Mere Town Council -The Chairman Writes

I had the pleasure of attending the Literary Festival prize giving for the Poetry Competition last weekend. It was a very well attended event and it was a delight to see so many of the children's' entries. I would like to congratulate Gail Garbutt and the Literary Festival organisers for arranging a week of successful, varied and popular events.

On the subject of events, the Town Council will be attending the annual Remembrance Service which will be held on **Sunday 10th November**. The service starts at the War Memorial in The Square at about 10.45 am. The Town Council has applied for a temporary 10 minute road closure in The Square so that we can stop the traffic.

At our October Town Council meeting, we were very pleased to hear that the Boundary Commission has made a final recommendation to the government for the Mere electoral ward to remain the same. In their report they said *'As part of our decision to modify our proposals for divisions in southern Wiltshire, we proposed further draft recommendations in which West Knoyle would be replaced in Mere*

division by Maiden Bradley. In the light of a large number of objections from both of those parishes and the confirmation by Mere Town Council that the current division most closely reflects community interactions in south-west Wiltshire, we are restoring the current division as part of our final recommendations.' It seems that people power worked on this occasion - I am aware that a number of parishioners wrote to the Boundary Commission to support this outcome and I would like to thank those that did so.

We also had a number of people attend the October Town Council meeting to inform us that the **Butt of Sherry Public House** was being put 'on the market' with a view to 'alternate use potential'. The Town Council was asked for its support in listing this building as an Asset of Community Value. The Town Council agreed to support the patrons in this venture and I am told that momentum has gathered pace since our meeting and a Facebook Group 'The Butt of Sherry Preservation Society' has been set up and a committee of people formed to investigate the possibility of purchasing the building as a community asset. I would like to point

out that, at the present time, planning permission for a change of use has not been sought or granted for this premises. Whilst the application to list the building as an Asset of Community Value will not stop the building from being sold nor will it prevent any owners from applying for change of use, it can delay the whole process and give opportunity for community groups to raise money to buy the property themselves.

There will be a public meeting on **Monday 18th November at 7.00pm**

in the **Andy Young Pavilion** to generate more interest in the **Mere Neighbourhood Plan**. This Neighbourhood Plan will provide a platform and strategy to help shape the future of Mere and is an extremely important venture but, unfortunately, it cannot be done without more public support. Please come along to the meeting to show your support and help shape the future of Mere.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

The first phase of the **Woodlands Development** in Mere have four units that are about to be handed over to The Guinness Partnership for social housing, these are 42,43,44 and 44a. Wiltshire Council I am assuming will have the nomination rights for these.

The Cranborne Chase Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty has been named Britain's best stargazing spot, after being recognised as an official dark sky reserve by the International Dark-Sky Association (IDA). The IDA recognises areas which have "exceptionally starry skies," and this is the first time a full area in the UK has been granted the status. The managers of Cranborne Chase spent more than a decade working to meet the strict criteria required, working with residents, councils, highway departments, businesses and schools

to ensure outdoor light was only used at night "when it is strictly needed." The area's director, Linda Nunn, noted that Wiltshire Council, which administers two-thirds of the area, "has already agreed to upgrade its street lighting" to help. Mere town is not in the AONB

On the subject of lighting, I continue to receive many complaints regarding non-working street lights. Whilst I apply constant pressure to Wiltshire Council in regard this issue, some get repaired and of these a few fail within days. Some are replaced with inappropriate lights which in one case Mere Town Council has fought and won. The infrastructure for them is about 60 years old.

A number of councils have chosen to ban 5G technology amid the spread of rumours that it can cause health

problems. Totnes in Devon announced that it was joining the Somerset councils of Glastonbury and Frome in opposing 5G until they were satisfied that it was safe. Shepton Mallet, also in Somerset, has followed suit, saying it would not endorse the technology "until there is more independent, disinterested scientific consensus that 5G wireless radiation is harmless".

