I am told. I was bitten by one, I needed medical attention twice for one of the bites I received.

I, and Graham Cotton, chair of Kilmington Parish Council, and others, have had many residents from the Norton Ferris area contacting us re the blind junction when they turn North towards Frome. The latest near miss, of which many happen regularly, resulted in Mr Ploughman, a farmer, paying out of his own funds for an improved mirror, which Wiltshire Council has now removed. The existing mirror was about 20 years old. There are three working farms and a contractor at least using this junction, all turning right to Frome, because their vehicles are too large to turn left and find somewhere to turn around

within a reasonable distance. This is the peak time of the year and the vehicles that cross are both large and slow. The result of a small vehicle impacting a large vehicle in the event of an accident, I would think is high, with the probability of life changing injuries, or worse. I am extremely concerned, even frightened about what can happen, now there is no mirror. I know the law is the law and fatalities have been attributed to mirrors at junctions nationally, however in this case I think the probability of a fatality will be much higher with no mirror. When returning from the Frome direction please slow and inform others of the danger.

Dorset being one of our neighbouring counties and council, it may interest some that Christchurch Borough Council has applied for permission to appeal after its High Court bid to halt Dorset's nine councils being merged into two authorities was rejected.

We are lucky in this area that Mere, Tisbury and Wilton have retained their free public toilets. It is something I feel strongly about. We all, especially some of us when we get older, need such facilities. A study has found that more than a third of public toilets across the UK have closed in the past 20 years. According to a Freedom of Information request, it is estimated that in 1998 there were around 6,000 public conveniences run by local councils, but they have been reduced by 39% due to financial cutbacks, leaving just 3,650 facilities, The study, carried out by Domestos with the British Toilet Association, also found that 12 of the 266 councils which responded did not provide any public toilets at all.

A local person asked me this year why potholes are not ringed in yellow, I sent this request into Highways. I now am sad to see a triathlete died when her bicycle hit a pothole which hadn't been filled in because a repair team couldn't find it. Kate Vanloo was thrown into the path of a car when she rode into the four-inch deep hole, which was hidden by a puddle.

Mere is in the process of forming a local neighbourhood plan. I read with interest the following, localism may be further expanded. Residents are to be offered new powers to veto or approve plans that affect their communities, as ministers say they want to help the public sector, private businesses, charities and volunteers to work together more closely to build stronger communities. Decisions to approve housing developments, sell public assets such as community centres, or spend more on fixing potholes could be made using new forms of direct democracy. The Department for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport said that the issues at stake and the precise decision-making methods would be up to individual authorities. "Government alone cannot solve the complex challenges facing society. Government can help to bring together the resources, policies and people who, between them, can do so," the department said. Local authorities in six areas will take part in a trial over the next 12 months.

I stated recently, after the world wide reporting of the attempted murder of Sergei Skripal and his daughter in Salisbury, that I considered Wiltshire Council's collective actions were helping the city to return to its former self. This may be so, however I now read which may

have been amplified by the subsequent Amesbury incident, that the footfall has dropped 12.5%, when nationally the drop has only been 3%. Salisbury Museum has seen a 44% decrease in visitor numbers compared to last year. Salisbury

Cathedral is down 17%. The police operation in Salisbury was so extensive that only two forces in the UK were not involved.

Wiltshire Council have now started the collection of more recyclables in the Mere area. I have had many reports of missed collections, although I must stress many households have had no problem. In view of the complaints I have had, officers have agreed to meet with me to try and resolve any future possible problems.

I mentioned in my last post, a planning application at Court Farm, Lower Woodford for the storage of electrical energy on a large scale had been presented to The Southern Area Planning Committee on which I sit. The application has been refused, however will now probably go to appeal. Regarding technologies relating to electricity generation: at a Wiltshire Council meeting I attended, I heard mentioned "mini nuclear reactor". I thought what is this, now I read in the media:- "Experts say developers of 'mini' nuclear reactors should be offered the same subsidies as those provided to offshore wind farms to help commercialise the nascent industry".

The proposal is among several contained in a report by an expert finance working group appointed by the government last year to advise on small nuclear reactor projects. "Advanced nuclear technologies provide a major opportunity to drive clean growth and could create high-skilled, well-paid jobs around the country as part of our modern industrial strategy," said energy minister Richard Harrington.

I attend many local events every month, a sad one this month was the funeral of Ian Flower. Ian died aged only 57 and I would like to thank his family for all he did and achieved over the years. He did much over the years for The Mere Carnival, The Local Red Cross, served in the local fire brigade, played in the local band in years past. He worked at The Hill Brush factory and in more recent years became self employed working for many local people in Mere, Kilmington, Zeals and elsewhere. He helped convert Mere Post Office to a "Main" model.

