I am pleased to say that, since my last report, Mere Town Council has held a physical meeting albeit outside and socially distanced. However, it was necessary to hold a meeting in order to approve the Annual Return and Accounts for the previous financial year which the Town Clerk has been busy preparing. We are hoping to hold another physical meeting in September, although this will be subject to government guidance nearer the time and it may be necessary to hold this meeting virtually.

I would like to thank Stuart Walker for organising the VJ 75th Anniversary wreath laying ceremony which, sadly, had to be scaled back due to COVID-19 but which, nonetheless, was very moving. I would like to thank Mary for playing the Last Post.

It was necessary for the Town Council to commission a new website in order to meet the government's accessibility requirements - www.merewilts.org. We now have a wordpress website that accepts direct contributions from the Town Council offices. This will be work in progress for the next few months and therefore, if there are any particular mistakes, add-ons, links or amendments that you would like to make to the website, please contact the Clerk.

We are aware that central government has issued guidance to Principal Authorities to prepare plans for local lockdowns if necessary. In our case, this would be Wiltshire Council's responsibility and we do not know what the criteria for local lockdown decisions would be and where the boundaries may be. However, we are still liaising closely with the Mere Community Support Group and would like to assure you all that the group is confident that the volunteer scheme will be able to continue responding to any calls for help.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Covid-19 continues to impact on us all. Few officers are allowed into County Hall. For instance: I have been contacted by someone who needs their solicitor to obtain search information to enable the sale of their property, the information is old and is on microfiche it cannot be accessed electronically and officers cannot access the area of County Hall to obtain that information on a regular basis. Staff numbers working in hubs each day as an average over the last 4 weeks is 160 in County Hall, 75 in Monkton Park, Chippenham and 60 in Bourne Hill, Salisbury. This is 16%, 24% and 19% respectively based on 100% capacity. The total capacity across all 3 hubs is approximately is 1600 but social distancing measures mean that the current building capacity is reduced by approx. 50%. As a result, capacity across all three hubs is currently approx. 800 and overall usage based on this reduced capacity is 37%. In County Hall there is no food available, the only meetings socially distanced is Social Services and Registration (Births, deaths and Marriage). The registry office is in use but limited.

The Library at County Hall is open 2 week days and Saturday. Mere is still not allowed to open despite volunteers being available, I understand also Salisbury and Chippenham are open, some more are in the pipeline and Mere is likely to be as late as October. I have asked that this time scale for Mere be brought forward.

The Blackmore Vale Magazine after nearly 40 years ceased at the start of Covid-19 and several have said besides missing it, many used the publication to be informed of Births, Deaths and Marriages? Mere Mutters sometimes perform this function, I have had two separate people suggest Mere Matters may be able to perform this function.

(Ed: Historically we have published short obituaries. I am equally receptive to the idea of 'boxed' notifications if people would like inclusion. Do let me know!)

I have had complaints of the poor quality of some minor highway repairs recently done, one being from West Knoyle Parish Councillors.

Public rights of way, footpaths and bridleways are being well used at present especially during lockdown, I have received many complaints regarding their condition, types of use and so on.

Mere and West Knoyle held their meetings outside socially distance which was nice in the summer, most meetings I now join are virtual meetings on a computer, including Wiltshire Council.

In the Mere Area we have several types of broadband infrastructure which are noted by residents to me, not always being happy with theirs, especially now some work from home using virtual meetings etc. We have Wessex which uses free air as well as other means. The Mere area is largely fibre to the green road side cabinets which many now complain is inadequate. Parts of Kilmington Common have fibre to the premises also parts of Stourton are taking advantage of. It seems fibre to the house is required, Salisbury is getting fibre to the premises City wide.

I receive regular complaints about dog fouling, one on the well-used pavement in Church Street another in the rural area of Kilmington, but still outside of a house. Please clean up after your dog in public areas, dog excrement can cause blindness in children and it is not nice for others to walk in. The Wiltshire Council Dog Warden will visit offenders if requested, probably not immediately because of covid19 being a national emergency.

Coronavirus

We would ask for your co-operation in following the guidance below.

- Continue following social distancing guidance
- Maintain robust hand hygiene by washing hands with soap and water
- Self-isolate at the first sign of showing any of the symptoms linked to coronavirus
- Arrange a test for coronavirus at the first sign of showing any such symptoms
- Ensure every member of a household self-isolates when one person in the home develops symptoms

Carers update

Mere Surgery has been working with Carers Support Wiltshire and have been awarded the Gold Level in the Wiltshire Investors in Carers GP Accreditation Scheme.

