A belated Happy New Year to all readers. Christmas seems like a distant memory now but the Town Council would like to thank all those who participated in the Xmas illuminations – you all certainly helped to make the town look festive and merry which, during this particular year, went a long way to cheering us all up and taking our mind off the COVID-19 restrictions and the fact that many of us could not be with our friends and family. I would like to thank George Jeans for organising and sponsoring the Xmas Light competition- we understand the winners are:

1st - Halfways, North Road, 2nd - 38 Lynch Close, 3rd - 8 Denes Avenue 4th - Oaktree House, Southbrook, 5th - 47 Downside Close

I would also like to thank the Town Council staff for coming in over their Xmas holidays to empty the bins and do some essential gritting around the car park, library and doctors surgery areas and for resolving some issues around the public toilets.

The Town Council held its Annual Budget meeting in December. This meeting is where members have to consider likely expenditure and income over the next financial year in order to determine the precept requirement (Town council's share of the council tax). This is the most challenging meeting of the year but we did eventually manage to make a set of recommendations which were agreed and subsequently approved by the Town Council at the January meeting.

Wiltshire Council is undertaking a review of the Local Plan. The current Local Plan is the Wiltshire Core Strategy. The Government requires every Local Plan to be reviewed at least once every five years. The Core Strategy was adopted in 2015 and is therefore being reviewed. Wiltshire Council has to allocate sufficient land to satisfy housing and employment needs up to 2036, and is seeking the views of local communities and stakeholders to see if the suggested distribution of numbers across the county is correct, and which of the proposed sites are most suitable. The Local Plan Review Consultation is currently taking place but as COVID restrictions mean that face-to-

face events will not be possible during this review, they are currently holding a series of online events. Please Google 'Wiltshire Council Local Plan Review' to find out more information and to book your place at the online events. (NB the events most relevant for the Mere area will be the two 'Rural Area' events taking place on Monday, 1st February and Tuesday, 2nd February between 7 and 8 pm.) Feedback during this review consultation will help to shape the draft Local Plan which will then be used to guide decisions on whether future planning applications for housing, infrastructure and land for employment can be granted.

We have had complaints and various discussions at Town Council meetings about problems with on-street parking in and around Mere. I know that this is a general problem in many, many towns and villages throughout the country due to the fact that towns and villages were not designed for so many cars. At Town Council meetings we often discuss the merits of requesting further parking restrictions in places where there are particular problems but we are also mindful of the fact that

this is likely to displace those parked cars to other areas and cause problems somewhere else. I am sure that this is going to be an ongoing problem but I would like to put a plea out to all residents to be considerate about where you are parking – in particular, please observe the Highway Code:

Rule 243

DO NOT stop or park:

- near a school entrance
- anywhere you would prevent access for Emergency Services
- at or near a bus or tram stop or taxi rank
- opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space
- near the brow of a hill or hump bridge
- opposite a traffic island or (if this would cause an obstruction) another parked vehicle
- where the kerb has been lowered to help wheelchair users and powered mobility vehicles
- in front of an entrance to a property
- on a hend

For clarity, in accordance with the government guidelines, we are keeping all the play areas open but would like to remind all users to follow the advice in the signage erected at the play areas and to remember that the play equipment is not cleaned or sanitised. Secondly, I would also like to point out that in accordance with government guidelines the Skate Park is CLOSED. It is difficult for us to physically close off the skatepark but signage has been erected to this effect. The Multi Use Games Area and Tennis Courts are also closed. Please observe the government guidance.

On the positive side and with the roll-out of the COVID vaccine, there does seem to be light at the end of the tunnel and we are very hopeful that we can get back to some normality in the near future.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

I was very sorry to hear of the passing of Brian James who as chairman along with a committee of dedicated people of Mere May Fayre raised £260 000 for Cancer Research UK by the 40th anniversary of the committee in 2013. It was a tremendous effort for all of them, videos were made around the early 1990's by Waterside Productions (Peter Manning) that show how the Fayre bonded local people at the time. The committee was started in 1973 with Mrs Dorothy George as Chairman, and was closed down 2019 with Brian still as President.