A more happier occasion was a retirement function for Richard Pester as Watch Manager at Mere Fire Station with his fellow fire fighters and family, no I do not mean I am pleased he has retired! Richard has served his community for 30 years, again for which I thank him. On the 26th August, a party was held at The Mere Social Club for all who know Richard. Duncan White, I understand, may become the Mere Watch Manager.

I attended The Mere Social Club's AGM, and it is all credit to the committee for their achievements. The club is in excellent financial health and has been brought up to a good standard.

The South West Area Board which has often given funds to this area has, in this financial year 2018/19, given a total budget of £84,787.00, which is half of what the board had to award in 2009/10.

#### **Adult Flu Vaccination**

### Clinic to be held on Saturday 13 October 2018 From 0900 to 1300 hours

Flu vaccination is recommended for the following patients:-

Patients aged 65 and over Carers

Pregnant women (at any stage of pregnancy)

Patients aged 6m - 64 years at risk including the following conditions:-

Diabetes

Asthma (if you are using a steroid inhaler as well as Ventolin or Salbutamol)

Chronic Respiratory Disease
Chronic Heart Disease
Chronic Liver Disease
Chronic Liver Disease
Chronic Kidney Disease
Chronic Neurological Disease
Patients with a low immunity
Morbid Obesity (adults with a BMI more than or equal to 40kg/m²)

If you are unsure if you fall into one of these risk categories or not please check at the surgery.

#### **Child Flu Vaccination**

Children aged 2 and 3 on 31 August 2018 (date of birth 1/9/2014 to 31/8/2016) are being offered routine vaccination for flu this year. The vaccination is given in the form of a nasal spray and separate clinic times for children have been set up. Please contact the surgery to make an appointment for your child if you would like them to be vaccinated. Children aged 4-9 years will be vaccinated at school.

Shingles Vaccination (only required if not previously vaccinated)
Patients who turn 70, 78 or 79 during the year are encouraged to make an appointment for vaccination against Shingles. If you were recalled for a shingles vaccination last year but have still not yet been vaccinated you can still attend for an appointment up until your 80th birthday.

Men ACWY Vaccination (only required if not previously vaccinated) Patients aged 19 on 31/8/2018, or those attending University or secondary education for the first time are encouraged to attend for vaccination. This vaccine is also recommended for anyone up to the age of 25 years on the 31/8/2018 if you have not been previously vaccinated. Please contact Reception for an appointment.

#### MERE RIVERS GROUP

#### Wildlife Sightings for June and July

So who could have predicted how this summer would be? And yet our water flow in the rivers and streams has remained good despite the driest summer we have experienced for some 50 years. Surely this must prove that our rivers are not Winterbournes, as has been claimed in the past, but that abstraction – which was temporarily stopped at the end of May – has a significant impact on their flow! Abstraction is due to start again in September, so let's see what impact that has!

Sightings for June were: Moorhen and 7 chicks were seen daily, Kingfisher 3 times, Eel, brown trout and the beautiful demoiselle were all seen twice. Single sightings were recorded of Great Spotted Woodpecker, Song thrush, Shrew and a kaleidoscope of Skipper Butterflies (we looked it up and that is the correct collective noun!)

Sightings for July were: Moorhen and (almost adult) chicks as well as bats and one or two hedgehogs have been seen daily, Kingfisher 6 times, Water Vole 4 times, Green Woodpecker and Eel were seen twice. Single sightings of Grey Wagtail, Brown Trout, Slow Worm, Vapourer Moth Caterpillar and a kaleidoscope of Ringlet butterflies were also recorded.

#### **Nature Notes**

Autumn is here and swallows and martins will be leaving us soon. The berries have ripened early because the weather has been so hot. These have and continue to provide a vital food source for birds and animals deprived of worms, slugs etc during our very hot summer. Please, if you can bear to, try to leave some berries on the plants when you are out picking them!!

We are really seeking to demonstrate that the greater flow of water during the cessation of abstraction has really helped our wildlife, so your sightings at this time are really more crucial than ever.

#### CHANGES TO THE GROVE BUILDINGS

The Grove Buildings will undertake major changes throughout August to start on 1st September 2018. These changes are set out below.

