I would like to start my report by saying how proud I am of the people of Mere over the last three months. A new generation of volunteers came forward to support the community and we are extremely grateful. Although some of these have now gone back to work or resumed other commitments, it is estimated that at one time we had a workforce of 150 volunteers on the Community Support Group register. The Mere Community Support Group (or Local Resilience Group), headed by Richard Jefferies, who has worked tirelessly throughout the last 3 months, has been a tremendous success. So much so that it has been recognised by higher authorities and emulated by others. As mentioned in Richard's report, the volunteers have carried out numerous tasks, which have all helped to ease the worries and burden on those that needed help. At this time, when lockdown measures are being relaxed, we don't know how much of this support will still be needed but it is very reassuring to know that we have an effective volunteer force who are prepared to step up and help. I am not going to single out any individuals but want to thank you all and as soon as we are allowed to do so, we

shall be organising some kind of thank you party in recognition for all your help. The two foodbanks in Mere have been tremendous and their supporters and volunteers have put in hours and hours to help provide this valuable and much needed resource.

I would like to thank the dedication of our doctors and all at Mere surgery, all at Mere pharmacy including their 'bouncers on the door' for their patience, smiling faces and their co-operation with the community support group. I also want to mention and thank all the care workers in Mere. I am aware that we have a number of residents who have been busy during lockdown producing PPE. whether it be scrubs, bags for scrubs or face masks and whether that be directly or indirectly for the NHS and key workers. There has been a national drive to support, protect and thank our NHS, health workers and other key workers and the clapping and cheering at 8.00 pm on a Thursday evening has been very moving along with the varied displays of rainbows, teddy bears and, of course, our unique Covid snake in the churchyard. All this has demonstrated our amazing community spirit and desire to support one another. Mere is renowned for its vibrant community spirit and I know a lot has been done by neighbours and friends for neighbours and friends that has largely gone unrecognised. I also know that it would be impossible to try and thank everyone who has made a difference. I would just like to thank all the residents of Mere and to say how grateful I am to live in this little town.

I don't know how we would have coped had the businesses in Mere not been resourceful and found ways of staying open and supplying the essentials necessary for day to day living. Special thanks go to the management and staff at Mere Co-Op, Mere Post Office and Sprout & Flower.

I would like to thank the Town Clerk, Lindsey Wood and her assistant Sonya Ward, for working throughout the Covid-19 crisis, responding to the government guidelines by shutting down facilities as required and then gradually reopening them, some with restrictions following risk assessments. Also ensuring that other essential services could continue in order to meet the new demands placed upon them by the lockdown situation. I am aware that some difficult decisions needed to be made at a time when it was not possible to hold physical Council meetings and that time resources were extended to concentrate on supporting the community and also to meet the ever increasing administration deadlines. We are anxious to get back to holding regular meetings just as soon as government guidelines will allow. To keep everyone involved and aware of what has been going on - the Town Clerk has produced decision reports in lieu of Minutes these are displayed on the Town Council website www.merewilts.org | I also want to thank the grounds staff for finding ways to work safely in order to keep facilities and open spaces available for us all to use and enjoy. It is regrettable that we had to scale down our VE Day celebrations but I was extremely grateful to Peter, Mary & Michael for coming along on 8th May and playing the Last Post at the War Memorial which proved to be a very moving experience.

Another recent occasion that I found very moving was the way that everyone came together to say farewell to John Hancock as his funeral procession drove through the town. John was a key figure of the community who selflessly helped and supported Mere in so many ways and was well loved by everyone. The people of Mere will miss him dreadfully and we will be discussing, with his family, proposals for a local memorial. Our thoughts go out to his family at this sad time.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

My wife Sue has suffered a stroke which has been very distressing. However, after over three weeks the outlook is now positive. I still spend several hours a day regarding council casework and I have spent some of this time helping local businesses with Covid-19 grants. Please look at Wiltshire Councils website for information on Covid-19, some of which may help local businesses as well as private individuals. I have continued to support those with housing applications, despite the difficulties imposed by lockdown.

I was sad to have learned of the passing of John Hancock. He was our policeman for decades until retirement when he stayed on in the community. He lived and worked with us when the area still had a police house combined with a police station and took an active part in our community. John won the South-West Region's Police Support Volunteer of the Year award last year.

The national pandemic emergency has resulted in a substantial hole in Wiltshire Council's budget, probably around fifty million pounds and it is hoped the government will bridge this gap.