For years now the surface of Boar Street near Mere Post Office required total resurfacing. I am pleased to see this has now been achieved. I am also pleased to see the replacement yellow lines.

I said last month, I raised at the South West Area Board the fact Mere Library should be at least open for pre-order and collect, by coincidence or otherwise it was agreed quickly. Now with another National lockdown Monday and Friday opening has been reduced to Fridays order and collect services as well as bookable computers to customers during the national lockdown. Customers are expected to use their local, nearest library to reduce unnecessary travel. Safety

remains the priority at all of the council's libraries, and customers will be asked to wear a face covering and use sanitiser before using a computer. The Home Library Service, providing books to the vulnerable in their own homes, will also continue. People need to contact their local library for more information or visit the website. Loan items continue to be renewed



automatically until the end of February so there is no rush to return items currently on loan. Wiltshire library members can still download eBooks and eAudiobooks and read eMagazines. All the details can be found at https://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/libraries-ebooks . With Covid still present, postal voting is likely to be popular, best to apply in plenty of time. This is the link for electors to download and print absent vote applications from the Wiltshire Council website:

www.wiltshire.gov.uk/elections-register-to-vote.

Methods of voting for the proposed 6 May 2021 election are as follows across Wiltshire:-

- i. PCC Election is counted using the supplementary vote system. Details are available on the Wiltshire Council website at: https://www.wiltshire.gov.uk/elections-pcc
- ii. Wiltshire Council Unitary Election normal ballot paper with voting for one candidate only
- iii. Town and Parish Council Elections normal ballot paper number of seats to be elected can range from 1 to 15 seats depending on area (electors to vote for 'no more than 'x' candidates).
- iv. Neighbourhood Planning Referendum ballot paper shows the Referendum Question and 2 boxes titled 'Yes' or 'No' to the right of the ballot paper.

The current stance is that Parish Council's are not recharged. However, this is now under review. A report has been published which will be discussed by Cabinet and Full Council.

Postal vote forms will not be provided to Post Offices by the Electoral Services Team. However, electors can contact the Electoral Services Team for a postal vote form (or any other absent vote application) to be sent to them. This can either be requested by calling 0300 456 0112 or by e-mailing elections@wiltshire.gov.uk. If an



elector struggles with the digital side of things, this can be requested by a family member or friend for Wiltshire Council to post directly to the elector. Powers of Attorney appointed for electors can also assist with this. I will print a few application forms that can be collected from Mere Post Office, no one should help you fill in this application beyond advice you can obtain from a Wiltshire Electoral Services Officer or a Government official publication. A303 Deverills underpass repair, Mere – 19th October 2020 to 1st April 2021 is now scheduled for the 25th Jan 2021 to August The underpass which carries the A303 over the B3095, near Mere is in need of repair. Concrete repairs, rewaterproofing, replace bridge joints, and finally replace surfacing and lining. Expect delays this summer. This project impacts on B roads that Wiltshire Council are responsible for, however I believe any questions you have regarding the project you have should be addressed to Highways England, 03001235000 or info@highwaysengland.co.uk

PCC Macpherson has launched a survey to collect feedback on policing: what is being done well and where improvements could be made, as well as a proposed increase in the policing element of the council tax. The suggested increase equates to £15 a year, per household, on a band D property.

This follows a recent national announcement made about central police funding which was based upon the assumption that all PCCs would seek to use the maximum flexibility afforded them by the Government to increase local precepts. In 2020, Wiltshire recorded the lowest policing precept in the South West. Even



with the increase, the band D average for Wiltshire will remain lower than the regional and national average. Mr Macpherson has warned that if the policing part of the precept is not increased next year, Wiltshire Police would need to find savings of more than £3m and would have no alternative but to reduce staff undertaking essential services. The extra £15 a

year funding, or £1.25 a month, means that Wiltshire Police will recruit 46 additional officers for Wiltshire in 2021/22. The Force is also on track to recruit this year's target of an additional 65 police officers by March 2021. This will take officer numbers to 1,050 - the highest number of Wiltshire Police officers in six years. The additional 46 officers in 2021/22 would see officer numbers rise to 1,096 by March 2022. The consultation runs until Tuesday, February 2. I asked

the assistant PCC Commissioner at a recent South West Wiltshire Area Board: I had been informed by an elector that if the increase goes ahead it should not be justified just because those returning a positive reply were of a high percentage of the total returns, the total number of returns usually represent a small percentage of the total number of returns possible by Wiltshire's population.