- 1. A new keypad locking system will be installed on the main door, codes will be issued to regular users. This is mainly for insurance purposes as well as security.
- 2. The toilets are used by the Church for Services, Weddings and Funerals etc., these toilets will be accessible via the disabled entrance in Barton Lane. When the Grove Buildings are not in use, the doors to the main and small halls will be secured.
- 3. Cameras will be installed on both front and back doors, this is for insurance and security purposes.
- 4. Re Bookings: For all Casual Bookings of the Grove Buildings. This must be done by booking form, through the Grove Buildings Website or a booking form which can be obtained from the Grove Buildings, along with the Data Protection Form. Once this has been completed and **full payment or deposit received**, then the date will be set and the booking confirmed.
- 5. Re Regular bookings, It has been noted that most, if not all, regular users are not being invoiced, this will now change. All regular users will be invoiced monthly. This will help both yourselves and the Grove Buildings to keep regular accounts, but I must ask all regular bookers, although it may be difficult at times, to pay monthly in arrears.
- 6. It is no longer viable to pay by donation for the use of the Grove Buildings. All donations are gratefully appreciated and welcome for the Church, but the Grove Buildings has to have a levy.
- 7. Anything borrowed from the Grove Buildings i.e. tables, chairs, crockery, cutlery etc. must be paid for in advance.

#### **BELL RINGING**

#### **News from St Michaels Church Bell Tower**

The bell ringers have been busy over the summer having rung at 6 weddings with another one at the end of September. Six ringers attend for a wedding and ring for half an hour before the bride arrives, longer if she is late!! This year all of the brides have been very obliging arriving pretty much on time. Afterwards a joyous peel rings out to greet the happy couple. In August one bride arrived just as the rope for the treble bell broke, the frayed end falling through the hole in the ceiling of the ringing room to the surprise of the ringer and the bell tolling endlessly on its way down. Luckily the bride had already entered the church and heard nothing of the dying bell. All was well when a new rope was fitted but this meant placing an order with a rope-making firm in Taunton – 52ft of rope with a red, white and blue sally costing £168 plus VAT. Luckily we had organised "Tea in the Tower" in June when 30 intrepid guests climbed the spiral stone staircase to view the bells and enjoyed tea and cake in the highest café in Mere. We raised over £60 plus a generous £40 donation to supplement our coffers.

In 1558 according to Church Wardens accounts, a new bell rope cost 2 shillings and 4 pence rising to 4 shillings in 1615.

In September there is a Heritage day, which is another chance to pay a visit to the tower to see the bell room, clock room and belfry. It is worth a visit to see all 8 of the magnificent bells, one dating back to 1480, and worth listening out for when they are rung on the second and fourth Sundays in the month for morning service, and again for evening practice on the first Wednesday of the month.

In November we are rounding up as many ringers past and present to ring for Armistice Day to commemorate the end of World War One. Bearing in mind that every tower in the country has been asked to ring at the same time we hope to have enough ringers to ring all eight bells. Do give us a call if you would like to join us.

#### LETTER FROM THE CHURCHES

## Rev'd Deacon Michael Hughes, of the Roman Catholic Church of St Mary's, writes:

He killed people. Then ate them. It is said he ate 72 people, including members of his own family.

His name is Belai, and you will see his story painted on the inner walls of the round church of Ura Kidane Mihret. This church is to be found in Ethiopia on the peninsula sticking out into the southern waters of Lake Tana, out of which runs the Blue Nile. The paintings are bright and lurid in detail, Belai being depicted as a chubby man, sitting cross-legged, chewing on red flesh, with assorted limbs, his next course, strewn about him.

He was a very wicked man. But one day a leper called out to him "in the name of Mary, Mother of God, give me water to drink". And Belai remembering the power of that name, did his first good deed and gave the thirsting man water. After that he was given grace to stop his wicked ways, and to live a better life. When Belai died, the devil made ready to drag him off to hell. His many huge sins were put on one side of the scales, the side that would tip him into the worst place (I think: overcrowded, hot stationary tube train, lights broken, standing among fetid bodies, never tired, never sleeping. For ever). On the other side of the scales was only the water flask he had given the leper. The scales are tipping him towards hell, when Mary, our Mother, puts out her hand so its shadow falls on the "good deeds" side of the scales, and the weight of even her shadow tips the scales back the other way so that his soul passes not into the dark, but into the joy and lightness of Heaven.

This story is a foundational story of the Ethiopian people – as that of King Arthur is for the British. Such mythic stories reveal great underlying truths.

The point of the story is that however wrong you have gone in life, it is not too late to change direction, for God wants all of us to inherit the place of JOY he has prepared for us in Heaven.

Before we die, while we are still hale and healthy, is the time to consider how we can do more good to others, and how we can draw closer to the God who made us, and loves us.

Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now – and at the hour of our death.
