The next meeting will be on **Monday 3rd June** at **7.30pm** in the Andy Young Pavilion.

Mere Town Council -The Chairman Writes

At the Annual Town Council meeting held last week. I was elected as Chairman for the Town Council for the ensuing year and I would like to begin my first Mere Matters report by saying a huge thank you, on behalf of the Town Council and the people of Mere, to John Jordan for his hard work as Chairman of Mere Town Council during the last two years. John attended many meetings both in Mere and county wide, liaised with numerous organisations and individuals and organised many events on behalf of the Town Council. He was supported in doing all this work by Kate Symonds as Vice-Chairman and we thank her for her sterling work too.

The Town Council also co-opted Mr. Richard Pester as a new member onto the Town Council to fill a vacancy that was recently created. We had three excellent candidates who put themselves forward to fill this vacancy and all of them, I am sure, would make worthwhile councillors. Unfortunately we could only co-opt one but I urged those that were not co-opted to come forward again should there be another vacancy in the future and also to bear in mind that there will be elections again in May 2021. We consider ourselves extremely fortunate in receiving this level of interest from

parishioners in becoming Town Councillors because we are constantly being reminded in manv government publications that it is difficult to generate interest in becoming a local councillor and we are aware that there are some parish & town councils around the country that have had vacancies that they have been unable to fill for months on end.

While annual procedural matters took up a lot of time at the May meeting of the town council, I note that we were consulted on 8 planning applications as well as proposals to made a modification order to the Definitive Footpath Map & Statement to add a public footpath from The Square leading in a northerly direction for approximately 57 metres to North Street. The Town Council voted to support this proposal on the grounds that it would provide a safer route for pedestrian and children wishing to get to and from the Square to the northern side of town. The Town Council also considered a request to extend the 30mph limit along the Shaftesbury Road. Whilst this proposal was not carried, it was suggested that we urge Wiltshire Council to repaint and remark the miniroundabout on the Walnut Road iunction. The Public Access Defibrillator at Castle Street had developed a fault which was picked up by Mr. & Mrs. Thompson who kindly carry out the weekly checks on the machine. The defibrillator has been returned to the manufacturers for repair & the ambulance service have been informed. In the meantime, the defibrillator at Duchy Manor is still in good working order and the ambulance service are aware of its location.

Each year the Town Council facilitates an Annual Town Meeting. This is a public meeting, not a Town Council meeting, and is a chance for members of the public to ask any questions of the Council and receive updates on the Council's activities over the previous year. We also encourage community organisations and charities to report on their activities over the year. At this year's meeting, held on 24th April we had reports and updates

from Mere & District Linkscheme, Mere Seeds4Success. Parochial Matters. Charities, Mere & District Chamber of Trade & Mere Rivers Group. I am always reminded, at these meetings, about how much goes on in Mere but most importantly, how much volunteer time is given up by so many people in order to keep our little town so vibrant and active and I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your hard work. On that note, can I please remind all organisations that are holding events to include them in the events diary in the Mere Chamber of Trade website: merechamberoftrade.co.uk/about-thechamber/calendar/

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

I was saddened to learn, Cllr Jerry Wickham, 58 is stepping down after confirming that he had been due to announce plans to take over from Baroness Jane Scott as leader of Wiltshire Council. Having recently been diagnosed with Prostate Cancer he is now urging more men to get checked out against the early signs of what he called the "silent killer". He added: "A man dies of prostate cancer every 45 minutes and that to me is a startling figure. Cllr Wickham confirmed it will now take several weeks to reflect before making a decision about who will step forward to replace Baroness Scott when she steps down, expected to be in July.

Best Places to Live:

Salisbury was chosen by the Sunday Times, Best Places to Live guide because it "remains a divinely attractive and welcoming place".

Salisbury will host **The Armed Forces Day** from **Friday June 28th until 30th June**. If you are visiting the event, entry will be by free ticket which will be available online.

Friday 28 June - celebrating serving military personnel and their families.

Showground open from 2pm for an afternoon and evening of entertainment and activities. Enjoy live entertainment on the main stage.

Saturday 29 June - community day, Military parade in the city centre in the morning. Military demonstrations and displays in the main arena. Air show. Enjoy live entertainment on the main stage. There will be a Fireworks finale.