Dog fouling and the depositing of plastic bags with excrement is constantly reported to me. Cllr Alan Mead a few years ago walked and distributed a leaflet regarding this subject to all of Mere, it helped for a while. The Wiltshire dog warden does not have the capacity to help with this problem. Mere Town Council has no street cleaner at present. Extra Dog bins need regular emptying usually at a cost. A television program advised that a video is required in most cases to lead to a successful prosecution. Toxocariasis can cause sight loss in rare cases, which is caused by parasitic worms in dog mess. From Mere Surgery

We are all excited to hear about the progress of the rolling out of the Covid vaccine and look forward to this improving the quality of life for all of us.

We know that you, like us, are struggling with the continued confines imposed upon us all due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Everyone is trying to make the best of the situation and, as a practice, we are committed to caring for you in the best possible way whilst keeping both you and our team safe. This is greatly helped by close liaison with the PPG – this is our patient representative group that ensures we remain in close touch with our patient community. All details are on the Mere Surgery website.

To keep you as informed as possible, we will update these messages frequently as we become aware of more information from NHS England:

- The vaccines are being rolled out in a very strict order and we will continue to invite patients in the order below:
 - o Residents in a care home for older adults and their carers
 - All those 80 years of age and over and frontline health and social care workers

- All those 75 years of age and over
- All those 70 years of age and over and clinically extremely vulnerable individuals
- All those 65 years of age and over
- All individuals aged 16 years to 64 years with underlying health conditions which put them at a higher risk of serious disease and mortality
- All those 60 years of age and over
- All those 55 years of age and over
- All those 50 years of age and over
- Please do not contact the surgery nor the hospital to seek a vaccine
- We will contact you when the NHS has informed us that you are eligible
- We are still open if you have any medical concerns and we will offer advice via the telephone whenever we can to prevent you leaving home unnecessarily



As a surgery, all of our over 80 year old patients who wished to have the vaccination have now been booked an appointment.

We are pleased to say, there have been no adverse reactions reported for those who have received the vaccine.

We have contacted Health and Social Care Workers and we are now contacting patients in the 75 years of age and over who will receive either a letter or text message with details on how the appointment will be made.

This week we have vaccinated our housebound patients, where it is impossible for them to leave home to attend an appointment for the vaccine.

Please continue to wait to be invited for your Covid-19 vaccination. The vaccine has been arriving with little notice but we anticipate this will improve and we will be able to have appointments released more frequently. As soon as we have confirmation of deliveries and appointments are available to book we will contact you.

Our staff, who are asymptomatic (not showing symptoms) are carrying out the Lateral Flow tests twice a week to ensure we continue to provide a safe environment for our patients visiting the surgery and our colleagues we work alongside.

It is vitally important to keep your contact details up to date by visiting our website and completing the Contact the Practice form, this will help us speed up the process when we need to contact you

Please remember with the current rapid increase in Covid-19 cases it is even more important to:

Wash your hands Wear a face mask as advised Keep 2 metres apart

PPG - the patient representative group of Mere Surgery

The PPG meets monthly with Mere Surgery to discuss a wide range of issues which have either been brought up by you, through the Mere Surgery website, have been picked up on the "Mere grapevine" (rumours can be dangerous things...), or have been passed on to us as messages for dissemination by the NHS. This month we have two key messages:

- Beware scam phone calls and text messages offering the Covid 19 vaccine. The vaccine is only available from the NHS and the NHS will contact you when it is your turn. The NHS will never ask you to press a button on your keypad or send you a text to confirm you want the vaccine. It will never ask for payment for the vaccine or for your bank details. Stay aware.
- Think 111 First: as you know the NHS in 2020/21 has been called upon in a way that has never been seen before. The health service is evolving to ensure care is available for all who need it. One such way is to encourage people to ring 111 to access a range of urgent care services so they get the right service at the right time. This includes, for the first time, directly booking people in to see emergency departments, minor injuries units or urgent treatment centres so stopping A&E being clogged with too wide a range of patients during this particularly dangerous time. Of course, people experiencing a life-threatening health emergency should always call 999 or immediately travel to the nearest hospital emergency department. Equally nobody will be turned away from the

emergency department if they arrive having not called NHS 111 first. However, if it is right for you think 111 first over this winter.

