

Become a Councillor

Elections are scheduled for all parish, town and city councils in Wiltshire and will take place on **Thursday, 6th May**. If there is anyone interested in becoming a Councillor, please contact our Town Clerk for further information and a nomination form or go to the Electoral Commission's website:

https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/media/5016

The nomination forms will need to be taken to **Salisbury by 8th April**, so please do so without delay. As a local Councillor you can become a voice for your community and make real change.

To be able to stand for election (or co-option) to a local council, an individual must meet certain qualifications (by law). They must be:

- Over 18 and a UK, Commonwealth, ROI, or EU Citizen and
- An elector for the parish, or in the last 12 months, have occupied land or premises in the parish, or work in the parish (principal or only place of work), or live within 3 miles of the parish boundary

All existing councillors cease to be councillors and will have to be nominated for election if they wish to stand again for the next term (2021-2025).

Mere Town Council has 15 seats. It therefore follows that if there are more than 15 nominations, we will have a contested election. If there are only 15 or fewer nominations then there will be no contested election and those nominees will be elected unopposed.

In the interests of endorsing democracy, the Town Council would prefer to have a contested election. It gives weight to the role of being a local Councillor if members know that they have been democratically elected to represent the views of the electorate – their community.

I presented PCSO Peter Tcherniawsky, a Certificate of Appreciation from the Town Council in recognition of his work in Mere as he is retiring at the end of March. PCSO Pete was a visible police presence in Mere and he built up a good rapport with varied sectors of the community and he will be sorely missed. We would like to wish his successor PCSO Daniel Gill a very warm welcome to Mere and would urge you all to have a chat with him if you see him out and about.



The Town Council will be following government guidelines on the roadmap out of lockdown and will be reopening tennis courts, Multi Use Games Area, Skate Park and other sporting facilities as and when we are allowed to do so and we will be applying the appropriate usage restrictions in accordance with the government and individual sporting guidelines. If there are any coaches, leaders or individuals who use or would like to use the Town Council's land or facilities for activities and classes, then they will need to submit an application form for the council to consider.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Meritorious Mere: well done to all award winners during the year. **Richard Jefferies** was awarded a **BEM** (The British Empire Medal) in recognition for his contribution during the Covid-19 pandemic.

The Wiltshire Life Magazine Awards to our local youth group Seeds4Success, under the leadership of Jaki Farrell and her team, winning the *Community Group of the Year* category. Louise Bennett has won the *Local Hero of the Year* category, raising funds for the *Stars Appeal at Salisbury District Hospital* and Dan Beckles of *furniturebox* has won the *Young Entrepreneur of the Year* award category. The High Sherriff Ashley Truluck, has also presented Anne Rich a certificate in recognition of her work providing the food bank, especially during Covid, again well done to all of them.

Students who need to have a lateral flow test before they go back to university can get tested at one of Wiltshire Council's symptom-free testing centres. Testing sites are currently located at, Chippenham Monkton Park, Devizes Leisure Centre, Salisbury Five Rivers Health and Wellbeing Centre and Trowbridge County Hall. Each centre is open on weekdays and same day appointments are available. Booking is mandatory.

Anyone who receives a positive Lateral Flow Test result automatically activate legal obligations to self-isolate, and may also claim for a Test and Trace payment if they are eligible.

On the buses!

Wiltshire Council will be reintroducing the normal time restrictions for using concessionary bus passes from 8 March 2021. From that date, concessionary bus pass holders can only use their bus passes from 9:30am on weekdays, but can continue to use them



at any time at weekends. Bus companies have been advised of the changes.

In response to the appeal last month in regard Dog fouling and the depositing of plastic bags with excrement in public places. Grateful thanks to Lucie Payne for

her voluntary work using bags supplied by Mere Town Council who have kindly agreed to dispose of.

The expansion of the lorry parking site next to Leaping Frogs Nursey at Zeals has been resisted by Zeals Parish Council and the AONB, in keeping with my principle of supporting local parish councils, if the recommendation from officers is to approve, I have requested by right, it is heard by a committee where the decision can be fairly made in public, where those in favour or against have a chance to put their view.

Liz and Vanessa know what resources are available to help. When life seems a bit overwhelming they can help identify where support is needed so that everyone can live a fulfilled, safe and independent life.

Mere Carnival

I have recently had the opportunity to read through many historic documents relating to Mere and in particular the Carnival events and Procession day.

Some of the earliest documents and newspaper cuttings dated back to 1962 and made interesting reading. Years ago the Carnival was preceded by as much as

two weeks of activities including a torch light procession up Castle Hill which started the Carnival festivities.

In some years the level of entries and numbers were very high on Carnival Day itself with as many as 48 entries alone for the children's afternoon procession. In one particular year there were 6 bands and more than 20 vehicles in the evening procession.

On Carnival day itself there were stalls set up outside, mostly local clubs, such as the Brownies and Women's Institute all contributing to the community atmosphere.

Sadly there are also articles referring to the lack of support in running the Carnival and in 1988 the Chairman said that if at least another 7 people did not ioin the committee there would not be a carnival the following year.