It is that time of year when Councils and Committees hold their Annual meetings and elect Chair & Vice-Chairs. Jose Green will remain Chair of our local South West Wiltshire Area Board with Tony Deane as Vice-Chairman. Richard Gamble is now Chairman of Wiltshire Council with the Vice-Chairman being James Sheppard. Wiltshire Council has also just approved steps to change its senior leadership structure and the proposed change will see a reduction from two Chief Executive Officers to one Chief Executive. I am sorry to hear that Robin Townsend, Director of Corporate Services at Wiltshire Council, will be leaving. He was awarded an MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours and I have known him for many years.

Wiltshire Council are now holding virtual meetings and the Southern Area Planning Committee will soon be doing the same. The weaknesses of broadband infrastructure in some areas of the South West Wiltshire Area Board have become more apparent since people have been working from home and holding virtual meetings etc. The board is considering what it can do to improve the situation

Town Clerk's Report

It is not usual for me to write a report for our parish magazine but then we are living in unusual times. I just wanted to add how proud I have been at the way the community of Mere has pulled together and joined forces to help one another. When we initially called for help and volunteer support we were amazed by the response we received and were able to put together a very efficient and resourceful community support group that gave us the confidence to say that we were making a real difference to the lives of our residents. Indeed, in the early days I received a number of emails from worried offspring saying that their elderly parents were living in Mere and they needed to self-isolate and they were unable to get provisions or prescriptions and they didn't know how they were going to manage. I was able to reassure those people and give them the information they needed to stop them worrying. Thank you to all involved and particular thanks must be given to Richard Jefferies who has gallantly managed the support group and supervised the volunteers.

As Clerk to the Town Council I have received regular emails from Wiltshire Council giving the latest news and advice on Covid-19. I know that all this information is available to view on numerous websites and we do try to put some of the relevant information out on local social media pages in order to keep you informed. At the moment they are trying to reach out to help communities recover from the pandemic and Wiltshire Council would be particularly interested to know if the Covid-19 pandemic has caused significant impacts that the community feels it cannot recover from. What is it that Wiltshire Council can do to enable communities to recover from this pandemic and the lockdown situation? For example, I have suggested that they might try and source some bite size digital e-learning - something that may help people who feel a bit inept or who wish to hone their skills in order to keep pace with the new way of communicating or holding virtual meetings or shopping or banking etc. We may find that there are unemployment issues or mental health issues that need addressing. If you feel that there is something that Wiltshire Council can help us do, to enable us to recover as a community, please let me know and I will pass it on to them.

I have also received much communication about economic recovery and the funding that is available to help businesses and shops. Businesses re-opening their premises can benefit from a COVID-19 Business Recovery Pack launched by Wiltshire Council. The pack contains a round-up of government guidance, helpful tips on how to implement the guidance and safety advice posters and

social distancing floor spots for businesses to use to keep their staff, customers and visitors safe. These resources have been created to support businesses across the county as they adapt their premises to provide a safe and welcoming experience for customers. They also complement additional signage being used across Wiltshire high streets to encourage people to follow social distancing guidelines. There is also funding available to help shops on the high street reopen safely.

Floral Sponsors

The Town Clerk would like to report that once again, the Town Council will be keeping up appearances by planting the tubs around the town to give impressive floral displays. Last year we were very grateful to the various sponsors (business and members of the public – see below) who helped to make these floral displays possible. The scheme was a great success. Mere Local Resilience to Covid-19

It is interesting to note that at the time of writing, the volunteer workforce comprising telephone coordinators and isolation volunteers have been involved in over 1000 telephone calls, made 154+ 'one off' support visits, and made in excess of 350 repeat support visits to assist with shopping, collecting prescriptions and generally just being a really caring Mere Neighbour, some have even helped look after the dog walking etc. In addition we have a group of volunteers who make daily contact with a few people who have needed that extra bit of support. The total volunteer workforce has comprised 80+ people, some of whom have now had to go back to work and some who have taken a break. Without their individual efforts life would have been very different – my personal thanks to you all and for putting up with me!

Who knows what is around the corner? Will we get a second wave? Rest assured that we shall keep the local resilience group going for the foreseeable future and be ready to respond to the needs of the community as best we can.

It has been a stressful for time for our Doctors and local businesses which have remained open and our thanks go to them all. Where would we be without our wonderful Pharmacy, the Co-op, Sprout & Flower our Post Office and others?

Finally I have to thank everyone in Mere. There have been a few dissenters but Mere has really responded well in exercising patience, consideration and compliance with requests in regard social distancing, hygiene etc etc. It is the community which has minimized any infection and hopefully it will stay that way.