Public Urged To Be Vigilant To Avoid Scam Vaccine Messages

Following reports in other parts of the country we are warning the public to be wary of messages claiming to be from the NHS asking the recipient to apply for their vaccine.

At a time when people are already feeling anxious and eagerly awaiting details of the impending vaccine,

scammers are using this to their advantage to commit fraud. If you receive such a text, don't follow the link or share any personal or financial details. The link will take you through to a fake NHS

website which is purposefully designed to exploit vulnerable people.

Fraudsters have tried to use the vaccine as a convincing subject to hook potential victims since the pandemic began. Thankfully reports have been relatively low, however

there has heen an increase in the last two months. The vaccine rollout brings further hope of fighting coronavirus and keeping people safe. Now that this is imminent and has been SO widely covered. some people mav be more easily misled.

You will be contacted by the NHS when you're invited to receive the vaccine which will be offered in some hospitals, some pharmacies and hundreds of local vaccination centres run by GPs. Remember that the

vaccine is free of charge, at no point will you be asked for payment details.

Detective Sergeant Sean Tregunna commented: "Although we've not been made aware of any cases in Wiltshire yet, it's likely to only be a matter of time before we are". The text message some people have

received was shared on social media over the

Christmas period and although this does help to raise

awareness of the issue, the most vulnerable may not be on social media themselves so we're asking people to share the information and warn their friends and family.

The same scam has also been reported as being conducted over the phone,

the caller often asks for a number to be pressed on their keypad, resulting in a charge likely being added to their phone bill, so you simply need to hang up.

We're keen to prevent as many people falling victim to these scams as possible and

urge people to not only share the warning but if they do receive a suspicious text, forward it to 7726 which is free of charge.

Since then the Trust has increased its remit to meet the changing needs of

our community: where appropriate they conduct a full fire risk assessment as well - installing smoke detectors and CO monitors where necessary and secure the homes of people experiencing domestic abuse. But it is probably their latest initiative. Stav Safe Online that meets the current challenges of modern day life. Cyber-crime is the Nation's fastest growing crime - with around one third of fraud occurring online. The Trust now has a team of 7 volunteers who carry out home visits, improving awareness through education and therefore helping to prevent computer enabled fraud.

The Charity does not work in isolation but cooperates efficiently with a wide variety of other organisations, such as Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Victim Swindon Service Support. Women's Aid, and many others.

In addition to securing reductions in the number of domestic burglaries, additional benefits have included the reduced fear of crime and social withdrawal generated by the burglary, restoring the confidence victims and their increased participation in the day-to-day activities of our communities.

Surviving Winter Fund

Wiltshire residents can claim up to £250 (whilst funds last!) to help with their heating and fuel bills over the cold period. This time round we are paying either for top up vouchers for their prepayment meters or credit into their energy account if they pay by direct debit. We can also help with solid fuels also such as LPG gas bottles, wood or coal.

To be eligible, the applicant will need be in receipt of a means tested benefit, of pension age, or of working age and receiving a disability benefit (or they/someone in the household has a health condition worsened by the cold). They also need to be struggling with their fuel bills and keeping their home warm. The fund can also help with boiler repairs of up to £300.

To apply, call our advice line number on 0800 038 5722. We would need either recent benefit award letters or a recent bank statement showing benefits being paid into their account. It is not essential that all of the information is provided in the referral as we will be picking these up and calling those back to gather any additional information! We can also provide freepost envelopes for those to send their evidence back to us.

Horses of Mere help me manage through lockdown

My name is Poppy Ross, I'm 13 years old, I want to share with you what is helping me through lockdown while recovering from chronic fatigue syndrome.

Having chronic fatigue has really restricted and cut off so much of my life; not being able to do what I love or just go to school full time like a normal teenager. I found myself stuck at home while everyone else got on and enjoyed their life. Then the corona virus hit and the small part of a normal life I had, was almost all gone.