After a local resident fell where no pavement was available, I found the following information. Wiltshire Council sweep pavements where this has been identified as a local priority by the Town Council. Road sweeping is very similar, as we are more reactive than scheduled. Wiltshire Council are responsible for the safety of the highway. Wiltshire will undertake sweeping where there is a safety concern, but this will follow a report or an inspection by a council officer.

Following on from the above, this time of the year when it is wet, farmers and builders tend to leave more deposits than in dry weather. The law requires them to put up a sign indicating slippery road at the beginning and end of the work, then sweep the road at least once a day, not scrape it which can cause damage. If Wiltshire Council have to clean the road, they will bill the offender. It is usually left to Wiltshire Council to enforce removal of deposits on the highway and not the police, however the police can become involved.

I have witnessed the financial cost of cancer on an individual and their

Wiltshire Council officers were awarded Queen's Birthday Honours. Staff at Wiltshire Council, in recognition of their work during and after the 2018 incidents in Salisbury and Amesbury, Executive Director Alistair Cunningham has been awarded an OBE. Director Robin Townsend and Network Operations Manager Simon Rowe have received MBEs for services to the community in South Wiltshire. Simon has always been very helpful to the Mere area in times of inclement weather. It is worth noting a 24-strong fleet of brand new gritters will be taking to the streets of Wiltshire this winter to keep the county moving whatever the weather. As well as the most up-to-date technology, the new winter fleet is also fitted with the very latest low emission engines. The gritters will be used on Wiltshire's primary road network of A and B roads, covering 726 miles and spreading approximately 150 tonnes of salt each time they are sent out. In severe or prolonged cold weather, the network can be increased to 50% by treating secondary routes. During winter, people can get updates on both the weather and road conditions on Twitter by following @WiltshireWinter

So many cars go in the ditches there but are usually pulled out by farmers so the accidents don't become a police statistic, one day someone will get hurt there.

Congratulations must go to the West Knoyle Social Club for raising a substantial amount of money to mend the roof in the bar of the village hall. The committee took on a major task and with a lot of hard work have made a great success of it.

Mere Rivers Group - *Wildlife Sightings for September.*

Fabulous sunny days in September resulted in more butterflies and moths seen around the town, particularly on ivy flowers. Those reported to us were: humming bird hawk moth - seen several times, comma butterfly seen twice, angle moth and painted lady butterfly both seen once.

Other wildlife reported was: slow worms (a two and a three) and kingfisher seen three times, water vole and coal tit seen twice. All seen once were frog, hedgehog and grey wagtail! Bullfinch call was heard once. More widely around Mere there was a flock of pied wagtail reported on the recreation ground ... we know these are often present. Ravens and red-legged partridge were seen on the downs. One resident is lucky and very happy to have bats roosting in their fascia!!

Nature Notes

At the time of writing this article (end of September), we have just had a lot of rain, yet our watercourses remain extremely low. For example, the Burton Mill pond is completely dry. So we will watch with interest to see what level of rainfall may be required to have our rivers and streams running back to their full capacity. Of course we can all do our bit to help by reducing the amount of water we use at home wherever possible, while also keeping pressure on the bodies involved.

In November the water levels should have increased, and we should see the return of the little egret to our rivers. Following sightings last year, please also keep your eyes peeled for the larger and rarer great white egret. We also hope our other treasured wildlife, like kingfishers and water voles, will return in good

numbers. As always, do let us know of any wildlife you observe while you are out and about to the email below. Very many thanks!

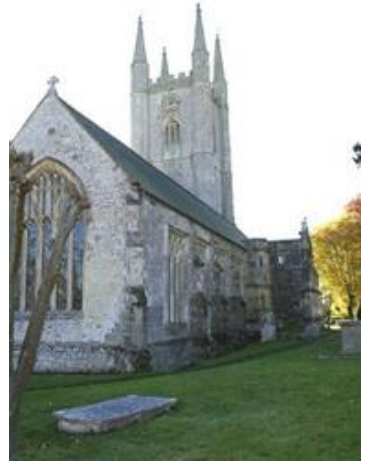

St Michael's Appeal

Mere's Parish Church, having served our community for over 800 years, is now in need of improvements to bring it into the 21st century and the congregation cannot undertake this project alone.