So here we are in 2021 and our committee is very small again. We need people to join us when we are allowed to start planning again so do keep a look out over the coming months. It would also be great to bring back some of the activities which used to take place and make Mere Carnival bigger than ever.

Mere Rivers Group Wildlife Sightings for January and February 2021

It is early March as we write. January was a cold and wet month, February was a mixture of cold, wet days but also warm and sunny days. As a result, we had quite a variety of wildlife reported including a brimstone butterfly. Kingfishers were observed a few times along the Shreen at Waterside. During the winter months, when there is very little foliage on the trees and bushes, its electric blue plumage can be seen all along our waterways usually in rapid flight from perch to

perch. As the days get longer and we head into spring, they fly to areas where there are high, muddy banks into which they can build their nesting tunnels.

Listed below are the sightings for January and February:

January: little egret seen 10 times, kingfisher - 6 times. Grey wagtail, pied wagtail and grey heron were all seen once. The call of the tawny owl and goldcrest were heard. Clumps of snowdrops were seen along the Ashridge at Burton.

February: little egret seen 9 times, moorhen seen 4 times, grey wagtail and grey heron both seen 3 times. The following were seen once - water vole, tree creeper, mistle thrush, flock of red wings, a charm of wrens, mallard duck, 2 rabbits, sparrowhawk and brimstone butterfly. The tawny owl was heard. Finally a congregation of 11 little egrets and another of 9 were seen in the Hinks Mill area.

Nature Notes

Those of you who have been out and about would have seen snowdrops and lesser celandine appearing along our lane edges and within the hedgerows. They truly are the first signs of spring! By April, as you are reading this, the lovely yellow primroses should be showing everywhere. Hopefully the weather will be warm enough for more sightings of the brimstone and also the orange tip butterfly. Anyone awake early enough will be treated to the birds' dawn chorus as they become very active in attracting new mates and starting to build their nests. If you are very lucky you may see hares boxing in our surrounding fields. Remember it is not two rival males boxing for a female, it is the female seeing off a male, who is being too persistent!

Whatever wildlife you see when you are out on your walks, please let us know. As always, we are particularly interested in our waterway's wildlife. Kindly report your sightings to mereriverwildlife@btinternet.com. We look forward to hearing from you.

Work on the Covid vaccination programme continued in February as we were delighted to take 20 local residents to have their first Covid vaccination at the Michael Herbert Memorial Hall in Wilton, Sturminster Newton Medical Centre or Bruton Community Hall. At the same time other medical appointments have begun to increase so we had a total of 72 trips in February. Not as many as a "normal" February but considerably more than the six trips in April last year!

A lot of work has been going on behind the scenes on developing a new Link Scheme website. Many thanks go to Steve Hoffman who volunteered his time and expertise to produce the new website **www.merelink.org.uk** which went live on 15 March. We are also very grateful to Doug Pike who oversaw our previous website for many years. If you have some free time do have a look.

Our volunteer drivers are available to take you to medical appointments, including Covid vaccinations, and shopping, if resources allow. Once you have an appointment please call **01747 860096** to book a Link driver. Please try to give us 48 hrs notice if possible. Over the Easter weekend please note that the Link phone will not be manned from Good Friday to Easter Monday (2-5 April) inclusive. If you need to travel during that time please give us as much notice as possible so that we can arrange a driver.

We continue to use the safety guidelines we introduced to protect both clients and drivers from the risk of spreading the coronavirus. Both driver and passenger have to wear a face covering while in the car and passengers have to sit in the back where this is practical. Drivers carry hand sanitiser and wipe down all surfaces that may have been touched by the passenger while in the car at the end of each trip. Unfortunately, we are unable to take people from different households in the same car.

Mere School

The value of volunteers in school

I hope we are approaching the end of a very strange period in school. We have all missed the many volunteers who come in to help our children and teachers.

Our volunteers help us with all sorts of things, mostly hearing the children read but we like to make full use of our volunteer's talents and skills! One of our volunteers is a retired teacher and she was spending one morning a week helping our children in years 3 and 4 with their learning. Another runs our after school Kwik Cricket Club. A local artist worked with one of our teachers and Gold Class to produce some beautiful Henry VIII portraits. Many help on school trips. Lockdown has meant that our children have been missing our much appreciated team of volunteers.

How do I volunteer?

Anyone who wishes to volunteer in school needs to complete a DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) with our office team to check that they are safe to work with children. This takes about 15 minutes and we ask you to bring some evidence to help us complete the process (driving licence, passport, recent utilities bill. National Insurance number). Once

we have received clearance we ask our volunteers to complete some school paperwork and reading and

then we introduce them to a class. The class teacher and teaching assistant will then welcome and induct the volunteer.

There is a financial cost to the school of completing these checks, so we do ask that our volunteers can commit to helping on a fairly regular basis. In these difficult financial times it is important that we are spending our school budget wisely, and unfortunately we just do not have the budget to pay for DBS checks for one-off volunteer sessions – as much as we may like to.

