Mere Town Council

Not only was this month's meeting the first with the newly elected council but also the first face to face meeting for quite sometime. Throughout the lockdowns of the last year, the business and administration of Mere Town Council has kept going in unprecedented and difficult circumstances. I would like to thank the retiring chairman, Clive Hazzard, Town Clerk Lindsey Wood and her assistant Sonya Ward, the groundsmen and all other staff for valiantly carrying on so efficiently. There has also been a tremendous force of volunteers who have helped with so much. Talking of which, as part of the "Great British Spring Clean" project, 22 volunteers turned out on Sunday May 23rd to pick up litter from around the town. Despite some morning rain, they returned, cheerful, with a pile of litter to be collected and taken away. It was good to hear that, in general, our streets and paths were quite tidy already. It has become apparent that Mere has been supported by many groups during the pandemic and we should all be proud of this community spirit, which the council is hopeful to foster in the future.

At our meeting, time was taken up by the official criteria necessary after an election. There was, however, several items of note, including an update of the PPG progress in trying to acquire the site of Fives Court, as a community health centre - this is, very much, supported by the Town Council and the people of Mere. Also, it was brought to our attention that £9778 in business rates has been paid back to Wiltshire Council. Lastly, the Town Council was informed that there will be a temporary road closure along Castle Street, The Square and Salisbury Street (B3095 from junction with Gillinghm Road to its junction with Water Street). The road closure will be required weekdays between the hours of 09.30 and 15.30 from 28th June 2021 until 6th July 2021 (7 days effectively). This is, obviously, going to cause disruption. Councillor, George Jeans, I know, has written about this in his report.

Wiltshire Councillor ~ George Jeans Writes

Tuesday May the 18th was a busy day for me - Trowbridge by 8-30 to sign acceptance after being returned Wiltshire Councillor for the Mere Division, for which I feel very humble after receiving 1332 votes. I would like to thank all those that voted for all the candidates. I shall try to continue to support all those in the Mere division, this includes Mere, Stourton with Gasper, West Knoyle, Zeals and Kilmington. I usually support the majority on an issue, which can upset some, this I have to accept. Full Council followed on the 18th which was in The Civic Centre at Trowbridge, this was because the Council Chamber was not large enough to allow sufficient social spacing regarding Covid. In the Evening I attended Zeals and then West Knoyle parish Council. At Wiltshire Council in Trowbridge, the old atmosphere and the "buzz" I knew a year and more ago have not fully returned, however it was nice that all these meetings, Wiltshire Council or local councils were real live events and not conducted via a computer screen.

I have printed the temporary closure notice and map of Gillingham Road to its junction with Water Street, to enable Wiltshire Council to carry out carriageway resurfacing and associated works. This Order will come into operation on 28 June 2021 and the closure will be required weekdays between the hours of 09:30 and 15:30 until 06 July 2021. I have displayed these in Walton PO and by the Salisbury Street Car park, plus I have worked with Mere Town Council and Wiltshire Council and its contractors to put a statement on Mere Mutters. In that statement, please note, "Given the concern that was raised by local businesses and residents when a similar temporary road closure was applied back in early 2019. Cllr. Jeans has made contact with Wiltshire Council and the contractors. They have confirmed that they cannot carry out the work at evenings and neither can they do the work one carriageway at a time and neither can they delay the work until the school holidays as their timetable is booked for that period. They have also confirmed that pedestrian access will be unaffected and access for all emergency services will be maintained. For access discuss with the traffic management team that will be in place at the time." I know this is difficult, many will want the road maintained, and others will want the work done at another time.

Wiltshire now have 15 to 17 % of waste going to landfill. This is an improvement, however I hope this can be improved as the present cost to the tax payer is significant.

I propose and will keep you informed in future regarding a car club for Mere, allowing use of an electric vehicle at an affordable cost, roads. Improvements for Norton Ferris road junction where I was recently nearly involved in a serious accident, plus making Gillingham Corner Junction safer for walkers returning to Mere.

"Waltons Footpath" after considerable input by many who wanted this route, the inspectors has not supported, I do not wish to take out of context however he has commented, "A number of supporters of the Order pointed out the

advantage of the use of the Order route rather than a nearby alternative along Manor Road. Manor Road is narrow with no adequate footway and is used by large vehicles, it is therefore unattractive and potentially dangerous for pedestrians. I understand the concern expressed and accept that the unattractiveness of this alternative would have made it likely that people might have preferred to use the Order route when they could." Hopefully these words may help a possible request for improvement from pedestrians using the Manor Road route.