From Mere Surgery

As you are aware, Coronavirus has impacted on how we provided services to our patients over recent months, so we thought it would be helpful to keep you updated with some of the changes we have implemented to keep patients and staff safe.

The priority still remains for us to look after our patients' health and would encourage anyone who has concerns about their health to contact the surgery.

Pre-booked appointments

There will be no access to the reception area unless you have a pre-booked appointment. If you arrive early for your booked appointment, please wait outside the surgery until your appointment time.

Face to face appointments are only available once you have spoken to a doctor or nurse via a telephone call or video consultation.

Please attend your appointments on your own where possible

We are not currently using the touch screen to confirm you have arrived, so please check in at Reception.

Booking on-line appointments

You are able to book Video / phone consultations only at present. As the situation improves, our aim is to release more appointments online when it is appropriate to do so.

Face coverings, masks and gloves

Please do not be alarmed our staff are wearing face coverings, this is to protect our patients and staff. We would ask if you have to attend the surgery at any time, you wear a face covering.

Hand sanitiser is available in the foyer, it is vitally important that you use this on entering and leaving the surgery, EVEN if you are wearing gloves we would request you still use the hand sanitiser available.

Social distancing

Social distancing measures are in place throughout the surgery so please ensure you maintain 2 metres apart. We have restricted the number of people permitted in the foyer at any one time, so it may be necessary for you to wait outside the surgery until such time that someone leaves to allow you to enter.

Sample pots

If you have been asked to collect a sample pot these are available in the foyer for patients to collect. A return box is also available in the foyer for you to place your sample in and this will be collected by a member of the clinical team to process.

All samples have to be received at the surgery by 11.30am.

Tiddlers and Toddlers Foodbank

Hopefully everyone in Mere knows about the group's FareShare Foodbank. It has been running for three years now, and has been an even greater asset during these difficult times.

I would like to thank everyone who has given to the stall. Our FareShare plus Walmart total collections from stores come to over 300 trips, collecting over 4,000 kgs of food and tripling recently due to extra food banks being run 5 days a week at least for the first two months of the crisis; a big difference from the original just once on a Monday, school's term time only.





Individual people's donations have included regular entire weekly shops from a couple of lovely local benefactors, plus generous cheques and cash, as well as swapping tins for a loaf to help out. Any leftover tins have been donated to the Church Foodbank parcel service every week, plus after one extra trip was recently made to Warminster Waitrose (who having already allocated all

their perishables to their local charities) donated an extra two trolley loads of long life items as well.

Waitrose Gillingham have been the most amazing regular generous resource; very few collections have been cancelled even during the most difficult times of low stock and some staff shortages. Local Asda (Walmart) and Tesco stores have also been donating.

With the Lecture Hall where we normally meet being shut, special thanks go to Laura and David Rich for saving the day, for all the setting up and manning of the Bank outdoors at The Gallery, Holt, Water Street, then for collecting and passing on the leftover long life stuff to the





church every week, and for sharing their valuable space which has been at a premium during lockdown with a big family all needing space to work.

There is a small but stalwart team of volunteers doing the regular store collections, and also making local deliveries, some to elderly people, or those too ill to go shopping. This help has been invaluable; kindly giving up their time and petrol money, so special thanks to Helen Lucas, Poppy Hall, Amber and Sam Willis. David and Steve Rich.

We have just learnt that a further amazing large

donation has been received from the Golden Bottle Fund which will enable us to organise vouchers from local shops to give to families in need. Thanks so much to the ever generous Hoare family.



Finally I would like to thank the Lecture Hall Committee for enabling us to store so much there and for helping to make the Toddler group such a focal point of the village and as popular as it is.

Oh, and even the goats on the hill and local pigs and birds have benefitted from the leftovers, so nothing has been wasted.

Current Foodbanks are Saturdays and Mondays, but we will be setting up more sessions if needed, 10.30am - 11.00am for young families, and then open the rest of the day for everyone else. See Mere Mutters for any changes / extra days.




Dressmaking in Mere - Operation Scrubs

Link Scheme

The Link Scheme has remained open throughout the coronavirus lockdown to take clients to hospital or other medical appointments or to deliver prescription medicines in our weekly dossette box run for Mere and Silton surgeries. The number of available drivers reduced from 38 to 5 as many of our volunteers are over 70 but most of our clients' medical appointments were cancelled so we have been able to cope with the reduced demand. Our Friday medicine deliveries have continued and, indeed, increased both in the number of addresses visited and their spread. We primarily cover people living in the local villages but have been to new places like Cucklington. Trips have been taking up to 4 hours and have covered over 50 miles. Hospital parking has generally been easier during lockdown although Warminster remained as busy as ever.