In coming months Mere surgery will be organising Carer clinics together with Carer Support Wiltshire where Carers will be invited for an annual health check at the surgery.

There are still plans for a Carers Café in Mere with Carers Support Wiltshire as a place where Carers can meet and support one another. Due to COVID-19 these plans are on hold.

All patients registered as a Carer are eligible for a flu vaccination so please make sure you book an appointment.

Flu clinics this year

Flu clinics will be held in the surgery but will be a little different as we must adhere to social distancing guidelines.

- Patients must have a pre booked appointment
- Please do not attend before designated appointment time as we will not be able to let you into the building no matter what the weather.
- Patients will be instructed to queue outside the surgery as limited numbers are permitted inside the surgery in order to maintain a safe footfall within the surgery at all times.
- Please would all patients attending the surgery wear a face mask or covering.
- Please wear short sleeves so that it is easy for you to be ready for your vaccination.

Eligibility

This year flu vaccinations will be offered under the NHS flu vaccination programme to the following groups:

- All children aged two to eleven (but not twelve years or older) on 31 August 2020
- People aged 65 years or over (including those becoming age 65 years by 31 March 2021)
- Those aged from six months to less than 65 years of age, in a clinical risk group such as those with:
 - chronic (long-term) respiratory disease, such as severe asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) or bronchitis
 - o chronic heart disease, such as heart failure
 - chronic kidney disease at stage three, four or five o chronic liver disease
 - chronic neurological disease, such as Parkinson's disease or motor neurone disease,
 - learning disability
 - diabetes
 - splenic dysfunction or asplenia
 - a weakened immune system due to disease (such as HIV/AIDS)
 or treatment (such as cancer treatment)
 - o morbidly obese (defined as BMI of 40 and above)
- All pregnant women (including those women who become pregnant during the flu season)
- Household contacts of those on the NHS Shielded Patient List, or of immunocompromised individuals, specifically individuals who expect to share living accommodation with a shielded patient on most days over the winter and therefore for whom continuing close contact is unavoidable
- People living in long-stay residential care homes
- Those who are in receipt of a carer's allowance, or who are the main carer of an older or disabled person whose welfare may be at risk if the carer falls ill

For patients aged 50 -64 we are unable to offer vaccinations at the moment unless you are in an at risk group as we are waiting on national guidance on vaccine supply. We will invite patients in this age group when the vaccine is available. Please do not call the surgery to make these appointments until you have been notified.

Clinics for children age 2-3 year will be held in the surgery from mid September. Parents of children in this age group will be sent an invitation to make an appointment. All other children up to age 2-10 years on 31st August 2020 will be vaccinated in school unless they are in an at risk category in which case they will be sent an invitation letter to make an appointment at the surgery. We would like to send text messages to as many parent or guardians as possible, so please update your child's contact details at the surgery.

Adult clinics will be held in the surgery from October onwards. On the following dates:

- Saturday 3rd October 2020
- Saturday 17th October 2020
- Afternoon clinics will be available

Changes to appointments

As you know, in light of the current situation, we have had to change the way we run our clinics recently and therefore it has been necessary to remove some routine face to face appointments.

We have introduced different types of appointments so if you have spoken to the GP before about the same issue please make this known to the receptionist when you ask for the GP to contact you.

In the same context, it would be helpful if you informed the receptionist if it is a new problem so you can be placed on the correct list.

All requests to see a GP are being triaged which means you will be put on a list and the GP will contact you to discuss your concern. Only after being triaged by the GP, if they feel it is necessary they will arrange the appointment for you to visit the surgery.

As we go to press, we're making final preparations for our first Suchana Support Group coffee morning since January – to be held outside, complying with safety regulations.

However, rain is forecast, and we can't meet inside if it's wet! We may try again on Tuesday 15th September. As always, everyone is very welcome. If you would like to come, please to be sure to ring or email first to book your time.

We hear that India is now the third-highest country in the world for its number of Covid-19 cases: by the time you read this it will be even higher as it is still increasing rapidly. It isn't quite as rampant in the countryside, such as in rural West Bengal where Suchana is situated, but it is very serious in Calcutta which isn't far away. The area is still in total lockdown two days a week and partial lockdown the rest of the time, so it isn't yet possible for Suchana to re-open its much-valued classes and support groups.

The Suchana teachers and volunteers have, instead, been busy distributing PPE as needed, together with story books in 26 surrounding villages, and transcribing for publication more local stories, (many of which haven't been written down before) in .the languages spoken by most of the children, which will provide them, and other Adivasi children with much-needed opportunities for first language learning and literacy.