We have a lot of parent/grandparent helpers who like to help in their child's class, but we do like to welcome volunteers who are unconnected to the school. These volunteers add a different dimension to school life and the children thoroughly enjoy talking to them and asking them questions about life outside school. I know that our volunteers also

enjoy talking to the children, but there is the added magical feeling that we all get when a child learns something new from

the help they have been given, or when we have had the opportunity to make a child's life a little easier. Our teaching staff have a hectic day but our volunteers have time to chat with our children.

We are hoping, when school life gets back to normal, that we can welcome back our volunteers. If you are interested in volunteering please give the school office a ring. We would welcome you 'with open arms'!

Walking in Mere

We are very lucky to be living in such a beautiful part of the country and in such an interesting town. There are so many little paths and places to explore as well as our Castle Hill and the more spectacular Downs. Every season brings its own joys and interests. However if you need some help in finding out where to go there are a number of groups you could join where you would have the advantage of good company and probably infinite knowledge of the area!

- <u>The Walking Group</u> arrange monthly walks from Spring to Autumn usually taking place on Sunday afternoons and involve a walk locally and in the wider area of about 6 miles. Transport is shared and details are posted outside the Post Office a few days beforehand.
- Short Walks For those who are unable to walk so far or prefer a gentler stroll of 2-3 miles, there is a monthly walk (not January and August) around the local paths with a cup of tea and cake at the Angel Tea Rooms afterwards. Details of these are included in each edition of Mere Matters as days vary but usually start at 2p.m. in the Surgery Car Park.
- Walking in Mere Cards. If you prefer to explore on your own or with friends and family, a set of walks have been produced by the Footpath (maintenance) Group, chaired by Alan Mead. The 6 cards are available at the Tea Shop, Sprout and Flower, Walton's Post Office, The Library and Stourhead Shop for £3.
- Mere Meanders Mere's houses and buildings hold a varied and interesting history. A small leaflet, produced by David Hope through the Historical Society, and sponsored by the Chamber of Trade, outlines the main buildings of interest. This costs £1 and is available from the Library, Tea Shop and Stourhead. There are often themed Guided Historical Walks.
- <u>The Red Arrow Trail.</u> Starting from the Square, a trail of red arrows painted on the pavements takes you on a walk around the town. It is about 2 miles long and a good family challenge!

More good news from Suchana. With local state schools still closed (though the infection rate remains very low) Suchana is proving an educational life-line for children and communities in their corner of rural West

Bengal. They have set up a local 'covid recovery strategy' doubling their weekly schedule in their main centre and in all the additional library, early learning and IT education centres recently established.

This provides support and stimulus for 'adavasi' children who have had no access to online learning during the long year of school closures, and are thus even more disadvantaged with the danger that they might drop out of education entirely. Suchana is working hard to stop this and to continue to offer them a chance for a fuller and better life. In relation to this, Suchana is also developing a new area of work helping Suchana 'graduates' to find apprenticeships, jobs or further training opportunities after leaving school.

Meanwhile Suchana's pioneering first-language work has helped to secure a contract with a publisher which includes the appointment of a project manager for that aspect of Suchana's work, making it also available for other adavasi communities further afield.

With so much good work going on Mere Suchana Support Group is keen to continue to help fund the core work of this unique project, and we have interesting fund-raising plans as soon the lifting of restrictions allows. The cake stall next to the Post Office, deferred from March, will now take place on **Saturday morning 17th April** - offers of cakes very welcome. Look forward to seeing you there!

Plans we had a year ago for Chamber activities in 2020 collapsed in the face of the Covid crisis.

It seems clear that the future will run under different rules to the past so the Committee is reviewing how we might continue to meet our aim of supporting local businesses and promoting tourism.

Some suggestions have been made and we are grateful to our Wiltshire Councillor, George Jeans for his continuing support. But what might be the future role of the Chamber?



The formation of the Chamber of Trade is lost in history but it seems to have been some 50 years ago. Then, the number of traders in the town was measured in dozens rather than the three or four major businesses and seven or so smaller ones of today.

The focus of developing businesses today is largely a single person, home-based venture either internet dependent, or craft based. This can feel a lonely path but the Chamber has offered support, advice, and encouragement. This took the form of monthly coffee meeting sessions arranged by one of our members in the Hill Brush Restaurant, providing social contact and an opportunity to mull over mutual business problems for those working from home. They had to be suspended but hopefully will resume when Hill Brush reopens.

We would also like to focus on the position local businesses are taking to become more environmentally friendly or provide associated services and deliveries when we are able to operate again unrestricted.

Our website merechamberoftrade.co.uk provides an online directory of local businesses. This is a free service for them to reach the people of Mere. If you are new to the area and looking for local services, please make use of it and support your local businesses. If you are a small business and not yet listed, please do consider it now and contact us via the website.

In all cases an internet online presence will be vital for advertising, sales, publicity of any vacancies, presenting new opportunities to the local area, and stimulating the local economy. As part of our future plans, we invested a year ago in a dedicated internet server, located in a secure London data centre. This is available for any locally based business to host their website on a shared cost basis. There are also locally based web services companies available to advise on best practice.

Now is the time to launch new ventures, especially for products or services which are seen as essential or desirable in the reduced economy of the next year or two. If this is you, we'd be delighted to welcome you and provide any help we can.