We have spent much time going through the regularly changing advice from the Government and Community First who oversee Link Schemes for Wiltshire Council. Using this we have introduced safety guidelines to protect both clients and drivers from the risk of spreading the virus. Both have to wear a face covering while in the car and clients have to sit in the back where this is practical. Drivers carry hand sanitiser and wipe down all surfaces that may have been touched by the client while in the car.

During the lockdown we have kept in touch with our volunteers by regular update emails (and post to those not on email). We know these updates have been appreciated by the responses and that many of our volunteers are frustrated at being unable to help.

One disappointing outcome of the coronavirus restrictions has been the cancellation of our 2020 AGM. The Trustees of the Mere and District Link Scheme have agreed unanimously that the 2020 Link Scheme AGM should be cancelled. The AGM was pencilled in for Friday 5 June but it was not possible to proceed because of the coronavirus restrictions. All the Management Committee have agreed to carry on for another year and our accounts for 2019/20 have shown a small loss of £309.57. A copy of the 2019/20 accounts can be requested by calling the Link on 860096.

We remain in a sound position and our volunteers are looking forward to taking clients to their hospital and other medical appointments when the coronavirus pandemic allows. Stay alert!

It seems a long time ago but in March we did a collection for Warminster Food Bank outside the Co-Op one Saturday morning and, as always, the good folks of Mere were very generous. Then on the next Monday the world stopped and we could not get the food to Warminster. On the back of this we started up Mere Emergency pop up Food Bank as the Food bank in Warminster had shut temporarily.

We did a very quick set up of facilities in the Church and we had weekly collections for 11 weeks and were able to issue over 40 emergency food boxes for families and individuals. The amount of food we had donated was massive and in the light of demand slowing up to almost none, in the last couple of weeks, we took the decision to take all the unused supplies to Warminster Food Bank at the beginning of June and there was just over 500kg!

We cannot thank you all enough for your generosity by donating a massive amount of food and some very generous financial help as well.

The Mere Suchana Support Group is very much looking forward to resuming its fund-raising support for this small but vital project in rural West Bengal, India which enables children from

very disadvantaged communities to get a grounding and support in basic educational skills, as well enjoying sport and creative activities and gaining in confidence and a sense of self-worth. Recent results of a survey tracking the progress of Suchana 'graduates' have been impressive, underlining the fact that this is a project that really makes a difference.

Suchana itself has had to remain closed during lockdown, but hopes to re-open in early July. In the meantime Suchana teachers have been working on translating and preparing more stories and other books and teaching materials in Santali and Kora, which are the first languages of many Suchana children. This is pioneering work and so far Suchana has distributed over 4,000 such books to schools and other projects further afield where these languages are spoken by 'adivasi' chidren.

Sadly this year's local fund-raising events, apart from a coffee morning in January and our very successful Shrove Tuesday Quiz, have so far had to be cancelled. However we are going to hold a lockdown-compliant coffee morning in the garden of Grove Cottage (opposite the Library in Barton Lane) on **Tuesday 18th August** from 10.30am. Taking an idea from the National Trust, we are asking anyone who would like to come to book a time-slot in advance, by phone or email (see below) so we can ensure we keep carefully to whatever regulations about permitted numbers and distancing are then in place for meeting outside. St Michaels Church - Appeal

The response to the Appeal has been typical of our warm hearted community with 20, four figure donations from private individuals, as well as many smaller ones. Many thanks to all those generous people who have contributed so magnificently to the Church Appeal.

In addition to the local contributions we have received some grants from the following trustsWiltshire CC Area Board.had granted £1000

The Baer trust £1,000, The Tanner Trust £ 1,000, The Fudge Trust £5,000, The Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust £5,500 and Wilts CC Area Board. £1,000.

Our current total stands at £132.000

It is most encouraging to have received these generous grants & we have several other applications which are still outstanding at the time of writing.

The Heritage lottery fund expressed interest in receiving an application for a contribution towards the pinnacles, but as a result of the coronavirus have stopped processing any applications until at least October.

The Diocese have granted planning permission for the internal works & we are awaiting their permission to repair the pinnacles.

The repair of the pinnacles is work that can only be done during summer months because of their height, and the Cathedral masons are too busy to do it this year. We hope that this will be able to be done next summer.

For work done before the end of this financial year a full refund of the VAT is available, a saving of about £30,000.

We therefore have a tentative start date for the internal works to begin on October 1st provided funds permit. We are still a little short of this target, so please consider donating if you haven't already done so.