We have the opportunity

As a result of a generous legacy we have the seed capital to modernize the Church's community facilities. After extensive consultation, the Diocese has given provisional permission to install a pair of toilets in the Church tower, a kitchenette in the North West corner and to improve access through the North porch with an inner glass porch, wider steps and handrail.



The front row of pews will be relocated making more room for a variety of events together with a row of pews from the rear enabling circular disabled access to refreshments served from the kitchenette, for the toilets and for the children's corner.

The appeal already has some funding sources and by raising a further £20,000 we will have reached a position to apply for matched funding from grant giving bodies.

We have a problem

The pennants fitted to all 4 of the tower spires 130 years ago were all made of iron. They have rusted, resulting in damage to the stonework and one having become detached. The estimated cost for this repair work is in the order of £60,000 – the bulk of this being for scaffolding.

Update on Shreen Catchment

Last December I wrote in Mere Matters letting you know that the Group Chief Executive of Wessex Water (WW), Colin Skellet, had indicated to Mere Rivers Group that four million litres of water abstracted from the bore holes at Burton Field were sufficient to service the local community and, also, that after real improvements to the water supply network this could remain an annual target. Four million litres a day is the protective amount that OFWAT, the water industry watchdog, allows Wessex Water to abstract under an agreed Abstraction Incentive Mechanism (AIM) which comes into force when flows in the Shreen and Ashfield, both rare chalk streams, are below a particular very low level.

So, after eight years of meetings and discussions the Mere Rivers Group hoped that the Environment Agency (EA) would finally agree to lower the present permanent licence to abstract 9.5 million litres a day from Burton Field. This high rate allows export, usually northwards, out of our natural catchment area. However, the EA Water Resource Section is reluctant to do so – they want the licence to stay at 9.5 million litres a day.

In mitigation, the EA propose either of two methods of ‘stream support’ which means keeping the 9.5 million litres a day license and, when the rivers look a bit dry and slow flowing, putting more water into those upper reaches which are so badly affected by taking water out of the chalk under their sources.

They would ask WW to either pump water up from the chalk aquifer close to the natural sources of our rivers so that they would look as if they are flowing naturally (a cosmetic visual amenity solution) or, secondly, pump water up a pipe, presumably lying on the river bed, from downstream where there is a flow, up to the dry source. The first option would mean that there would be additional depletion and lowering of the water table. It would also mask over abstraction so that the aquifer could be depleted without overt observation from our wild life observers. The second option would potentially affect all the little springs around Waterside, Lords Mead and Holwell which contribute to the natural flow at present. Mere Rivers Group do not support either option and discussions continue.

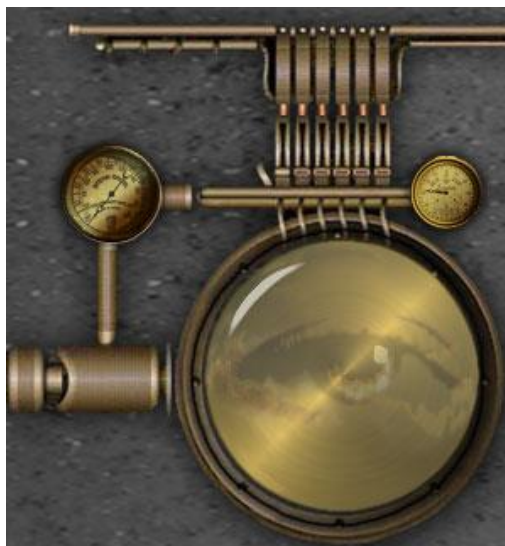