Regarding broadband improvement in south Wiltshire, no more Boards for Openreach will be held as they have now finished their ultrafast rollout however, Gigaclear is continuing to build until the end of this year in North Wiltshire. In my opinion improvement now will be because of commercial operations, government vouchers or even may be legislation.

Mere Surgery Patient Participation Group (PPG)

Each month members of the PPG are interviewing team members at Mere Surgery to highlight key services available to Mere Surgery patients. This month, I interviewed Dr Andrews, Dr Taylor and Practice Nurse, Polly Sealy, about a new service for women:

New Women's Health Clinic at Mere Surgery

The new clinic combines all women's health services so that expertise, time and resources are available at specific times, providing a better patient experience with more time for each appointment.

Dr Andrews is keen to encourage women to book into the service if they have an issue to discuss. She advises that "*The clinic covers a range of women's health issues, including contraception advice coil fitting, gynaecological issues and HRT. It's also useful for anyone who really struggles with smear tests. Issues around sexual health are usually referred on to Wiltshire Sexual Health services, so it's best to contact them directly (wiltshiresexualhealth.co.uk).*"

The clinic runs as a joint 4-hour session with a doctor and nurse available on alternate Tuesday and Thursday mornings; Dr Andrews and Polly Sealy run the Tuesday clinic, whilst Dr Taylor and Francesca King run Thursday sessions.

Practice Nurse, Polly Sealy, explains, "*It's a safe space for women to come and discuss their health issues and no problem is too small. The clinic enables more time for women to ask questions and we have a lot of resources to share, including information and leaflets". "Many women suffer in silence, putting up with symptoms for a long time, when there are simple things that can be done to help them"*, adds Dr Taylor.

For straightforward issues like coil replacements, appointments can be booked directly through reception. In other cases, book a routine initial telephone appointment with a nurse (particularly for pill checks or coil questions) or doctor, after which you will be booked into the clinic if it's appropriate.

Feedback has been very positive and Mere Surgery are keen to promote this new service. However, if you can't make these times, then please don't worry, you can still access the same services. For emergency contraception, don't wait for a clinic, just contact the surgery as soon as possible.

PPG Survey results in regard saving Fives Court

Analysis of the recent survey showed that 1033 responses were collected. This represents about 27% of the residents of Mere and its environs over the age of 18. They voted overwhelmingly for the Fives Court to remain in community use (1030, 99.71%) and should be converted into a Community Health, Leisure and Wellbeing centre (1018, 98.55%).

Mere Surgery PPG would like to thank everyone who has been involved in this effort: the businesses that supported us, Mere Matters for publishing the Article, Mere Mutters for making us their banner, the volunteers who gave up their time and especially the residents of Mere and its environs who gave their opinion by responding to the survey.

Mere Surgery PPG is hoping to present the case for Fives Court to Wiltshire County Council in late June. If successful the PPG will be given 6 months to prepare a detailed business case which will include the use, funding, costs and ongoing support of the site. To prepare this business case a detailed survey will be held to understand the needs and wishes of the community. The paper being presented to Wiltshire Council will be available on the PPG section of the Mere Surgery website no later than **10th June 2021**.



Mere Rivers Group -Wildlife Sightings for April 2021

As stated in our March article, this is our last "Wildlife Sightings" article. We truly are very grateful to all of you who took the trouble to make a note of your sightings and then email them to us. These sightings made a big difference in our conversations with Wessex Water and the Environment Agency in regard to the abstraction of water and contributed to the reduction in abstraction during the summer months.

Below are the sightings for April which was a very cold and dry month. It did not stop the birds from being very busy nest building and feeding hungry chicks.

Along Waterside the daily life of the ducks and their ducklings was an ongoing "soap". At the beginning of the month there were only two ducklings left from the original clutch of ten. Another hen mallard had eight ducklings. Of these, five survived to the end of the month by which time this hen adopted the other two, who had been abandoned by their mother. The poor hens have a very rough time, trying to protect their young whilst consistently being pursued by various drakes.

Other sightings include:

Pair of Moorhen daily, initially on their nest and then, by the end of the month three moorhen chicks were seen being carefully looked after by their parents.

Seen once were the following: 2 trout, water rail, stoat, green finch, chiff chaff and a pair of grey wagtail. The call of a goldcrest was heard.