To start with walks weren't an option, partly because there was just nothing motivating me, but also I just was not physically able. But then I found it, the reason to get out every day, the horses of Southbrook. They finally gave me something to enjoy. I have loved horses all my life and hope to be an equestrian vet when I'm older so they also helped me remember my love of horses.

It was amazing to be able to go and talk to the horses. I really believe they've helped me so much: physically, because the short walk to their field was beginning to help me build back a little bit of my strength; as well as mentally because it helped me take a massive break from feeling rubbish. When I go to visit them, I forget that I have chronic fatigue syndrome and that I'm ill. I love talking to them and every time I hear Toby the donkey "eor" it makes me giggle. It shows how much animals can really help us.

So thank you to the people who own the donkey and horses, just seeing them in your field has made the last year so much better.

P.S If anyone knows were the sandy coloured horse with a black mane has gone then it would be great if you could let me know as he was definitely my favourite and came to talk to me the most and maybe if he's in a field on a footpath route I could add him in to my little walk.

From Poppy's Mum.

Imagine a sports-mad, turbo charged, sociable and confident young girl, who's highlight of her time at primary school is being given the role as sports ambassador in year 6. This was Poppy two years ago and little did she know that that was all about to change after a severe case of food poisoning back in April 2019. That's how cruel Chronic Fatigue Syndrome (CFS) is, one day you feel find, the next you get ill, your immune system takes a knock and then you can't understand why you're not recovering.

CFS (also known as ME) is a long-term chronic illness with a wide range of symptoms, the main one being severe and persistent fatigue and exhaustion, along with nausea, pains and trouble focusing. Poppy's body does not produce enough energy. Imagine your energy like a battery charge, each day a healthy person would start the day at 100% charge

whereas Poppy will start the day with 10-20%. The result of this is not having enough charge to get through the day. Every day things we take for granted like chatting to a friend, having a shower, going to school, playing sport or watching a film all take up high levels of energy for Poppy. So, to help manage her CFS and to prevent 'payback' (her symptoms getting worse) she has to track and plan out her day so that she doesn't use up too much high energy.

CFS has impacted on Poppy in so many ways. She can't go to school full time, has had to stop all her sports and out of school activities and it has stopped her being able to go out with her friends, doing all the fun things teenagers should be doing. But even with all that she keeps finding things to be grateful for and to make her smile.

"I never thought we would be in a position where we had to use a food bank but over the last year we could not have managed without the Mere Food Bank. This service has been invaluable to my family and I will be forever grateful to Anne and her team for all there help and support.

If you get the chance to donate to a food bank please do because your donation will really help someone in need and will be so appreciated also you just never know if one day you might need them to help you."

Its only a Sharp Scratch

My Covid iab was booked for January 7th at 2.27pm at the Michael Herbert Hall, South Street, Wilton and Lehose to drive in on the B3089 because I know the road and it's such a pretty drive. Coming into Wilton on this road turn right at the traffic lights the Michael Herbert Hall is down on the right hand side and was easy to see because of all the hi-viz iackets (perhaps I should say I am very long sighted!) I parked close by on the roadside, there was some off road parking which might have been reserved for wheelchair users but there were plenty of people to ask when I went. Even though I was a few minutes early I was told to go straight inside, so I didn't have to hang about in the cold. My name was checked against a list, a card was written out with name, date and details of vaccination type (Pfizer). I have to keep this card in a safe place as proof of vaccination.

It was all highly organised with many people to help, I was moved along from chair to chair (carefully wiped after each use) arriving at a table where there were 2 young people manning a laptop, the nurse doing the vaccination and at least 2 other people helping out. The jab was quick and painless, the hall freezing because all the windows and doors were open but somehow knowing that, although the space was large and full of people. it was very well ventilated, the cold didn't matter. On being seated in another chair after the vaccination a slip of paper was handed to me with a time written on it - my personal exit time. There was a large clock facing the room to count off the 15 minutes before one could leave - with permission from one of the many room stewards who seemed more than willing and able to help anyone who needed it to get back to their car. Unlike the flu iab I had a chance to talk to the nurse who did mine who said she and her co-workers would be doing this job every day 'until it was all done'. Hats off to them!

