

Mere Town Council -The Chairman Writes

Firstly, a big thank you to all of those involved in organising and arranging and taking part in Mere Carnival – what a wonderful occasion it was, helped by the glorious weather and appreciative crowds. I hope that enough money was raised to safeguard the future of the carnival for Mere. I would also like to add a special thank you to Barry Hansford who, by magic, manages to ensure that the streets are free of litter by the Sunday morning after carnival.

Before the winter comes and along with it, the risks of flooding, can I remind all riparian landowners of their responsibilities (If you own land or property next to a river, stream or ditch you are a 'riparian landowner'): –

- If a watercourse runs alongside your garden wall or hedge you should check your property deeds to see if the wall or hedge marks your boundary. If the watercourse marks the boundary, it is assumed you own the land up to the centre of the watercourse.
- You should keep the banks clear of anything that could cause an obstruction and increase flood risk, either on your land or downstream if it is washed away. You are responsible for maintaining the bed and banks of the watercourse and the trees and shrubs growing on the banks. You should also clear any litter and animal carcasses from the channel and banks, even if they did not come from your land.

The environment agency has a very good guide to the rights and responsibilities of riverside ownership called 'Living on the Edge' which you can download or view on their website.

Also, this is the time of year that home owners and landowners need to trim back hedges and trees that directly abuts a road, footway or a public right of way, especially hedges growing on the side of road junctions.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome our new Grounds Person, Simon, to the staff of Mere Town Council. We wish him all the best for his new role and trust that he will become a valuable member of the team. Also we would like to take this opportunity to thank James, the head groundsman, for managing single-handedly during the busy grass-cutting period over the last couple of months.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

The outcome of the Local Boundary Review will be known on the 1st October, we should then know if Maiden Bradley will be part of The Mere Division and if West Knoyle will be taken away from Mere. I am informed both villages have protested regarding the proposed changes.

"A day in the life of a Wiltshire Councillor" I continue to attend local events and try and get those events publicized in the media, this can lead to busy periods for me. On the 2nd September I attended around 6-30pm Mere Museum where it was announced Rose Heesom was to be the new curator and I wish her every success. Then I attended The Walnut Tree Inn for the crowning of the royals at 7pm. I then further attended the Mere Town Council at 7-30pm putting on the usual planning presentation, for which I must thank Bret Norris for loan of his projector until I can obtain a replacement, the last one departed with a rather large bang at a previous council meeting. During the day I had downloaded the presentation, besides seeing to all the usual casework. I sent text and pictures to the media of the two local events, which were published. Now here I am sat on my birthday writing it all up.

I understand that Wiltshire Council are now considering changing to budgeting for three year periods as some other authorities have been doing.

Our local population are not all young. Wiltshire Council are responsible for public health, therefore it may interest some, a preventative digital risk assessment app called Safe Steps has helped reduce falls at care homes by 28% in just nine months. It is being used at over 100 homes, having been licensed at a local level to Clinical Commissioning Groups. It costs £100 per care home, and could now be rolled out across Britain. It is expected to provide a return on investment of 500% per area, by preventing the cost of falls and hospital admissions. The app works by using a number of measures, such as vision, environment and medication, to allow carers to determine the level of risk each patient has of falling and tailor their treatment accordingly.

Historic English shopping centres will benefit from a £95m regeneration fund, the Government has said. In all, 69 towns and cities will receive money, with projects aimed at turning disused buildings into shops, houses and community centres. The South West will receive £13.7m. Hopefully some of it will find its way to a town near us.

We should all applaud the recent work done by Dick Morris and Barry Hansford in clearing Pennybank Lane using their own tools and transport. Well done lads – an example to us all.

In Mere I have received numerous complaints regarding non-working street lights, probably once a month I contact the Wiltshire Council and some are repaired. A few have been replaced with LED lights which is to be applauded.

While on the subject of Street Lights, I noted Bat-friendly street lights are to be installed on a crossing in Worcestershire. Worcestershire County Council believe they are the first bat-friendly street lights in the UK and that they would also assist pedestrians walking in the area.

To remind you with the 5th November approaching, if you are intending to have a large bonfire, please advise **Fire Control on 0306 799 0019** or use the on line form, this can save a false call out.

Mere Patient Participation Group

Who are they and what do they do, you may be wondering?

All GP surgeries in England are required to have a Patient Participation Group (PPG) to help provide the practice with the patient's perspective. They act as a route for patients to advise and inform GP practices on what matters most to them and help to identify solutions to problems. It's not a forum for complaints, which should go direct to the practice through the normal channels.

PPGs are initially set up by each surgery, who invite volunteers from within their patient population to form the group. The PPG then set up a committee, decide on their objectives and run their own meetings with input from the surgery. The activities of each PPG vary depending on the needs of the practice population, which they need to identify and respond to.

What does Mere PPG do?

We're very lucky in Mere to have a surgery that has been ranked 7th out of over 7000 surgeries in England for quality of service*, which means that we don't spend all our time dealing with issues. Our activities can be broken down into three main areas:

- 1. Acting as a 'voice' for your issues and working with the practice and wider network to find solutions to meet the needs of our community.
- 2. Organising health promotion events to help you understand common health issues and how to prevent or manage them.
- 3. Helping to fill gaps in services by signposting the support that is available locally.

We currently have 13 members plus a surgery representative who meet bimonthly, with smaller sub-groups meeting more frequently as required. Over the coming months we will highlight some of the activities we've undertaken so far and let you know about key issues we are currently discussing and upcoming events. We provide the service for users of hearing aids provided by the NHS through the Audiology department at Salisbury Hospital. In August 2018 our rivers were flowing well despite being the driest summer on record, because there was no abstraction until October. As a result there were eight sightings, during August 2018 of our precious water voles.

In contrast the water levels this year are very low, even though rainfall has been higher this summer, and we can only conclude this is because water abstraction has been continuous since October last year (although only at around 50% of the permitted level during the summer months). As a result up to August 3rd, there were regular sightings of water voles, mainly on the Shreen. Now as the river levels have significantly dropped there has only been a single sighting since 4 August. We have to take from this that our riverside environment has become unsuitable for them and they have moved elsewhere. The pattern of low numbers of vole sightings has been reflected across all our wildlife. Where they can, people have been saving stranded fish.

In early September BBC Radio Wiltshire broadcast live interviews with members of Mere Rivers Group about the state of our streams, with an item also broadcast on local BBC TV. Anybody who feels strongly about our streams may like to add their voice by writing to Wessex Water, the Environment Agency and/or our local MP highlighting their concerns.

So our sightings for August were: Water Vole 3 times, Kingfisher and Song Thrush seen twice. All seen once were Goldcrest family, pair of Coal Tits, Emperor Dragonfly, Grasshopper, Tawny Owl and c. 12" Trout. A Great Spotted Woodpecker was heard calling!

Nature Notes

It is great to be receiving reports on wildlife in our wider Mere area and this included male and female Roe Deer, family of Red Kites and Buzzards, Painted Lady and Common Blue Butterflies. With the advent of October and the winter months we can expect to see winter migrants such as Redwing and Fieldfare, which will benefit from the glut of hedgerow fruit and berries. Please continue to support us by reporting your sightings, particularly from the riversides, to the address below. As always we really appreciate your help!