Sunday 30 June - celebrating veterans and cadets those who have served and those who may serve. Join in to set a world record for the largest human poppy.

Our **Seeds for Success** group may merge with the Zeals Youth group.

I am pleased to report some have volunteered to join a **litter picking group** that may form in Mere. Also a volunteer has come forward to help repaint some of the Street Name plates. Wiltshire Highways, in principal, have offered to pay for the paint. With the help of the Area Board and Mere Town Council some streets in Mere with no name plate may be able to acquire one. The above would be open to the villages around Mere as well.

Items for discussion at Community Area Transport Group (CATG) will no longer be raised via the Area Board system on the Wiltshire Council website. The Town/Parish Council will now be the first point of contact for the public.

I did say last month "With the development of Woodlands which is the old Hill Brush site, a 30MPH speed limit has been called for by some of the residents of Shaftesbury Road and others. I can see the merit in this and would not be

against it, however it is not going to happen quickly in my opinion." Mere Town Council have decided to go against a reduced speed limit, and from the above you will see they are the first point of contact and cannot discuss this again for at least 6 months, therefore I will get a SID (Speed Indicator Device) displayed from time to time.

The **National Federation of Sub-Postmasters** has warned that many of its 8,000 members have reported such significant drops in income that up to 2,500 sub-post offices are at risk of closure. A survey found that 22% intend to scale back or shut their branches in the next year, with those in rural locations most at risk. The federation wants a continuation of subsidies to branches beyond 2021 (Mere has no direct subsidy), the return of some Government services to post office branches, and the development of a broader range of banking and other financial products for them to offer. I can say Mere PO would welcome such a move.

I was interested to learn at a meeting of the **Broadband Project Board of Wiltshire Council**, the introduction of the ultra-fast 5G mobile network could be delayed by two years partly because of legal disputes over the control of lamp posts across Britain. This due to ambiguous wording in a new electronic communications code and lack of guidance over access to lamp posts and other street furniture. I have had similar complaints elsewhere in my division, new telegraph poles being erected close to existing electricity poles for instance.



On the 7th August 2002 Wiltshire County Council acknowledged a local resident by letter that a no through road sign would be erected at Edgebridge/Lordsmead, Mere. I am pleased to inform that after 16 years it has just been put up.

Residents in Tickhill Road in Rotherham have been left baffled after a £6,000 bus shelter was erected on the street – despite its only bus routes having been cut in March. Some would like it moved to The Square in Mere, where at present you can on occasions get cold and wet waiting for a Bus.

Mere Rivers Group Wildlife Sightings for April/May

It is clear you were getting out and about during April and over Easter with the arrival of Spring, as we had a large number of sightings reported to us for which we are very grateful – thank you!

The sightings were: moorhen and chicks seen daily, water vole 13 times, holly blue butterfly 6 times, peacock butterfly and slow worms both seen 4 times, male grey wagtail and ladybird seen 3 times. All seen twice were mother duck and ducklings, frog, swallow, great spotted woodpecker and bee fly. The following were seen once: pair of bullfinches, water rail, green woodpecker, goldfinch, greenfinch, pair of red kite, pair



of buzzards, wren, hedgehog, fox, pair of song thrushes, red admiral butterfly, field vole, pied wagtail, orange tip butterfly. We have had a report of a nesting blackcap and a robin's egg shell. Calls have also been heard of the following birds: chiff chaff, 3 times, great spotted woodpecker twice, goldcrest twice and greenfinch once. Further afield house martins have been seen!

Nature Notes

April saw the start of our river monitoring which involved the carrying out of a kick test on our rivers and noting specific indicator species of invertebrates. Reports are supplied to Wiltshire Wildlife Trust and also provided to Dorset Wildlife Trust at their request because our waterways feed into the River Stour in Dorset. Our first test of the year showed a reasonable mix of species and good flow, and will be carried out monthly until September. These tests are helpful in our campaign to reduce water abstraction levels by providing additional evidence to the sightings you provide.

At this time of year there are many baby birds around. Please leave them alone and do not be tempted to feed them white bread or dairy products (milk and cheese) as these can be fatal.