Nature Notes

April proved to be a very strange month weather wise. As stated above it was very dry and sunny but also very cold. As a result the trees were slow coming into leaf as were the plants. However it was an amazing month for the blackthorn blossom. The blackthorn remained in bloom for the whole month and lined our fields and roads with its beautiful white blossom.

By the end of the month, in sheltered areas, the bluebells, wood anemones and ramsons (wild garlic) were in bloom. Another plant that could be seen in several places was wild sage with its purple flower. Also the first swallows and house martins were seen flying over the town. Hopefully, by the time you read this, the swifts have arrived and are being heard screaming over our rooftops.



Once the weather improves and gets warmer there should be an abundance of wildlife so look out for butterflies, damselflies, beautiful demoiselles, fledgling birds and young mammals, especially hedgehogs in your back gardens.

Ton-up - Between January and April we made 101 trips taking people to their Covid vaccinations. Most were to Wilton but we also went to Bruton, Sturminster Newton and Westbury. Once again our main work in April was to Covid vaccinations and we took 30 local residents mainly for their second jab. We did a total of 78 trips in April and, once the outpatient clinics start catching up, I think we will soon get to the pre-pandemic number of over 100 trips most months. One of our longest serving drivers, Gwil Hitchcock, has decided to stop driving after 18 years volunteering. A truly great effort and I have written to him thanking him for his help.

Our volunteer drivers are available to take you to medical appointments, including Covid vaccinations, and shopping, if resources allow. Once you have an appointment please call 01747 860096 to book a Link driver. Please try to give us 48 hours notice if possible but we will try to arrange last minute requests.

We continue to use the safety guidelines we introduced to protect both clients and drivers from the risk of spreading the coronavirus. Both driver and passenger have to wear a face covering while in the car and passengers have to sit in the back where this is practical. Drivers carry hand sanitiser and wipe down all surfaces that may have been touched by the passenger while in the car at the end of each trip. Unfortunately, we remain unable to take people from different households in the same car.

Grandparents, aunties and uncles can all get involved in developing the reading of a child. Adults



have such a vital role in developing reading by checking understanding, asking questions, sharing views and making links with other books and the wider world. Importantly, adults can listen and enjoy books with others.

During the two recent periods of school closure that have had to occur due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the parents of our pupils have had to work incredibly hard to support their children in their learning, becoming the teachers at home and delivering multiple lessons each day. As a teacher and a parent myself, I have been astounded at the dedication of the majority of our parents, many of whom were working themselves throughout both lockdowns, but still managed to guide their child in learning from home. Because of this shift in focus of parents teaching at home, reading, in some houses, had to become secondary to the English, maths, science, geography, history, PSHE and art lessons that were asked to be taught. The workload for some parents and pupils unfortunately pushed reading for pleasure out of the day.

As we emerge from the shadow of this turbulent time in the education of our children, let's not forget the importance of reading and see this time, as households begin to meet, as an opportunity to deploy our whole community as willing listeners to our young readers. After all, as the saying goes, it takes a village to raise a child.

Letter from the Churches ~ Deacon Michael Hughes writes.

We called them Pongles where I grew up. You probably know them as cowslips. Have you SEEN them this year – and the bluebells that have been stupendous for over a month, and the scented violets and the secretive wild orchids?

Such beauty surrounds us – not the artifice of our gardens created by our labour and money - but the free God-given plants which have flowered in our woods and hedges a thousand years and more.



Last year of a warm sunny Spring afternoon – it was in

the frightening times - I went for a siesta after a good lunch and

lay out, fast asleep, in the woods among the nodding bluebells, the archangel and the wood anenomes. The thick carpet of flowers hid me from sight.

I was woken by a sense of presence, and opened my eyes to see the soft muzzle of a roe deer inches from my face. She had come to inspect me, and her limpid eyes- far more lustrous than all the cosmetics can make the human eye- and mine met in that stillness for a moment before she bounded away.

We are all given WOW moments when the beauty of our planet overwhelms us. When we don't just observe the deer (or the sunset or the ladybird on our hand) but feel it bless us in our core, like water on a dry wilting plant.

Can you think of such a moment of wonder in your life?

The effects of the way we destroy the environment will not be just on animals and plants. It will change the lives of everyone on earth for the worse. If we do nothing, people whose lives are already desperate, the hungry and the poor, will no longer be able to sustain life.

God gave us this beautiful blue planet to be our common home. We have to stop trashing it. What am I going to do? Go back to sleep among the bluebells, or take some tiny action to change the way I live?