In spite of January 7th being very foggy for part of the journey it took me 1.5 hours door to door from my house in Pettridge Lane. Other than a slightly sore arm for a couple of days I had no noticeable side effects and in fact my arm was less swollen and sore than after my last flu jab.

I await a date for part 2 of the vaccination.

Mere Rivers Group - Wildlife Sightings for November and December 2020

The sightings covered below are those sent to us during November and December. Both months were very wet so thank you to those who were hardy enough to get out and take the time to let us know about the wildlife you saw!

In both months 4 juvenile moorhens were seen daily on the Shreen at Waterside.

In November a kingfisher was seen four times. A small flock of blue tits and a grey wagtail were seen twice. The following were seen once - great spotted woodpecker, pair of pied wagtails, coal tit, 3 mallards, emperor dragonfly, pair of magpies and collared dove.

In December a kingfisher was seen twice and a little egret and grey wagtail were both seen once.

Nature Notes

For those who got out and about, the wildlife was easier to see with no leaves on the trees or bushes. Both months were very wet but unseasonably warm and, as a result, insects were still active and a bumble bee was seen on Castle Hill as well as the dragonfly reported above. A barn owl was heard and a small murmuration of starlings was seen circling above the town, as was a red kite. Others have said how pleased they've been to see the birds in their gardens. These have included sparrows, goldfinches, chaffinches, blackbirds, wrens, blue tits and great tits.



Redwing and fieldfare, both winter visitors, are in the shrubs and hedges. Little egret, moorhen and mallard ducks can be seen on the water or under the overhanging branches. However, the most beautiful bird to see along our waterways is the kingfisher. Keep your eyes open and enjoy your time with nature. Please make sure you report all your river and stream sightings. Thank you.



And we <u>have</u> kept going! The worst of the winter is behind us, the birds are pairing up and their singing fills the dawn; a dawn getting earlier and brighter every day! Croci, daffodils and snowdrops break the brownness of the earth and we have shown remarkable *Sisu*. Not just getting through another dreary winter, but getting through a mentally and spiritually hard one, with the virus precautions stopping us from being close to our friends or family, and fear threatening to steal our God-given joy. We cannot not build up herd immunity to the virus until all countries have efficient vaccine programmes. Thanks to the generous support of many people, our cake stall, deferred from November, went ahead on 5th December and was a great success, making £258.80 in just over an hour. People seemed to be as happy

to see us as we were to see them! All being well and the then current restrictions permitting, we plan to hold another cake stall near the Post Office, around Easter time. Please look out for us (and offers of cakes will be very gratefully received!). Looking ahead as optimistically as possible, our little committee is also planning to hold outdoor coffee mornings in the Spring and late summer; and if (it's a big if) the Grove Building is open by then, we're dreaming of a Summer evening 'Quiz and Pud' evening (instead of our sadly cancelled Shrove Tuesday Quiz & Pancake event): see later editions of Mere Matters for details.

In spite of the present situation, we felt inspired to be bold in our planning by the impressive example of the Suchana project itself. Although infection rates are relatively low in West Bengal, all government schools have been closed since March last year and remain closed, and online learning is out of the question for most children Suchana, on the other hand, has been very busy, having opened cautiously in September and fully from December, Ishani, whose only experience of formal school up to GCSE was at Suchana, is now helping there in her pre-university gap year, and was able to join our planning meeting by Zoom. Her enthusiasm was infectious as she described how the 30+ staff. (many of them volunteers and some part-time, including 5 Suchana 'graduates') have been finding new ways to expand their 1st language literacy programme in scattered village settlements - while at the same time distributing sanitiser, Covid-aware posters and emergency PPE. They have established new early learning centres, enabled the publication of 270 story books in the two main languages spoken by the local children, and distributed copies widely in pre-school centres and elsewhere, and are pioneering ways of supporting literacy developed through the use of mobile phones. They have doubled the mobile library hours, together with a sophisticated recording system, and much else. You can discover more from their Facebook page.

In these dark days, it is very encouraging to be involved in a project where a little goes such a long way in improving life opportunities for so many children and communities. Thank you so much for your help.