So the Suchana project that we support continues to be busy and productive, and is very much looking forward to welcoming the children back as soon as this is allowed, for the wide range of learning support groups and classes for these very marginalised children and communities. Mere has been incredibly generous to this project over the last 10 years, and we're very grateful to everyone who helps to make this possible.

Link Scheme

We were saddened to hear of Diane Pringle's death. Diane was a valued Link driver for many years and we were privileged to be able to help her get to medical appointments as her health deteriorated. May she rest in peace.

The Link Scheme continues to provide transport during this period of relaxation of the coronavirus lockdown, taking clients to hospital or other medical appointments and delivering prescription medicines in our weekly dossette box run for Mere and Silton surgeries.

The number of available drivers has reduced to 10 as many of our volunteers are over 70 and not available to drive at present. There is beginning to be an increased demand, but we are still coping. We primarily cover people living in the local villages.

We continue to regularly review the changing advice from the Government and Community First who oversee Link Schemes for Wiltshire Council. The safety guidelines we introduced to protect both clients and drivers from the risk of spreading the virus are still in operation. Both driver and passenger have to wear a face covering while in the car and clients have to sit in the back where this is practical. Drivers carry hand sanitiser and wipe down all surfaces that may have been touched by the client while in the car.

Donations continue to be received and for the present we remain in a sound financial position. However, we do need more drivers. **We would appreciate hearing from anyone who is under 70 and wishes to help others.** Contact me on the Link Scheme number for more information.



Mere Rivers Group - Wildlife Sightings for 2020

Thank you once more for sending us all your sightings, which have been interesting. June in particular proved to be a wonderful month for seeing butterflies, and flights of marbled white and meadow brown butterflies were reported. Also people seemed to be noticing more bird calls. Other nature sightings are listed below:

June - seen daily: mallard and her five baby ducklings and eight older ducklings on the Shreen at Waterside.

A pair of moorhen were first reported on their nest and, later in the month, with their three chicks. Goldcrest seen three times, chiffchaff seen three times and flights of marbled white and meadow brown butterflies.

Seen once were: water rail, green woodpecker, grey wagtail, a buzzard circling, a group of four sticklebacks, light emerald moth and a scarlet tiger moth.

The calls of blackcap, whitethroat, bullfinch, goldcrest and chiffchaff were heard.

July – seen daily: pair of moorhens, initially with their three older chicks and later in the month building a new nest with six baby chicks appearing towards the end of July. Subsequently it was lovely to see the older chicks helping with rearing the babies!

Other sightings in July: water vole seen twice. Seen once were: - heron in flight, small trout, holly blue butterfly, bullfinch and polecat.

Nature Notes

Because of the fabulous weather throughout May there was an abundance of wild flowers which led to many butterflies being observed in the area. These included marbled white, meadow brown and holly blue, already mentioned, but others seen further afield were peacock, red admiral, tortoiseshell, comma and various skipper butterflies.

Also seen further afield were a family of four kestrels, a pair of ravens and a drove of four hares.

The other thing noticed, during July, was the huge amount of berries forming on so many bushes and shrubs. This and the quantity of flowers seen earlier in the year are a result of a mild winter and warm spring and we would hope this should result in a fabulous feeding source for masses of small mammals and birds, including those on migration, so do please keep your eyes peeled and let us know. Thank you!

Firstly we were told that the pub had been sold and that Dawn and Brenden would be leaving on August 28th however it seems that at that point it wasn't actually the case and nothing had been signed or finalised. So after we gathered for an emergency committee meeting we had news that we could place a new bid with the Estate Agent and raised an incredible amount in 48 hours along with a letter of support from our finance company which we believed was sufficient to make a bid.

It is however with great regret that I have to report that the initial bid was accepted over ours as it was a cash offer without further hindrance or delay and the transfer would be going ahead with the initial bidder.

Dawn and Brenden have secured a new but temporary property in Somerset and as of August 28th if the new owner hasn't himself secured a new tenant the Butt of Sherry will close. We wish the Bromillows all the best for the future and thank them for their efforts.

We are trying to work with the new owner to secure the appointment of a new tenant but we feel this may not be easy in the current pandemic climate. We will still work tirelessly to maintain the Butt as a hostelry and will further fight any efforts to overturn the Asset of Community Value order and any future change of use applications, this will be carried out under the banner of the Butt of Sherry Preservation Society with the Mere Community Benefit Society being mothballed once share monies have been repaid.

Huge thanks to all those in Mere for the way you have supported us and hope we can rely on your support in any future efforts to keep the Butt of Sherry for the community.