Female mallard and her eight ducklings on the Shreen, Slow Worm seen four time Pair of Moorhen seen three times, Seen once were: Pair of treecreepers, Pair of Greenfinch, Juvenile Kingfisher, Buzzard, Sparrowhawk, Canada Goose, Water Vole, Roe Deer, Common Frog, Eel, Trout, Beautiful Demoiselle.

The call of a cuckoo was also heard.

There is no doubt that many of us have reaped the proven physical and mental health benefits of being able to access the open countryside and seeing Spring unfold around us.

I am sure we all agree how fortunate we are to live in an area with such a range of easily accessible countryside habitats including our fabulous waterways. This has meant we have been able, over the last few weeks, to watch birds nesting and fledging, bees and other insects being busy, and indeed to hear and see a great range of wildlife. Much of this has been in closer proximity to our residential areas than we would normally expect because it has been so peaceful. Many people have commented, in particular, on being able to hear far more because of the absence of traffic on the A303!! We sincerely hope that as 'normal life' is returning many of you will be able to recall and continue to reap the benefits that you enjoyed from our countryside during lockdown.

Observations from the wider area in May were the calling of a tawny owl and sightings of swallows, house martins and lastly swifts seen in ever increasing numbers.

The Churches and the World's New Normal.

There are dates that have particular significance. For Americans the 4th July with their celebration of American Independence, has long been a significant date. For us this year it has potential new significance, in that it is the day when hairdressers and other shops will be allowed to open, and also Churches and places of worship.

Our worship will not be quite the same as before the lockdown began, as the social distancing required will affect how many people we can safely allow in the building, where we sit, how we enter and leave the building, whether we can sing hymns, or take a collection, and whether Holy Communion can be participated in. One possibility is that depending on how many people wish to attend worship, we initially have a shorter service.

I am sure we will get back a more recognisable pattern of Church life together, but that will take time before we can safely meet together, in the way we have been accustomed too.

There is another date that is going to change things, 25th May 2020, and the murder of George Floyd by four police officers in the American city of Minneapolis. Phrases like 'Black Lives Matter', 'I Can't Breath', 8 Minutes And 46 Seconds', have been repeated in protest in America, in the UK, and around the world. It is a call and chance to create a new and more just normal for everyone. The future unlike the past can be changed. Jesus in his teaching, such as the parable of the Good Samaritan [Luke 10:25 - 37.] and Lazarus and the rich man [Luke 16:19 - 31.], makes clear we cannot remain silent. Minneapolis can seem like different world to the one we live in and experience here, but as Paul reminds us in Galatians 3:28 in Christ the differences between us and George Floyd who lived life in a very different situation, do not continue to exist.

Parking charges to be reintroduced at all Wiltshire Council car parks

We are reintroducing parking charges at all car parks, and on residential and onstreet parking areas in the county from Monday 1 June. All parking permits and season tickets will also restart from this date, and parking wardens will enforce any parking contraventions in the county.

On 25 March, the government gave NHS and care workers free use of all council parking and this will continue until further notice, however, we went one step further and suspended all parking charges, including in residential areas, from the 27 March which was to be reconsidered when the government issued new guidance.

Letter from the Churches - Dn Michael Hughes writes:

Back in March, we braced ourselves for the coming of the virus. Now that infections rates are falling, we can look back over the three months and see how it was, and how we did.

In the plague of 1348 "the infected perished almost immediately... dropping down while talking". In Siena, Italy, 50%, *half the population*, died.

Thank God this virus was not like that. Probably not even 1% of our population have died, and the huge majority of those who got it badly have survived. You will, according to your nature, be full of wonder at the many acts of kindness, heroism and self-denial – or you will dwell on the selfish sad acts which the media love to report. Try to look on the bright side.

We Catholics, as well as the other denominations, have noted the staggering number of people who are sharing in on-line church services – many times the number who were coming to church before the lockdown. Millions of people have discovered they have spiritual needs which are not met by Netflix or social media.

Prayer is conversation with the God who made and loves each one of us. Confined to our homes, prayer has become part of the lives of many people who previously thought they were too busy to pray. And in prayer they have been comforted and given courage to endure. Their prayer has been heard, and we have come through the worst of the pandemic, and here in this beautiful part of God's creation, we have been given the best weather we could possibly have wished for, which has made lockdown so much more bearable.

What happens next? The virus may come back again: we pray fervently that it will not. We trust we will continue to regain those freedoms we always took for granted. In either event, Christians will strive to make a better world than the one before all this started. One where Jesus' revolutionary statement that all people, being equally valuable to God, should be equally loved by us, and those most in need receive most care. All people matter equally.
